Hearing Set On Gooding 1962 Budget

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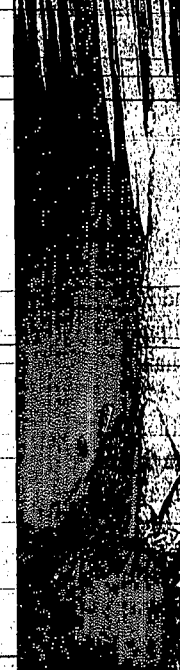

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Search for New Football Coach Begins at Idaho

MOSCOW, Jan. 16 (AP) — The University of Idaho was in the market for a new football coach Monday, but apparently will remain an independent with no conference connections for some time. Athletic director J. Nell (Skip) Stahley, relieved Sunday as head football coach, began the search for his own successor and hoped to find someone soon.

Stahley said he would be happy with the weekend action which relieved him of coaching chores and left full time for his duties as athletic director. The decision by the board of regents was coupled with an announcement that the school would emphasize of Vandal athletics in general, or football in particular. Idaho also appears likely to remain an independent school.

The new coach must be here for spring football practices in March. I will continue the recruiting work we have laid out. I will be out of campus about 100 days as I will be still head coach. All the members of my staff will be here through June 30," Stahley said.

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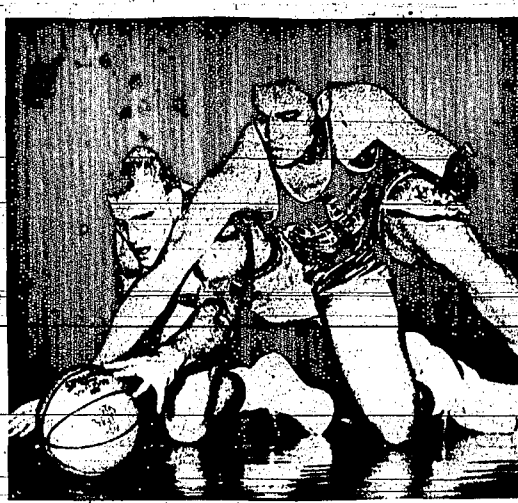
