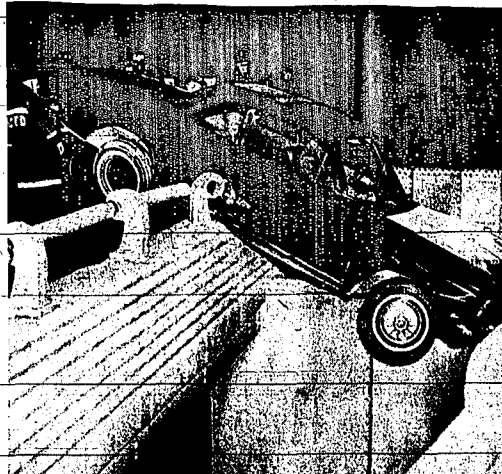

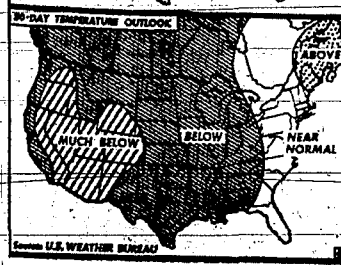
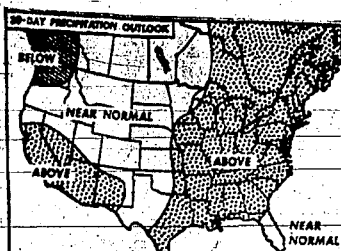
# Peace Corps Nigeria Girl Sets Wedding

### U.S. Planning Atomic Tests Pact Efforts

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP) — The United States plans a determined new effort in the next round of disarmament negotiations to get the Soviet Union to agree to a treaty banning nuclear weapons tests under an international inspection system, officials said today.

The United States will go ahead, meanwhile, with its program of underground test explosions and the probability is that in the next couple of months President Kennedy will make a final decision to conduct nuclear tests in the atmosphere.

Informants said today that the present trend of administration thinking is strongly in favor of atmospheric tests aimed at improving U. S. nuclear weapons performance and developing an anti-missile missile.

The next round of disarmament negotiations is expected to open in Geneva, March 14. The date and place are tentative pending approval of the 18-nations which will participate in the conference under U. N. auspices.

Nuclear test ban talks, which opened at Geneva almost three weeks ago, came to a dead-end Tuesday.

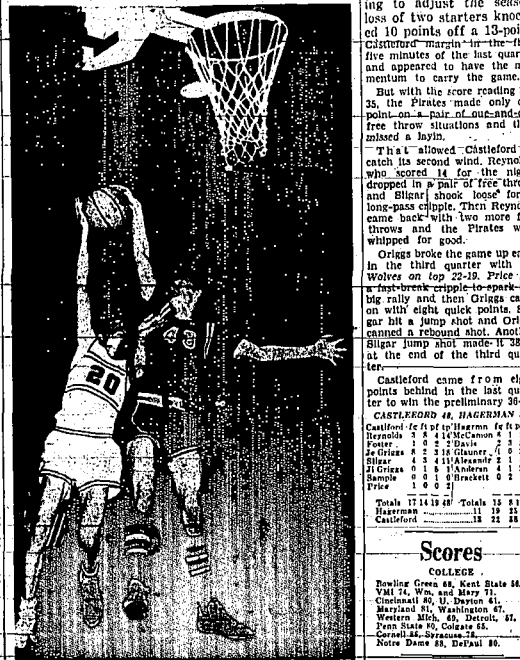
# Applications For Coach at Idaho Studied

# Colorado State, Utah Top Skyline League Statistics

DENVER, Jan. 17 (UPI)—The co-champions of the Skyline basketball league last year, Utah and Colorado State universities, are off to a good start toward doing it again. ### Inter-American Peace Unit Plans Castro Condemnation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—An inter-American peace committee report due today or Thursday is reported to condemn Cuba for acts of intervention, human rights violations, and Communist ties.

The Organization of American States report is based on the committee's investigation of Prime Minister Fidel Castro's regime in Cuba. The investigation was requested in a resolution introduced by Peru.

### Castro Seeks To Forestall OAS Resolve

HAVANA, Jan. 17 (AP)—Fidel Castro's regime today lined up heavy defense artillery for the inter-American conference in Uruguay. The government announced that President Oswaldo Dorticos would head the Cuban delegation and Carlos Rafael Rodriguez, one of Cuba's top communists, would go along with the rank of ambassador.

Until Tuesday, Foreign Minister Raul Roa was scheduled to head the delegation to the conference Jan. 22 which will take up charges that communism based in Cuba threatens the peace of the hemisphere.

The switch was interpreted as evidence Castro's regime is going to do everything possible to head off drastic collective action against it.

Except for the Uruguayan host, Dorticos is the only chief of state scheduled to attend the conference. A government spokesman said he would hold the rank of foreign minister during the meeting.

### California Politicos Split by Knight's Withdrawal Move

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 17 (AP)—State political leaders were divided today on the implications of Governor Goodwin Knight's withdrawal from the gubernatorial race, but all unanimously expressed regret that the veteran politician was forced to step aside.

John Krebbel, Republican state central committee chairman, said there were still "three other prominent and capable Republican candidates who have announced for this office."

Knight, 65, announced his withdrawal yesterday following a two-month battle with hepatitis.

"I was very sorry to learn that Goodwin Knight is still suffering all health," said Krebbel, "and I wish his many friends in wishing him a quick and full recovery."

"I would like to add that although Knight's illness is a personal misfortune, it points up the value of the free and open primary system to which California Republicans subscribe, in which there are three other prominent and capable Republican candidates."

Eugene Wyman, southern California Democratic chairman, voiced a different opinion.

"It will be the old story of Republicans having no real choice with (Richard) Nixon on the ballot," said Wyman.

With Knight off the GOP ballot, the former Vice President will run against former Lieutenant Governor Harold Powers and Assembly GOP leader Joseph Storch.

Wyman said "moderate Republicans" were left with little choice of candidates in the absence of Knight.

Joe De Silva, executive secretary of the Hawaii Clerks union, said De Silva responded to Knight's withdrawal by announcing he would register as a Democrat.

"I have discharged my personal political obligations to my good friend Goodwin Knight," said De Silva.

In San Francisco, Roger Kent, Democratic state central committee chairman, predicted after the primary, Knight supporters would "go solidly with Gov. Edmund G. Brown."

### Dynamite Rocks Negro Churches

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Jan. 17 (AP)—Dynamite explosions rocked three Negro churches—the first such violence involving churches here in 23 years—during the busy Sunday night.

No one was in any of the church buildings at the time and no injuries were reported by nearby residents.

Two police officers near one of the sites sensed received minor injuries from the force of the explosion.
