92.5 Billion Kennedy Budget Forwarded to Congress; Most Of Hike to Pay for Military

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—President Kennedy, in the first federal budget of his own making, called today for record peacetime spending of 92.5 billion dollars and a wobbly surplus of 436 million dollars—a margin possible only if revenues rocket and the price of mailing a letter is increased. The 1,500-page spending blue-print, which covers the 1963 fiscal year starting July 1, foresees a spending rise of nearly 9.5 billion dollars over the current level—More than 75 percent of the increase would involve military and space programs.

Kennedy told congress he expects outlays to total slightly more than 92.5 billion dollars—an amount exceeded only twice before—during World War II. Receipts are estimated at 87 billion dollars, an unprecedented level, 11 billion dollars higher than this year's income.

A defense program of \$27 billion dollars, or nearly 15 billion dollars, is the largest part of the budget. Allocation of 24 billion dollars for space research, an increase of \$1.3 billion.

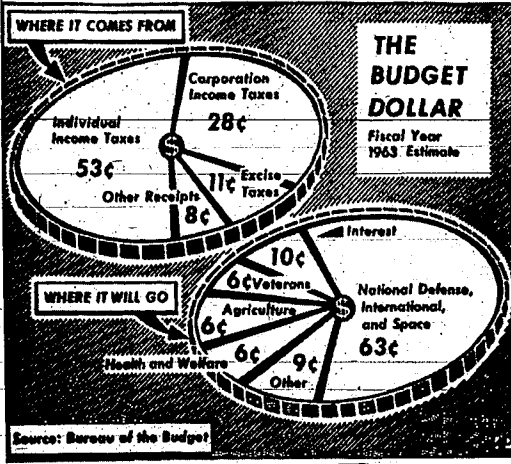
A foreign aid program boosted by 200 million dollars to 3.9 billion dollars, along with a 50 percent increase in spending figure, which totals 2.5 billion dollars in economic aid and 14 billion dollars military aid.

Repeal of the 10 percent tax on gifts and bequests, with later adjustments in aviation taxes.

Enactment of a new farm bill designed to cut farm program spending from 13 billion dollars to 8.5 billion dollars.

Increase the "temporary" 286 billion dollar tax on the sale of a new car to 200 million dollars.

Increase postal rates by about 60 million dollars a year.



Budget Highlights

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—Highlights of President Kennedy's budget, presented for the year beginning next July—

- Budget surplus—Spending will total 92.5 billion dollars, up 14 billion dollars over the record level in the current fiscal year. Revenues are estimated at 93 billion dollars, an increase of 10.2 billion dollars over present levels. This results in an estimated surplus of about 200 million dollars.
- Defense—Reductions in spending from peacetime, the postal deficit and temporary extension of the deficit permit, increase for education, health, housing and natural resource development "without raising significantly total expenditures for domestic civil functions."
- Defense spending—Defense budget is up 15 billion dollars over the current year to \$27.7 billion dollars.
- Shelter Program—The defense budget contains 100 million dollars for a shelter program designed to make space available for 50 million persons.
- Foreign Aid—Military assistance expenditures are declining to an estimated 14 billion dollars for the current year with 22 billion dollars five years earlier.
- Expenditures for economic and financial assistance to the developing nations of the world have been increasing over the past five years, reaching 2.4 billion dollars.

Successful Test Of X15 Reported

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Jan. 18 (UP)—With his third test, the X15 rocket plane opened up over three-fourths of the way pilot Neil Armstrong for the X15 rocket plane, 3,710 miles an hour Wednesday—more than five times the speed of sound.

The flight was a test of a new control system for the sub-wing speeder, Armstrong took the plane to an altitude of 153,000 feet, or 28 miles up.

Glenns Ferry Man Dies After Vehicle Upsets West of Bliss

BLISS, Jan. 18—Richard W. Tinsley, 32, Glenns Ferry, died at 8:05 a.m. Thursday at Magic Valley Memorial hospital, Twin Falls, of injuries received in a one-vehicle accident three and one-half miles west of Bliss on highway 30 earlier today. The man was thrown about 20 feet from the 1961 Chevrolet panel truck he was driving, and apparently had been lying at the site for several hours before he was found. State Patrolman Walker J. Kirtley said he was called at 3:50 a.m. after an unidentified truck

drive saw Mr. Tinsley's truck and notified King Hill port of entry.

The panel truck had veered from one side of the highway to the other, overturned on some rocks and landed on the top of the truck, the patrolman said. The top of the truck was level with the roadway, making it difficult to notice in the dark.

The Glenns Ferry man, who was alone in the truck at the time of the accident, was taken to Gooding Memorial hospital by ambulance and then transferred to Twin Falls later in the morning. He reportedly incurred a broken pelvis and left leg, as well as internal injuries.

This is the third traffic death for Magic Valley in 1962 and the first in Gooding county. The first fatality occurred Jan. 8 in Twin Falls county and the second occurred last Friday, four miles east of Burley in Owyhee county.

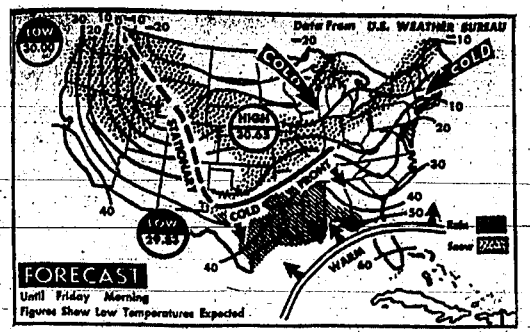

"Ways and means of acquiring opportunity for training their otherwise-mighty-minds" were the subject of discussion Tuesday by the Twin Falls County Council for Retarded Children.

The project was brought up for consideration after the group heard a report from Mrs. Leah Hill, past president of the Twin Falls council who now lives at Alhambra, Calif.

Mrs. Hill told of such a center in Alhambra and was enthusiastic about its value. She mentioned that retarded children of all ages use the center, giving children over school age an opportunity for training their otherwise-mighty-minds.

Also, it was pointed out that such a center would include workshops in which the children could pursue their crafts and turn them into profit.

The Twin Falls group noted that there is a great need here for a place in which all its activities can be concentrated. Anyone interested in helping on the project is asked to contact Lynn Knutson, telephone 733-2055.

Crowded condition of the special education classroom in the junior high school was stressed by Paul Kenny, teacher. He reported that Boyd Lowe, school guidance director, has said there are at least 18 students in regular junior high school classrooms who should be added to the special class.

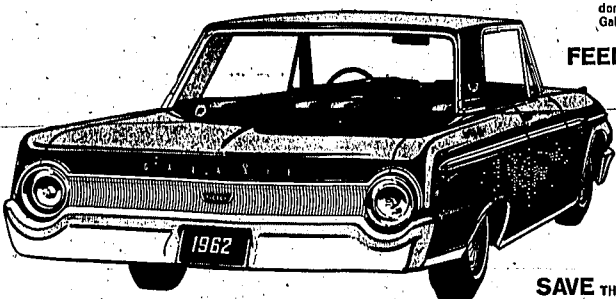

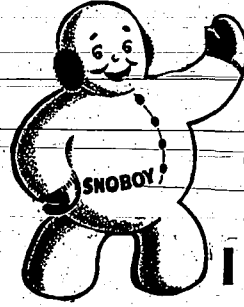

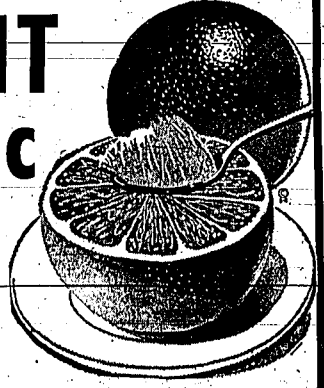

Federal Unit Backs Farm Labor Right

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—A cabinet level committee called Wednesday for extension to farm workers of union bargaining rights, minimum wage and unemployment insurance laws already in effect for other U.S. workers.

These aims were included in a program adopted by President Kennedy's migratory labor committee—and endorsed by the president himself—as a blueprint to aid "one of the most unprivileged groups in the American labor force."

All members of the committee were notified on the report. Asst. Arthur J. Goldberg, secretary of labor and chairman of the migratory committee, and Orville L. Freeman, secretary of agriculture and a committee member.

But Freeman stressed that the capacity of farm operators to provide better conditions for their workers is conditioned on their receiving more income. Freeman said he is sure more would do so voluntarily if they could afford it.

Committee members, besides Goldberg and Freeman, include Secretary of State Dean Rusk, I. Udall, Secretary of Welfare Abraham A. Ribicoff and Robert C. Weaver, housing and home finance administrator.

The committee made clear that the administration is planning its immediate hope looks ahead on five migratory labor bills already passed by the senate. They would provide a federal program for health and education aid to migrant families, curb use of migrant children as farm labor and control migrant labor agents and contractors from excesses.

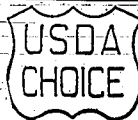

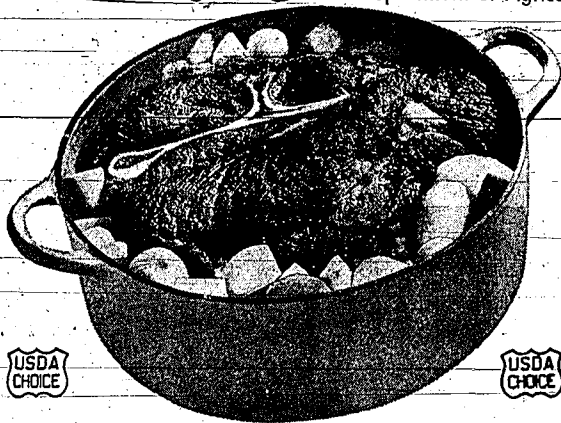

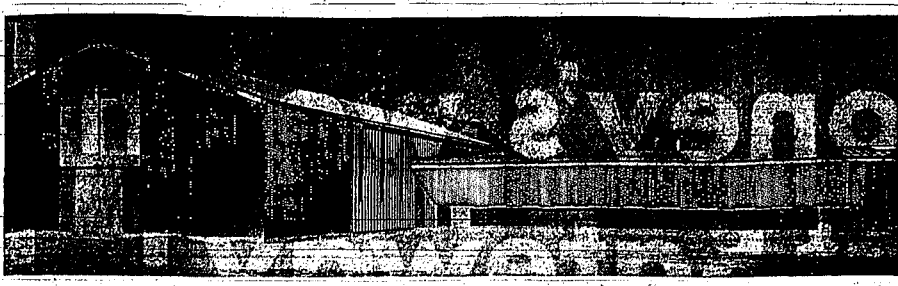

Rotary Club Has Speech On Far East

"There will be another Pearl Harbor if the United States does not agree to give to the communist nations that we mean business," stated Kilsoo Han, authority on Far Eastern affairs, predicted his attacks on Pearl Harbor and South Korea, during the Rotary club's luncheon meeting Wednesday noon at the American Legion hall.

Kilsoo is head of the Sino-Korean Peoples League, a non-government group organized in 1952 to aid U.S. intelligence in the Orient. As an authority on Far Eastern affairs he supplies the state department with reports on the Far East.

Kilsoo said within three years, Red China will become a full-fledged military partner to Soviet Russia. He predicted that atomic weapons ready for nuclear warfare. Between 1954-55, the Sino-Soviet alliance will demonstrate its strength with America.

Kilsoo stated when Soviet Russia and Red China feel they are economically stronger than the U.S. and have superior nuclear weapons, they will demand that America withdraw troops from Europe. When this happens and the U.S. does nothing, the communists will try to push the troops out. If this happens there will be another Pearl Harbor, Kilsoo predicted.

He said Russia has stockpiled 60 and 70 megaton bombs and has revised its nuclear strategy to make use of those bombs. According to Kilsoo, a Russian general told the Chinese that a nuclear war can be won in the first 24 hours and that only the stockpiled bombs can destroy our underground missile and administrative centers.

When the bombs are dropped and exploded, Kilsoo said, the blast will neutralize all electrical equipment for from 16 to 24 hours, thus giving the enemy the edge.

Distance Dial Plan Is Told At Club Meet

Twin Falls' new direct distance dialing system, scheduled to go into operation Feb. 18, was discussed by Neal Cronin during the Wednesday noon luncheon meeting of the Twin Falls Rotary Club in the Rogerson Hotel Roundup room.

He explained that direct distance dialing can be used only by telephone subscribers on a separate or two-party lines in the area. Personal or personal calls, club calls, calls from motels, hotels or pay phones and collect calls still will be placed through operators.

Cronin explained that when a person places a direct distance call, his number and the number of the telephone being called are transmitted for an automatic tape, along with the area code number if the call is to an out-of-town telephone. Other notices on the tape include the starting time and completion time of the call.

The tapes, which automatically account for all DDD calls through the Twin Falls exchange, will be mailed each day to Salt Lake City, where the telephone bills will be tabulated.

Cronin pointed out that there will be a universal information number that persons may call to get information on telephone numbers in other cities on the DDD system.

After dialing an access number, which will connect the caller to the Idaho DDD system, and dialing the area code of the city or area in which the called number will be, the person calling will dial 555-1212, which is the universal information number. The number always will be the same, Cronin explained, whether the caller dials information in New York City, San Francisco or Salt Lake City.

He added that if a person dials the wrong number and ends up dialing an incorrect number, he should ask the called person for the town he is in and his telephone number.

Budget Calls For Slice in Travel Taxes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP)—Good news for travelers: President Kennedy asked congress today to repeal the 10 per cent federal tax on railroad and air travel—effective July.

The proposal—believed likely to win overwhelming approval by the lawmakers—would mean a tax saving of 70 million dollars a year for passengers.

In a message outlining his new budget, Kennedy also proposed that the 10 per cent tax on airline tickets be cut to five per cent next Jan. 1. He said this would cost the treasury about \$2 million dollars a year in revenue. He urged that almost one-half of the lost revenue be recaptured by levying additional taxes on aviation fuels and a new five per cent on air freight.

The President recommended that the effective date of tax changes affecting the airlines and their passengers be delayed until next Jan. 1. This would give the civil aeronautics board time to determine what increases, if any, in fares should be required to enable the airlines to pay the new fuel taxes.

Thus, the effect of the tax proposals would be to lower the cost of railroad and bus travel without necessarily bringing much, if any, reduction in the over-all cost of airline tickets.

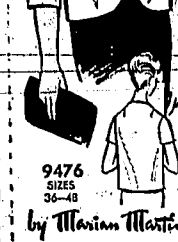

Cold Affects Housewives' Grocery Cost

Housewives who found the recent extreme cold registered in higher fuel bills now will find its effect in their grocery bills.

The increase may not be as marked as some early reports indicated. One large regional grocery chain said it will mean two or three cents a pound more for certain vegetables.

It added that the freeze in Florida and Texas growing areas will push up the price of onions, spinach, beets, cabbage, peppers, cucumbers, eggplant and squash.

Despite the freeze shoppers will still find plenty of budget-stretching bargains in carrots, onions, potatoes, sweet potatoes, broccoli, celery and lettuce.

Good buys, fruit counters will continue to include apples, oranges and grapefruit.

At the meat counter beef again will be a feature, with lamb and pork good regional buys. Broiler-fryers and turkey are still top meat buys.

One nationwide chain is holding a beef sale, and has dropped prices on a number of cuts. At New York, sirloin steak is down 10 cents to 24 cents a pound, and rib roast down 4 cents to 85 cents a pound.

The frigid weather and heavy snows have held back some vegetable shipments, resulting in a general price rise.

Fish continues to be influenced by regional tastes and availability.
