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NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Of last year's continued and controversial aid-to-education issue, the administration has learned the hard way that it is not possible to get to one type of educational aid, at a time.

Therefore, next week, the senate will attempt to pass a bill to assure federal participation in both public and private colleges and universities.

This will be the first major item of the President's legislative program to reach the senate floor since congress convened on January 10. Unhappily by procedure that would require presidential approval, the bill appears assured of passage. But not until after Sen. Barry Goldwater, R., Ariz., has put up a stiff fight against it.

HOUSE TO ACT, TOO—More than likely a similar bill will reach the house floor in the next few weeks. The committee is expected to consider and probably send to the house a bill sponsored by Rep. Edith Green, D., Ore.

The committee last week voted up all aid-to-education legislation mainly because of the parochial school question. It is expected that the bill will be amended to reach the senate floor.

With all the hurrah, legislative in-fighting and final deadlocking in connection with the entire program, it is not surprising that the bill is unfamiliar with the exact details of what's in the senate higher education bill. It was not approved by the senate floor until July 15, just before congress adjourned.

WHAT BILL PROVIDES—By following Acheson's thread back through the legislative maze to the bill itself, known as H.R. 1241, here is what emergency bill will provide for a two-year program of \$1.5 billion dollars in loans to public and private nonprofit institutions of higher learning for construction, remodeling and equipment.

A two-year program, totaling 148.5 million dollars for scholarship aid to highly qualified students who cannot afford to pay their college bills. No student would receive more than \$1000 a year. They would be chosen by state commissions and administered by the federal government at all college that will admit them.

Matching grants to states, amounting to 350 million dollars in a five-year period for the construction of two-year "junior colleges."

PLANET OF PRECEDENT—There is nothing new about the federal aid to school construction. It has been granted through the "impacted area" program. Federal aid to college students are nothing new if you consider the G.I. bill with its millions of dollars worth of education. The national education act, however, only gives loans to students.

Junior college grants are not out of keeping with present practice. The bill is expected to be passed in the next few weeks. It will not be until after two of the senate's most-ostentatious orators have had their day. They are: Sen. Wayne Morse, D., Ore., chairman of the education committee, and Senator Goldwater, ranking GOP member of the full education and public welfare committee.

PREVIEW OF ARGUMENTS—Morse will elaborate on the President's statement in his State of the Union message that "enrollees are going to school for the first time in 100 years."

He will say, also, that 60,000 very bright high school graduates cannot go to college because of lack of funds.

Senator Goldwater will maintain—as he did in a minority report on the bill—that "within a year 50 percent of present rate of rapid growth in college enrollment will be met."

He also says that many smaller colleges are looking for students and often college scholarships go begging.

It will make interesting—and confusing—listening. But the bill will pass the senate. It will probably be passed by the house. The president has learned it is better to have half a loaf than none at all, as was the case last year.

Douglas Flah, regional manager of the National Dairy council, said consumers do not have to fear fallout in milk or in other foods since the radiation is very small.

Ernest T. Kellogg, director of technical services, said that the thinking of authorities seems to be that milk is connected with heart disease, but the industry is left with the slogan "milk is the cause of the disease of the people."

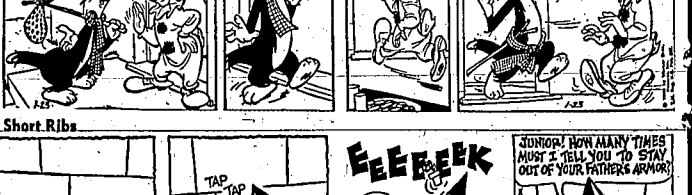

OTTAWA, Jan. 23 (AP)—The Canadian government announced last night that it planned to ban the importation of foreign magazines and periodicals to bolster the nation's sagging magazine industry.

The proposed measure was announced by Prime Minister John Diefenbaker.

He said the action would be taken to prevent the importation of so-called "spies" magazines and periodicals. The United States is the source of 40 per cent of such magazines and the restriction was expected to result in loss of profits.

"Spill-run" magazines are those which carry advertising aimed specifically at the Canadian market. Diefenbaker said the legislation also would discourage Canadian advertisers from using such publications.

Such action is expected by the ban would be the Reader's Digest and Time magazine.
