They announced plans Tuesday to merge. The consolidated line would be called American Airlines, retaining the name of the pioneer Eastern Air Lines from the roster of American carriers. The proposal is to create a system with 900 million dollars in assets, 39,000 employees and 400 aircraft will be submitted to stockholders of both companies and the civil aeronautics board.

Rupert Area Growth Cited For Chamber

RUPERT, Jan. 24.—The importance of the development of the community was stressed by Dr. Nelson at the annual meeting of the Rupert Chamber here Monday night.

Dr. Nelson said at this period in the growth of the community, the challenge to the chamber is greater than before. He pointed out that Rupert showed a 33 per cent increase in population during the past several years, with an increase of 50 per cent for Blaine county. Russia, Red Chinese Battle Over Way to Control World

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The row between Russia and red China over communist strategy for conquering the world has become so intensive neither the Soviet nor the Chinese leaders have the power to put an end to the dispute.

U.S. officials said that the dispute could lead to an outright split between the two huge communist powers although they do not think it is at all probable, at least in the foreseeable future. What they do expect is a continuation of the bitter argument which has produced a sharp ideological division between Moscow and Peking with a steady but slow worsening of relations between the two communist governments.

The U.S. policy toward this cold war within the red bloc is to sit by and see what happens, officials feel that any open effort to exploit the communist differences would probably backfire.

Evidence is found in a Moscow broadcast to China last week that the Soviet leaders may now be trying to reach over the heads of the Red Chinese leaders and persuade the Chinese rank and file communists that Soviet policy is right.

The broadcast, made in the classical Mandarin Chinese which is widely understood in China, said they held Tuesday at the American Legion hall.

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U.N. Praise Of Resolve Is Foreseen

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Jan. 24.—U.S. delegates predicted today the general assembly will give overwhelming approval to an Asia-African resolution calling on Portugal to end her rule in Angola and start the West African colony on the road to independence.

The resolution was submitted Tuesday—40 sponsors—and was expected to pull as many as 95 favorable votes in the 19-nation assembly, well over the two-thirds needed for approval.

The draft was assured support from the 51 members of the Asia-African bloc, the 19-nation Soviet bloc and many of the 20 Latin-American states.

The United States, Britain and France have given no indication how they will vote on the proposal, which asks all member states to deny Portugal a NATO membership—any support that could be used against the Angolans.

A U.S. spokesman said the resolution had been sent to Washington for study in this summer, when the inquiries will be made against the American position Thursday. Observers predicted, however, that support for the Asia-African draft.

The French and British still were studying the draft.

T. G. Hoffeller, district director of the immigration and naturalization service, said Wednesday aliens in the Montana-Idaho district have only one more week in which to comply with the federal law requiring that aliens report their addresses to the government during January of each year.

"The immigration official urged all aliens who have not yet complied, to go as soon as possible to the nearest postoffice or immigration station and naturalization service office to file the report. Parents or guardians must file the report for alien children under 14 years of age."

Hoffeller said the address report is required each year from all aliens except those in diplomatic status, representatives of certain international organizations and persons admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers. He pointed out that failure to comply carries penalties including a fine and deportation.

Spanish Hold Ringleaders' Of Dope Ring

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Three "ringleaders" of a 150-man dollar narcotics ring who helped bail and fled the country have been arrested by authorities in Spain, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said last night.

Kennedy said that Frank Canino, 50, Brooklyn, and Vincent J. Mauro, 45, New York City, were arrested in Barcelona while en route with false Canadian passports. Salvatore Maneri, 48, Palermo, Sicily, was arrested on the island of Mallorca and taken to Barcelona today, he said.

The three were among 24 men indicted last May 21 in New York City in connection with an international narcotics ring. Eleven of them have already been tried and convicted.

Two others were found slain and a third-style after the indictments were handed down. None of the ring was described as having smuggled about 150 million dollars worth of heroin into the United States in 10 years.

Senator Asks Embargo for Cuban Trade

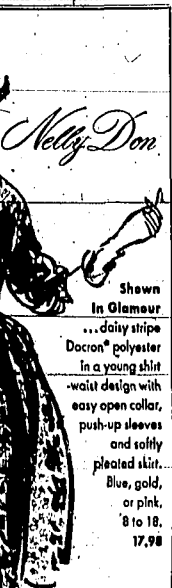
Food for Americans

PINEAPPLE-LOBSTER
You'll be surprised how delicious the combination of rock lobster and pineapple cubes can be. In this recipe, there are water chestnuts and pickles also. Served with fluffy rice, this unusual dish is a genuine surprise treat.

Rock Lobster With Pineapple
(Yield: 6 servings)
6 (4-ounce) South African rock lobster tails
4 tablespoons peanut oil
1 shallots, diced
2 water chestnuts thinly sliced
1 green pepper, cut in strips
1 cup pineapple juice, well-drained
1 cup sweet pickles, sliced
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1 tablespoon cider vinegar
1 tablespoon grated ginger root

(Juice with pulp)
1 tablespoon cornstarch moistened with water
Parsli rock lobster tails by dropping in boiling salted water. When water boils, cook one minute. Drain immediately and dredge with cold water—O. U. away thin undrained membrane and remove meat from shells. Cut each tail into 5 or six pieces. Heat oil in heavy skillet. Add shallots, water chestnuts and green pepper. Sauté lightly. Add pineapple cubes and pickles. Mix together pineapple juice, vinegar and ginger. Add and simmer all together for a few minutes. Stir in the cornstarch and cook until thickened. Add rock lobster pieces, bring back to boiling point and cook in sauce for four minutes. Serve immediately with rice.

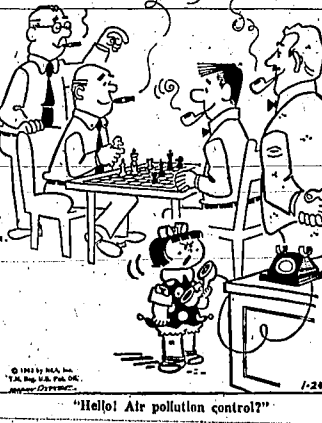

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Prince Charles Will Attend Rugged School in Scotland

LONDON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Prince Charles, 15, is to attend Gordonstoun—a school so rugged that a boy who was expelled said he "heard bleeds" for the heir to the British throne.

Gordonstoun, Prince Phillip's old school, with its spartan discipline of cold showers and physical training was recalled as a "complete horror" by Lord Russell, 17, son of the Duke of Bedford.

Charles will become a chip off the Prince Phillip block.

His mother, Queen Elizabeth, was believed to favor Eton, the traditional training ground for royally and the British upper classes.

Gordonstoun, which was founded in 1924 by a German refugee Dr. Kurt Hahn, along Prussian discipline lines, stresses character building over academic studies and treats poor and rich alike in "classless" fashion. The prince is to transfer there in May from his present school, Chisum.

The Daily Sketch said today Charles is the "first king-to-be" to be educated in an institution which is "fundamentally classless." Daily Herald columnist

Henry Fielding called it a "spectacular decision."

Step in the Gordonstoun uniform comprises knee pants and open-necked shirt. Charles' day will be spent at 7 a.m. with "calisthenics" or a morning run and then a cold shower. Then each boy will have to make his bed, and sweep the floor—alone.

Charles will live in windmill lodge with about 60 other boys and sleep in a dormitory with six to a dozen students.

The school forbids smoking and curfews. Charles' father, the Duke of Edinburgh, is a former headmaster of the school.

Chew said last night Charles would be treated "the same as other boys." He added that nowadays boys reflected a decline in "discipline and enterprise" and his antidotes were physical training and character-building.

Chew denied, however, that discipline was "excessive."

Max Girdle, 18, a grandson of Prince Phillip, an alumnus who, unlike Lord Russell, stuck it out, said "The cold showers may sound awful but we all got used to them easily."

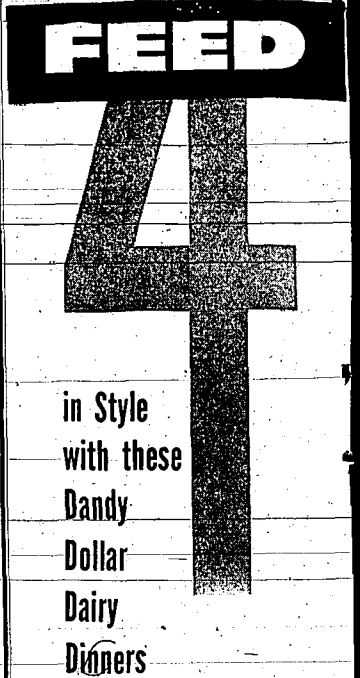

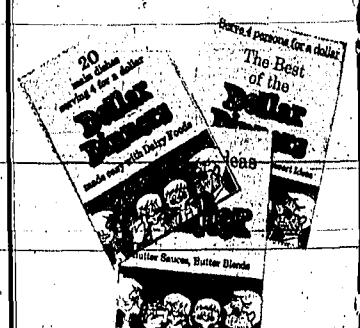
