Rusk Requests OAS to Expell Red-Run Cuba

PUNTA DEL ESTE, Uruguay, Jan. 25 (UP) — The United States, blasting Cuban and world communism in a slashing attack, called urgently today for a collective Latin-American counterattack against Prime Minister Fidel Castro's "spearhead." To turbulent applause, U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk urged 13 other American foreign ministers, sitting in judgment on Cuba, to drum the Castro regime out of bodies of the Organization of American States. His speech reflected heavy pressure here for a compromise between those advocating the sternest punishment of Cuba in the form of collective trade sanctions on the one hand; and the small but influential so-called "moderate bloc" of Brazil, Mexico and Argentina, on the other. The speech suggested the United States had held some options in mind for the fire purpose to test the atmosphere and ascertain what maximum can be expected here.

Idaho Aides Hold Confab About Safety

JEROME, Jan. 25 — Approximately 35 mayors, police chiefs and safety coordinators from southern Idaho towns are attending a National Safety Council inventory coordinators meeting in the Jerome city hall. 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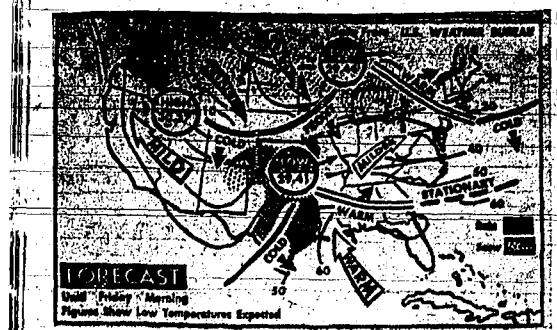

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Heart Work Outlined by T. F. Doctor

BURLEY, Jan. 25—Dr. Robert F. T. Doctor, Twin Falls, was the guest speaker at the heart drive held Wednesday noon at the Elk's club dining room.

Dr. Doctor, who is the chief of the heart clinic at the LDS hospital, Salt Lake City, talked about recent advances in diagnosis and treatment of heart disease and showed a slide of a diagnostic unit and one of a computer unit for the laboratory.

General, 43, Selected for Key Position

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—The army has selected its youngest general for a key position in its anti-guerrilla plans.

He is Brig. Gen. William B. Ross, 43, who will be promoted to the two-star rank of major general to become assistant chief of staff for special operations.

The special forces, trained as paratroopers and in command of flying flaps, have a vital role in the administration's plans to fight communist-inspired subversion and guerrilla warfare on the fringes of the free world.

Ross, a tall, well-built non-West Pointer who graduated from the University of Oregon, gained his reputation as a fighter in World War II.

He was awarded the distinguished service cross for heroism in the abandoned shadow of the Anzio beach in Italy when he was leading the third battalion of the seventh infantry.

"As his battalion reached its objective," his citation said, "one of the assault companies became disorganized in the glare of a burning half-track."

Ross (then a lieutenant colonel) was subjected to heavy shell fire. With his vision impaired by concussion, his field legs ripped and his helmet punctured by fragmentation, he reorganized the company in the face of open fire from three enemy tanks, and forced the enemy to withdraw.

"The special forces will be directed by Ross," he said, "and the army plans further increases when men and training facilities are available."

Sugar Beet Men Okay '62 Plans

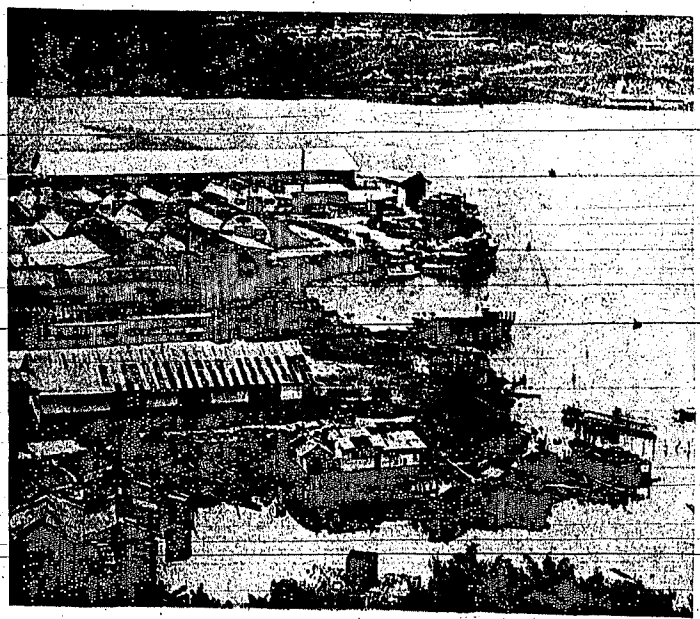

Hollandia, New Guinea, Now Modern City Viewing Rusted Landing Craft

HOLLANDIA, Dutch New Guinea, Jan. 25 (AP)—Rusted hulks of landing craft still litter the beaches of Hollandia amid the wreckage of Indonesian resistance. The vast harbor is quiet, with barely a stir of activity. No-no-no military planes—Base C, Dock Four—all are still in everyday use.

But Hollandia is far from being an abandoned shadow of the great military base built by U.S. forces nearly 10 years ago in a dumping off point for the Douglas MacArthur's return to the Philippines. It is more like a modern American residential suburb—and in a setting most real-estate operators would pay a fortune to duplicate.

Hollandia nestles in rolling green hills above a network of small bays. There are scenic views from almost every vantage point—and in a setting most real-estate operators would pay a fortune to duplicate.

Life is quiet here on the edge of one of the world's wildest jungles. Offices open at 7 a.m. and close at 2 p.m. Then everyone goes home for lunch and a nap while the town buzzes in the tropical heat.

A car is as much a necessity as in any American suburb. Good roads, built during the war, are well traveled and the lower stretches expansively over an area of 25 miles.

Reindeer Cut To Be Tested By Consumer

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—An Alaska reindeer meat may find its way to the dinner tables of many Americans if housewives in Washington state prove receptive to it.

The bureau of Indian affairs says it is all set to test the possibilities for marketing the meat produced from reindeer herds tended by Alaskan Eskimos.

The meat will be packaged by McCorok, a tiny village on the Bering sea island to Nunitka, then flown to Washington state markets.

Bureau officials say they hope the tests will increase the profitability of reindeer herding, which brought a return of more than \$200,000 to some 100 Eskimo families who herded Alaska's 43,000 reindeer in 1960.

Outside of Alaska, few Americans have tried reindeer meat. A U.S. railroad once served it in its dining cars, but dropped it after it ran into resistance, justification inspired by cattle-raising interests.

Brown Plans Tough Battle With Nixon

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25 (AP)—California's Democratic governor, Edmund G. Brown, is setting out on a 10-month campaign with a prime objective: Beat Richard M. Nixon.

Brown announced Wednesday night he'll run for a new four-year term and he seemingly took it for granted the former vice president will be his Republican opponent in November.

Brown put not only his record but that of President Kennedy on the line. Nixon, who lost California, narrowly to Nixon in 1960, endorsed Brown as "a humane, progressive and enlightened leader." He predicted victory if California voters, three-to-two Democratic, vote, three-to-two Democratic, in the election on the state administration's record.

Brown declared Nixon knows nothing about California; that he is out to convert the governor's office into Nixon-for-president headquarters.

"I don't like what he stands for and I don't like his reasons for wanting to be governor," he said.

Nixon, a former California congressman and senator, replied that Brown "offers four more years of the inflated and bloating which have become his copyrighted political trademark."

In contrast to his recommended policy of the past, he added in a statement, "I shall present to the voters of this state a program to meet the challenge of the future."

Nixon, in entering what is now a three-way race for the Republican nomination for governor last Sept. 27, pledged he would not run for president in 1964. And he said he intended to beat Brown "to a pulp."

Brown, 54, accepted the challenge before a cheering audience of 3,200 diners who paid \$100-a-plate to hear him make it official. Those in charge estimated the affair netted \$103,000.

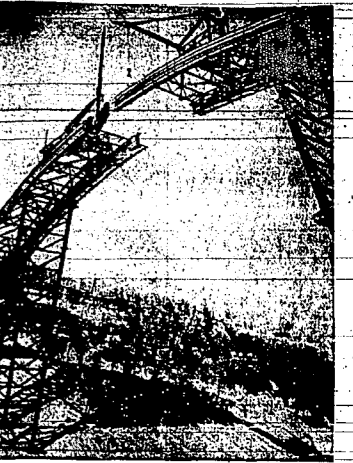

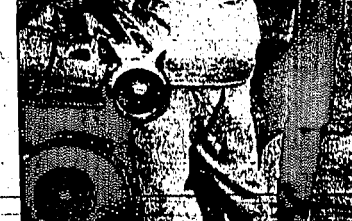

Olympic Chairman Hopes To End NCAA-AAU Fight For Athletic Power Soon

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The President of the U.S. Olympic committee stepped Wednesday into the giant power struggle now rocking American sports and predicted a peaceful settlement within the next 90 days. "I plan to call a meeting of officials of both the Amateur Athletic union and the National Collegiate Athletic association within the next month," Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson of Chicago told an Olympic rally. "The differences between the two groups are not great. I am very optimistic about settling all the issues and getting down to business with a simple purpose."



America's international sports prestige has been threatened by a revolt in college—NCAA—ranked over control of the U. S. amateur sports program. Charging mismanagement by AAU, overseer of amateur sports in this country since 1888, a group of college coaches recently filed plans to set up rival federations in track and field, basketball and gymnastics. These federations would hold eliminations and would certify athletes for international and Olympic competition, a responsibility normally reserved for the AAU. However, these federations would have to gain the approval of the various international federations. College coaches have accused the AAU of dictatorial and self-perpetuating powers and of denying the thousands of colleges and high schools a voice in the conduct of sports affairs. "I think each side will have to give a little," Wilson said. "The AAU may have to broaden its committees. The colleges may have to soften their demands. We must get on with our development program for the 1956 Pan American games in Sao Paulo, Brazil, and the 1960 Olympics at Innsbruck, Austria and Tokyo."

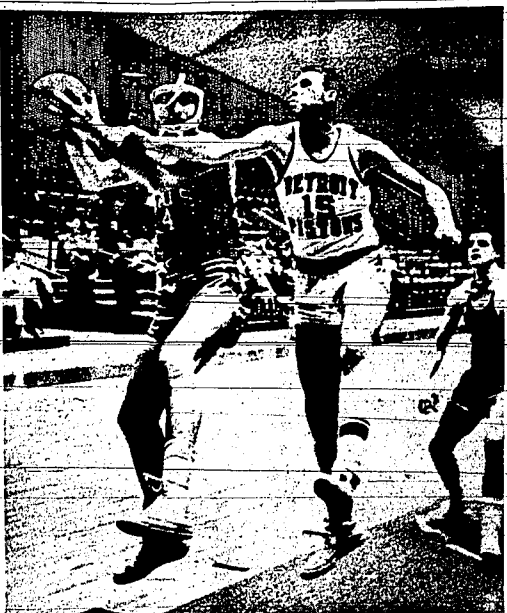

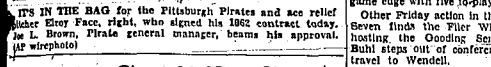

Headed for World's Fair? Pack Along Lots of Money

SEATTLE, Jan. 25 (AP) — Coming to the Seattle World's Fair? Bring money. You'll find plenty to spend it on.

The exposition, which opens April 21 for a six-month run, has cost an estimated 80 million dollars to put together. It will cost \$2 per adult and 41 per child to get in.

Most patrons will be spending somewhere more, Bill McFarland, press chief, estimates the average expenditure per person for the "fairgrounds" will be \$5.10.

Expenses of the fairgrounds are already a matter of controversy. Some of the motel and restaurant industries deny reports there will be sharp price increases.

Transportation by monorail from downtown Seattle will be 75 cents round trip and 50 cents one-way for adults, 50 cents round trip and 35 cents one-way for children.

The price admission will get you into the federal science pavilion, the futuristic World of Century 21 and the industrial and foreign exhibits. Admission to the fine arts exhibit will be 50 cents.

It will cost at least \$1 to go up in the 600-foot Space Needle. An elevator will take you to the observation deck, where there will be a restaurant, the Eye of the Needle, which will revolve once an hour.

"The menu hasn't been set, but it will be a fine restaurant," says Jack Borg, who will manage it. "The prices will be comparable with other fine restaurants in town."

For comparison, Borg cites two restaurants where complete dinners run from \$4 to \$8 and which say they plan no increase in prices.

An article in the Oregon Journal recently said restaurants in Seattle are preparing menus

which will reflect price increases of about 20 per cent. "I don't think it's true," says George Clark, manager of the Washington State Restaurant Association.

Clark says there will be some increases due to the increased cost of goods and labor. The association's contract with five culinary unions expires June 1.

Those who hope of the performing arts events at the fair will range upward to a top of \$6.50. A fair spokesman says the minimum haven't been decided. You will be able to get into the Playhouse, the Opera House and the Arena, where most of the events will be held, without paying admission to the fairgrounds, since they have outside entrances. You won't be able to ride the monorail in that case, however, since the terminal is inside the grounds. Bus tokens cost 22 1/2 cents. The stadium will have an outside entrance, but the fair says most events will be free.

Rides on the Gayway will run from 25 cents to 25 cents except for the Space Wheel, a variation of a Ferris wheel consisting of a long spinning arm with a car at the end. That will cost 50 cents.

The 1602 listings of motels and hotels by the Automobile Club of Washington show an average of \$14.25 for a room or unit with one bed for two persons. Last year the average was \$12.77, which means the increase 22 per cent.

Expo-Lodging, Inc., the housing arm of the fair, says this doesn't mean an average increase of that much, since a number of large hotels have increased. Expo-Lodging claims to have 95 per cent of the first and second-class hotels and motels in a 30-mile radius registered. Six single rooms range from \$7 to \$15 and double from \$7 to \$17. The agency says families can expect additional charges of \$1.50 to \$3.50 per extra person. An Automobile Club listing of hotels and 26 motels. Rates for two persons in a one-bed unit range from a top of \$22 to a low of \$6. The range last year was \$18 to \$6.

The Automobile Club's restaurant listing for 1962 hasn't been made up yet.

Some motels report they are already booked up for the full six months, but Expo-Lodging says it will be able to find accommodations for everyone on some who come without reservations in peak periods, may find the only accommodations are in private homes. Expo-Lodging is listing these up too. The agency says 75 per cent of reservations are coming from California, with about half the rest from British Columbia.

On Jan. 25, one last note for first-night gala in the Opera House, featuring Igor Stravinsky conducting the Seattle Symphony orchestra, will be priced up to \$50.

Traffic had to be rerouted through Quincy until the wreckage could be removed.

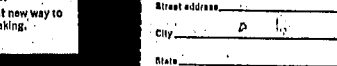
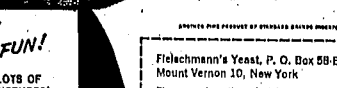
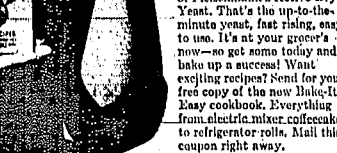
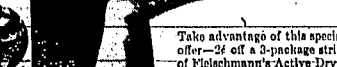
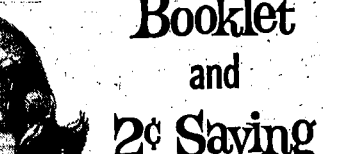
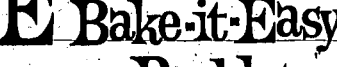
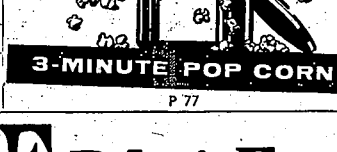
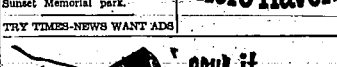
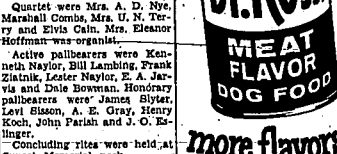
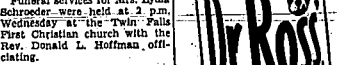
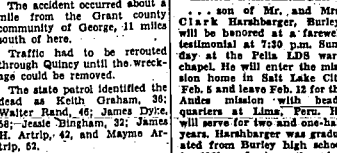
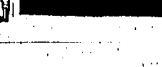
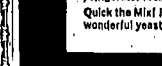
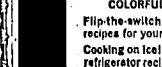
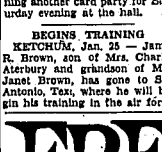
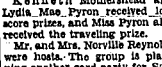
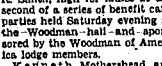
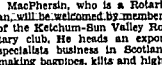
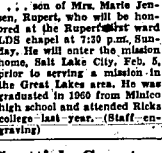

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Hypnotism Is Discussed at Meet of Club

Dr. Fred T. Kolouch discussed hypnotism and medicine during the Wednesday noon luncheon meeting of the Twin Falls Lions club in the Rogerson hotel Roundup room.

Dr. Kolouch pointed out that hypnotism is another extension of the doctor-patient relationship. He mentioned that "people go to doctors for their ailments — comfort, strength and security. He added that the therapist is not always easy or cheap to provide because diagnosis and treatment often can be complicated."

He explained that through hypnotism, a doctor can suggest to the patient that he will feel little or no pain during an operation or after its completion. He added that during hypnosis the patient is wide awake.

Dr. Kolouch mentioned the high costs of medicine and hospitalization. He said that a few years ago he cured the teeth of a person connected with a patient undergoing treatment for a stomach ailment. The time he entered the hospital until he left.

He mentioned that politics and law often enter into doctor-patient relationship and discussed briefly the controversy over medical malpractice suits. He said that doctors also are becoming afraid to perform risky operations or new treatments and noted that in a recent San Francisco law suit about \$600,000 was awarded to one family because their daughter had polio after being given a new polio vaccine. The lawyer who represented the family received half of the \$600,000.

Dr. Kolouch suggested that persons have a yearly physical check up by a dependable doctor. He also recommended support of Masilo Valley Memorial hospital, which he said is one of the best organized hospitals he has visited.

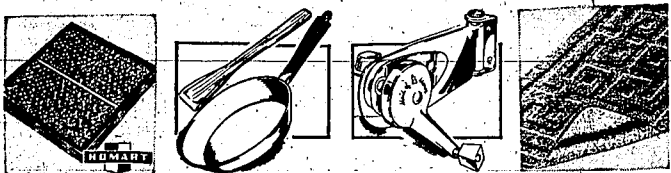

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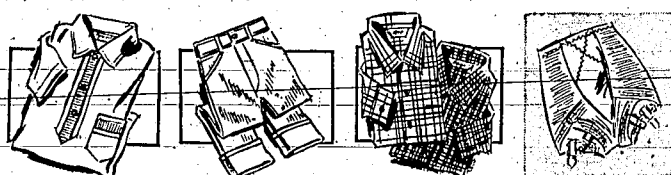


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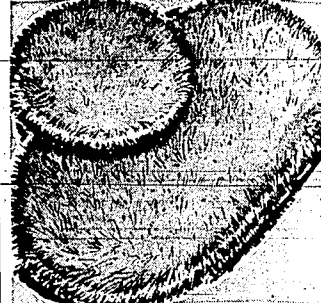
