## Woman Slays Her Husband After Battles

BRUNEAU, Jan. 29 (AP)—Cecil Allenback, 34, was shot to death in a small trailer house here last night after an argument with his wife.

Sheriff Al Barberis said the wife, also 34, told him she shot her husband because she feared he would kill her. The couple had five children, a 14-year-old son, the oldest, and four co-siblings.

The family came here from Spokane last week and Allenback planned to work at the missile construction site near BrunEAU.

Barberis said investigation indicated the couple had been drinking at a bar in Grand View, then returned to their trailer house here, continuing an argument which had been in progress for some time.

The sheriff said Mrs. Allenback told him her husband threatened to get a gun. When he climbed out of the car to go to the trailer she said she got a .23-caliber gun from a box in the car and followed him.

She found her husband holding his son on the floor of the trailer house and shot him. Barberis said she told him.

No charges were filed immediately. The sheriff said an inquest probably would be called Thursday or Friday.

## Solon Casting Dour Look at Fun Program

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—Sen. Henry Dworshak sees economic problems for Idaho in President Kennedy's proposed expansion of national recreation facilities — and particularly in the program's financing.

The plan, to add 20 million acres to the nation's parklands and recreation areas would include, for financing, such features as user fees to the public visiting federal park and recreation sites and excise taxes on outdoor equipment.

"If these proposals for financing are adopted," Dworshak said, "they could have an adverse effect on Idaho's growing tourist industry as we now find our merchants having to charge slightly higher for some equipment because of distance from manufacturing centers."

The tax, based on sale price, would be higher in Idaho and cause a much higher price boost of these products in Idaho. User fees could possibly bring an end to Idaho's free outdoor recreation areas both for tourists and local residents as well," the Idaho Republican said.

In all three sections of the President's program that, if properly scaled down and handled in accordance with sound fiscal policy, could be adopted by Idaho's outdoor recreation needs. # Legal Phases of Family Life Is Lawyer's Topic

Robert Balleisen, Twin Falls attorney, was guest speaker at the annual dinner meeting of the Twin Falls home economics homemaking group in the Rogerston home last evening.

Balleisen received his law degree from the University of Colorado. He served on the staff of the state district attorney general at Boise, served as Twin Falls city attorney for eight years, and was prosecuting attorney and county clerk for three years while maintaining a private practice.

Balleisen spoke on the subject of family property law in Idaho and outlined legal rights for the management of the marriage contract as well as annulment and divorce proceedings in Idaho.

He outlined the essential law and discussed various methods in contracts for purchasing a home. He emphasized the value of the services of a lawyer and qualified real estate man when making such a purchase.

Balleisen stated that a buyer should know beforehand where the boundary and fence lines are, the type of construction and location of the house, zoning restrictions, building restrictions and easements, advantages and possible depreciation of the property.

He pointed out the buyer should inspect the heating system, insulation, all plumbing, sewage drainage, attic interior, frame construction, basement including water, electric and gas, as well as signs of termites.

## Food for Americans

EGG, ASPARAGUS PIE WITH egg so plentiful, try this delicious egg and asparagus main dish. Serve it with crisp french fries.

EGG 'N' ASPARAGUS PIE (Makes 6 servings)

CRUST: 1/2 cup enriched corn meal 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 4 to 5 tablespoons cold water

FILLING: 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 1/2 cups milk 1 cup shredded American cheese

1 1/2-cup onion can asparagus spears, drained 8 hard-cooked eggs, sliced Heat oven to very hot (450 degrees F.). For crust, sift together corn meal, flour and salt. Out in sifting, mix milk, margarine, pepper and cold water. Add water, a tablespoon at a time, stirring lightly until pastry can be formed into a ball. Turn lightly floured board or canvas; let stand about 5 minutes. Roll dough into 13-inch circle, loosely into 8-inch pie plate. Fold edge under; flute. Prick bottom and sides. Bake in preheated oven (450 degrees F.) 12 to 15 minutes.

For filling, melt butter in medium saucepan; stir in flour, salt and pepper. Gradually add milk; cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Stir in cheese and egg; stir additional minutes until cheese is melted and sauce is thick.

Arrange asparagus spears and eggs in bottom of baked pie shell. Cover with cheese sauce. Bake for several minutes until top is bubbly and lightly browned. Garnish with additional asparagus spears, hard-cooked egg slices and paprika if desired. Serve hot.

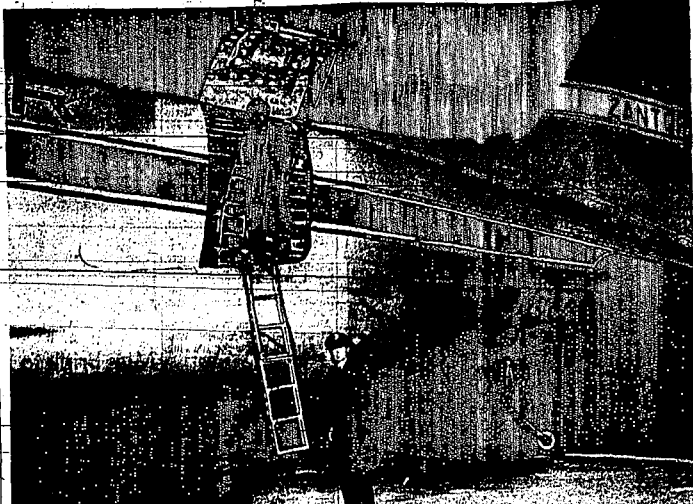
