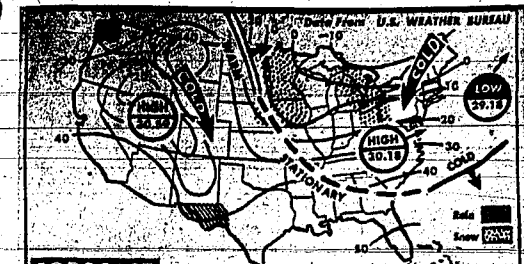

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Sister Kenny Foundation Is Swamped by Second Scandal

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 1 (AP)—The head of the new Sister Kenny foundation said Wednesday the indictments of seven men on charges of defrauding contributors to the foundation "inevitably" will hurt the organization.

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Kennedy Agriculture Plan Faces Congressional Fight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—President Charles B. Truman of the American Farm Bureau federation — which favors less government intervention in farm prices and production — called the President's proposal "a real catastrophe."

The program would force dairy farmers and grain producers to choose between government controls designed to slash their surplus production or the loss of existing government price guarantees.

Republican foes began amping up these controversial features of the Kennedy administration farm bill shortly after it reached Congress yesterday.

"There is very little clamor for farmers for this type of legislation," said Rep. Charles D. Hayden, Iowa, senior Republican on the house agriculture committee.

His administration oil covered so many facets of the farm program that even Republicans found some features to applaud.

Hoover said the recommendations for strengthening the food-for-peace program "contain some merit."

Farm Leader Talks to Buhl C. of C. Meet

BUHL, Feb. 1—Charles Wojcik, director for the National Farm-ers organization, was guest speaker at the Buhl Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday. He noted with the climbing costs the farmer is now in the cost price squeeze, and needs such an organization in order to compete with industry and labor.

It was pointed out the NFO organized in 1936 and is now the third largest farm organization in the nation. George Peter, Buhl, district director of the NFO, introduced the speaker. Secretary Lloyd Byrne was instructed to send a letter of appreciation to W. B. Whiteley, Oakley, who was guest speaker for the most Chamber's annual banquet meeting, and to Roscoe Rich, Burley, commending him on his years of work and advice on the state highway board.

Italian Party Swings 'Left' To Socialists

NAPLES, Italy, Feb. 1 (AP)—Italy's ruling Christian Democratic party swung to the left today in a move to give the country a new government headed by Pietro Nenni's Socialists, former allies of the communists. The Christian Democrats, after five days of debate here, voted on Premier Amintore Fanfani's plan to scuttle his middle-of-the-road government and replace it with a center-left cabinet. It could win Socialist support for a more vigorous domestic program of economic, social and school reforms.

The resolution put before the party delegates, although approving the reopening of the left, Fanfani has urged since 1956, pledged the party to maintain Italy's pro-Western stance. He said as a member of the North Atlantic Treaty organization. It also rejects any move toward outright communism or fascism, declaring that any government backed by the Christian Democrats would respect the independence of every totalitarian influence.

The rightist faction of the Christian Democrats conceded defeat in advance by accepting only 22 of the seats on the party's national council. The rest went to backers of the opening to the left.

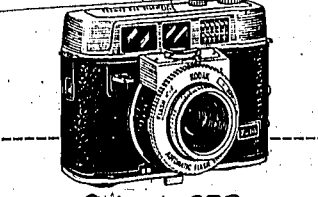

DELICIOUS VALENTINE—Here's a suggestion—for the one-size cook who wants to surprise her mother with an edible Valentine.

It is a handsome mold. First make a pineapple gelatin heart, combining pineapple gelatin and canned crushed pineapple and maraschino cherries. Ring the heart in tiny rosebuds. Add a touch of whipped cream and additional maraschino cherries cut in half and snipped to resemble hearts.

Molded Valentine Dessert—Heart (Makes 4 to 6 servings) 1-3/4 cups package pineapple flavor gelatin 1 cup crushed pineapple 1 cup cold water 1 cup crushed pineapple 10 maraschino cherries Empty pineapple gelatin into a bowl. Add boiling water and stir until the gelatin is dissolved. Stir in cold water. Chill the gelatin until it is thick as unbeaten egg white. Stir crushed pineapple and maraschino cherries into the thickened gelatin. Ladle into a 1-quart heart-shaped mold or into individual heart-shaped molds. Chill until firm. If desired, top with whipped cream and heart-shaped maraschino cherry halves.

Liberals Set Civil Rights Floor Battle

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—Senate liberals, unable to keep the Kennedy administration's first civil rights bill out of a hostile committee, prepared today for a floor battle and possible "Southern filibuster" later this year.

Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., who fought against letting the measure go to the senate judiciary committee, said he was encouraged by Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield's promise to take alternative action if the bill is bottled up.

Mansfield told the senate yesterday he would offer the bill as an amendment to some other measure if the judiciary group did not report it out in 60 to 90 days.

"Then we can add other civil rights amendments," Keating said. "We will run into a Southern filibuster anyway, and the issue is raised on the floor later."

The bill to outlaw unreasonable searches and seizures and a provision for voting in federal elections was cleared for the judiciary group by a vote of 11 to 55. The vote came on Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson's ruling that the judiciary committee should handle the bill.

Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., whose judiciary group has been called the graveyard of civil rights legislation, declined to predict when or whether the bill would be sent back to the senate.

Battle Looms On Proposed Park in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 1 (AP)—A Parliament battle was shaping up today over the proposed development of a national park in southeast Utah, but the head of a governor's advisory committee said the group would later clear of politics.

The controversy over the park has blossomed into a major issue in this year's campaign for the U-S senate seat now held by Republican Sen. Wallace F. Bennett.

There were three major developments Wednesday:

A geologist said the area involved includes part of the richest potential mineral producing region in Utah.

U-S Democratic delegation in congress announced that the national park service has ended their study of the area and the Canyonlands national park and national secretary Stewart Udall will announce \$2,000 acres added to the previously surveyed area.

Senator Bennett warned that the Utah plan could cost the schools the revenue from minerals produced on school lands in the area.

Dr. W. P. Hewitt, professor of economic geology at the University of Utah, told Gov. George D. Clyde's advisory committee that the Canyonlands region borders on the "black shale" oil and uranium producing area.

Dr. Hewitt, arguing for multiple use development, said U.S. geologists have found that the northeast quarter of the proposed park has deposits of potential uranium, and that the uranium deposits of immense potential value. He also said the region showed promise for further oil and uranium development.

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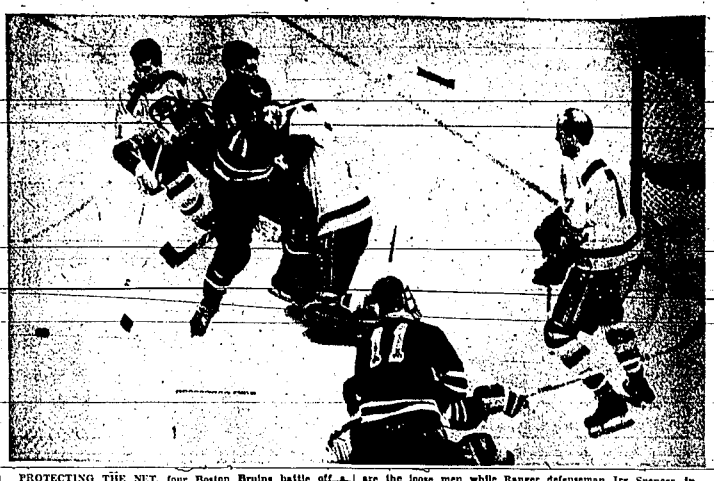
