Hearings Set For Congress On Welfare

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Congress opens public hearings today on reforms recommended by President Kennedy in the federal-state welfare program which cost taxpayers about four billion dollars a year.

Welfare Secretary Abraham A. Ribicoff was called on the first witness before the house ways and means committee.

The administration plan, stressing rehabilitation, is designed to provide more help for the needy and help some of them get off welfare rolls.

Advance signs indicated that some, but not all, of the revisions recommended by the administration will become law.

They include day-care centers for children, day mothers, work, job training centers to teach trades to relief recipients, and authority for states to require job-seeking parents to work for their family's relief checks.

Although the program is aimed at long-run reductions in welfare costs, it would add about 193 million dollars to the federal share of welfare in 1965.

The present program is scheduled to expire June 30.

Castro Passes New Law for Fund Control

HAVANA, Feb. 7—The Cuban government enacted new regulations Tuesday night to curb the transfer of funds from private transactions and aid in the "cardinal task of reaching in a short time the Socialist re-orientation" of the country.

The new law will make cash practically obsolete in transactions between business organizations.

It specifies that most of the remaining private businesses and all government enterprises shall make "all payments and collections through the agencies of the National Bank."

All business transactions must be accompanied by invoices and official bank transfer forms. Cash payments may be made only after obtaining special permission from the National bank, Cuba's sole banking institution.

Union Votes On Western's Parley Offer

NEW YORK, Feb. 7—About 100,000 members of the Communications Workers of America today on a new wage and benefit agreement reached with Western Electric company.

Union negotiators approved a package outline for a 74-cent-an-hour wage increase for heavy equipment installers in 43 states. Police benefits would also be increased 15 cents an hour to the agreement. The union said results of the vote on the settlement probably would not be known for two weeks.

Negotiations started Jan. 4 under a wage suspending provision of a contract that still has two years to run. An impasse in the talks last week triggered a one day walkout by union members

In five Midwestern states. The agreement rewrites travel and transfer clauses of the contract and continues a merit provision under which Western Electric distributes three million dollars yearly.

"I grabbed him with one arm and wrapped my leg around his neck and hip," she said. Marshal Andrew, 39, mother of four and also carrying a pistol, ran to Mrs. Standley's aid and grabbed the man, too. All three fell, breaking bottles in the window behind the counter after the woman had been dragged 20 feet across the floor. Several men were on hand by the time the lock charge was properly arrived. "I knew he had to be detained," Mrs. Standley said. "I'm glad Emily was in the bank on the route. Both stopped at the trouble in the store to a veterinarian to get rid of incantations for the people. Bowen is held on federal bank robbery charge.

Privilege No Increase Due Soon in Grazing Fee

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—The interior department said Tuesday that federal grazing fee will remain the same through June 30. The announcement said there had been considerable speculation among members of the livestock industry that substantial increases would be made in fees charged for grazing sheep, goats and goats on land administered under the Taylor act of 1934.

There are some 170 million acres of public land available on a fee basis.

"Grazing fees have not increased proportionately with other costs," said interior's bureau of land management, "and independent economic surveys being completed to determine the impact of increased fees on the livestock industry."

"Even if the survey indicates that increases are in the best public interest... no change will be made in the current fee structure."

The department has proposed a rule that would continue to allow the national average of the market price of feed or lamb. This rule would not, in itself, change existing rates but would provide a framework within which to adjust fees as warranted by economic conditions. It would allow 30,000 holders of grazing permits pay a total of three million dollars annually for grazing privileges, BLM said.

Expert Says Freeze Hurts Idaho's Fruit

BOISE, Feb. 7 (AP)—Fruit damage is likely to have resulted to southwestern Idaho fruit areas as a result of the extreme cold weather that would hurt the fruit industry, horticulturists reported today. He said a survey indicated that peach orchards in Emmett and Caldwell areas were killed and there was some damage to branches. Other fruit trees probably will not survive. Considerable damage also was reported to buds of sweet cherry trees and trunks of some trees were split by the cold.

Horn said that on the basis of the length of sustained time below zero, the coldest this winter was the coldest since 1930. "In the case of peaches," he said, "it generally happens that when the temperature goes to 10 below zero, fruit buds are killed and some branches are killed. Each bud main hardiness when temperatures are reasonably low and lose hardiness when weather gets warmer. "Sudden drops cause more damage than periods when temperatures are cold and gradually rise. At the time of the big freeze, Jan. 21, the preceding days were cold and the temperature fell to 26 below at Emmett. At such a temperature you expect 100 per cent kill because it is seldom the buds can take 20 below."

Horn said there also is likely to be some damage to apple trees, particularly Norway macintosh and other smooth-skinned varieties. He said some English apples were cracked open.

Damage to climbing roses is likely, he said, and it is possible hybrid tea roses were killed back to the snow line. Pycnantha may also have been killed back to the snow line in areas of most severe cold.

Artis Eaton, Twin Falls, vice president of the Idaho Cattlemen's association, and Ray Lincoln, president of the Idaho Wood Growers association, will speak.

Roland Rattick, Castleton, is president of the 71 Livestock group with Patrick Currier, Jr., also Castleton, vice president, and Roy Buckner, Hagerman, secretary-treasurer.

Officers will be elected at the annual meeting to be held June 4 at Three Creek.

An adjourned meeting will be conducted by BLM officials on Thursday for the Dev-I creek unit of the association.

Dead Eagles Are Present For Hearing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Four dead eagles appeared as witnesses at a congressional hearing today.

One was a full-grown bald eagle, crowned with an abundant mass of golden eagle feathers. The other three looked like golden eagles but were identified as bald eagle conservation subcommittee.

One was a young bald eagle, and the third was a mature golden eagle.

The four birds were accompanied by representatives of the interior department who appeared in support of a house joint resolution to give the golden eagle the same protection as the bald eagle.

In 1940, congress put the bald eagle on the national emblem, under its protective wing to keep it from extinction.

The interior department spokesman said the resolution was intended to give more protection to the bald eagle rather than to the golden eagle, which serves as a symbol.

Rep. Silvio O. Conte, R., Connecticut, said, "The primary hazard that remains is the fact that it is virtually impossible for anyone except a trained ornithologist to tell the difference between the golden eagle and an immature bald eagle. Conte said, "until the bald eagle develops the characteristic white head and tail feathers in its fourth year of life."

Noble E. Buell, chief of the wildlife division in the bureau of sport fisheries and wildlife, said that changing the bald eagle act would provide some enforcement problems.

"Bald and golden eagles are somewhat different, food habits," he said, "and our department would need to give different regulatory treatment to the golden eagle when found destroying livestock or game."

He suggested that it will be necessary to permit livestock owners to kill golden eagles which attack or are about to attack livestock.

Symbol? Confession of Eighth Grade Youth Heard

ATLANTA, Feb. 7 (AP)—A south Georgia eighth grader wants the state to place a statue of a mule on the capitol lawn so that future generations will be able to view the mode of travel and motive power of their forebears.

The resolution introduced Tuesday by Rep. William Kinnaman, 77, said in this case the mule is the symbol of right that we make this contribution to the memory of the Georgia mule.

Edward Segon, assistant state attorney, said the confession would be offered at the hearing on one of two delinquency petitions filed against the 12-year-old.

Yesterday officials of suburban Cicero, the boy's home, testified in an apartment house fire in Cicero.

Clifford J. Cicello confirmed the case to today before testimony could be given on the second delinquency petition.

William Cahrobay, Cicero fire chief, testified the boy set fires in apartment houses on three separate dates last October.

The boy said he "derived satisfaction" from setting the Cahrobay told the court. He said the boy told him he used newspapers and matches to set the fires.

Romney May Be Asked on Future Plans

DETROIT, Feb. 7 (AP)—George Romney's pending decision on whether he will seek the Republican nomination for governor of Michigan this year—and maybe win himself a shot at the White House in 1964—added interest today to the annual meeting of stockholders of American Motors corporation.

Romney likely will be asked straight out whether he'll run for governor, but the AMC president, who also is board chairman, has announced he will not disclose his intentions until a new conference Saturday.

One of AMC's 25,000 stockholders, Harry Korba of Yonkers, N.Y., announced he would question "Romney's political liberalism" when he opposes cumulative voting rights for his stockholders.

Stockholders were scheduled to vote on a proxy proposal by Korba to elect five directors. Korba's plan each stockholder would have votes equal to 12 times the number of shares he held, and could cast them all for a single candidate for director, if he chose.

His non-cumulative voting stockholders cast all their votes 12 different times, once for each director to be elected.

Jet Crashes, Fatal for 4 U.S. Airmen

CHELSEA, England, Feb. 7 (AP)—A U.S. air force B-57D bomber destroyed jet bomber crashed today while landing at the local air force base.

The spokesman said the four crewmen were killed when they bailed out at "extremely low altitude" and fell to the runway.

He said the pilot and navigator safely ejected themselves. The seventh man aboard the training flight—a gunner—was reported missing.

The twin-engine plane—stationed with the 42nd U.S. tactical reconnaissance squadron at the local base—usually carries a crew of four. The extra three were aboard because of the training mission, the spokesman said.

Names of the crew members were withheld pending notification of next of kin, the spokesman said.

Katanga Says Troops Wipe Out Villagers

ELISABETHVILLE, Katanga, Congo, Feb. 7 (AP)—The Katanga government charged today that central Congolese troops forced the residents of a village in northern Katanga to their own guns and then buried the entire population.

A communication said the alleged atrocity occurred in the village of Rutuku in the area of Albertville. There were no other details.

The communication also said troops responsible for the massacre were members of 22 European Roman Catholic missionaries at Kungulu-pokot, said in Albertville. The missionaries were "mercenary disguised as missionaries."

Katanga President Moise Tshombe, meanwhile, announced that his government and the United Nations was in agreement on the expulsion of all mercenaries in the province's armed forces.

The reported agreement on the mercenary problem, long a source of differences between Katanga and the United Nations, was announced after Tshombe met U. N. Congo chief Sirer Linnar, U. N. Congo military commander Gen. Maurice Kérougan, and U. N. civil representative Georges Dumanol.

Tshombe said he had agreed to the joint U. N. and Katanga commissions—on military and the other civilian—to oversee the removal of all foreigners in the Katanga area. The commissions would be organized later today or tomorrow, he said.

U.S. Agrees To Terms of Arms Study

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—The government's first contract dedicated to arms control and disarmament was signed today.

Compared with the multi-million dollar awards announced almost daily for weapons, the arms control and disarmament agency's first contract was small.

It called for a \$150,000 study of the Bendix corporation, Ann Arbor, Mich., on the techniques of monitoring the production of nuclear missiles.

But spokesmen said announcements of other studies will follow "reasonably soon." They will be concerned with problems of industrial identification, and the feasibility of zonal inspection arrangements for disarmament, it was said.

The agency, created by congress last year, began operations Sept. 26. Its personnel have been involved in nuclear test ban negotiations, and will take part in the 18-nation general disarmament talks to begin March 14 at Geneva.

Those present for the contract signing ceremonies included agency Director William C. Foster and L. B. Young, general manager of the Bendix Systems division.

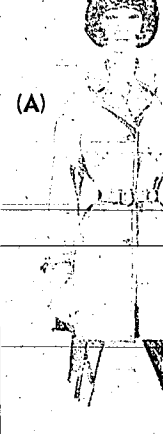

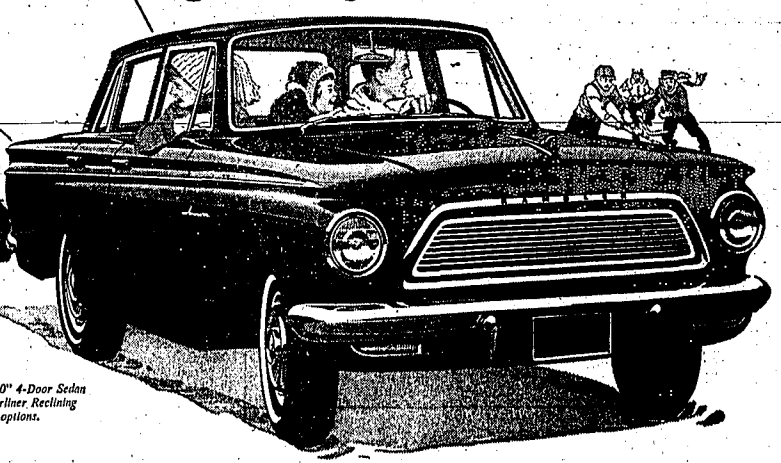

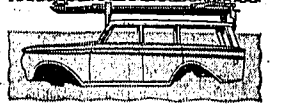

He described the bank system as "socialism" and said he could not attribute any motivation on Wilson's part for these moves.

They also said the United States agreed several months ago to let the British use U. S. facilities in Nevada to conduct underground nuclear tests.

President Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan agreed at Bermuda last December to make preparations for a resumption of atmospheric experiments in view of Russia's tests.

They said the British sought and received permission to use the Nevada facilities sometime before the Bermuda conference. They have not said just when they want to use this permission.

Lonely Idaho Lemon Tree Is Producing Large Fruit

Mrs. William Kemper, 1403 Spruce street, Twin Falls, is engaging in an unusual hobby—she is trying to grow lemons in Idaho in the middle of winter.

Her hobby has produced results, though, because a tree she purchased from a mail order house in Connecticut three years ago is growing a very large lemon.

Mrs. Kemper said she keeps the tree outside during the summer months and brings it indoors as the first snow of frost. She adds the tree has produced blossoms in the past but all have dropped off. This year the tree had two blossoms but one dropped off just before the fruit began to form.

The lemon measures nine inches in diameter and according to Mrs. Kemper, will make very good lemons when it gets ripe.

She also keeps an orange tree in the house but it hasn't blossomed yet.

A problem with growing citrus fruits, according to Mrs. Kemper, is pollination. Citrus fruit trees are not normally found in Idaho and usually the pollination has to be done with pollen brought from a tropical climate. She said this year the tree was not pollinated and it is a mystery how the tree is able to bear fruit.

Steel Union Wages Unit Has Confab

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 7 (AP)—The wage policy committee of the United Steelworkers union gives final consideration today to proposals for a new contract with the steel industry.

The 110-member committee was expected to give speedy approval to the proposals. Officials then will make public general terms the USW will seek in negotiating talks with the industry.

The union's 34-man executive board, headed by USW President David J. McDonald, drew up proposals in conference Monday and Tuesday.

Having their opinions on proposals at the 10th USW convention, union observers have predicted the union will seek greater job security, improved benefits for unemployed union members, higher wages and a shorter work week.

At the conclusion of board conferences Tuesday McDonald refused to estimate what the proposals would cost the companies in dollars and cents if approved.

Cuba Charge Collapsing in U.N. Debates

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Feb. 7 (AP)—Cuba's charge in the United Nations that the United States is planning new aggression against Prime Minister Fidel Castro's regime appears faced to wind up as an oratory exercise with the general assembly taking no action whatever.

The United States has made plain that it will oppose any resolution related to the Cuban charge no matter how mild or vaguely worded. The U. S. stand is expected to get support from virtually all the Latin American and West European members and a good portion of the 50-member Asia-African group.

The general assembly's main political committee, which recessed for a day so that members could wade through the mass of charges and counter charges delivered at the opening session Monday, scheduled two debate sessions today.

Kennedy Has Power to Halt Steel Strike, if Necessary

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—President Kennedy reportedly wants a steel labor settlement in a matter of weeks. If there is delay, he has full power to head off a midyear strike and a disruptive steel inventory buildup as well.

The reason is that the 80-day cooling-off procedure of the Taft-Hartley Act can be invoked to prevent a strike from occurring as well as to stop one that has already started.

With both the President and Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg saying repeatedly that a steel strike at this stage of half-developed economic recovery is unthinkable, it's logical to assume the administration would not let a steel without occur if threatened.

But besides not wanting a strike, the administration wants to avoid the usual overstocking of steel in advance of a strike threat. Both Kennedy and Goldberg have said this should be avoided as economically disruptive production led to inevitably following a production buildup.

Thus if the industry and Steelworkers failed to heed the administration's advice to come up with an early settlement, it should surprise no one if the President lets it be known publicly he intends to trigger the Taft-Hartley procedures into effect.

A promise of this sort—that there would be no strike when present steel contracts expire on Feb. 28—certainly would substantially disencourage steel customers from overstocking.

If all this came about, the threat of any steel strike would be put off from July 1 to past mid-September when the 80-day cooling-off period can end. Even then the odds probably would be against a walkout because Congress too, could step in to prevent it.

Such discussion is perhaps premature. It's still early in the game. The Steelworkers want to come up with its demands for contract changes today in Pittsburgh. Such demands are traditionally a statement of goals rather than realistically expected attainments.

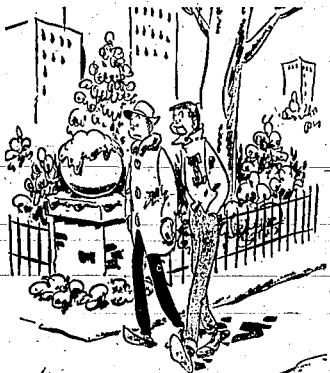

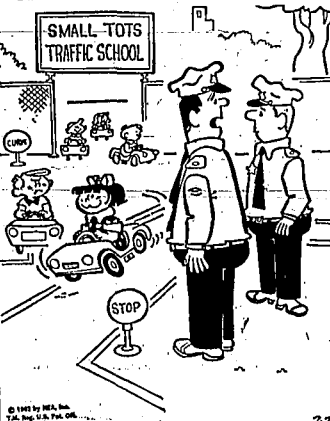
