

Kennedy May Ask Air Tests

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—President Kennedy has indicated he will order a go-ahead to resume U. S. nuclear testing in the atmosphere over the central Pacific.

At his news conference Wednesday the President in effect added new conditions to the Soviet Union—measures to prevent secret preparations for testing. This would be in addition to measures to prevent sneak tests.

Kennedy said that in view of the "secret" prepared and massive series of 40 to 50 tests conducted by the Soviet Union last fall, "final studies" on testing in the atmosphere should be completed "within the month."

Pointing out that he already has initiated preparations for testing, Kennedy declared that he shall not hesitate to determine for himself if it is decided that they are necessary to maintain the effective deterrent strength of the United States.

He repeatedly emphasized he has not reached a final decision. But the weight of his comments indicated his trend of thinking on the issue that further U. S. testing will be shown to be necessary when studies, involving the atomic energy commission, the central intelligence agency and the state House agency and the state House agency and the state House agency are completed.

"We are simply saying for today and tomorrow," Kennedy said, "but we must consider the future too."

At another point he spoke of the risk to the U. S. nuclear power position and the possibility of some sort of arms race.

The implication that Kennedy is moving steadily toward an order for at least was borne out privately by a source in the administration.

FCC Official Claims Study Is Necessary

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Chairman Newton Minow said today the federal communications commission will study the need to reform its own structure before it decides whether to renew its request for power to regulate television.

Minow said the commission would act through the record of nearly three years of hearings, TV industry protests and public comment.

The American Broadcasting Company ended the final, three-phase study on the National Broadcasting System and the Columbia Broadcasting System in operating government regulation of networks.

The commission remained on record in favor of legislation to provide for a new structure for the networks, which distribute more than half of all TV programs.

An FCC official said the main question was "just how much regulation should be." The commission now increases individual stations and has "back-stopped" power through the five stations owned and operated by each network.

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Kennedy Backs up McNamara, Uses Executive Rights

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—President Kennedy invoked the doctrine of executive privilege today to forbid Pentagon personnel to call a senate subcommittee the names of censors who altered texts of specific anti-communist speeches.

The chairman promptly upheld the plea. "I am convinced this executive plea applies and the court sustains it," said Chairman John Stennis, D-Miss.

Up to the time of the presidential intervention Stennis had been one of those attempting to elicit answers to the point.

The subcommittee member objecting to the chair's ruling was Sen. Strom Thurmond, D-S.C., whose charges that the military had been misled against anti-communist statements set off the subcommittee's study.

Thurmond did not appeal Stennis' ruling immediately to the subcommittee, but he has argued that the military had been misled against anti-communist statements set off the subcommittee's study.

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Toll Rises to 279 In Mine Explosion

SAARBROEKEN, Germany, Feb. 8 (AP)—The Saar state mining office announced today that 279 miners were killed and approximately a score are still missing in one of Germany's worst coal mine disasters.

A spokesman said 276 bodies had been removed from the tragedy-stricken Lubenthal mine near here, and four men had died in hospital. Another 81 miners are in hospitals, many in critical condition. The explosion on the night of the disaster

man said 100 men-escaped unhurt from Wednesday's explosion and cave-in, leaving about 20 men unaccounted for among the 480 who were in the pit at the time of the disaster.

Efforts continued more than 20 hours after the accident to find the missing, who possibly are buried under tons of coal and rock.

The bodies of many miners were found buried, gassed or crushed in the debris of cave-ins from the fourth level 1,600 feet underground.

Earlier, authorities gave widely varying estimates of the number missing, because many survivors had not returned to the station-owned mine office.

Many of the rescuers were among the 200 miners who escaped when a gallery 7 1/2 feet below the main shaft set off a gas explosion that sent 150 miners flying into the main shaft and ceilings crashing. One 1,600 feet below the surface, 300 miners were killed by the gas blast, it was said.

## Steel Union Pushing for Job Security

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 8 (UP)—The United Steelworkers Union will strive for substantial improvement in job security and unemployment protection for the nation's 430,000 basic steelworkers in contract talks opening next Wednesday in this steel capital.

Officials of the union formulated their 1962 contract demands in three days of conferences ending Wednesday. The current contract expires June 30.

It became evident the steelworkers are "bitterly interested" in obtaining stronger provisions to protect their jobs and provide them more money when they are laid off in slack periods. They fear their security is being swept away by technological advances. The union called for a shorter work week but made no specific demand.

USW President David J. McDonald said he feels the atmosphere prevailing between the union and companies is much better than it was prior to the strike-producing 1959 negotiations.

He downplayed reports that the top negotiator for his steel expressed a somewhat sympathetic feeling toward the union's position.

"We recognize that improved employment security of steelworkers is of primary concern in these negotiations, and while there is no agreement as to the means by which this can be achieved most effectively, there is no doubt as to its importance as a general objective," he said.

# NATIONAL WHRLLIG

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—In case your community article about the "hot spot" from Russian fallout this spring, the government is preparing a "hot spot" control to protect your milk and food supply.

Some may insist that these plans are insufficient. But government officials maintain there is no evidence that fallout will require emergency action.

But even so, plans are being shaped up.

The government is in the position of creating undue alarm if it talks too much about counter measures or being detected in its duty if it doesn't talk about them enough and stand prepared.

**ESTIMATES CLOSE**—Government decisions about strontium-90 levels this spring are based on estimates by individual atomic energy commission scientists. If these estimates were made more widely available, they would reduce confusion.

Strontium-90 may reach an average level of 21 microcuries per liter of milk, estimated by Dr. Harold A. Knapp of the AEC. Dr. Gordon M. Dunning of AEC estimated 22 microcuries per liter.

In some areas concentration of strontium-90 may be twice, or even three times, the average. This is not surprising, since the highest concentrations are in the Northeast, the Midwest, and the South.

Even with a liter (slightly more than a quart) of milk per day, the amount of strontium-90 contaminated food, government officials believe it unlikely that strontium-90 intake in any area will exceed the safe level of 100 microcuries per day. **PLANS TO DATE**—Conversations with members of the governmental-industry committees working on the problem add up to the following:

There are no known plans for the commercial production of strontium-90 decontamination units in the nation's dairies. Neither government nor industry is urging this to be done.

Information is now being given dairy farmers by the department of agriculture of how best to reduce strontium-90 levels in feed for cattle.

Studies are being made for prospects of shipping milk from other areas to strontium heavy areas. It is being noted that a custom is how best to deal with any potentially heavy concentrations of strontium-90 in fresh vegetables and fruits.

**10-CENT A QUART TO DECONTAMINATE**—A pilot plant strontium-90 decontamination unit is being set up in the department of agriculture, the U.S. public health service and the atomic energy commission. It runs milk through an ion-exchange process that will take out strontium-90.

Though none of these units are in known commercial production, the cost is estimated at about 10 cents per quart of milk. The cost of a unit is estimated at up to 10 cents.

The pilot plant was unveiled to the press and industry in March. It was pointed out that there was no need to put such units in dairies as long as strontium-90 prospects do not exceed present limits. The unit is intended to install them right away as it could cause pain and competition based on a spurious reason.

**"Consumer's Union" magazine**, however, "takes exception" in its February issue to the government official's advice that consumers should buy dairies for dates to have produced and to install such units.

**WHAT FARMERS CAN DO**—The agriculture department is now getting under way with its notification of dairy farmers and their neighbors of the best way to produce milk, changes of fodder and grain feeding of cattle should be necessary.

Frank A. Todd, the department's major spokesman on this problem, stressed:

"Neither special remedial measures nor unusual modifications of normal practices should be insisted, unless responsible authorities have declared that a state of emergency exists, making some kind of decontamination measures advisable."

As for other foods, officials point to the fact that the food and drug administration is on the alert as to whether or not it is safe to eat. It is stated that fruits and vegetables that have suddenly become radioactive from fallout should be washed or peeled to reduce such decontamination. But few persons undoubtedly would be willing to take that risk.

**OF ONE thing** the public can rest assured: that the government will do its best to make sure that it keeps close tabs on developments and the public and all authorities will be notified of counter measures that can be taken should "hot spots" tend to get out of hand.

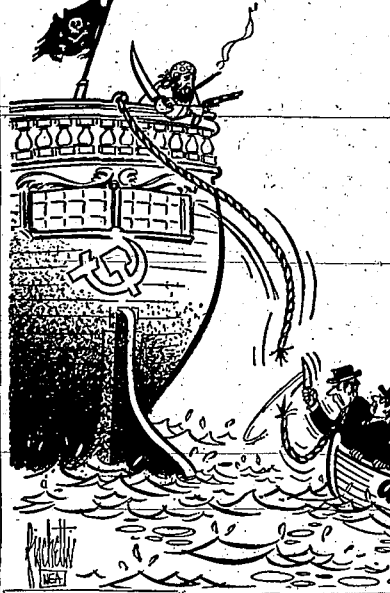

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(NEA) The most arresting statement in the Kennedy speech on the farm program message to congress is that "in spite of a 65-million increase in population by 1980, farm production will be able to produce all we need to eat and have in our cupboards."

It is assumed that the American technological revolution will continue for the next 20 years at the same rate as in the last 20 years.

The conclusions drawn from this assumption are that the existing program of farm subsidies will have to be reduced to reasonable year-to-year levels. The farm hand cultivation will have to be reduced in acreage so that it produces no more than can be consumed.

This is what the new administration farm plan proposes to accomplish by drastic measures.

A headline in the conservative proposal is indicated by the goal of increasing farm income by 25 per cent within the next five years.

It is assumed that the American technological revolution will continue for the next 20 years at the same rate as in the last 20 years.

The "development" in the program means the development of new resources in farm production through better education and by bringing new industries into the rural areas. It will provide better incomes for farm people instead of driving them into cities.

The specifications of these programs are too long and complex to present here in this column. Summary call for more feed grain and dairy programs to be approved or rejected by farmers and for voting in national referendums.

Cotton and sugar programs will require more federal resources. The President also promises an annual message on land resource utilization.

The dairy program would be complete as soon as it can be approved. The program would be made effective for the crops harvested in 1963.

These programs will be implementing the program of radical, revolutionary, and by imposing the most stringent controls ever proposed for American agriculture.

If they can achieve only a fraction of the goals sought, they will be a disaster for the nation. The alternative—removal of all controls—would probably bring about many farm bankruptcies.

**With United States population increasing** the way it is, there is a real danger that the world's agricultural appropriations will decrease. But it is implied that tax dollars will be transferred into agricultural programs to help the farmers during most of February and as long thereafter as necessary to help the farmers.

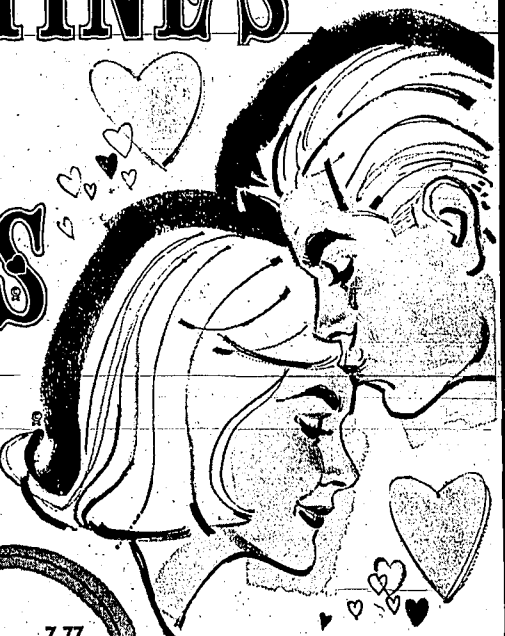

# FBI Activity Reported on At T.F. Meet

Wade Brownell, Butte, Mont., representing the district FBI division, reported on the FBI activities in the Twin Falls Lions club Wednesday noon luncheon in the Rogererson hotel ballroom. Brownell outlined the services and value of the FBI identification division disaster squad and its 12 million aids of fingerprints. He noted that the squad uses the fingerprints to identify victims of major catastrophes, such as shipwrecks, fires or plane crashes. He noted that the most recent use of fingerprints in a disaster was to identify people on the Montana governor's plane, which crashed about two weeks ago. He mentioned that most of the fingerprint cards in the FBI files are taken for non-criminal purposes, such as people entering the military service or persons working in government jobs. He noted that in some cases, particularly fires, fingers of the victims cannot be printed for identification. When no prints are available, he explained, dental charts can be used. The squad also works out of the country, Brownell pointed out. He mentioned that FBI agents helped identify the Mexican victims on a plane that crashed last year in Belgium. The services of the disaster squad are available to any local law enforcement group, he pointed out. When asked if it is possible for people to have identical fingerprints, Brownell noted that the squad has tried to disprove the theory, but has not identified any two persons with identical prints. He said many people have similar prints, but not identical, and added that the FBI has used identical twins in its research on identical prints. ### U. S. Charges Monopoly to Gum Maker

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—A Brooklyn bubble gum manufacturer was accused today of illegally monopolizing a growing industry—the distribution of picture cards portraying major league baseball stars.

The federal trade commission charged that the manufacturer, Topps Chewing Gum, Inc., had exclusive picture card contracts with all but seven of the 491 major league players.

Alleging a violation of the FTC act, the commission said Topps has created a monopoly contrary to the public policy of the United States and in detriment of free and open competition in the bubble gum and picture card industries.

The complaint said that collecting baseball picture cards is increasingly popular among young boys and that they will only buy bubble gum which is packaged with a baseball card.



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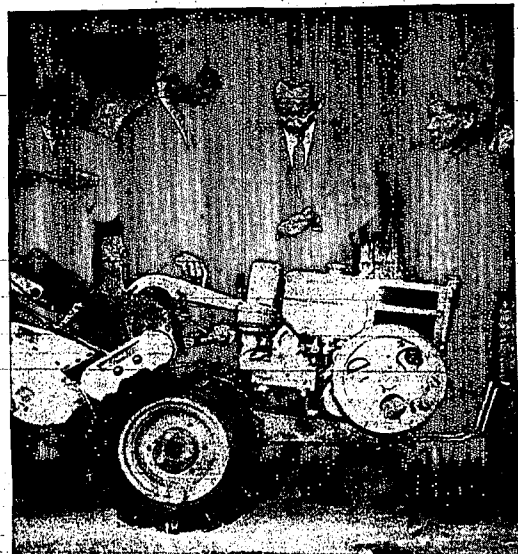

BURLEY, Feb. 8—Some 200 cattle feeders and businessmen attended the beef cattle field day Tuesday at Buhl to watch a demonstration on grading of feeder calves and hear discussions by six agricultural leaders. Highlighting the activities was grading of feeder calves at the Sandmeyer-Strawser farm five miles west of Jordan's corner.

Morris Hemstrom, University of Idaho extension animal husbandman, discussed each grade with the feeders as the calves were graded. During an afternoon meeting in the Buhl Moose hall, he talked on performance testing and pointed out advantages to cows which produce calves that show poor gains in the feed lot.

Eric Wilson, University of Idaho extension agricultural engineer, discussed the layout of the Sandmeyer-Strawser feedlot and pointed out advantages in the arrangement. He showed slides to demonstrate proper layout and construction details of feed lots.

Wilson pointed out that feed bunk should be located north and south to permit sunlight on concrete apron along feed bunk and water trough. The apron should be wider than five feet and should be elevated six to eight inches above the ground. The apron width and elevation would cause cattle to move away as soon as they finished eating or drinking.

Dr. James O. McMillin, Buhl veterinarian, discussed winter care of calves and the importance of moving cattle from the pasture to the feed lot lowers their resistance because of the protection of the abrupt change. He explained the importance of timing of vaccinations and the other ways they are immediately after moving cattle into the feed lot.

Dr. John Baker, U of I department of animal husbandry, offered information on wintering. He gave experimental evidence that cows calving in the winter season in good shape and should not be allowed to lose more than 10 per cent of their weight during the winter.

"A lot less than 10 per cent will produce ample or stimulated calves," he said.

Dr. Ross Christian, U of I department of animal husbandry, gave an illustrated talk on the physiology of reproduction and pregnancy testing. He showed several color slides and pointed out that the percentage of cows pro-

# Buhl Budget Is Approved After Parley

**BUHL, Feb. 8**—The proposed budget for 1962 totaling \$104,755.60 was officially adopted by the Buhl city council following a public hearing Tuesday night at the city hall.

In other business council members accepted the bid from the Dual Parking Meter company, Canton, O.—for 175 single head manual type parking meters for the city at \$40 per meter. The company also will replace the mechanisms and housings on the existing meters changing them to a manual type meter. The company also agreed to take 20 percent of the revenue from the meters until they are paid for.

The bid from Layne and Bowler Pump company, Twin Falls branch, also was accepted to pull city pump well No. 1. The company will check the parts and clean out the sand and reinstall the pump with the labor and equipment amounting to \$3,212.22. In addition the company will install the new pump in well No. 3 for \$7,070, with the work to be completed by March 26.

The city will pay the company one-half of the cost at the completion of the project and the remaining one-half in January, 1963.

Council members accepted the bid from the Wicks Works Equipment company, Salt Lake City, for a new motor for city well No. 1, at a cost of \$1,500. The bid also included a repair vehicle hall shaft wellmotor which will increase the present flow of 1.1 million gallons per minute to 1,230 gallons of water per minute.

The city will pay for the new motor in the same manner as for previous projects. It was noted at the meeting no interest on carrying charges will be added for either project.

Council members allowed \$50 expense money to Buhl Police Chief Charles Burbank to attend the Idaho law enforcement conference in Boise on Feb. 7-8.
