

Lawmen Support Frondizi

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Feb. 9 (AP)—Police reinforcements moved into the heart of Buenos Aires Thursday night to counter Castro outbursts against Argentina's diplomatic break with Cuba but the Argentine public appeared undisturbed.

President Arturo Frondizi took security precautions after hearing that staunchly anti-communist military chiefs and cabinet members with Havana, increasing the military's isolation of the communist dictatorship.

Frondizi, 51, gave in grudgingly after the chiefs of the army, navy and air force served him an ultimatum demanding a complete break with Castro and his cohorts.

Western Allies Defy Red Effort To Close Berlin Air Corridors

BERLIN, Feb. 9 (UPI)—An allied spokesman disclosed today that the western powers defied a Soviet attempt to restrict traffic in the three air corridors into West Berlin yesterday and today. Earlier, the Soviet commander refused an American request to show his identity card and turned back from an attempted crossing into West Berlin.

Soviet commandant Col. Andrei V. Solovjev was on his way to a meeting with Maj. Gen. Sir Rohan Drahmire, the British commandant, this morning when he tried to enter West Berlin through the Friedrichstrasse crossing point. When an American military policeman—then asked him if he was Col. Solovjev, the Soviet commander ordered his car turned around and drove back into East Berlin, ignoring the M.P.'s question.

A few hours later, the Allied spokesman said that Western planes ignored a Soviet warning against flights in the corridors at certain altitudes because Russian planes would be flying there at the same time.

Harding Faces GOP Lashing On Burns Creek Turndown

BOISE, Feb. 9 (AP)—Eastern Idaho's long-sought Burns Creek dam has become an interesting example of that old political parable: "It's better when it's dead."
There isn't much about the much-mooted dam that has not been covered by the proposed \$65 million-dollar power and water project before Fallades on the Snake river has had it in congress for this season.
Rep. Ralph Harbo, the 23-year-old Blackfoot Democrat who introduced the latest authorization bill after winning election on the Burns Creek issue, is among them. He's been a champion of reviving it this year.
While Burns Creek appears to be dead as a bill in congress, it's playing like a phoenix from its own ashes as a political issue in the forthcoming Idaho election campaign.
Republicans, mindful that Harding beat former Congressman Homer Budget of Boise with the coming campaign, some are planning to make it a permanent congressional merry-go-round.

Carver Says Politics May Touch Unit

NAMPA, Feb. 9 (AP)—Idaho's health administrator yesterday warned employees of his department that public health might become a political issue in the 1968 state campaign.

Dr. O. Carver advised department personnel to "help provide accurate information" on public health matters to candidates who want to evaluate health activities.

He also urged employees to "help correct some of the misconceptions and untruths that are almost certain to appear during the forthcoming political campaign."

Dr. Carver gave his views in a letter to some 1,100 department employees. He read the letter yesterday afternoon to Nampa State School personnel.

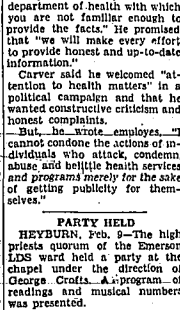
The administrator asked employees to "inform my office whenever you learn of an attack on a program or segment of the department of health with which you are not familiar enough to provide the facts." He promised that "we will make every effort to provide honest and up-to-date information."

Carver said he welcomed "attention to health matters" in a political campaign and that he wanted constructive criticism and honest complaints.

But, he wrote, employees "cannot condone the actions of individuals who attack, condemn, abuse and belittle health services and programs merely for the sake of getting publicity for themselves."

Chartered Plane Arrives Here With Load of Chickens for Poultry Firm

Flying chickens? That's right, flying chickens, not frying chickens. A placard of baby chicks was flown into Twin Falls' Justin flight Thursday on a charter flight from Arbor Acres chicken farm, San Luis Obispo, Calif., for Bertie's Poultry company, Twin Falls. John Bertie, manager of the company, notes that parent breeding stock is flown into Twin Falls about 12 times a year. Thursday's shipment of 4,300 baby chicks was one of the smaller consignments, Bertie explains. The chicks have been flown in on both charter planes and on West Coast airlines. The West Coast shipments vary from 1,000 to 6,000 at a time, depending on passenger commitments. The charter flights can handle from 4,000 to 8,000 birds at a time. Bertie points out that the Twin Falls airport is used for "something else in the valley besides passengers." The 4,300 chicks received Thursday were transferred by delivery truck to Bertie's Ingerman valley pulled farm. There they will be raised as breeding stock. In about seven months the chickens will begin to produce their share of the farm's annual two-million egg total. Each hen will produce about 150 eggs during the nine months she will be utilized. Of the 150 eggs about 120 will become eventual fryers for processing at the company's Twin Falls plant. The offspring fryers are grown by contract growers throughout the area and then brought to the processing plant. The parent stock is used for about nine months, and then sold for market. Merwin W. Amerine, Oakland, Calif., pilot for Twins' Birds' charter chicken flight, was scheduled to leave other "baby chicks at Caldwell and Seattle, Wash., before returning to San Luis Obispo, Amerine, who owns a turkey breeding farm, makes the three or four Twin Falls charter flights per year as sort of a sideline.

Water Report in Wood River Area Slightly Above Jan. 1 FAILEY, Feb. 9—Snow depth and water content for the Wood River valley show only a slight increase over the Jan. 1 measurements because of the strong chinook winds and warm weather last week, reports William Woody, acting soil conservation surveyor. Water content is 132 per cent above the average for the past five years and most snow courses are above the last good survey year of 1958, Woody commented after completing surveys this week. The precipitation tank on Galena summit, which was installed only 21 days ago, has shown an increase, compared to 10 inches of water for November and December. February holds true to form. It should continue a better than average snow pack, Woody notes. Snow depth at the Dollarhide course on the divide between Warm Springs creek and the Smokies, is 50 inches, with a water content of 15.9 inches. The 1958 depth was 64 inches with 24.1 inches of water content. Depth on Galena summit is 48.8 inches with 14.5 inches water content. In 1958 it was 20.4 inches with 12.7 inches water content. At the Horse creek course, not far from Galena lodge, the depth is 43 inches with a water content of 12.0 inches, whereas in 1958 the depth was 49 inches with 11.3-inch water content. On Bald mountain—the snow depth is 47 inches with 11.3 inches water content. At the Muldoon course the depth is 21 inches with 4.5 inches water content. At Garfield ranger station in

the Muldoon country there is 24.5 inches of snow with 5.4 inches water content, compared to 34.3 inches of snow with 6.7 inches of water content in 1958. At Svede's peak, on the divide between Muldoon and the Little Wood river drainage, the snow depth is 41 inches with 12 inches of water content. In 1958 the snow depth also was 41 inches but with a water content of 8.5 inches. Assisting Woody on the various courses were his son, Carl Norman Warren, Blaine county agent; Ralph Cisco, Sawtooth forest ranger at Halley, and Chester Arndt, forest service camp. Lawrence Johnson, Halley, who files to those courses inaccessible by snow-plows, has measured depths at a dozen other places by flying low and reading the numbers on stakes set for that purpose. He reports the depth at the Atlanta summit course is 81 inches; Trinity lakes 83 inches; Couch summit, in the Big Smoky country, 46 inches; the Lost Wood divide 48 inches; Jackson peak, near Idaho City, 69 inches; Browning creek, at the head of Little Wood river, 45 inches; Blot-Rock at the head of Antelope creek, 27 inches. Twin Rocks, at the divide between Muldoon and Copper Basin, 5 inches; Copper Basin, between the head of Copper Basin and Mackay, 23 inches; Cherry creek pass, eight inches; Stickney Mill, about two miles down the East river side of Trail creek summit, 20 inches; and North Fork meadows, on the Lost river drainage, 27 inches. On March 3 Johnson will take these various courses and take the water content of the snow. He also will take measurements at the Vienna mine, on the headwaters of the Salmon river drainage.

Test Cow Herds Every Two Years, Men at Beef Cattle Field Day Warned

Cow herds should be tested about every two years of some times often, states Morris Hemstrom, University of Idaho extension service department animal husbandman, during a beef cattle field day Tuesday at the Sandmeyer-Strawser farm, Buhl.

He said that herds should be tested just like soil and crop seed for their yield. Cattle feeders are beginning to seek out persons who have tested and are testing their herds for production, Hemstrom states. "It is more profitable to pay a little more for good genetics in the feedlot than to buy calves from an average herd," Hemstrom adds.

Hemstrom said profit on the cow and calf operation depends upon cow costs, calf price, calf weight and per cent of calf crop. He also said experiments show you can cull cows after their first calf.

Hemstrom said genetic variation makes a wide difference whether a calf gains in a feedlot. It is proved that genetic characteristics affect 30 per cent of all calves and feeding efficiency and 48 per cent of daily gains.

Dr. John Baker, University of Idaho department of animal husbandry, stated economy is the prime concern on wintering cows, but most ranchers should avoid stress by letting cows get too thin. Cows should always be in good condition at the beginning of winter, Baker states.

In feeding cows during winter, first concern is the cow's energy supply; second, protein supply, and third, make sure the cows have plenty of phosphorus on a hand to mouth basis. The way to supply phosphorus is by feeding a supplement of bone meal or dicalcium phosphate.

If cattle need phosphorus, Dr. Baker states, they will eat the supplement, but if not, they will let it alone. He said cows often run short of vitamin A during the winter. To correct this, they should be fed vitamin A supplement.

Winter heifers should be fed during winter to gain often, about a pound per day, Dr. Baker said. Heifers bred for the first time should not be allowed to lose 10 per cent of their weight during the winter and older cows should not lose more than 15 per cent of their weight.

During the afternoon session Doug Pinkerton, engineer, North Side Canal company, will speak on "The losses in our canal system." Carroll F. Williams, manager of the North Side Canal company, will speak on

"Steps being taken to lower our canal losses."

Final speaker of the afternoon program will be Dr. Dorell C. Larson, extension irrigationist, University of Idaho speaking on "Structures and methods that can be used to apply water more efficiently."

Priest pointed out that the agricultural success of southern Idaho is dependent upon the proper use of irrigation.

"This program is designed to give the farmers some ideas that they can use in applying water more effectively on their individual farms," he noted.

563 Predators Are Killed In Valley During Quarter

From Oct. 1, 1961, through Jan. 6, there were 520 coyotes and 43 bobcats killed in Magic Valley, reports the fish and wildlife service.

Cassia county had the heaviest Magic Valley kill of coyotes with 95 reported, yet it was not the leading county in the state. Owyhee county led by a wide margin with a coyote kill of 209 for the quarter.

In Magic Valley, Blaine county had a kill of 65 coyotes and 24 bobcats; Camas county, three coyotes; Cassia county, 95 coyotes and four bobcats; Elmore, 77 coyotes and four bobcats; Goshute, 39 coyotes and three bobcats; Jerome, 51 coyotes and two bobcats; Lincoln, 14 coyotes and three bobcats; Minidoka, 14 coyotes and one bobcat; Twin Falls, 70 coyotes and two bobcats.

"Light" Exercise Is Much Better Than None

"When you get out that little notebook to check on your New Year's resolutions, here's one you should add to the list. — This year I will do something about improving my figure instead of just talking about it."

Getting started on daily exercise is the only difficult phase of the whole program. Once you do that, you'll find you're having fun while you trim down the bumps and bulges.

Debbie Drake, one of television's sparkling personalities, explains in her book "Fast Way to a Perfect Figure," that common sense at the dinner table and 15 minutes a day exercise can give you the figure you've

always wanted. It's much more effective, she says, to spend five minutes each day at some exercise, than to devote a longer time in a hill or vice versa, skipping days in between.

Here are a few easy-to-do exercises that will show an improvement in measurements. And as Miss Drake advises, they can easily fit into the routine of either housewife or working girl.

Stand straight and tall, pull in your stomach muscles, raise your arms above your head, and stretch. That's all you can take an inch off your waistline by merely pulling yourself up to your full height, and stretching your stomach muscles at the same time. This can be done sev-

eral times a day. It sounds simple, but it's the most important waist reducer of all.

A crepy throat or a double chin may seem like opposite ends of a pole. But they can both be handled with the same exercise. If you have neither, remember that it's always simpler to prevent a problem than to cure one. So this one is for you, too.

Sit in a straight chair, for you may feel a slight dizziness at first. Hands on hips, circle the head from top to side, back to side, bringing it as far in each direction as you can. Start with 10 times a day, gradually increasing to 40 to 60.

An excellent exercise for the entire lower half of the body may also seem too simple to do

much good, but try it. Sit in a straight-backed chair, with hands at sides. Rise to a standing position without using your hands for support. Sit down again in the same way. Do it very slowly, and it will reduce the hips, flatten the abdomen, tighten the thighs and slim the calves. Could you ask for more?

This year, adhere to a figure-firming routine daily. Watch your diet. Don't binge or overeat, but eat sensibly.

Multi-Earner Trend Higher In U.S. Now

Look around your neighborhood, and chances are — statistically, at any rate — that two out of five families will have more than one wage-earner.

Look next year and there'll probably be more of these families.

In the last five years, "multi-earner" families have been increasing at an average of three per cent annually, which is to say that in an average year about 100 such families were there were only 100 the previous year.

With more families becoming "multi-earner" families, the Institute of Life Insurance points out, all statistics seem to indicate that by 1970 at least half the homes in the United States will have more than one wage-earner. Halt Contagion With Cleanliness

Health and sanitation experts stress the importance of cleaning before and after tending to the patient, and good housekeeping practices in the sickroom based on the expert's advice. Hot and hot water plus drying in the sunshine and fresh air.

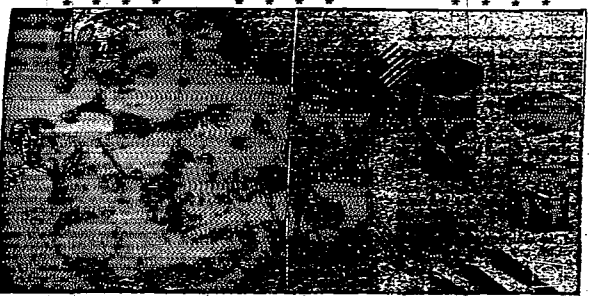
Portable Hi-Fi? Well, Almost; At Least It Could Be Carried

Listeners of high fidelity sound reproduction have sensitive ears. Some of these people spend a great deal of time traveling and frequently find themselves stuck in a hotel or motel room where the only music available is a cheap radio.

The answer, of course, would be a portable high fidelity system, but there is no such on the market. But if a listener is serious enough, he might build a system he could carry about. The problem would be to put together one light enough to carry with the program source — say, records. An FM tuner could be added at the expense of extra weight.

Triicorn hats are made from a strip of blue paper 10 1/2 inches long and 1 1/4 inches wide. Fold strip in thirds and cut a scallop on one side. Bind the straight edge with white tape and anchor the tricorn with transparent tape.

The drum is a small round box (a tack or small nail container will do), or a fat spool of thread. Cover on top with white paper, on the sides with red paper and strips of white tape.

HOW TO BROIL FALLS BRAND SIRLOIN STEAK PERFECTLY

For broiling, a steak should be cut 1 to 1 1/2 inches thick. (A steak less than 1 inch thick should be pan fried or sautéed). Score or cut the fat around the edges to prevent burning or curling during cooking. Let meat stand at room temperature for an hour before broiling.

Preheat the broiler until very hot. Grease broiling rack, place steak on the rack and broil 9 inches from the heat. For a 1 1/2 inch steak, allow 8 to 10 minutes for each side. If you want to test the meat for doneness, make a small cut near the bone. Season with salt and pepper before and after turning.

Serve at once on a hot platter with a generous chunk of butter melting on the meat.

SAUTEED MUSHROOMS

Rinse 1 pound mushrooms in cold water (don't peel or they lose flavor). Leave them whole if small, cut in pieces if large. Fry in about 5 tablespoons melted butter over a low heat for 6 to 10 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Serves 4.

Cover tightly and bake 1 1/4 hours or until meat is tender. Remove cover and bake 20 minutes longer to allow chops to brown. Serves 6.

- 1 can (10 ounces) cream of mushroom soup

- Dash pepper

Start your oven at 325° F or moderate. Grease a shallow, medium-size, baking dish. Drain tuna. Separate into flakes with a fork. Mix with mushroom soup, chopped green pepper, and milk. Pour into baking dish. Now separate whites from yolks of eggs. Add salt to whites and beat until they hold a point. Beat yolks with soda and pepper vigorously. Fold yolks into whites and pile on top of the tuna mixture. Bake 25 minutes. Serve immediately to 4.

Uncover and cook 30 minutes longer. Serves 6.

FOOD TIPS

Keep in mind that 1/2 teaspoon of a dried herb is equivalent to 2 scant teaspoons of a fresh herb, finely chopped.

Egg whites freeze like a dream. Before using let them stand at room temperature until thawed.

Detachable Rooms Are Predicted for Future

CHICAGO, Feb. 9 (AP)—Houses in the future will consist of detachable rooms to trade in as needed. A new modular, which an electrical company executive predicted would be on the market within a few months, is being developed.

G. T. Bognard of General Electric said the first such houses, which prices beginning at \$15,000, will be on the market within a few months.

The detachable-room houses would be fashioned of foamed plastic on a metal frame and outside surface of aluminum. The interior walls would be made of wood, aluminum, plastic or glass, or a combination of wood. They would be built on the modular principle. The basic size of rooms might be 12 by 12 feet, with expansion possible in 4-foot units.

Under this plan, newlyweds could buy a lot in a modest priced sub-division and purchase a house with two 12 by 12 foot modules for a living room and

bathroom, a bed and laundry which could be added by the purchase of a small four module, while the living room might be enlarged by the addition of a 4 by 12 foot dining alcove on one side to counterbalance a similar-sized kitchen with built-in appliances on the other side.

Additional bedrooms and other rooms could be purchased as the family increased.

Finally, if the couple decided to move to another location, they could have their light-weight

house disassembled, carted to the new lot and re-erected in a few days.

If the new location called for a larger and more luxurious house, a couple of old rooms could be traded in for new, more expensive ones and 12 by 12 foot modules added in groups of two to provide big 24 foot long rooms.

As the children married and left home, the parents might give each a present of their own rooms with which to start a new house or the old rooms could be

sold to a used-house dealer or advertised in the classified section of the newspaper.

What will the detachable house look like? As Bognard sees it, the roof could be either pitched or flat, with translucent plastic panels permitting daylight to enter. The exterior could be virtually any style—ranch, Georgian, Cape Code, colonial.

Changes inside would run mainly to built-in—stereo, hi-fi, television, cabinets, lighting and appliances.

Magazine Blasts TV Show on Defunct Papers

The magazine look at the death of two big newspapers in the nation's third largest city—a documentary which drew review praise of its aspects as a show—has come under fire in publishing circles.

"It became apparent early in the broadcast that this was not just a documentary about the demise of two papers in Los Angeles, it was more of a hatchet job on newspapers in general."

That charge was leveled by Robert U. Brown this week in the newspaper trade journal Editor and Publisher, which he heads. He further charged that "far from being a documentary, it was an editorial based on some misinformation and a determination to avoid important facts."

The show was "death in the City Room," broadcast on the CBS-TV network Jan. 25—Reporter Charles Collingwood, producer, Jack Beck. It was one of the "CBS Reports" series of

which Fred W. Friendly is executive producer. It immediately subject was the ending of publication in Los Angeles of the Chandler-owned evening Mirror on Jan 5 and of the Hearst-owned morning Examiner.

I reply to the Brown charges, Collingwood said: "Any idea that this program was part of some television master plan to attack newspapers is absolutely ridiculous. When two important organs of public information in the third largest city of the United States disappear simultaneously, this is a news story we thought we should investigate. I'm surprised and flattered that the industry has singled me out to present any case they may have about newspapers. It's completely untrue."

Although the TV program was unable to present anyone from the management of the remaining Chandler paper, the Times, for quotation, Otis Chandler, Times publisher, told UPI: "Southern California is a dynamic newspaper market. More than 50 excellent newspapers are competing in this great metropolitan area and their circulation reflects the tremendous in-

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 9 (AP)—"I'm 23 years old going on 30," said sleepy-eyed Gardner McKay. "And that's why he's quitting his starring role in television's 'Adventures in Paradise.' The show is aging him faster than he thinks is prudent for a man of his years."

"For the past year I've worked 11 or 12 hours a day without rest," the big guy complained. "Now I've had it. I know the value of time and it has been passing too quickly for me."

McKay, a lanky, athletic character, is a deceptive type. In a day of fire-breathing macho actors with faces like landliscs on Mt. Rushmore, Gardner is a handsome man in the tradition of Tyrone Power and Robert Taylor.

But he is pegged for a pretty boy with naught for brains. Gardner reads more books than a librarian with insomnia. He also vexes philosophical when moved by the muse.

"I've made a list of things I want to do when I knock off work next month," he said, referring to notes on his script.

"I want to hear music, see comedians, read books, do the Twist, sail, move around, think, play basketball, plan sculpturing, study and travel."

Gardner carries \$2,500 a week at 20th Century-Fox studios where his contract has another 3½ years to run.

If he had elected to stay with the TV series he would be earning \$5,000 weekly next year. Instead, Gardner expects to be suspended by the studio for quitting the program.

"My income will be exactly zero when that happens," he said.

"But I don't care. Some people wake up in the morning, look in the mirror and suddenly they are 50 years old. There's nothing wrong with being 50, but it's how you get there."

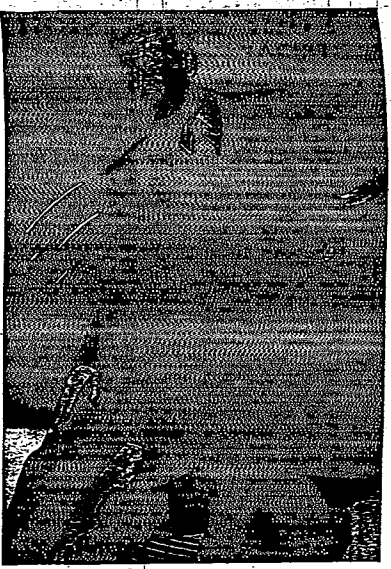

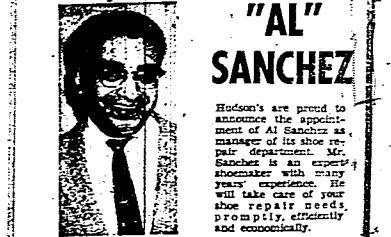
