

# West Answering Plea for Parley From Red Chief

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (UPI)—The United States and its allies today reacted to the reply rejecting by Nikita S. Khrushchev's call for an 18-Soviet Premier conference next month on disarmament. All signs would leave the door open for a possible summit meeting later if real progress is made meantime toward reducing East-West tensions. Secretary of State Dean Rusk scheduled a meeting today with the ambassadors of Britain and France. The state department called the meetings on world problems in general. But Khrushchev's proposals were expected to be a prime topic.

# County Puts Approval on 1962 Budget

County commissioners adopted the final budget Monday for 1962. No changes were made from the tentative budget adopted Jan. 8. This year \$2,107,641 was budgeted for county operations, an increase of \$747,476 over the \$1,360,165 budgeted last year. Commissioners reported they expect little or no increase in the county's tax rate. The increased assessed valuation of the county, however, was noted in the public health fund, revolving program and in advance two commodity conferences. They are to be held in March.

Increases were budgeted for the county hospital, county fair and the poor fund. A total of \$502,290 was budgeted for current expenses. Biggest increases were for the county hospital fund. Commissioners budgeted \$1,253,892.

A total of \$1,500,000 was budgeted for the county fair fund. \$220,600 was budgeted for the county poor fund and \$58,380 for the county hospital fund. Commissioners budgeted \$1,253,892.

# Guardsmen, Highway Crews in Valley Prevent Flood Damage

National guardsmen and highway crews in several Magic Valley communities continued their round-the-clock surveillance Tuesday to keep damage from flooding runoff water to a minimum. Troop I of the Gooding national guard has been patrolling Little Wood river which winds through the main residential area of Gooding since Sunday night, using sand bags and blasting ice jams to prevent flooding. Problems created by the spring runoffs are compounded by the fact that the Snake river at Shelley is flowing at a rate of 8,500 cubic feet per second, according to Eagle. He said the danger rate is 25 to 30,000 feet per second.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Feb. 13 (AP)—Space agency officials said today weather prospects for the launch of the first manned orbital flight Wednesday are about 50-50. They indicated the mission might be postponed again if things didn't improve. Lt. Col. John S. Powers, spokesman for the astronaut program, said a news conference today would be held to discuss the weather outlook "marginally."

# Moscow Charges Ship Is Buzzed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (UPI)—The American airplane today was charged by Moscow with spying. The aircraft was a Lockheed C-130 Hercules transport plane. The Soviet government accused the plane of flying over the Black Sea and collecting intelligence. The American government denied the charges, stating the plane was on a routine flight.

# Six Demy Fraud Of Kenny Fraud

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Feb. 13 (UPI)—Six men charged with defrauding the Slater Elizabeth Kenny foundation pleaded guilty today to charges of mail fraud and conspiracy. The men were charged with raising money for the foundation through a series of fraudulent solicitations. They were sentenced to prison terms and fines.

# Flood Worsening At Pocatello as River Rises Foot

Southern Idaho's multi-million-dollar flood—already have driven thousands from their homes—worsened at Pocatello today when the Pocatello river rose nearly another foot. The Banneck county sheriff's office said additional evacuees were streaming to higher ground from their lowland homes. Early estimates put the total homeless at 200. The number increased this morning but new estimates were not immediately available.

# Smylie Seeks U.S. Aid After Disaster

BOISE, Feb. 13 (UPI)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie asked President Kennedy today to declare Idaho a federal disaster area so money could be obtained to help the state recover from a multi-million-dollar flood. In a wire to the President, Smylie asked the nation's chief executive to clear the way for granting additional aid to the state under public law 875. The money under that law would be used for debris removal and damage repair.

# Hills Runoff Is Blamed in County Flood

IDAHO FALLS, Feb. 13 (UPI)—Snake River Watermaster Henry Eagle said today flooding in Bonanza valley, according to a runoff from foothills east running parallel with the Idaho-Wyoming border. The runoff was caused by heavy snowmelt and rain. Eagle said the flooding was worsened by the fact that the Snake river at Shelley is flowing at a rate of 8,500 cubic feet per second.

BERLIN, Feb. 13 (UPI)—West Berlin police today exchanged shots across the six-month-old border with East Germany. The shooting was the result of a Communist attempt to enter the city. The police fired back, wounding several individuals.

# British Hear Macmillan on U. S. A-Tests

LONDON, Feb. 13 (UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said today U. S. nuclear tests on British soil would be a "major step" toward achieving a ban on nuclear testing. Macmillan said the tests were necessary for the development of a new generation of nuclear weapons.

# Murder Trial Is Slated in Rupert

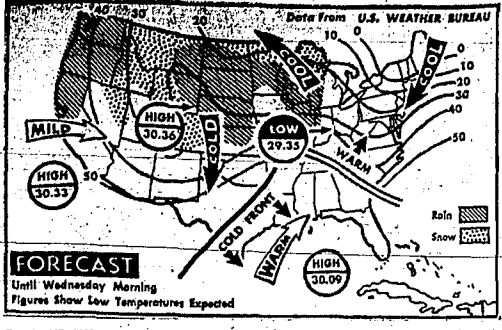

houses on Nevada street as precaution. Officially, the water level in the Polmet climbed this morning 8.4 feet. The stage is 8.4 feet. Some 8-foot-high residents of lowland areas near the river, however, had escaped inundation of their homes.

The dwellings were built on stilts that put them three to four feet above the level of the river bank. A parish at Idaho State college, Park Parrish, 18, nearly drowned in the Portneuse river at Onyx, Idaho yesterday.

State police fished him from the water, where he was clinging to a log. Police helped, after pinpointing him in the pre-dawn darkness with a search light. He was taken to Bannock county hospital for treatment of exposure. He had been in the water—half, for about one and one-half hours.

Gov. Boyd, meantime, Gov. Robert E. Smylie reported that a representative from the army corps of engineers is studying the Pocatello area from Walls, Wash. The field man has orders to render all possible assistance to flood-stricken areas. Smylie said there were 10 other corps of engineers officers also in the area.

Engineers in flood-ravaged southern Idaho, conditions seemed to be improving somewhat. The water had receded slightly in the Pocatello area, where 2,000 residents were forced to flee their homes by rising water over the weekend and yesterday.

Judd said a survey is under way in Lava Hot Springs to determine if the water is needed and that "it will be shipped in by helicopter."

Blackfoot families evacuated their homes along the banks of the Blackfoot river on the night of Blackfoot—between Blackfoot and Idaho Falls—during the night.

A crest was expected to reach the Blackfoot river at the government camp in the Waterloo area, four miles north of Blackfoot, on Monday afternoon. The river and it was not expected to cause serious flooding.

Most of the residents of the town, however, were able to save their homes because many were on high ground.

Hot river watermaster Henry Eagle at Idaho Falls said that since the crest of the flood on the Portneuse went by, the water—and it was reported at 8.61 feet, or 2.81 feet above flood stage, at 3 a.m.—the water will be over for the next 10 days.

**Indonesians Told of U. S. Peace Effort**

He is Lyndon Ray Smith, a Canadian-born who escaped from San Quentin prison nearly two years ago. The FBI said the wanted man is the first of the "10 most wanted" since 1950, with the true name of Smith.

Smith is probably armed and may be considered very dangerous, the FBI warned. He has been sought by police since Feb. 1960, after he had been in a prison camp officer near Fort Benning, Ga., since March 1959.

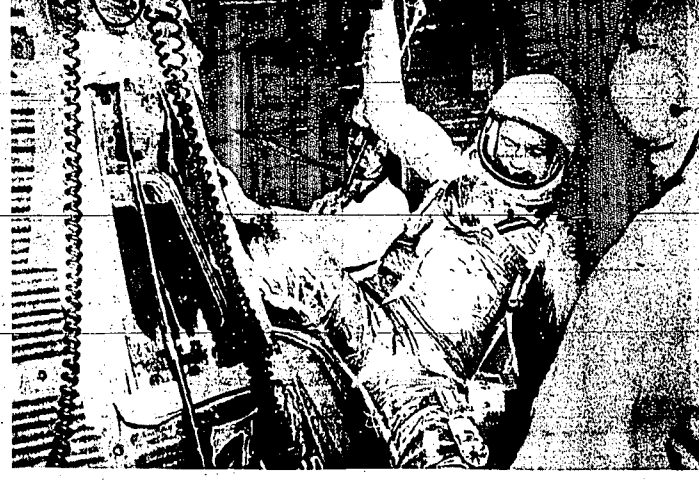

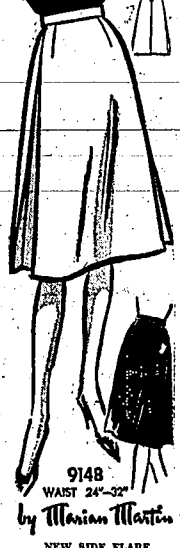

**RYE BREAD RECIPE**

**4-H Club Rye Bread**  
1 1/2 cups water  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
2 tablespoons caraway seeds  
1/2 cup shortening  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 package of cake yeast, active in cotton, tulle, linen.  
1/2 cup very warm water  
6 cups rye flour  
Measure one-half cup of water, brown sugar, caraway seeds, shortening and salt into saucepan. Bring to a boil and simmer gently. Five minutes. Remove from heat and pour into large mixing bowl. Add one cup cold water. Add yeast to very warm water; stir until dissolved. Stir two cups flour into cooled liquid in large bowl and dissolved yeast and mix well. Stir in remaining flour carefully, reserving one-half cup for kneading.

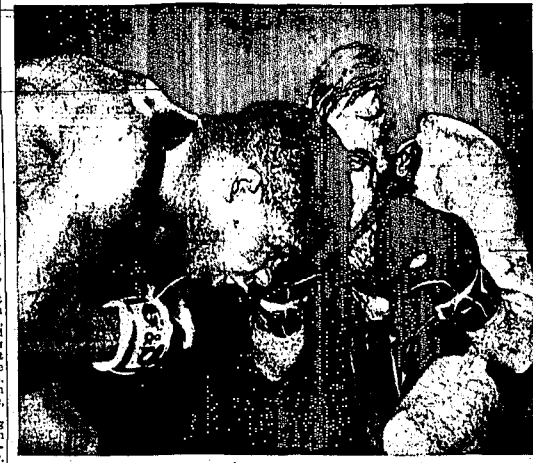

Judy Bracken, Twin Falls high school speech instructor and director of the play, notes that the melodrama, which is as old as "Uncle Tom's Cabin," contains action, drama, comedy and "just about everything." One cast member adds that George Peyton's down-and-out plantation has no connection with "Peyton Place," which came later.

Miss Bracken explains that the theater-in-the-round type of production is a new experience for the students, who generally produce plays in the junior high school auditorium amidst the usual stage surroundings.

Tickets are being sold by cast members and will also be available at the door. Miss Bracken notes that the tickets are not being sold for any particular night because some ticket-holders may change their plans and wish to attend another of the three nights.

### Anti-Missile Is Self-Destroyed

POINT MUDOU, Calif., Feb. 13 (AP)—The army's Nike Zeus anti-missile was launched Monday night in a spectacular display of fireworks, but destroyed itself automatically because of technical trouble in the second stage operation.

The 48-foot long missile zoomed into the night sky like a giant, solid sheet of flame from its tail. The army waited more than a half an hour before announcing the rocket deliberately destroyed itself "to assure flight safety."

The army said "certain test objectives were met." The first stage separated on schedule and the second stage ignited, according to the army statement.

### Sailors to Test Fallout Shelter

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—The navy will send 100 volunteers into a 25-by-48 foot fallout shelter at Bethesda, Md., this weekend for an indefinite underground stay.

The navy said it will be a "cold-weather" experiment to see whether artificial heat is needed in such shelters, and to test the reactions of the men to close confinement.

The navy said all but seven of the volunteers are from the Great Lakes naval training station in Chicago, and the rest are experts from the navy's nuclear research, tests and docks and submarine habitability branches.

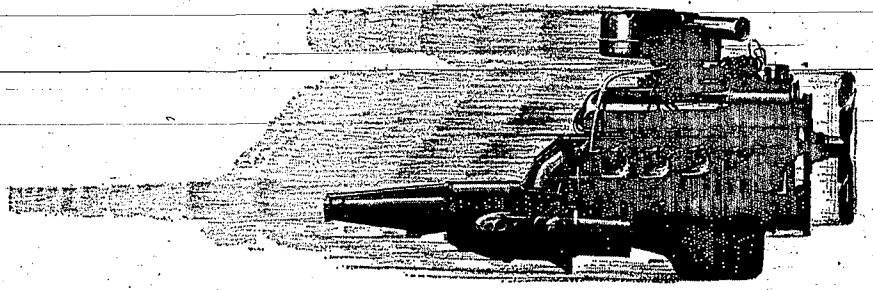
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
