Kenney Reports Powers Is Aiding In U-2 Probing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—President Kennedy said today U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers is cooperating fully with government interviewers and eventually will be free to testify to congressional committees and appear at a news conference. Kennedy opened a news conference with a statement on the case of Powers, who was freed by the Russians Saturday in exchange for U. S. release of Soviet spy Rudolf Abel.

Weather Halts Shot for Space

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Feb. 14 (UPI)—The federal space agency put astronaut John H. Glenn's orbital flight on a day-to-day basis today after bad weather forced postponement of the round-the-world trip for the eighth time in two months. It appeared unlikely that Glenn could take off before Friday morning. Hours after the latest weather-enforced postponement of the flight, the national aeronautics and space administration said no new launch time had been determined.

Air Academy Action Spurs New Notices

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Rep. Ralph R. Harding, D. Ind., expressed anger for action he said was taken in the firing of two liaison officers for the air force academy in Idaho.

Harding said he was informed the firing of the two officers was "a political activity, could not possibly be condoned by the air force academy, it is the policy of the academy to have reserve officers in these liaison assignments who are not active in partisan politics."

Rep. Orval Hansen of Idaho Falls, a Republican candidate for Harding's seat in congress, resigned as a member of the academy after he said Harding demanded his removal.

Harmony Is Keynote at Steel Talks

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 14 (AP)—An unprecedented era of harmony being over opening steel buy contract negotiations today with both the industry and the union, an industry official quietly stated today by President Kennedy.

Selection of Valentine's day for the bargain sale of steel is described as strictly coincidental. It is fit in with the sweetest season of the year, the negotiators seem to have adopted in place of their knock-down bargaining stance in prior years.

Industry talks were expected to be mainly exploratory, clearing the way for private meetings between President David J. McDonald of the United Steel workers union and J. Conrad Cooper, chief negotiator for U. S. steel corporation and the industry.

With the bargaining getting under way four and one-half months after the expiration of the current contract, the steel industry has formally started a later date for a new agreement, but it is generally believed to be in early stages.

Talks today brought union bargaining teams into separate sessions with representatives of the 11 major steel companies.

Governor Talks on Nevada's Tax Reforms, Greets Friends

"Nevada is the only state in the union that doesn't have illegal gambling," asserted Nevada Gov. Grant Sawyer in a speech delivered to more than 250 persons gathered for the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce annual meeting Tuesday evening in the Turf club. Topic of his speech was "What tax reform has meant to Nevada," but about half of the hour he spoke was concerned with getting acquainted with the many friends he knew when he graduated from high school here in 1937. Governor Sawyer arrived late at the dinner after being delayed by bad weather and flood conditions blocking the road at Battle Mountain, Nev. He drove from Grantsville, Nev. and was relayed to Twin Falls by private jets of the state police.

In his speech he asserted, "People living in what are in a vital area, it offers a golden opportunity for them to grow with the western states." He explained that just recently American industry has made efforts to move branches from the East to the West.

In support of his tax reforms in Nevada, he said, "It was a trial of the state depending on one economy, namely gambling, so another type of economy was looked for."

Outlining what the state has done to seek location of industry in Nevada he explained, "A group of 30 Nevadans has been formed, who solely on their own behalf go about the country and explain the situation in Nevada." He added that at times he invites about 20 persons to attend a luncheon at which he explains just what a gambling means to Nevada and what facilities Nevada can offer for industry.

He said, "So far, the influx of industry has been among small business, which with the individuals it brings, can better the social, economical and intellectual development of the state."

He asserted that space is valuable in the United States and his industry is seeking more room to expand. Explaining Nevada's tax situation, he said, "Right now people may bring goods into the state, assemble them here, and warehouse them here, without tax of any kind. Wyoming, Idaho and North Dakota.

Flood Over East Idaho Has Eased

Flood conditions eased somewhat in southeast Idaho today, but thousands of persons still were homeless and the danger was not entirely past. A shallow body of water 16 miles long and two miles wide crept toward Blackfoot through the night, but sank into the thawing ground just as it reached the city's outskirts. "The situation is definitely better," said Maynard Taylor, county chief defender-director. "No more water is moving in. The new flood lacked half a mile of reaching the city."

In Pocatello water also began to recede after reaching a depth of five feet in some sections, but the Portneuse river, although dropping, still was four feet over flood stage.

"The water is going down," said one source. "I think most of the damage has been done, but it's been terrific."

The crest was reached at between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning, and it is now receding. It is down to 10 feet now.

About 20 farm families evacuated their homes on the outskirts of Blackfoot during the night and hundreds of persons within the city prepared to flee, with the immediate danger gone, however, plans for further evacuation were set aside.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie asked President Kennedy to declare southeastern Idaho a disaster area and provide \$50,000 in immediate aid. He put the damage at a million dollars.

Lt. Col. James S. Keel, Idaho's civil defense director, said that at least 400 homes in Pocatello were awash; 600 were flooded to some degree in Idaho Falls; most of the homes of the 500 persons in Bancroft and 600 in Sugar City also were flooded. Keel said the major trouble spots were Pocatello and, potentially, Blackfoot.

Lincoln Area Has Water Over Roads

Richfield and Dietrich communities in Lincoln county continued to bear the brunt of flood conditions Wednesday as the Little Wood river was retained in its banks at Gooding. School has been canceled at Richfield for the rest of the week by Supt. A. M. Derr because of water covered. Dietrich schools also have been closed because official fear buses could upset on the water.

Arms Parley Gets Reject By Kennedy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—President Kennedy today rejected Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's bid for an immediate 18-day summit conference but expressed his readiness to attend later if lower level diplomatic talks at Geneva show progress.

The president turned down Khrushchev's suggestion in a polite but firm letter to the Kremlin leader. He said such a meeting "at the outset of this disarmament talks on March 16 might retard the cause of arms control."

In his letter responding to Khrushchev's recent proposal he told the premier that any such session should wait until they were better prepared for success. The question is one of timing, he told Khrushchev.

Red Chinese, Russians Are 'Celebrating'

TOKYO, Feb. 14 (AP)—Red China and Russia celebrated today the 12th anniversary of their day of alliance, but some cracks appeared in the facade of their proclaimed solidarity.

Only two important Chinese officials attended a rally to honor the treaty last night, according to Peiping.

The Soviet Friendship association, whose president is Gao Ching Ling, better known as Ming-shan, was the main attraction. Vice President Lion Cheng-chin presided over the ceremony and Chen Yi, China's foreign minister, and Lin Feng, an official of the national people's congress were the only Chinese government officials there.

Peng alluded to the ideological dispute between the two communist nations when he declared China has been "always loyal" to the Moscow declaration by international communism of 1957 and 1960.

Peng has implied in the past that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev has not always adhered to these pronouncements set forth by the communist parties of the world.

Young Makinen was studying in West Berlin's free university when arrested Sept. 5, 1951, on spy charges and sentenced to eight years in Klev prison.

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Secret Army Bombs Lash Moslem Area

ORAN, Algeria, Feb. 14 (AP)—The secret army occupation today staged its biggest plastic bomb attack to date in the Moslem quarter of Oran, touching off angry Moslem demonstrations.

About 40 bombs exploded, starting several fires which firemen brought under control.

There was no immediate word of casualties, although there were unconfirmed reports that some Moslems had been trapped in bomb-wrecked homes.

Riot police and troops sealed off the quarter and hurled confusion and tear gas grenades at the demonstrators.

Several hours after the bombs went off, grenade explosions and shouts of demonstrators could still be heard. But the riot forces were able to keep the angry Moslems out of European quarters of the city.

Moslems streamed into the streets, some of them participating in another part of the city were stoning Moslem cars.

His encore, "The Dance of the Goat" by Arthur Honegger, was an enchanting number played without the orchestra.

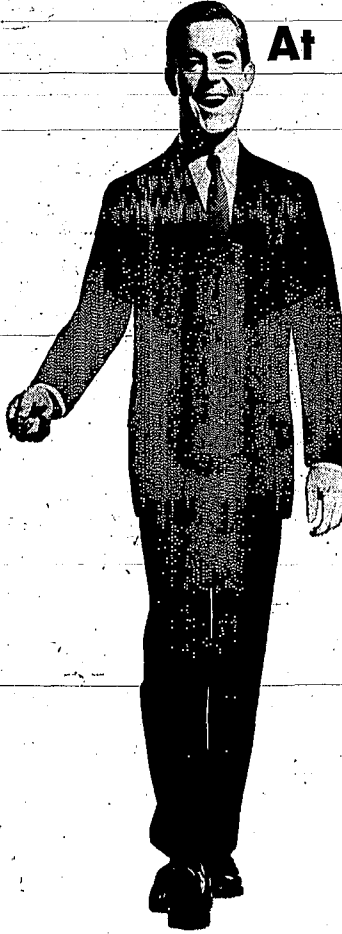

NATIONAL HIRLIGIG

BY JAMES J. ANN FREE
WASHINGTON, Feb. 14. — Many citizens are offended by lurid, obscene paperback books and magazines that flood newsstands...
The fact is that several leading publishers have been doing something about it lately...
But the big obstacle is how to enforce the law against obscenity without infringing upon freedom of the press and individual liberties which are guaranteed in the constitution.

New Approach

A good deal has been said in recent years about the subject of mental illness and treatment of mental illness. Much has to be expected in the future as efforts to get proper facilities and personnel for diagnosis and treatment. Already, giant strides of progress have been made in the field of public understanding. People generally recognize now that a person can need mental treatment without being considered insane.

One facet of such understanding is the general awareness that alcoholism is a mental illness with peculiar problems and special approaches to treatment. The public also generally accepts the fact that some persons need the services of a psychiatrist.

In short, the public realizes a person can be mentally ill without being a candidate for an asylum. The understanding is a base which can be used as the foundation for greater acceptance and real progress.

The Idaho Mental Health association is responsible in some measure for the change in public attitude in this region toward mental illness. Its members have worked hard at a difficult assignment and under adverse circumstances. These workers will gather in Gooding April 5, 6 and 7 for the annual conference of the association. They have adopted a constitution for the "guidance for legislation," the ultimate goal being to present the program of facilities to the state legislature.

Association members conduct facilities are inadequate to deal with the problem. An indication they are right is found in "A directory of psychiatric and related services" prepared by the Gooding County Mental Health Association. The directory lists three psychiatrists in private practice in southern Idaho, all located in Boise. Beyond that, there are no psychiatrists and public officials involved in related fields, none of which might invite consultation in cases involving, say, an emotionally upset child or a mentally disturbed person.

Early attention for the emotionally upset child or a mentally disturbed person can avoid all sorts of grief later, particularly in cases of progressive mental troubles. These early manifestations of mental illness are of prime concern to Mental Health Association members. And case histories indicate early treatment is in the best interest of society. Such treatment not only can result in a useful citizen, but it can avoid tremendous expenses later, including needless crowding of various institutions.

The Mental Health association will welcome any new recruits at the Gooding conference in April.

DIRECTORY TIME
Distribution of new telephone directories last development in news to the events in most communities. In addition to serving as a list of telephone numbers, directories are accepted more and more as an authority on the correct spelling of names and correct addresses. The latter benefits are byproducts but are helpful and significant, nevertheless.

In Twin Falls, the telephone directory has become more important each year because of the development in phone area. The new directories, being distributed now, go further afield than ever with the addition of Carey and Stanley phone numbers.

Of value and significance to phone subscribers who have one-party and two-party lines in Twin Falls, the new phone directory has "Area Code 208" on the cover and includes instructions for direct distance dialing.

LOCAL MOTES COUNT — This language in brief, is that if the dominant theme of the material is to arouse prurient interest and is of sufficient contemporary community character, it may be outlawed as "obscene." And the supreme court held, also, that such obscenity never has, and never did, enjoy protection of freedom, of the press under Anglo-Saxon law.

This supreme court ruling caused panic among publishers of risqué men's magazines who are building a green light to state authorities to crack down more vigorously on obscenity as defined by the Supreme Court.

Another blow against commerce in printed lifts has been struck in late in an Oklahoma City decision of the United States district attorney's office in buying obscene photographs from a Columbus, O., dealer, in a case that may prove to be a significant precedent.

PURCHASERS THREATENED — Moreover, postal inspectors intend to prosecute others who buy obscene photographs and magazines in pornography reveal them to be major purchasers of such material.

The government contends that, while the magazines have no effect upon the average person, except to arouse disgust, that they arouse the emotions of the few who are susceptible to them. Lower federal courts have upheld this view. The act of buying such periodicals as "obscene." And this is the issue presented to the supreme court on appeal.

TO THE COMMUNITIES — But progress in the fight against genuine obscenity can be offset if enforcement authorities get overzealous and interfere with the legitimate activities of such persons as the practice of nudism come in that category.

When the laith is being held on television for mediocrity, violence, and other sins of omission and commission, it is often the case that sometimes is made that the public responds with silent assent when worthwhile offerings are made. The appointment of a four-star general to head United States military assistance to South Vietnam, emphasizes just how deeply the U. S. is committed to helping the march of communism in Southeast Asia.

It includes sea patrols in an attempt to cut off reinforcements from reaching the communist fighters from North Vietnam.

In terms of money, it means that the United States is investing around ten billion dollars in the hope that South Vietnam can become a bulwark strong enough to afford protection to Thailand, Cambodia and Malaya.

U. S. money also is going into massive talks towers and transmission cables of blankets and all of southeast Asia. The United States men are being recruited for a huge airport building program.

When Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor visited South Vietnam early last fall at President Kennedy's request, he assured to come away with the conviction that men and women in South Vietnam's chief problem.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGGER'S VIEW

Ever since President Roosevelt died in his little Georgia place away from the White House, his spouse, editors have been bothered by letters inquiring whether he was ever otherwise put to death by some American. Indeed, some uneasy specimens have wanted to know whether he was, in fact, BRIT.

I met strangers on the streets that day who rolled their heads and murmured, "I can't believe it." I must confess now that my colleagues on the press detail were right in their historic matter. It was not until John T. Flynn phoned me a couple of years ago that I was began to explore a mystery.

My Flynn asked tersely if I had a copy of a new book of memoirs by the one I had called a pretty lady, who had been a secretary of some degree to our late president.

My Flynn then referred me to a particular page and line and asked "who is that lady?" The lady's name was Mrs. Winthrop Rutherford. She was enormously popular among the press.

The first tentative answer given is that companies wanting to get into the space communications business might find it profitable to obtain buying shares just to obtain voting rights.

Class A shares might, however, become just token stock, with no real voting rights, through class B nonvoting stock.

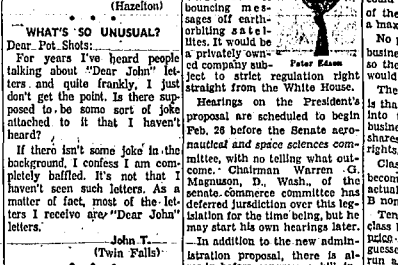
Ten thousand shares of this class B stock are authorized. The lady is not a shareholder, but she is a director. Or is she? (All right, she is a director.)

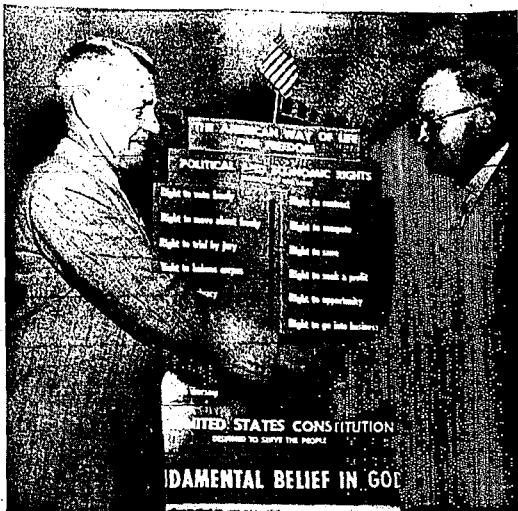
Miss Barraso's salary was \$82.50 a week.

Indonesian Throws Egg At Kennedy

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Feb. 14 (AP)—An Indonesian demonstrator threw a duck egg at Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy today. It missed.

The egg-throwing incident took place as Kennedy visited the auditorium of the University of Indonesia's law school, where he delivered an address to students in his judgments of the United States.

A question-and-answer period that followed, Kennedy gave as good as he got and took the wind out of the sails of one of 2000 two-headed student when he said that the annexation of Texas and the subsequent U. S. Mexican war was not a very "bright spot" in American history.

The blue-shelled duck egg was hurled by a student named and splattered on the pavement.

Soldiers promptly grabbed the young man who threw it and took him off under arrest.

The incident came on the second day of Kennedy's visit to this nation of 3,000 islands. Communist threats to disrupt his visit so far had failed completely.

Powers Stays In Maryland, Paper Claims

BALTIMORE, Feb. 14 (AP)—The Baltimore Sun said today that Francis Gary Powers, a spy pilot, was not a 65-acre government estate in eastern Maryland along the Choptank river.

The newspaper said location of the Powers hideout was confirmed by a "high source in the intelligence community."

Powers has been kept incarcerated since his release from imprisonment by Russia last year.

The Sun said Powers was reunited with his wife and parents in Maryland and presumably has been undergoing interrogation by central intelligence agency officials.

Unit Asking For Potato Legislation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—A potato industry advisory committee recommended legislation Tuesday which would impose marketing quotas and guard against a glut in potato production.

In Boise, Gov. Robert E. Smylie said the proposed potato program appeared to be completely responsible to the Idaho industry.

The chief executive called "for an all-out fight in the congress to prevent adoption of the legislation authorizing the program."

The advisory committee concluded a series of closed meetings Saturday and the agriculture department did not disclose the findings until after congressional sources reported them Tuesday.

A spokesman for the department said that planting allotments based on the historical record of each farm's potato acreage. This year's quotas would not be included in such a base.

The proposed potato program would be administered by a 46-member national potato administrative board. Members would be appointed by the secretary of agriculture from nominees selected by the potato industry.

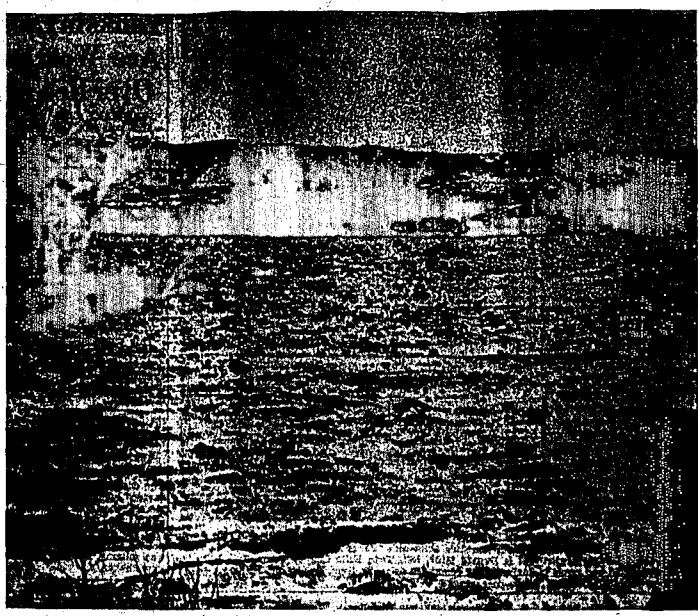

11 Sentenced On Narcotics Ring Activity

NEW YORK, Feb. 14 (AP)—Eleven members of a big international narcotics ring have been sentenced to prison for from five to 25 years each for amassing \$50 million dollars worth of dope into this country, their arrest thwarted plans to expand their operation half again as much.

Non-white, three other defendants, who escaped trial by jumping bail and fleeing to Europe were held during the day. They received 10 to 15 months in Spain.

The ring was estimated by the government to have imported more than 400 pounds of heroin over a 10-year period and sold it for \$50 million dollars.

The heaviest prison sentence was 25 years against Charles Shiffman, 59.

Air Line Told To Refund Mail Pay In CAB's Order

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics board issued Tuesday a tentative order that would require Pan American World Airways to refund 2.2 million dollars of air mail pay to the government.

After nearly 12 years of litigation and negotiation, the CAB proposed a compromise solution to a mail-rate case covering the period from 1946 through 1949. Pan American and American Overseas Airlines, which now is a part of Pan Am, received 712 million dollars in mail pay for the years involved.

Pan American contended an additional 6.9 million dollars was due it. The proposed settlement of the case in the CAB tentative order would require a refund of 2.2 million dollars from Pan Am to the government instead of an additional payment to the air line.

PROGRAM URGED—WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Sen. John G. Stennis, D. Miss., has proposed a troop indoctrination program to require servicemen to spend a number of hours each week studying both communism and the U.S. government. Stennis is chairman of the senate subcommittee which is investigating alleged "muzzling" of military officers and plans to look later, into troop indoctrination programs.

\$127,513 Is Sought Here For Damage

James Donald Whaley, 23, Buhl, filed a \$127,513 lawsuit in eleventh district court Monday against Franklin E. Coats, Melvin W. Carter and Jone Carter, charging negligence in a Nov. 13, 1961, car accident.

Whaley was a passenger in a 1950 Ford driven by Billy White, 19, Buhl, which rammed into the rear of a Carter packing company truck driven by Coats. The accident occurred four miles west of Buhl on highway 30.

Whaley charges that the truck had no fall lights and that the accident was the result of the packing company's negligence. He seeks \$125,000 general damages and \$2,513.38 medical expenses. He received several fractures, lacerations about the face and scalp, multiple abrasions and teeth damage.

Buhl Decides On Payments To Architect

BUHL, Feb. 14—Buhl school trustees voted to pay the architect firm of Waples, Clark and Schmal, Boise, six per cent of 75 per cent of the negotiated contract price, which substantially exceeds the original estimate for plans and specifications prepared by the firm for the new bus building program when they met Monday night.

Grafting Forms Theme for T. F. Garden Society.

April Walter spoke on budding and grafting at the Twin Falls Garden club meeting. She was introduced by Russell Miller, program chairman.
