Salmon Dam Has As Much Water Now as May, '61

HOLLISTER Feb. 15—Salmon reservoir contains as much water now as when the irrigation season was started last May it was reported today by H. M. Griffith, manager of the Salmon River Canal company.

At the peak of the runoff, the new In Salmon reservoir was reported about 1,000 cubic feet of water per second.

Oldtimers on the Salmon tract could not remember a similar heavy runoff in any period and the dam had never been such an early runoff.

Griffith pointed out that runoff is expected later from rains and warm weather, but there was no report of the amount of water in that reservoir.

Ocean Gales Again Scrub Orbit Flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Feb. 15 (AP)—A 54-mile race across the central Atlantic to the United States today to cancel its ninth attempt to rocket astronaut John H. Glenn Jr. around the world. The next try is Friday.

The storm, covering an area of about 27,000 square miles, was driving 18 foot waves through the area where Glenn would have to

land in event of an emergency during the first few minutes after liftoff.

The center of this storm is located about 930 miles east of Bermuda.

As it did Wednesday, the "scrub" came after a special weather briefing for Project Mercury Director Walter C. Williams at the Cape Canaveral control center. The briefing began at midnight.

Immediately after the decision was made—the White House was advised of the further delay in the planned launch which was first scheduled for Dec. 20.

Glenn was awakened at 1:03 a.m. by his doctor, William Douglas, and advised of pos-

sibilities. Subsequently Douglas said that Glenn appeared to be somewhat disappointed.

At a post-midnight weather briefing for newsies, an official said: "Unsatisfactory weather in the central and eastern Atlantic caused postponement of the launch attempt for at least 24 hours."

That would mean sometime between 7:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Friday.

Mishap Nets Second Suit For Damage

A \$80,000 civil suit was filed by Billy Whitted, 19, Buhl, Wednesday in district court against Franklin E. Coats, Melvin W. Carter and Ione Carter.

The truck, which had stopped on the highway to make a left turn, had no tail lights, reflectors or directional signals, the petition claims.

Whitted says he was permanently crippled in the accident and asks \$1,027.27 for hospital expenses, \$265 doctor bills, \$12.50 ambulance fee, \$4,000 lost earnings and \$85,000 general damages.

James Donald Whaley, 23, a passenger in the car driven by Whitted filed a \$12,500 lawsuit against the Carters and Coats Monday in district court as a result of the accident.

Cuban Flier Asks Asylum From Castro

GANDER, Nfld., Feb. 15 (AP)—A Cuban flier asked for political asylum in Canada Wednesday after being turned down in Ireland.

The immigration department officials said the co-pilot of a Cuban airliner, left the plane as it landed here early this morning and asked for political asylum. He was the 10th Cuban on the Cuban airlines flying over northern Canada to seek refuge here in the past year.

The co-pilot was identified by Irish authorities as George Durand. Canadian authorities refused to identify the man, but admitted the plane's co-pilot had asked for asylum.

Irish authorities turned down Durand's bid last night, saying they did not believe his story. Officials in Shannon refused to say what explanation Durand offered for his attempt to remain in Ireland.

Udall Orders Elk Shooting Halt at Park

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall said today the elk herd on the northern range of the Yellowstone National park has been reduced to the point where park rangers can stop shooting the animals tomorrow.

Shooting of the elk began in December in an effort to reduce the herd of 10,000 to 5,000 head. A reduction program was undertaken because the elk had become over-populated and were threatening the northern ranges' forage.

The herd remained at 10,000 head, the heavy culling of the animals would have driven other species from that area of the park.

Moose, mountain sheep, deer, and antelope were among the periled species.

Udall did not say how many elk were shot by park rangers, although the number must have been considerable. He noted that the heavy culling of the herd had caused about 2,500 elk to leave the park and enter Montana. In his announcement of cessation of the shooting, Udall recalled that Montana officials had refused his repeated requests to reopen the Montana hunting season so that sportsmen could hunt the elk.

Udall said a few more animals will be trapped and transported to meet the reduction goal. The only shooting which remains to be done is the killing of five animals a week for the next few weeks until calving time. He said that these carcasses have been requested by the research unit of Montana State College for laboratory studies.

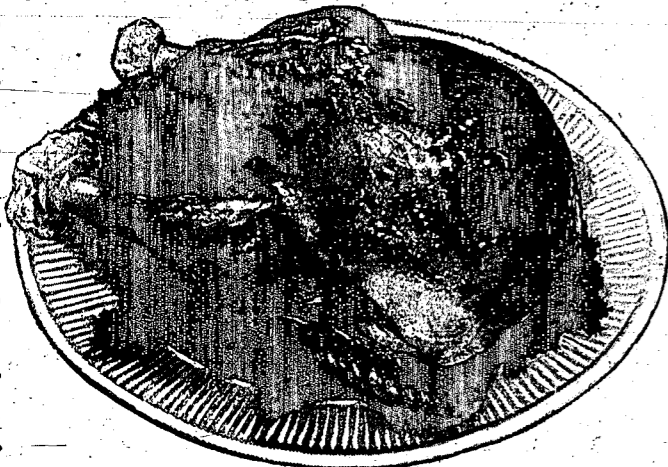

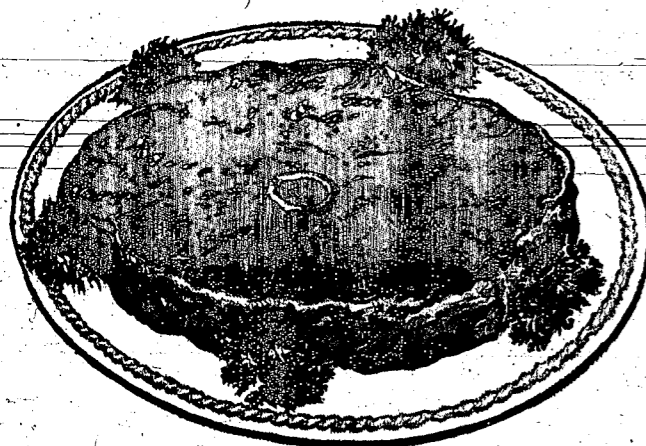

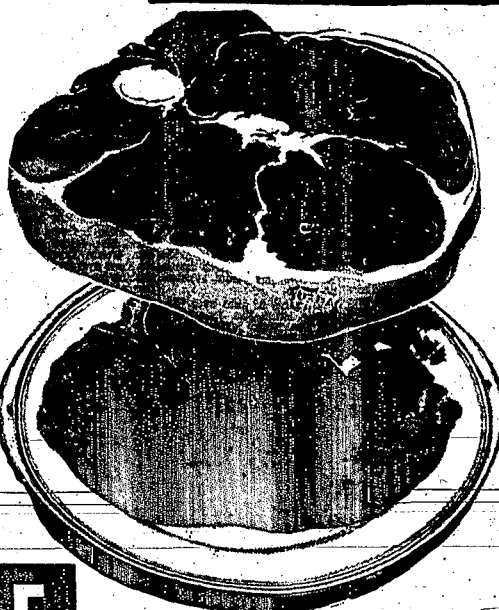

Demo Edges Byin Narrow Detroit Vote

DETROIT, Feb. 15 (AP)—State Sen. Harold M. Ryan, a Democrat, defeated state Rep. Robert E. Waldron by less than 800 votes in a special election for the 14th district seat in the U. S. house of representatives.

Republicans waged an impressive campaign, bringing 12,000 more backers to the polls than appeared in the primary election. The GOP attributed the strong turnout in the normally over-whelmingly Democratic district to "disaffection with the Kennedy administration's programs."

Ryan formed himself a "Kennedy Democrat" while Waldron described himself as a conservative Republican who "generally agreed with Barry Goldwater."

Venezuelan Hits Castro At Big Meet

CARACAS, Venezuela, Feb. 15 (AP)—Nearly 100,000 wildly cheering Venezuelans heard President Romulo Betancourt denounce "communist Cuba" and threaten "inter-American action against Latin 'diplomats'."

Special significance was attached to the meeting because of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro's charge that none of his Latin foes would dare hold a rally in mass. The meeting, Castro addressed in Havana last week. A noise bomb exploded at the rally but did no damage.

A vast crowd, including straggled peasants trucked in from the provinces, jammed Silencio square in traditional Caracas communist activity here—to hear Betancourt who also proclaimed that he was independent of the United States.

The president praised President Kennedy and U. S. efforts to aid Latin America, but he proclaimed his independence of the United States.

Goldwater was reported to have notified the organization he could not appear on the same platform with Walker since the latter had announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor of Texas.

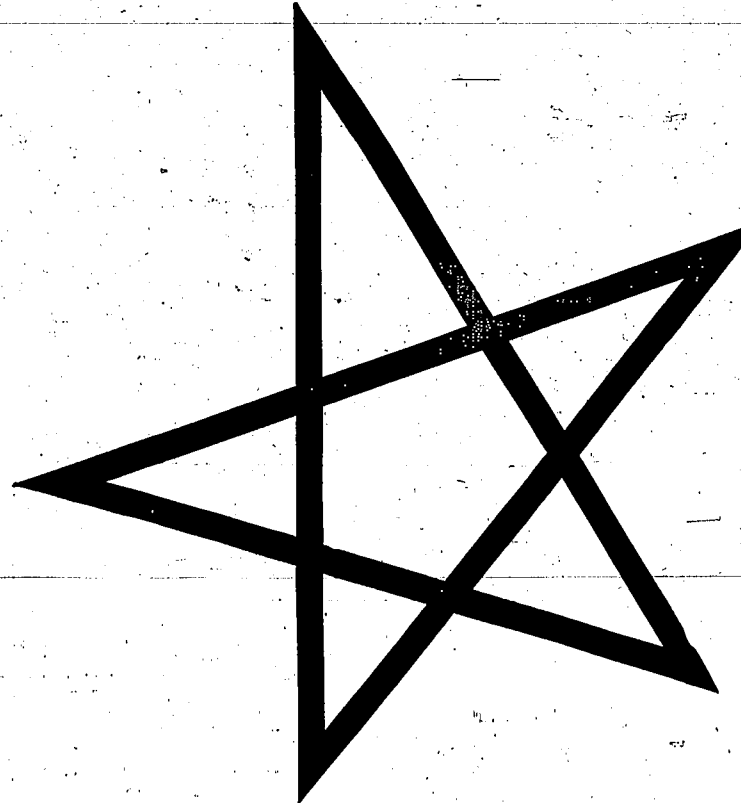

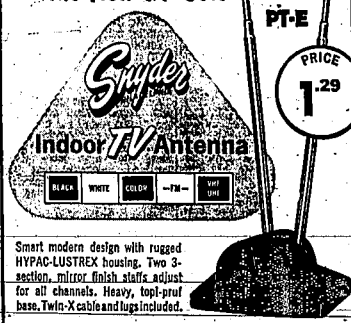

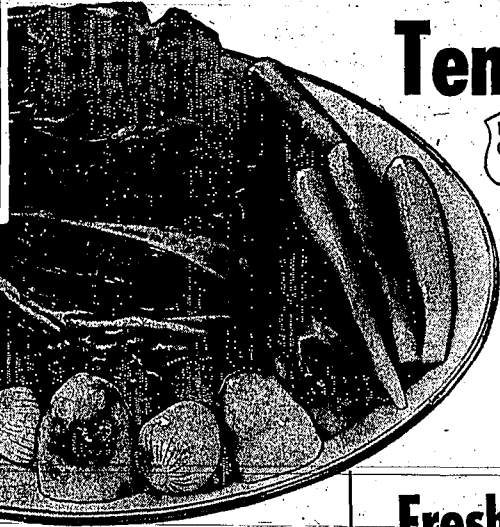

Adding to some of the geographical factionalism is the candidacy of Charles Herndon—a Salmon attorney and hotelman from the south-central area—and from the south-western corner of the state, there are four: Walters, State Rep. Clarence Hoge of Emmett, Gooding Ward of Marsing and Omar Maine of Payette county. Walters, through his leadership of the party the past three years, probably would have an easier time than some avoiding the geographical designation.

Besides these announced candidates, there also are several possibilities. They include Attorney Frank J. Benson, Boise; General Vernon K. Smith, the pro-gambling man; H. Max Hanson, state director of the Farmers Home administration, among others.

Some in-fighting already has begun. Ward has fired a couple of verbal shots at Walters. Walters and Smith have exchanged barbs. And, behind the scenes, there has been much more—taking in several other candidates.

These are some of the signs that have some of Idaho's Democrats more than a little concerned about the choice of a party chairman to serve through the primary election.

All teachers were re-hired for another year and given a \$200 raise, plus their increments.

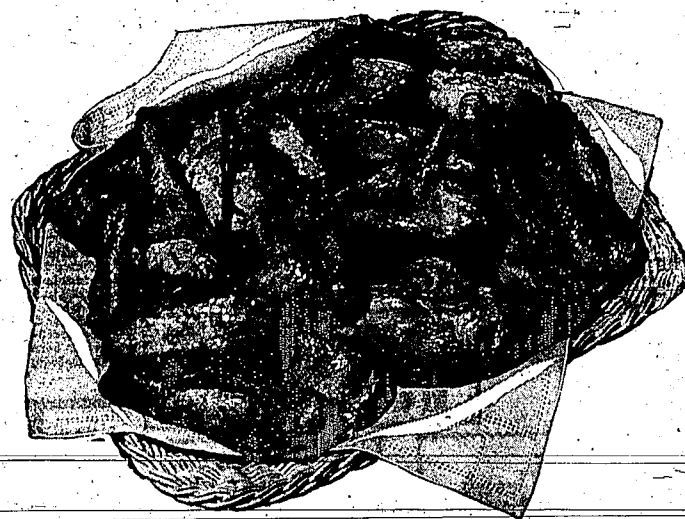

FRESH LEMON MERINGUE PIE

Make pastry for one-crust pie, per instruction on Package. While crust cools, prepare following recipe:

Combine 3 cup sugar, 1/2 cup cornstarch, 1/2 tsp. salt and blend in 1/2 cup cold water in saucepan. Gradually add 1 1/2 cup hot water, stirring constantly, over low heat until thickened. Add 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice and 2 tbsp. grated rind, stir and cook 2 more minutes. Blend a little hot mixture into 2 slightly beaten egg yolks then gradually add yolk to hot mixture and cook 2 more minutes. Blend in 2 tbsp. Tablerite Butter, cool, pour into baked pie shell. Top with Meringue, brown in 375° F. oven 12 to 15 min.

KITCHEN TALK
 Meringues: Use whites separated from yolks (3) beat to soft peak stage with 1/4 tsp. salt. Gradually beat in 8 tbsp. granulated sugar until stiff peaks. Fluff Meringue on pie, make sure meringue is brought up to crust, to prevent pulling away.
