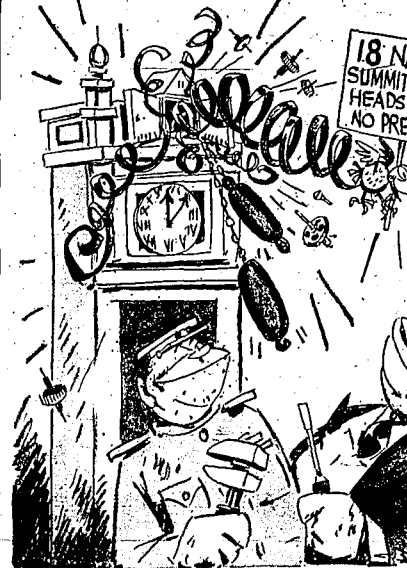

Khrushchev Wife Echoes Parley Plea

NEW YORK, Feb. 19 (AP) — Speaking English that came through clearly, Nina Khrushchev appeared in a special broadcast to American women for increased understanding and emotional disarmament.

The Soviet premier's wife, whose words were easily understood despite her accent, called on Americans Sunday night to lay down their arms and be friends with the Soviet Union.

"We must not be allowed to break out," she said in her 10-minute broadcast, beamed by Moscow radio. "This can be done through general disarmament under strict international control."

Mrs. Khrushchev said she was replying to American women who had written expressing their concern about the danger of war, especially a nuclear conflict.

Echoing her husband's line, she said governments should dump all weapons into the ocean.

She also echoed the Soviet premier's call for opening the 18-nation disarmament conference in Geneva March 14 at the summit level.

Castro Faces Cuban Exiles Invasion Bid

GUATEMALA, Feb. 19—A group of Cuban exiles here is organizing an army to seek the overthrow of Prime Minister Fidel Castro in Cuba. The organization, however, is still on paper and says it cannot mobilize unless it gets U. S. weapons.

The best available information is that no Cuban exiles are being trained here under arms at this time. Both Guatemalan and U. S. officials deny there is such activity. Chateau was one of the first to announce the formation of the Cuban army, Gen. Jose E. Pedraza y Cabrera, 58.

In an interview, General Pedraza would say only that "we are not now training any soldiers."

A civilian spokesman for the group, asking that he not be identified, said the organization has "all the men we need" for an attack on Cuba.

These men—all Cubans—are now scattered throughout the continent waiting for the signal to unite and trait as an invasion army, he said.

The army cannot be mobilized, but will have weapons from the United States, the spokesman said.

As far as can be learned, the organization's efforts to approach the United States government for backing with arms have not yet met with any success.

The spokesman said that although General Pedraza is commander in all military aspects, the organization is controlled by a directorate of about 30 men. He described them as businessmen, professional, farmers, laborers, industrialists and bankers.

Church Gets Support for Bonds Plans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19—Chairman J. William Fulbright, D. Ark., of the senate foreign relations committee, today described as "reasonable" a plan to insure repayment of the proposed 100 million dollar U. S. purchase of United Nations bonds.

Fulbright made the statement as his committee prepared to examine hearings on the bond purchase proposal with witnesses scheduled from a variety of non-government organizations.

He was referring to a proposal by Sen. Frank Church, D. Idaho, for modifying President Kennedy's request that the United States buy half of the 25-year, 300 million dollar bond issue.

Church's plan would let— but not require—the President withhold from the named U. S. payment of the amount due this country as its repayment on the bonds. The repayment then would go directly to the United Nations to make up the part withheld from the regular U. S. payment.

Fulbright told reporters he was not ready to endorse the plan, but was confident the administration would accept his proposal although it would be withdrawn if the bond purchase, as attached to the bond purchase.

He called for more solidarity but observers felt he meant the American, British and French authorities for the lack of agreement on how to treat Soviet commandant Col. Andrei Solyovoy.

Solyovoy has been barred from American streets because a communist police refused access to U. S. officials in civilian clothing after they refused to show identification cards.

Last week he entered West Berlin through a British sector crossing and visited British headquarters for an hour.

Brandt, in his regular Sunday night radio speech, said the impression should not be permitted to grow that the allied forces "should stand among themselves."
