Long Laotian Battles Seen By U. S. Aide

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii, Feb. 20 (AP)—U.S. Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara warns that guerrilla warfare in South Vietnam may continue for years.

McNamara flew back to Washington today after nine hours of talks with 22 military and diplomatic leaders called to Hawaii to meet him. He said on departure that the situation in the troubled Southeast Asia republic "seems to be stabilized insofar as communications lines are concerned," but the end is not in sight.

His meeting, the third in the past two months for which McNamara has been able to equip and train armed forces.

"We have assigned special forces who have experience and knowledge of counter guerrilla warfare to train Vietnamese forces in this type of warfare.

"This type of warfare is a long and hard struggle because it is not full-scale warfare but guerrilla warfare. Some of these forces have been in the area for as long as 10 years in other parts of the world, but I am hopeful this will not be the case in South Vietnam."

But he added, "we must be prepared to be patient in our approach to this problem and not expect overnight or clear-cut results for some period of time."

"If think you will find that George Meany is as enthusiastic about this as Reuther," Carey said. "It is not devolve and should strengthen the entire labor movement."

AFL-CIO President Meany and Reuther have been reported to be working in harmony since they settled a series of disputes at the AFL-CIO convention two months ago.

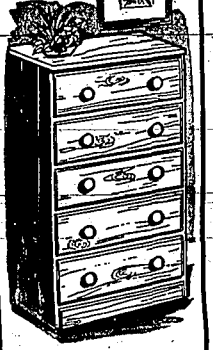

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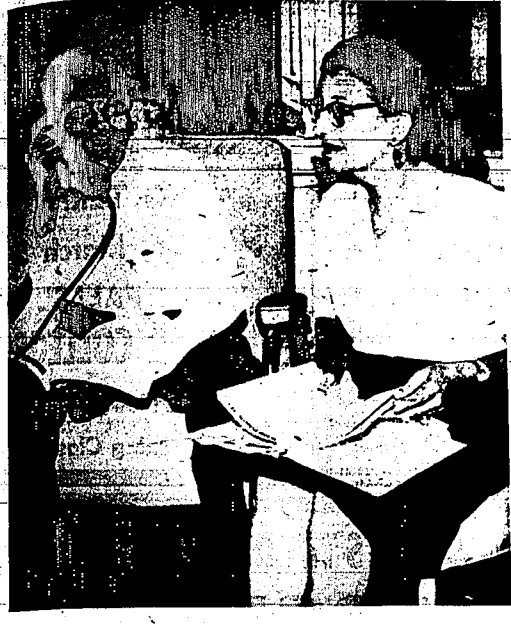

Mrs. Durant Is Author's Best Disciple, Pupil

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—To tiny Mrs. Will Durant, her husband is my guide, my husband, my lover and my friend.

"He could call me his best disciple and pupil," said Mrs. Durant. "As I look up to him as my only teacher."

Then she added, "I keep my own identity because he is a kind and benign person . . . he does not expect abject slavery or devotion."

Mrs. Durant, who on Oct. 31, 1961, was married for 48 years to the historian-philosopher, spoke of her husband with great respect and affection, almost reverence, during an interview.

The two, whose permanent home is in the "beautiful hills" of Hollywood, Calif., came to New York for the publication of volumes seven of Durant's history of civilization.

It is called "The Age of Reason Begins" (Simon and Schuster), and for the first time both Durants are listed as authors, although Mrs. Durant has collaborated with her husband, helped with research, ever since "The Story of Philosophy" was published in 1926.

She said that book established him financially so that from then on, we had everything we would need. From that time on, our association was not only with the greatest—with Erasmus, Montaigne, Voltaire . . .

Mrs. Durant said that originally the Durants would be in the last in the history of civilization group, but there still was not yet covered by the time it was completed.

Now, she said, two more volumes are scheduled, the next one, "The Dawn of Modernity," to be published in 1963, and the final one concerned with the age of Voltaire, to be published within her husband's 80th birthday on Feb. 17 in November; she is 63.

They will not attempt to write of more recent events, she said. "Because you can't write history while it is being made. You need perspective to gather the essence."

Mrs. Durant is a vivacious woman with bright blue-gray eyes and almost white hair cut in a short, straight bob. She was born in New York City and first met Will Durant "when I was 13. We were married when I was 15."

She was nearly 30, he said, and already was a disciple of the great Greek philosopher. It was Aristotle who said that a woman physiologically is 15 years older than a man.

Will Durant began to identify his wife as "Aristo" in a reference to her in 1929 when "The Mansions of Philosophy" came out. She is so identified in other works, she said.

"The first writing I did was on me." But marriage to a scholar meant that "I never had to go through filling myself with trash. I began to read good books . . . history, literature. I learned by his guidance what was distinguished writing . . . what would not die."

Scripps Says Newspapers' Lot Changes

CHICAGO, Feb. 20 (AP)—The lot of the daily newspaper in the United States "is changing and will continue to change for the people who read it," the head chairman of the Scripps newspaper group said today.

Radio and television have changed it, he said. Scripps is a luncheon address to a meeting of the Inland Daily Press association here.

Scripps said there is no question that a change in the lot of the daily newspaper is occurring because of the increased use of news magazines, as well as radio and television, on current events and news personalities.

"They are all a part of a change pattern in which people are receiving communication," he said.

Scripps said the modern metropolitan newspaper has passed through three cycles and compared its development to that of the industry counterpart.

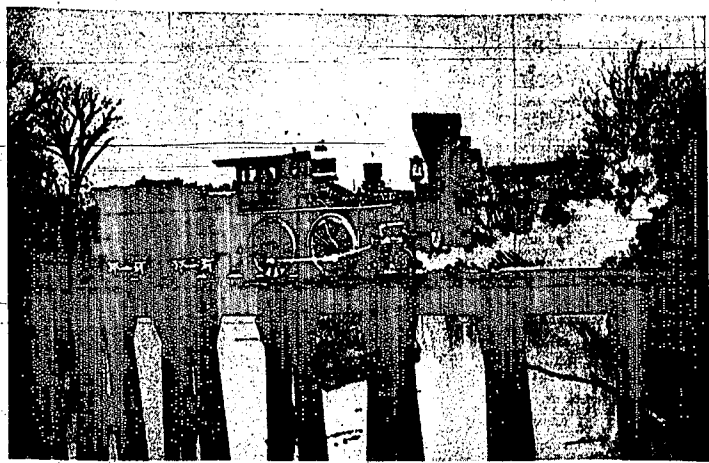
The three cycles were early development with growth in circulation, consolidation and maturity.

He said the greatest growth in the newspaper market was in urban areas where we see the greatest growth in population.

Also we see where small towns are dropping into big towns and then into cities.

Scripps said he was "chafed" at many of the reports on the deaths of two Los Angeles dailies, especially those which either omitted or glossed over the point that the Los Angeles market is served by over 25 dailies and well over 100 weeklies and semi-weeklies.

"This is what they call a two-newspaper town!" he said.

Scripps criticized such phrases as "power of the press." "The fourth estate," "Moulders of public opinion."

He described a statement attributed to Edmund Burke about the "power" of the "fourth estate." In the English parliament as "head wine for the journalistic ego." He said it "was an unfortunate and misleading phrase."

"If we can think in terms of estates in our body politic, then the press is properly an instrument of the third estate, or the general public," he said.

The stocky product of Oklahoma and Texas Tech hopes to be back in Moscow around March 2 with his family. He'll leave his Champaign-Urbana home about March 3 and drive west with his wife and four-year-old daughter. He expects to have three varsity aides plus a frosh coach.

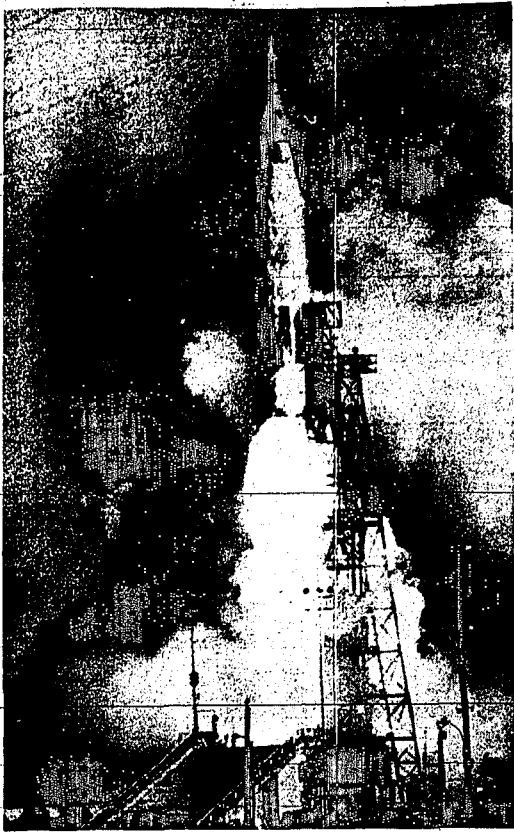

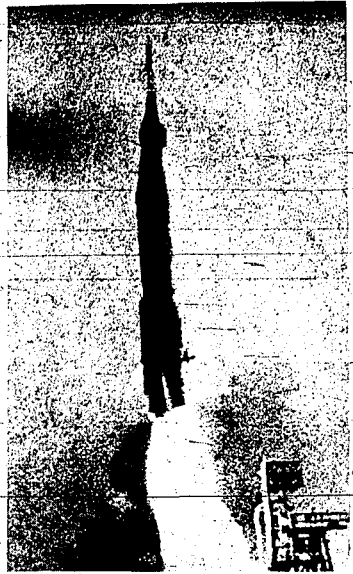

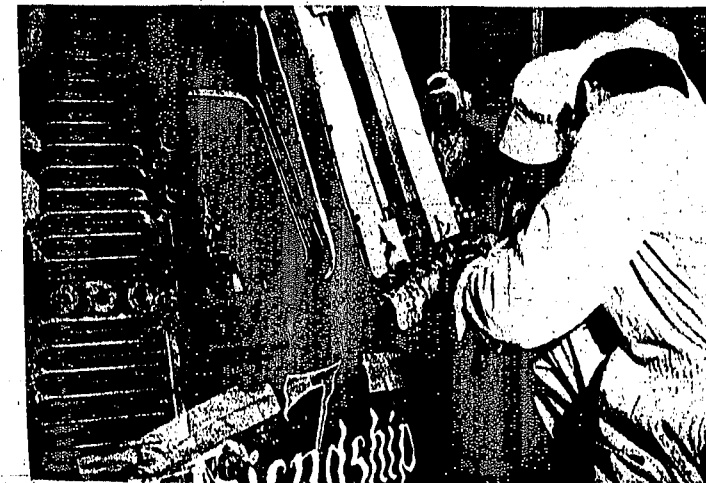

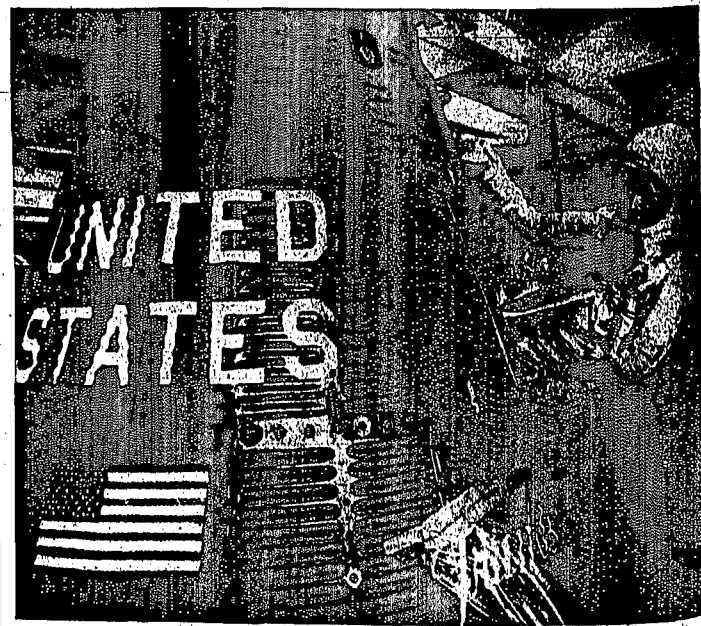

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Official Asks Plan to Hike Grazing Fee

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., Feb. 20 (AP)—Western stockmen were challenged Monday to come up with a program for gradual raising of fees on federal grazing lands.

John A. Carver, Jr., assistant secretary of the interior, told members of the national advisory board of the bureau of land management there will be no increases in grazing fees this year.

"We won't press for an increase this year, but we do think we need to make a start beginning next year," Carver said.

He said fees can be adjusted gradually.

"If this council should come up with a program for scheduled, moderate upward adjustments designed to reach some mutually agreed upon standard, we will give you the most sympathetic consideration," Carver told the stockmen.

The advisory board is made up of representatives of cattle and sheep interests using federal lands in 10 western states—Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah and Wyoming.

Carver said the present price for grazing stock on federal lands administered by the BLM is 10 cents for each animal unit a month.

"Other federal and state agencies and private owners collect fees considerably higher," Carver said.

"We cannot justify as reasonable, grazing fees which are 1-15th of the price of comparable private forage, one-sixth the price of forage which we administer on other interior department land or one-third the price of comparable forest service forage."

Carver suggested the department might fix a minimum and maximum fee, allowing the local district grazing advisory board to recommend adjustments of fees within this range based on individual circumstances.

Teacher in Utah Given Jail Term

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 20 (AP)—Richard C. Donelson, 33, was sentenced to an indeterminate term in the Utah State prison today for carnal knowledge.

But Judge Milton Anderson stayed the sentence on condition that Donelson spend one year in the Salt Lake county jail.

Donelson, a junior high school music teacher, earlier pleaded guilty to the charge. He was accused of taking a 14-year-old Salt Lake City girl to New York City.

The two departments are considering a proposal to raise the domestic sugar quota to 55 or 57 per cent of the U. S. market. Under present law due to expire June 30, about 53 per cent of the market is allocated to American producers.

The reported compromise likely would meet with stiff opposition from the domestic sugar industry. An industry committee has already proposed a new version of the sugar act including domestic quotas that government officials estimate at about 61 per cent of a basic annual market of 2.7 million tons.

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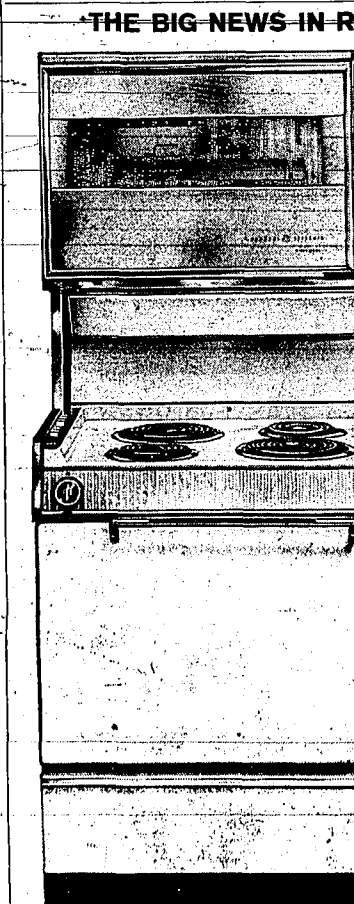

Farm Plans Explored by GOP Solons

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP) — Republican congressmen got out their first chance Monday to explore the Secretary of Agriculture's plan to farm program and had sharp queries about its disciplinary aspects.

The program, which is aimed at eliminating mountain feed surpluses in wheat, feed grains and in new production, may turn out to be more controversial than the one he largely failed to get past congress last year.

Taking up the full session provision, Rep. Page Belcher, R., Okla., said, "This is the first time anyone has ever proposed a criminal penalty on a producer. I don't think we should put a man in jail for not keeping records if it comes to that, we'd all be in jail."

Freeman said the penalty was felt to be necessary to make enforcement of the program effective.

But when Rep. Delbert Latta, R., O., brought the matter up again, Freeman softened his stand.

"I think that section is a very stringent one and I think this committee could write a much better one," he said.

Rep. Charles B. Hoeven, R., Ia., said the law contains a "backstop" to force farmers to approve the rigid control program. This is the authority for the secretary to sell 10 million bushels of feed grains and 200 million bushels of wheat from government stocks on the open market if farmers vote down the plan in referendum.

Hoeven said this would depress market prices and called it a "really provision saying to the farmer unless you vote for it we'll show you the reason why."

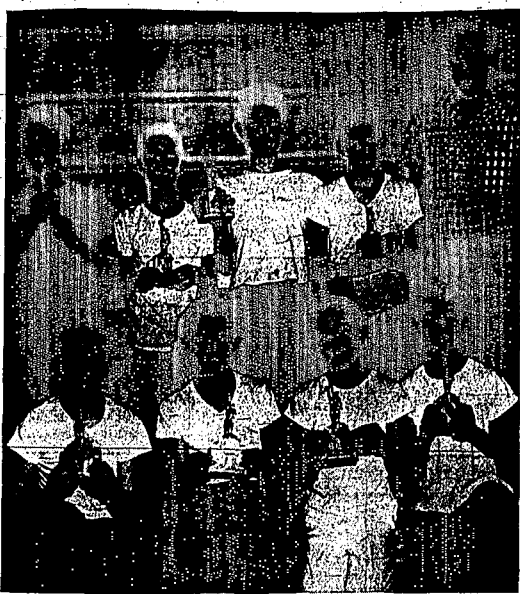

Then Andrew had a party with six small people about his size. They had a special teddy sponge birthday cake baked by a palace chef. It was topped by two candles which the young prince blew out.

Teddy bears and a pink wooden rocking elephant made by brother Charles at his school woodwork classes for a Christmas present. Then he played on the palace lawn, throwing sticks for the two corgi dogs; Whisky and Cherry, and kicking a colored ball around. He also fulfilled his regular morning engagement of feeding the ducks on the palace pond.

"The council will not take part in a series of conferences on the proposed prison which have been arranged by the Washington group," said Eugene Tibball, executive director of the Montana between-session legislative study group. "We are asking, however, to be kept informed on any action taken by other western states."

The proposal drew opposition

from Floyd Powell, warden of the Montana state prison.

Powell contended it would be impossible to work out a cooperative system because of variations in state laws on prison and parole procedures. His opposition was backed by the state prison board.

**New T.F. Postoffice Noted
Part of Unique Lease Plan**

The new Twin Falls postoffice is part of the postoffice department's unique commercial leasing plan, announced W. W. Franz, Twin Falls postmaster Monday.

He explained, "Under this program, investment financing is used to obtain needed facilities which remain under private ownership, pay local taxes to the federal government and are leased to the federal government."

He said the new postoffice is part of a program ordered by President Kennedy to stimulate the nation's economy.

The new Twin Falls postoffice, located at 253 Second avenue west, will be dedicated at 2 p. m. Saturday, and Jay B. Christensen, assistant to the regional director, Seattle, Wash., and J. C. Grilley, postoffice inspector, Postoffice, will attend the dedication.

Franz said, "The new facility will be a link with the postal system that today has more than 35,000 postoffices. This system serves more than 13 million persons and handles about two-

thirds of the world's mail. There are 560,000 postal employees handling about 65 billion pieces of mail a year, including more than a billion parcels."

"Mail business... has gone up," he noted. For example, 1959 post office revenue was \$202,989 compared to \$364,553 for 1958.

In stating other figures connected with the local postoffice, he related, "The number of postoffice employees is 54, compared with 63, 10 years ago. There are three vehicles operated in this area compared with two 10 years ago, and the number of mail collection boxes has been increased from 46 to 54 in the last 10 years."
