GRAND TURK ISLAND, Bahamas, Feb. 21 (UPI)—Astronaut John H. Glenn, Jr., came through his three-orbit space trip around the world in "excellent condition" and began telling doctors and scientists today about what he saw in space. "John is in excellent condition," Lieut. Col. John A. Powers, astronaut spokesman, said. "A preliminary physical did not reveal any sign of physiological change." Glenn got little sleep last night after being brought in triumph to this island in the Bahamas after his mission in space. Despite that, however, Powers said he was "fresh, rested and in good spirits" this morning.

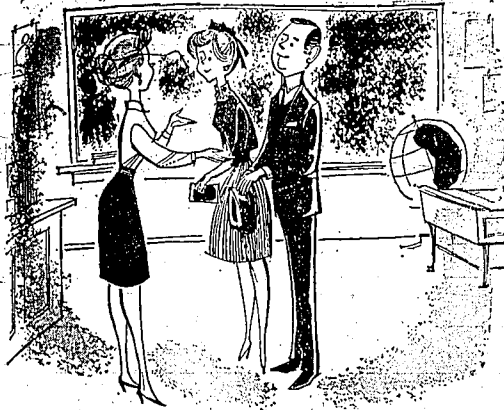

Their home life is successful, their social life is successful. It seems that they can't fail. On the other hand, we also know adults, just as well-educated and just as personable, who occasionally fail. The first group is on the spiral of success; the second on the spiral of failure. Parents must make every effort to get their children off to a good start in school, particularly in the primary years. Children who succeed regularly in school are sure of themselves; they expect to succeed. They are happy at home. They get their lessons at school. They play the games at home. They like school. They are on the spiral of success. Some children, however, take an opposite tack: These children are not able to read as well as the others and are soon afraid to read in class. They lose confidence in handling numbers in arithmetic. They fail to make

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21—In addition to his centralization of control over the expanded cabinet of the executive branch, President Kennedy's broad program is designed to make the United States more secure for the future. Legislation against a sudden attack on all national fronts—financial, commercial, military, political—is frequently being pointed out, and correctly, that a demagogic nation guided by a dictator would be a disaster. TAX CONTROL A WEAPON—His proposal that a President be empowered to raise or lower taxes by 50 per cent is the most spectacular and controversial example of his ready-for-war attitude.
Such a proposal would enable him to commandeer almost immediately the funds required for an international emergency. There would be no need for setting contracts for military supplies, as there has been in the past. Prompt action would be essential in this field, especially if conflict should arise.

His request for the right to lower tariffs on a wider scale has its military aspect. Anything that will free a flow of goods between the western world and the east is a military asset. It will also create a feeling of general good will that did not exist among the democracies in 1944 or 1959.

NEED OF UNITY—Mindful of the pro-German and pro-British elements in 1941-42 and the American front in 1939-40, President Kennedy strives to discredit the extremists on the right and on the left. His effort to achieve psychological unity has been aided by a number of solidly former President Eisenhower.

The stockpile inquiry ties in with this program. Aside from saving money, the symbolism is in itself a great asset. It is a way of showing that the nation is not only capable of producing its own goods, but also of producing them in a more efficient manner than it has in the past.

Despite Charles de Gaulle's opposition and British indifference, the eventual incorporation of France into NATO or a similar body seems assured. It has been the subject of discussion between the White House and top officials of the United Nations, with the smaller European members favoring it.

In the diplomatic bargaining over this question, we will ask that our allies on the continent make a far greater contribution of manpower to U.S. forces and to the U.N. contingent in troubled Africa.

SHELTER PROGRAM FIGURES—There are other major preparations of a "pushbutton" system at Washington, although they remain in the category of classified data.

Apparently the present administration is not qualified to determine the difference between a business readjustment and a recession. If President Kennedy's recession of 1961 is an example, politicians and bureaucrats are running things and you just get depressing the recession and figures after recovery showed it was more or less a slight readjustment. There is no doubt administration talk made the situation worse.
It's fine to have machinery that can be used to deal with any reverse in the economy, but mechanics have to be found to govern us.
There are no more political implications in any plan which would permit the executive branch of government to dump two billion dollars into public works. Elections have been won in the past with far less.

Papers Open Columns for Orbital Story

By United Press International
Newspapers spared no space in reporting the astronomical John H. Glenn's triple orbit about the earth, devoting tens of thousands of columns to news dispatches, photographs, charts and commentary on the historic feat.

New York City's seven major daily papers alone filled 5,476 column inches with their layouts on the first earth orbit by an American. A column inch is the width of one column, one inch high.

The New York Times turned over complete pages over to dispatches and photographs, in addition to parts of other pages, to use the most column inches in any paper in the city—1,332. The greater part of two pages was devoted to a text of Glenn's communications with the ground stations in orbit. In a rare departure for the Times, it also published a full page of photographs of the space mission.

The New York Herald Tribune also topped the 1,000-inch mark. Its space shot layout totaled 1,039 column inches. New York's tabloid Daily News and The Mirror filled both front and back pages, as well as center sections with photographs. The News published 797 column inches and news and photographs on Glenn's flight and the Mirror 588 column inches.

The afternoon New York newspapers also turned whole advertising-free pages to the space effort yesterday. The World Telegram and Sun published 621 column inches, the Journal American 788, and The Post 314.

Solon Says Democrats Have 'Handcuffed' Investigators

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—A Republican congressman charged today that the democratic majority on the house highway investigating subcommittee has "handcuffed" its investigators.

Rep. William C. Cramer, R. Fla., said the staff of the special subcommittee should be "turned loose" to look into all phases of the highway program in Massachusetts.

Cramer claimed the majority had limited the investigation to right-of-way issues. He said other phases of the Massachusetts highway program should be examined.

Subcommittee Investigator John Conlan held up his arms in answer and said "Do I look like I've been handcuffed?"

Assistant Massachusetts Attorney Gen. Joseph F. Lyons told the subcommittee yesterday he would wait until it finished its hearings before attempting to recover money from any fraudulent transactions. The subcommittee has said the justice department, the internal revenue service and other federal agencies are watching the hearings to determine if they should take action.

Other developments:

Pa., said why Kennedy did not request a tax increase to offset the pay hike. Government workers representatives testifying before Senate committees called the plan inadequate.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Feb. 21 (AP)—Here is a voice from space—radio transcript of what astronaut John W. Glenn said to Earth during his three-orbit space flight:

"0, 4, 3, 2, 1. Liftoff. The clock is operating. We are under way. It is a little bumpy along about here. Coming into high gear a little bit. A little control went by the window, or something."

"Coming out real fine. Flight very smooth now."

Glenn reported a steady flow of technical information on such items as cabin pressure, booster engine cutoff, oscillations, fuel and his own physical condition.

"Zero 0 and I feel fine. Capabilities is turning around. Oh! This view is tremendous—Cape! Looking around, and I can see the booster doing turnaround. Just a couple of hundred yards behind. It looks beautiful."

"Can see clear back—a big cloud pattern away back across the cape. Beautiful sight."

"Temperature is 60 on the suit. I am very comfortable."

"The horizon is a brilliant blue. There I have the main land—in sight—present time coming up on the scope, and have the Canaries in sight through the window and picked them up on the scope just before I saw them out the window."

Idaho Facing Deep Freeze, Hansen Says

POCAHELLO, Feb. 21 (AP)—A candidate for the Republican nomination for U. S. senate says deep freezes in Idaho are not unusual. Frank Church appears to be trying to put Idaho into deep freeze.

Add to this the failure of his much heralded Idaho with the administration' in obtaining 'the Bunn creek project and we see a crying need for effective representation in Washington.'"

Hansen, who also as mayor of Gray Alaska, spoke to a teen-age Republican club here last night. He said that a senator should expect to work with state and local people to encourage responsibility and action on their levels.

If this is not done, Hansen said, continued pressure will be brought to bear for federal aid and control.

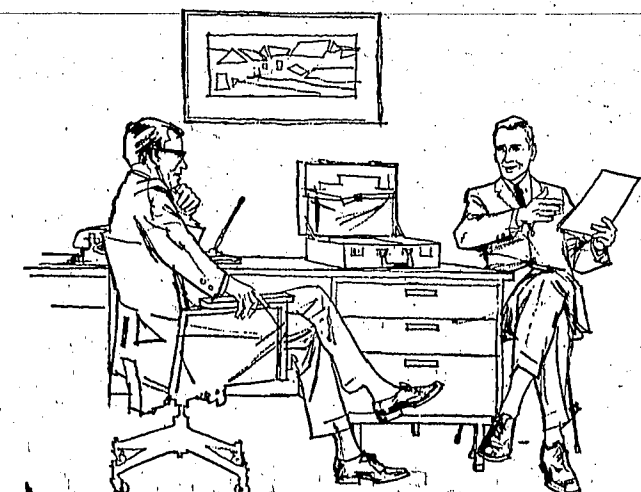

Bryan Allen, assistant secretary of agriculture, said that "we cannot expect the taxpayers to keep bailing out funds for storage, give-away programs and all the rest."

In a speech to the Potato Growing and Marketing association of Idaho, Tuesday Allen urged the farmers to consider the marketing order suggestions "with just an open mind as you would look over combines and other farm machinery."

Allen spoke in place of James Ralph, another assistant secretary.

He said that the Potato-National Advisory committee developed legislation and proposed a set of marketing orders which will be given further study if a demand for orders is shown.

"This is a far cry from what is being said about the government wanting to regulate or police farmers," he said.

"The power is in your hands but in the course of the law action must be taken in the name of the secretary of agriculture."

He told the group that agriculture has become efficient through research and development.

"We now have to look to marketing field as we are producing far beyond the ability of the consumer to take so the farmer will get and show a profit on the farm," he said.

He said that marketing orders may be new to potato growers in Idaho, but he noted that California has used them since 1921.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—The White House social season opened with glitter and song and tonics to the man who was the first to go to space—astronaut John H. Glenn, Jr.

Tuesday night's state dinner was given by President and Mrs. Kennedy in honor of Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, House Speaker John W. McCormack, D. Mass., and Chief Justice Earl Warren. But Glenn was the guest of honor in absentia.

He was the subject of toasts at the banquet of veal fillet aspic for 120 guests.

Both Warren and Johnson rose to toast the marine flier who became the first American to orbit the earth.

"Tonight climaxes a memorable day for John Glenn and for the free world," Johnson said.

The song was provided by mezzo soprano Grace Bumbry, 24, St. Louis-born Negro who flew in from Paris for her special White House concert.

But it was Glenn's performance that sparked the evening—even his hunter.

Kennedy, who earlier had expressed the thanks of a proud nation of Glenn's performance, said that one of the guests—Senate Republican Leader Everett R. Dirksen of Illinois—had told him and Vice President Johnson into political orbit during the day.

Republicans contributed heavily to a vote distracting the Kennedy administration's strategy on a proposal to establish a department of urban affairs.

And with a house vote coming up, Kennedy said McCormack need bein boosted into the same kind of orbit.

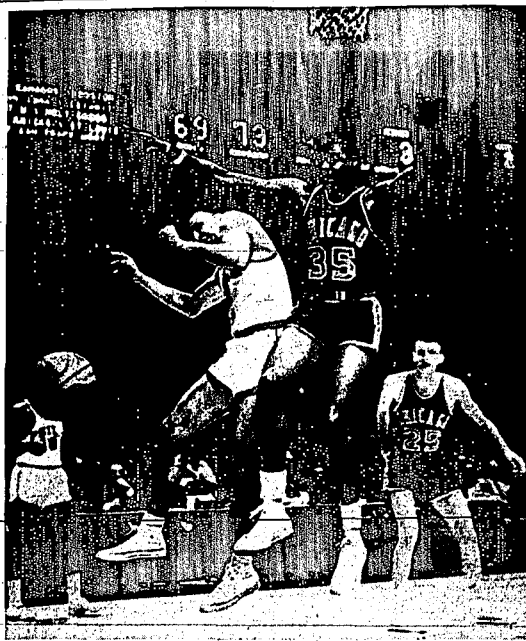

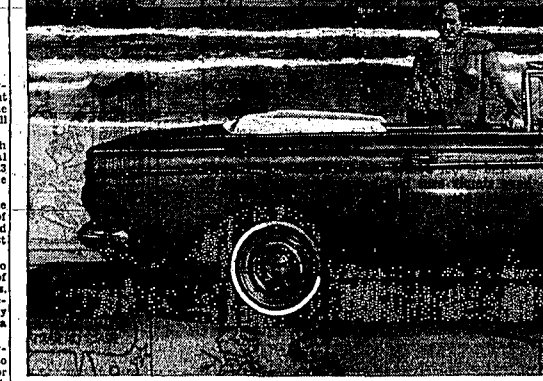

Hunters Told to Try High Areas

BOISE, Feb. 21 (AP)—Idaho sportsmen were advised Tuesday that if they will go to the higher elevations during the early portion of the fall big game seasons they have better chance of bagging a deer with less competition from other hunters.

By doing so, too, the state fish and game department said, the hunter can avoid the foul weather which often marks the late season shooting, even at the lower elevations.

Levi Mohler, chief of game management, said tagging and holding studies during the past several years show trends in herd movements and survival.

During the past two years, he said, some 445 deer, 150 antelope, 50 elk, five moose and six goats were tagged for future identification. Records show where each animal was tagged and a later survey will determine migration patterns of the big game.
