**Dworshak Flays Spending Boost**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP) — Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Idaho, said today expenditures proposed in the coming year by the federal department of agriculture represent a gain of nearly 2 billion dollars over the agency's expenditures in 1960.

### Former Gooding Resident Started Trying for Radio Career When 11

IDAHO FALLS, Feb. 26 (AP)—Dennis Hill started hanging around radio stations when he was 11 years old.

When disk jockeys saw him coming, they quipped, "Dennis Hill could ask more questions than the FBI."

Dennis wanted to be in radio. More so than most.

It wasn't just the excitement, Fred had him.

One day in 1944, he was caught literally with his pants down when a tornado struck his school in Oklahoma and demolished two buildings.

Dennis, sitting in the boys' washroom, was able to make his way into a hallway and drop to the floor of the shuddering building until the twister passed.

When it was over, four of his classmates had been killed.

His parents made many moves, but Dennis always found a radio station to haunt. He became a fixture in stations in Utah, Colorado and finally in Idaho.

After graduation from high school in Gooding in 1954, he started at Boise Junior college. But the main attraction in Boise was radio stations.

Dennis hung around one station so long that, finally, one announcer had him play a routine tape recording and then put the national network back on the air. "Just to get rid of me."

Then another announcer, Tom Fairchild, asked him to make a voice recording. Impressed, Fairchild brought Dennis along on "remote" broadcasts from grocery stores.

Dennis even got a few words over the air.

There was no pay, but the experience was what Dennis wanted.

But the end came, Dennis quit school and returned home to Idaho Falls where he "just sort of existed" for a year. But he still haunted radio stations.

One night, Fairchild's voice came over the local station. Elated, Dennis contacted him in hopes of finding a radio job.

But Dennis was not he needed more training. So he went to Fitch's college in Rexburg for a year's course in radio. At the same time, the local station, KID, AS-TV, let him work on a Sunday night shift.

His first words on his new job were: "One moment, please." A turrible had gone dead in the middle of a record.

Eight months later, he was on the payroll—his first.

It was now 40 hours a week for Dennis, but his inclusion to hang around a radio station persists. And he is no less inquisitive.

Last month, he returned from a California school where he studied for his first class radio license. This is the Ph.D. of radio broadcaster.

Dennis, now 35, was tops in his class. His teachers were amazed. For Dennis is totally blind—and has been since he was 13 years old when glaucoma robbed him of the few shadows he could detect in his boyhood.

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### Protestants Meeting for Policy Talk

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 26 (AP)—The general board of the National Council of Churches, embracing 125 major Protestant and orthodox denominations with a total of 40 million members, today opened a five-day policy-making meeting described as unprecedented.

## What Price Glory?

When Lieut. Col. John H. Glenn, Jr., orbited Earth, the event lacked just two days of coinciding with the birthday of another great American, who may have been overlooked in the excitement. The other great American, of course, was George Washington, often referred to as the "father of his country."

But what price glory and how fleeting fame! Early Thursday, a Twin Falls school was hurrying to work exclaimed, "Well, it looks as though enough to get the flags up; they should have been up Tuesday while Glenn was in orbit!" Perhaps a rising generation might relate the two dates with something like, "We mustn't forget, now; Washington's birthday comes two days after the American Orbit Holiday!"

As a belated reminder, George Washington was born Feb. 22, 1732, Feb. 22 is observed as a federal holiday. It is not a federal employee's duty that day; it's a legal holiday in all 50 states, District of Columbia, Panama Canal Zone, Guam, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands.

Two or three times, students at Twin Falls high school have come very near to rebellion—which is in the fine tradition of Washington and the 13 states—in their contention that the public schools should recognize George Washington's birthday. Now rebellion cannot be condoned, even on the birthday of the man who led one of history's greatest rebellions. Yet the holiday-minded students may have a point and there is no denying they can cite fine precedent to support their contentions.

Many nations enjoy national holidays to mark the birth dates of far lesser men than George Washington. It is a national holiday in many countries in celebrations. To the everlasting credit of American youngsters, these foreign events are marked by bloodshed frequently.

Perhaps today's high school students aren't too concerned with the reason for a holiday, just so it's a holiday. Otherwise they would have pointed out long ago in their drive for recognition of George Washington's birthday. It is at least a national holiday in many states. Or they might even point out that if school days are so valuable that teachers' institute should be held on Saturday and Sunday, then saving two more days of classes along with regular school on Washington's birthday.

But students should avoid any action that might earn the tag of revolutionary, even while trying to honor the hero of the Revolution war.

Some or many of them will recognize that their elders have provided a method to achieve a school holiday on George Washington's birthday. It shouldn't be too difficult for the students to find qualified legal assistance in drawing up a petition to be presented to the state legislature. The petition probably would point out that George Washington's birthday is a legal holiday, and that banks and state offices to close, probably including the office of state superintendent of public instruction. The petition would go on to ask the state legislators to declare a school holiday, also, so students could join in paying homage to the Father of Our Country.

Idaho has some 90,000 elementary and some 70,000 secondary school students. The legislature undoubtedly could be impressed by petitions bearing the signatures of more than 100,000 students, which shouldn't be too great a goal. And there would be an opportunity for some powerful lobbying through parents who also were legislators.

Anyone for a Feb. 22 holiday for schools?

## IF AND OR BUT

Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg has made several statements in the past tradition of the professional bureaucrat. But when he spoke to the Chicago Executives' club, he made a wonderful statement that should be quite suitable in almost any eventuality.

He declared that "holds both serious threats of industrial conflict and the promise of unparalleled progress" toward labor-management peace. Inasmuch as he's the administration expert in the labor field, Secretary Goldberg is determined how he'd go to it.

What's over him in the field of labor in 1962, he can't refer back to Chicago speech with, "See, I told you so when I spoke before the Executives' club in Chicago back in February."

And if there is anyone who may have some doubts about what 1962 holds in the field of labor management, just wait until the end of the year and then look back and see that Secretary Goldberg was right!

# NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 — The heavy reinforcements which the United States has supplied South Vietnam to resist the communist infiltration into the region, the value of the regional alliances we have organized to contain Russo-Chinese aggression.

Although President Kennedy's defense and military, his statement resembles former President Truman's insistence that our participation in the Vietnam war is a "police action."

American troops in South Vietnam now number 4,000, possibly more. They are engaging in operations as training and supplying native units, flying them into action and, of course, returning fire when shot at by the hostile enemy.

ANOTHER KOREA? POSSIBLY—Should the Chinese Communists shift from guerrilla infiltration to full-scale war in retaliation for our intervention, we may have another Korea on our hands. As South Korea is more of a buffer than a Korean peninsula, where we achieved only a stalemate.

The immediate puzzle on Capitol Hill centers on the question of the best Treaty Organization's members (SEATO) are giving us no military aid in a conflict which concerns them so much, and the fact that the United States could lead to World War III, and they are far less prepared for such a calamity than the U.S.

Other members of SEATO are Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Pakistan and Thailand. Should the communists conquer all of these countries, the United States might share the same fate. Even now, Australia and New Zealand are alarmed over communist domination of Indonesia.

"PAPER TIGER" — Our SEATO allies are frankly reneging on a pledge which they only made last March at a meeting of the organization's ministers in Thailand. They declared: "It therefore continues to be an active military attempt to obtain control of Laos, members of SEATO are prepared to take whatever action may be necessary to do so."

It is true that Laos and South Vietnam are not members of SEATO. But, as President Kennedy notes, they are "protocol countries." This means that they come under the protection of SEATO.

Southeast Asia is not the only danger spot where our Allies have failed us. Inspiring Mao Tse-tung's army, the communists of the United States and its system of containing alliances constitute only a "paper tiger."

AND RELUCTANT DRAGONS — When the communists threaten to penetrate the strategic oil-rich Middle East—several years ago, the U.S. and its allies (SEATO) were ready to aid. We had to rush troops into Lebanon, while the British occupied Jordan, although neither nation was a member of SEATO.

Even our allies in the Middle East have failed us. Charles de Gaulle has withdrawn his Mediterranean fleet, and keeps 400,000 soldiers in turbulent North Africa. By insisting on building up a large army in the Middle East, the United States and Britain will not use nuclear weapons in a showdown with Russia.

EMBARGO ANTI-CLIMAX  
The closing of the U. S. market to products from Fidel Castro's Cuba dramatizes the spirit of the Pan American resolution of Punta Arenas, Chile, in 1958, against anti-climatic. The Eisenhower administration pulled the bigger part of the rug from beneath Castro's boots in 1960, when it cut off sugar imports from Cuba.

WALRUS AND OYSTER  
Rationing of gasoline has been decreed in Cuba, and the U.S. has warned that tight controls are due on all consumer goods.

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## COVERING THE CAPITAL WITH PETER EDSON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (NEA) — President Kennedy's Latin-American Affairs task forces will be sent to countries that can't do their own planning and which ask for help. Two such groups are already at work in Haiti and Uruguay.

Review of each country's plan to screen out the impractical and screwball ideas will be assigned to committees of experts chosen from the State Department. The review will be done by a panel of nine "wise men" chosen by the Inter-American Affairs Commission.

Work of all these committees will be co-ordinated by Dr. Raul Prebisch of Argentina, who is the executive secretary of the U.N. economic commission for Latin America.

When each plan is approved there will be an analysis of what the country can do, using its own resources and with outside assistance it will need.

The committees will have no authority to execute any program. They will be up to each country to carry out its own program although it may ask some organizations for help.

Task forces have already been set up for housing, agriculture and education planning, regional development and public administration are still to come.

The hope is that acceptable plans for all the republics will be ready before the end of the year. There are to be short-range, intermediate and long-range plans for 1970 goals and beyond.

Emergency projects to meet immediate needs are not being held up by plans are completed. Financing is already being advanced on acceptable projects.

July N. Darling, who died a few days ago in New York, was one of the best of a tribe of editorialists in American journalism; the pen-and-ink scribbler who wrote the column "Ding's View" of one of our most important papers for a broad range of readers.

Darling was the best draftsman of this kind and a most quaint trade secret that he had lost his grip and control of the Gillette pen, the Wadsworth standard weapon of the black-and-white artist to the camera.

Back in 1910 after an early morning hour or two in a duck-billed boat on the water, he came back for camp and breakfast against a frozen coastline, laden with his gun and a bunch of ducks against a wind with a bit of snow, when he snared one foot in the loop of a corset-like frozen line that he had stepped on. He got up and stumbled on, but his right elbow was "singing like a kettle."

# Solons Ask U.S. Owned Space Unit

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)—Two Democratic senators called for a joint meeting to discuss private ownership of satellites in the space age today by calling for a separate bill to allow satellite communications network.

The move was expected to come after both the house and senate held a joint meeting to see an address by astronaut John Glenn.

Sen. Estes Kefauver, Tenn., and Wayne Morse, Ore., plan to introduce a bill that would create a 500 million dollar communications satellite network. The principal and interest would be repaid from the system's proceeds. According to Kefauver, it would operate like the Tennessee Valley authority.

Other developments: "Farm—The chamber of commerce charged that the administration was trying to force production and marketing control on farmers with the "getting tough" and breaking the backs of farmers."

Water B. Barber told the senate agriculture committee and the administration was proposing to manipulate prices in monopolistic fashion by limiting the food and fibre supply of the nation.

Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen said yesterday that a "democratic coalition" was "a myth."

Dirksen said he had never been in a meeting with the Democrats, but that Southern Democrats "see through the same pair of specs as we do." He said that if the Southern Democrats were north of the Mason-Dixon line "they'd be wearing a Republican hat."

He said he probably would introduce his own foreign trade bill as a "stipulation" to a congressional veto of tariff agreements negotiated by the President.

Other developments: "Judgeships—Administration sources said yesterday that President Kennedy would nominate a dozen federal judgeships to the senate within the next 30 to 60 days."

Schools—Chairman Dornick Y. Daniels, D. N. J., said yesterday that his special house bill to amend the federal act to racially segregated schools Wednesday would include provisions for health, education and welfare.

Farm—Sen. Alexander Wiley, W. Va., yesterday proposed the nation of a national agricultural policy to help congressmen farm policy. The committee composed of representatives of farmers and farm organizations.

## Help Your Child in School—No. 6 Hobbies, Outside Activities Good, But Student Must Keep up Grades

Editor's note: If your child has a special interest in talent, how do you get it into his school? An editorial series tells you in this sixth issue of 22 articles on how you can help your child succeed in school.

Do you have a young baseball or hot-rodder or skin-diving enthusiast in your household?

Fine—As long as his school grades are kept up.

Hobbies and other extra-curricular activities broaden the lives of children as they do

adults. They give a new dimension to life.

If a child loves music and devotes almost all available time to it; if he tears down old cars and builds them up again; if all to the good providing school grades are in keeping with his ability.

If not, parents must take action.

It is possible for a boy or girl to sell the chance for ultimate success in life for a pot of porridge of immediate pleasure. Don't let this happen to your child.

A youngster can participate in a few of them, and still be good in school.

There is nothing wrong with a consuming interest. A good many youngsters find their forte in this way. It is dangerous only if it causes a prolonged blackout of other activities and grades drop significantly.

Parents who discover this concentrated interest on the part of a child at an early age are fortunate. They can broaden the youngster's interest by encouraging reading and participation in family discussions. If they are successful in school, subjects can compete for their interest.

Children with many interests are less inclined to concentrate on one at the expense of all others.

Parents who do not discover that their youngsters are centering attention on one talent or hobby until they are in junior or senior high school have more of a problem.

For years I have watched parents use penalties and bribes in an attempt to persuade their children to give up special interests. They hoped that if the youngsters gave up these interests they would become engaged in other subjects.

By this method, the parent becomes an ogre. He refuses the boy or girl the one true life in which he or she gets real satisfaction.

My own efforts to solve this problem were futile for 10 years.

Initial tabulations indicated, however, that the congress party will have suffered setbacks in various areas, particularly in Punjab state.

Counting was to begin today in the North Bombay district where the parliamentary contest between Defense Minister Y. K. Krishna Menon and Acharya J. B. Kripalani attracted wide interest. Krishna Menon, Nehru's controversial chief aide, must be reelected to parliament to retain his defense post.

What the first day of counting ended last midnight, no results for the national parliament had been announced. Nehru's congress candidates had won 92 out of 135 state legislature seats decided by the close of counting, which resumed this morning.

The balloting, which took 10 days, was for 494 of the 607 delegates to the lower house of parliament, and for 2,853 seats in 12 state assemblies. An estimated 125 million of the 200 million eligible voters took part, and final results are not expected until early next week.

## Conciliators Try to Avert UAW Strike

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Feb. 25 (AP)—Federal conciliators met today with representatives of the United Auto Workers and the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company in an effort to head off a midnight strike deadline at seven of the firm and electrical equipment makers' plants.

The conciliators said they were trying to arrive at a contract for the 5,800-member local 248 at West Allis, Wis., which controls a little more than half of the union's bargaining strength.

Mediator William Rose, Washington, D. C., said he felt that if an agreement with the West Allis local could be reached, central negotiations on a contract for all eight plants would follow shortly.

Of the eight Allis-Chalmers plants at La Crosse, Wis.; La Porte and Terra Haute, Ind.; Cedar Rapids, Ia.; Pittsburgh, Pa.; Springfield, Ill.; Gadsden, Ala.; and West Allis, only the West Allis plant has not set a strike deadline. The Terra Haute plant was scheduled to be closed this summer by the company.

The Allis-Chalmers contract with the union expired on Nov. 1 of last year. But, on agreement between the company and the UAW, it was extended indefinitely with a seven-day cancellation notice by either side.

# Berliners Bolt Across Red Barrier

BERLIN, Feb. 26 (AP)—West Berlin police today reported the escape of an East German border policeman and three of his friends across the East-West border.

They fled through barbed wire from the Soviet zone of Germany to the American sector of Berlin in a suburban area last Wednesday.

The policeman, Rudi Thurow, 31, gave details of the flight to a West Berlin newspaper, B.Z. Thurow told police he fled through the barbed wire first and covered the escape of his friends, two men and a woman, by firing 30 shots from his machine pistol over the heads of the communist policemen who tried to halt them.

The two other policemen took cover and did not fire on the fugitives.

# East German Expert Asks Political Aid

LONDON, Feb. 26 (AP)—An East German economics expert left a London cocktail party for a visiting communist delegation, picked up his wife and 6-year-old son and defected to the West, the West German embassy said today.

An embassy spokesman said Werner Hinderstein brought his family to the embassy a week ago and requested political asylum. The request was granted, the spokesman said, and the Hindersteins are now in West Germany.

# Waterfowl in Idaho About Same as 1961

BOISE, Feb. 26 (AP)—Wintering waterfowl populations in Idaho are about the same as last year, but 13 per cent above the long-term average for the state, the Idaho fish and game department said Sunday.

The winter waterfowl inventory made by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife shows some 650,000 birds of which 522,000 were ducks, 97,000 geese and the remainder coot and swan.

Elwood Bureau, state bird supervisor for the department, said ducks were four per cent higher than last year and about 20 per cent above the long term average.

Geese numbers, he said, are about normal for the winter period but appreciably below the count on this species a year ago.

Some 284 of the scarce trumpeter swans were found wintering on the north fork of Snake River in eastern Idaho. This is about 30 per cent more than the usual number of trumpeter swans wintering in the state, he said.

# Wins Race Set Today in Pro Grid Suit

BALTIMORE, Feb. 26 (AP)—Lamar Hunt, one of the founders of the American Football league, was expected to be called at the first witness today in the AFL's 10 million dollar antitrust suit against the National Football league.

The trial, expected to last from four to 10 weeks, will be heard without a jury.

Hunt owns the Dallas Texans, who have been operating in competition with the Dallas Cowboys of the AFL for the past two seasons. The AFL contends the NFL moved deliberately into Dallas in 1960, knowing that the city could not support two teams.

The NFL was accused of trying to get players to break contracts with the AFL, attempting to show the new league would not honor commitments, and threatening to blacklist the AFL's prospective players.

An affidavit filed with the court said the losses of the eight AFL teams in 1960 ranged from \$245,211 in Buffalo to \$288,222 in Los Angeles. The Los Angeles franchise since has been shifted to San Diego.

The suit seeks \$100,000 damages for the AFL, \$500,000 for the Dallas Texans and \$400,000 for each of the other seven teams.

The total of \$3,260,000. The suit seeks treble damages of \$10,000,000 under antitrust laws.

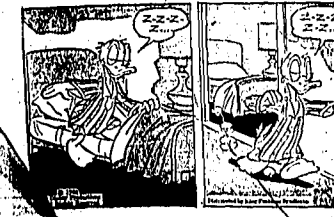

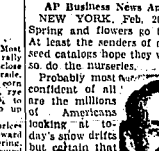


