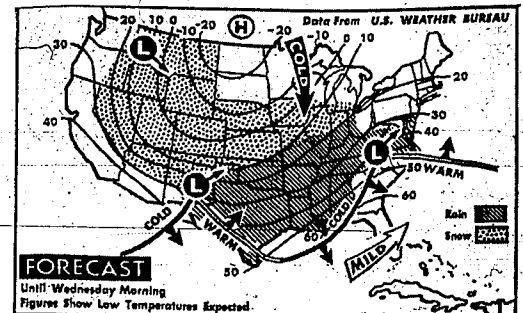

Hanson ran for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1958 and was voted out in the primary election by A. Mc Dermott, who will carry the gambling plan. Dermott, although a Democratic tie swept the party's candidates into all the other statehouse offices, lost in the general election to Republican Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

COLOMBO, Ceylon, Feb. 27 (AP) — Mrs. Sirimavo Bandaranaike, prime minister of Ceylon, announced Monday the replacement of Gov. Gen. Sir Oliver Goonetilleke, whose name was mentioned in a recent attempt to revolt. He will be replaced by William Gopallawa, ambassador to the United States.

The move, which was approved by Queen Elizabeth on the recent commendation of the government of Ceylon, will take effect March 2.

Gopallawa, 55, a member of one of Ceylon's leading aristocratic families, is the father-in-law of Mrs. Bandaranaike's brother.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Republican defeat in national and state elections has resulted in a terrific lull in their vote in suburbia as well as in the tenement districts of the cities. And this is politically significant.

The lull is a significant shift to the so-called "bedroom counties" surrounding metropolitan areas. This shift is being made by the bureau of applied social sciences at the University of Chicago, which is making a study of the suburban vote.

The trend also disposes of another long held political belief, which is that migration from cities to suburbs is a transformation of Democrats into Republicans. The theory has been that the ownership of homes and the burden of real estate taxes, instead of rent and mortgages, more financially sensitive and more conservative.

SLIM SUBURBAN LEAD—Nixon, for instance, carried three counties outside of New York City, or about half the expected Republican majority. This figure failed to offset President Kennedy's 600,000 state margin, which he rolled up in Democratic and hostile cities.

LOST ILLINOIS IN SUBURBS—The Californian was really floored by voters on the outskirts of Los Angeles. The population of the counties—Lake, Kane and Will—was only 46,500 majority, and again it was almost half of the usual Republican poll. He lost the state by only 65,000.

These observations apply to the same degree in many other states—Massachusetts, New Jersey, Maryland, Michigan, Ohio and California.

It is not surprising, therefore, that it is the young families which are moving to the suburbs, while the more settled and older people remain in the cities. The old folks do not want to leave their friends and familiar neighborhoods.

Although New York's population declined during the 1950-60 decade, the number of whites aged 18 and over increased by 1.5 million. The population throughout the country is growing faster. The significance of this change lies in the fact that young people show the younger generation to be more conservative, and therefore, Republican.

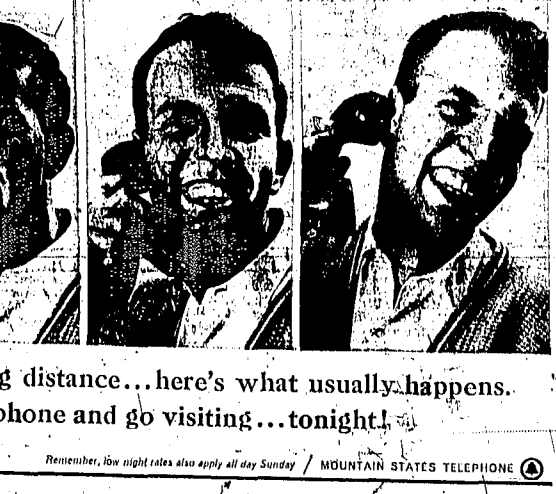

They must learn how to put forth the right kind of effort. Every time a student quits before he learns an essential lesson or solves an important problem, his learning ability drops. Every time he puts forth the right effort, he gains. It is until he gets it, his learning ability increases. Persistent thinking is the key. Students who attend to each

Red Scientist Cites Need of Moon Studies

MOSCOW, Feb. 27 (AP)—A Soviet scientist said yesterday additional facts must be learned about the moon's surface before a manned space craft can be landed there successfully. Dr. Dyomin wrote in the Ekonomicheskaya Gazeta (Economic Gazette) that Soviet astronomers have established via radio telescopes that a slag-like porous mass makes up the outer crust and that radio waves prove there is ice on the moon. But the exact texture of the surface and whether the ice can be converted into drinking water remains to be determined, he said. Dyomin suggested the lunar sea beds would be the best place for a space craft landing. But he cited one disadvantage: They are far from such interesting spots as the mountains of the moon. The Soviet Union still holds first place in cosmonautics and engineering, he wrote, but the capital flight of scientist Gennadiy H. Glenn, Jr. represented "one more step in exploring the cosmos." Dyomin said Soviet scientists are making a detailed study of the moon's crust to try to find the best method of effecting a soft landing. The far or dark side of the moon could not be used, he said, because it would be impossible for the cosmonaut to keep radio contact with the Earth. He said Russia's Lunik II which reached the moon in 1959, established the absence of any significant magnetic field around the moon. This means it does not have harmful radiation belts such as those ringing the Earth, he said.

Justice Taylor Running Again

BOISE, Feb. 27 (AP)—Justice O. J. Taylor, who has the longest term of service of the present members of the Idaho supreme court, announced today he is a candidate for reelection. The term of Chief Justice E. B. Smith of Boise also expires this year and he, too, has announced he will run. Neither has any announced opposition. Taylor, now 68, will reach retirement age of 70 during his next term of office if he is re-elected. Idaho law permits him to complete the term during which he reaches age 70, but he is not eligible for reelection after that. The justices are elected on a nonpartisan judicial ballot.

AFL Owner Accuses NFL of Conspiracy

BALTIMORE, Feb. 27 (AP)—Lamar Hunt, contended Monday that the National Football league did not announce expansion plans in 1959 until after he founded the American Football league. Hunt, owner of the Dallas Texans in the AFL, was the only witness to testify in U. S. district court on the first day of the AFL's 10 million dollar antitrust suit against the NFL.

Hunt told chief Judge Roger C. Trayner, who is hearing the case without a jury, that the AFL was formally organized at a meeting in Dallas on Aug. 25, 1959, and six \$25,000 checks covering the original franchises subsequently were deposited in a bank.

One week later, Hunt said, the chairman of the NFL's expansion committee, George Halas, announced that the NFL would field teams in Dallas and Houston in 1961.

Actually, the NFL moved into Dallas in 1960, the managerial year of the AFL, and into St. Louis in 1961. Both the Texans of the AFL and the Dallas Cowboys of the NFL have operated at a deficit the past two seasons.

Hunt said he formed the new league after failing in an effort to purchase the Chicago Cardinals of the NFL and after his suggestion that the established league expand into Dallas was rejected.

As late as June 1959, Hunt said, the late Bert Bell, commissioner of the NFL, told him his top was not interested in expansion. Several months earlier, Hunt said, Halas told him that expansion "was several years away."

In an opening statement, NFL attorney Gerhard A. Geggel, contended that the NFL was named chairman of an expansion committee in January 1958, and that action for possible expansion into Houston, Dallas and Minneapolis was taken "before the American Football league was even a dream."

Steelhead Law To Be Enforced
BOISE, Feb. 27 (AP)—The Idaho fish and game department said Monday it will enforce vigorously the new regulation requiring use of a punch card for sportsmen catching steelhead.

Robert L. Slater, the department's acting director, said that sportsmen who attempt to evade the limit on steelhead by buying more than one fishing license will be prosecuted. He said the steelhead punchcards are not transferable.

Use of the punch card system became effective Jan. 1. Slater said it is intended to reduce the number of steelhead caught. Slater named chairman of an expansion committee in January 1958, and that action for possible expansion into Houston, Dallas and Minneapolis was taken "before the American Football league was even a dream."
