NEW YORK, March 1 (AP)—John Glenn, America's hero of outer space, rode up, spaceless Manhattan today in a titanic thunder of cheers and cannon fire.

Nehru Party Has Control After Voting

NEW DELHI, India, March 1 (AP)—Mongolian returns from India in a national election confirmed Prime Minister Nehru's Congress party in the national parliament today and minorities in 14 states.

Conservative and communist made gains in the assembly, but not enough to seriously challenge the Congress party's hold on India, which it ruled in the 15 years since the independence from Britain.

With 347 of the 494 elected parliament seats reported, the Congress party had 242 and there was no speculation this trend would shift.

Toll Mounts In Red Drive On Viet Nam

SAIGON, March 1 (AP)—Increasingly severe communist attacks are taking a heavy toll of South Vietnamese troops in the Mekong Delta, military sources said today.

Two major clashes since Saturday virtually wiped out units totaling 104 men, the sources said.

Only 18 men are known to have escaped unharmed from the raids, which killed at least 47 soldiers and wounded 88.

One government victory was reported Monday, when three battalions of loyal troops routed 200 communist guerrillas.

The raids fled toward the Cambodian border, pursued by warplanes, but communist forces were believed killed.

Two platoons of civil guards and a self-defense squad of 60 men in all were almost completely wiped out Saturday.

Airliner's Plunge Preceded By Explosion, Witnesses Say

NEW YORK, March 1 (UPI)—Residents of the area on Long Island where the American Airlines jetliner crashed today said the big craft's plunge into Jamaica Bay was preceded by a shattering explosion.

Herbert Johnson, 61, superintendent of the wildlife sanctuary at the crash scene, was only 200 feet away when the plane went down.

"The flames didn't last long," Johnson said. "The plane was completely disintegrated."

"It shook the whole house," said Mrs. Joan Chuch of the explosion. "Oh, it was terrible."

Mrs. L. W. Russo, who lives a few doors away from Mrs. Chuch, was shaken by the blast. "It was terrible," she said.

Another who heard the explosion was Mrs. Mary E. Carroll. "I thought the boiler in my cellar had blown up," she said.

Volunteer fireman William Martin was duty-bound to the Grand Central volunteer fire department about a half-mile from the scene.

Heavy Smoke Covers Scene Of Jet Crash

NEW YORK, March 1 (AP)—The scene of the American Airlines jetliner crash, as viewed from a helicopter 300 feet above the swamp, was one of desolation.

The swamp area was heavy with black smoke, but twisted pieces of silver wreckage floated in the sunlight.

Bits of debris from the plane bobbed on the water of Jamaica Bay, an arm of the Atlantic Ocean.

The aircraft's explosion splintered the wreckage into thousands of pieces.

Three hours after the 100 a.m. EST takeoff, 95 bodies had been recovered.

What happened? Police said that the 707, which lived nearby, offered one clue.

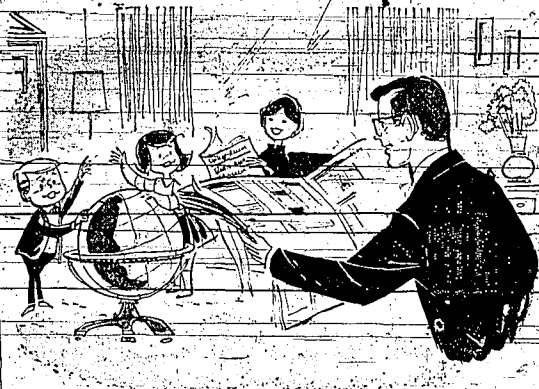

Help Your Child in School—No. 9 Help Needed by Many Children for Getting Thoughts Across to Others

By DR. LESLIE J. NASON (Professor of Education, University of Southern California)

Children who are blind, hard of hearing or have speech disorders are considered handicapped. It is difficult to communicate with them or for them to communicate with others.

Too many children who are physically perfect suffer from the same handicap. A surprising number of children arrive at school without learning to get their thoughts across to others.

Children need practice in putting their ideas, needs and thoughts together in a way that they can say them. It isn't as easy for a child to express an idea as it is for an adult. The child has fewer words to use and some situations are beyond his ability to understand and explain.

Reading helps children learn to use new words. Let your child tell you what he has read. Let him tell you in his own words. Often he will need to use words from the story to explain the action. It takes time and patience to listen carefully while a child's story goes on endlessly without really telling anywhere. Let him hear. Tell him: "Thank you, dear!"—but not thinking and learning. Someone else is doing it for him.

The job of the parent in helping the child communicate can be quite simple. Nature is on your side. One of the deepest desires of all humans is to communicate ideas and feelings to others.

Children don't have to be taught how to express themselves so much as given a chance to learn to do it. And the best aid to this kind of learning is an interested listener—your.

As the child grows older, his observations and ideas become complex more rapidly than his vocabulary.

Encourage him to take time to put his thoughts into words, his words into sentences and then say them. Take time and wait for clear statements.

There is no substitute for logical thinking and communication. Tomorrow, give the best help from teachers.

Cabinet Aide Answers Rap By Unionists

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg told Wednesday the administration has no intention of declaring labor contract terms binding upon all employers and employees and union reach settlements consistent with the national interest.

Goldberg's statement in response to explain what he meant in a speech last Friday to the Chicago Executive Club—a speech that some leaders of both unions and industry have interpreted as suggesting more government intervention in labor disputes.

The secretary said in the Chicago speech that in the light of U.S. commitments at home and abroad, government intervention in labor disputes must increase to insure that settlements are "right" not only for the parties themselves but for the public interest as well.

Goldberg emphasized Wednesday that neither by law nor the administration's intention to impose settlement terms on anybody but the intent to submit in general and perhaps occasionally in specific terms what labor and management should do for the public good.

Program by Ballet Troupe Recorded as 'Outstanding'

The Ballet Troupe of the France proved to be one of the outstanding dance groups to appear in this area for several years. They presented the third concert in the current Community Concert series for a capacity audience in the Filer high school auditorium Wednesday evening.

The brilliant technique of the group was marred occasionally by the limitations of space and one of the ballets could not be presented at all because of the small stage.

"Suite en Blanc," a ballet in the classic tradition opened the program. This was followed by "Pas de Deux de Casse Nolette," also of classic style. The French technique, characterized by arched, graceful movement, but underlain with dynamic strength, was most aptly illustrated in some cases (the interpretation was somewhat stiff) for purity of technique in these classical ballets. The two premier dancers, Lily Reger and Milenko Banovich, were frequently applauded for their beautiful and elegant solo and pas de deux parts.

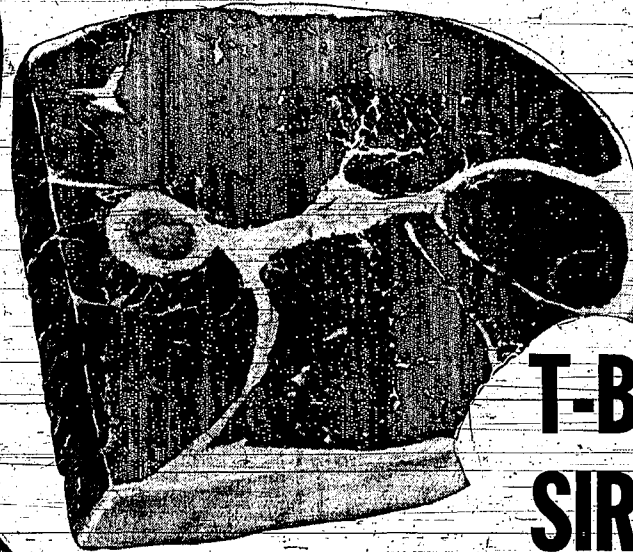

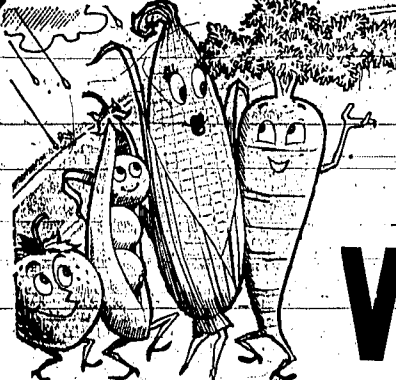

Communications Satellite Corporations Cause Split

WASHINGTON, March 1—The federal communications commission has split with President Kennedy over ownership of an American communications satellite corporation.

The FCC Wednesday came out in favor of limiting ownership of the corporation to communications companies.

Kennedy, in legislation submitted to congress, would have the corporations sell its stock-up to a billion-dollar worth—not only to communications companies but also to other types of companies and the general public.

The FCC's position was set forth by Chairman Newton Minow at a hearing of the senate space committee. He said the budget-bureau had cleared the commission's statement, even though the FCC was not in accord with the President's program.

While disagreeing with the administration's position on ownership of the corporation, the FCC agreed it should be a private enterprise.

PITTSBURGH, March 1—A 32-year-old mother of five boys gave birth to triplet girls Wednesday at Allegheny General hospital.

Elizabeth Altman of North Hills and her girls were reported in good condition. The father, Ralph Altman, a certified accountant, said: "It's a shock."

British Give Negroes Hope In Home Rule

LONDON, March 1—The British government Wednesday offered the Africans of Northern Rhodesia a slender chance of winning a majority in parliament and home rule, in their 200,000-square-mile territory south of the Congo.

The proposals on revision of the Northern Rhodesia constitution, announced in the house of commons by Colonial Secretary Reginald Maudling, touched off a deep imperial crisis.

Facing a death blow to his Central African Federation of Northern and Southern Rhodesia and Nyasaland, Premier Sir Roy Welensky insisted, uninvited, by jet into London to pound the desks of British leaders.

He did not comment on Maudling's proposals directly, but he told airport newsmen before they were announced that he would "use force if necessary" to prevent dismantling of the eight-year-old federation. He said an African voting majority in Northern Rhodesia would endanger the whole federation and he meant to prevent it.

Losing that putting touch, although he still had everything else, is what ended the top-flight career of the mighty Ben Hogan.

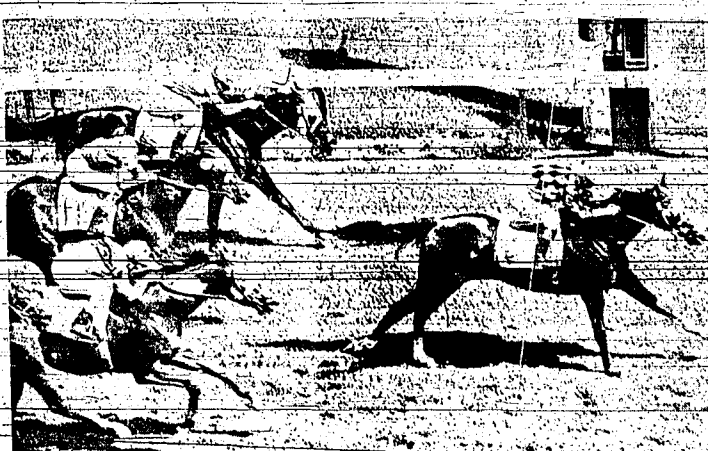

Soviets to Be Invited To Net Meet

NEW YORK, March 1.—The Soviet Union will be asked to send players, possibly five or six, to the U. S. tennis championship this year, Col. Edward Eagan, chairman of the U. S. Tennis Association, said today.
