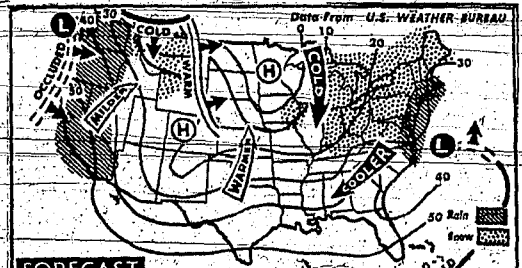

# Shell dealers suggest 10 ways to cut car repair bills

Your car is probably the second-biggest single investment you'll ever make. Here are 10 pointers from Shell that can help you protect that investment. They're easy to follow. And they might well save you a lot of trouble, as well as needless expense.

- 1. Check your cooling system hose for weak spots.** Inspect all of the rubber hoses that interconnect your cooling system. If they are cracked, cut or swollen, they could give way at any time and cause engine temperature to soar. The result: a troublesome breakdown. Less serious, but a potential cause of overheating, is a debris-clogged radiator. Ask your Shell dealer to use his air hose to clear away clutter on the outside of your radiator.
- 2. Touch up scratches before rust sets in.** You can discourage the spread of rust by using touch-up paint on body scratches. Rust also likes to plug drainage holes on the underside of car doors and body panels. Keep those holes open (a screwdriver or any pointed instrument works fine) and you may well prevent a rusted-through door or body section.
- 3. Avoid 100-foot trips.** It's a mean trick to start a cold car, drive it just a few feet, then turn it off. Yet people often park in front of their homes, then drive into the garage later on. This can increase engine wear, dilute your oil with unburned fuel and give sludge more chance to form. If at all possible, drive right into the garage when you arrive home.
- 4. Look for oil streaks on inner walls of tires.** It may take a bit of back-bending, but it's well worth the effort to check the side of your tires you seldom see—the side facing in. If there's any sign of leaking fluid on tire walls, tell your Shell dealer. A leaking brake cylinder or rear axle oil seals could be at fault. - 5. Obey the cardinal rule of car care.** A professional lubrication job is still the best way to keep your car in good health. But it should be done on a regular basis—not "every so often." So, take your car for a turnpike drive this weekend. It can be good exercise for it. And a pleasant afternoon for you.

WASHINGTON, March 5 — Although still an embryo politician, George Romney has virtually challenged the Kennedy administration to resort to anti-trust action to break up large concentrations of industry, especially in his own field of automobiles.

He has said that any firm controlling 35 per cent of the market — any market — constitutes a monopoly. Today, General Motors controls 43 per cent of the market, Ford 22 per cent and Chrysler 12 per cent, making 85 per cent of the total. The "Big Three" had 93 per cent.

Romney now accounts for 7 per cent, up from only two when he took over.

In view of Attorney General Kennedy's aggressive policies and actions on all fronts, as well as the support of the Romney camp in Washington, there is a general belief that Romney's challenge will be accepted, not only with regard to automobiles but also respecting other industries, especially steel.

**FACTS IN FILES** — Attorney General Kennedy will find plenty of data in the files of the Department of Justice to support his anti-trust-Bismarckian program.

For example, Herbert Brownell, Jr., and William P. Rogers, both of whom are now in the Romney camp, were once in the Kennedy camp. They began grand jury action against both leading automobile and steel interests, but nothing ever came of them.

The grand jury investigation at San Francisco involved eastern suppliers of steel. The complaint was that they engaged in price fixing on their part of Feb. 27, it stated that one million dollars would make a stack 100 feet high.

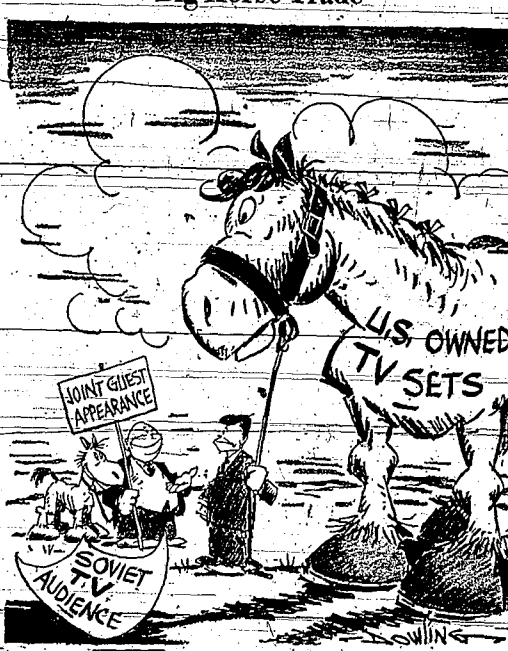

### Atom-Testing Gains Protest From Nippon

**TOKYO, March 5 (AP)—**Foreign Minister Zenko Koike today filed official protests with the United States and Britain against the U. S. decision to resume atmospheric nuclear testing and the British explosion of nuclear bombs underground.

Koike summoned British envoy Sir Ogden Mordant and U. S. Ambassador Edwin O. Reischauer to the foreign office to hand them protest notes.

Koike appealed to the United States to reconsider its decision. "It is of deep regret that the United States has decided to resume nuclear testing... despite the fact that Japan had protested repeatedly against such tests," Koike said.

He also said "it was regrettable that Britain conducted underground nuclear testing in Nevada on March 1."

Koike said the Japanese were the only people that had suffered from the "horror of nuclear bombs and protested against any country that had carried out nuclear testing."

Cigarette stocks were mostly down from a three-point advance with only R. J. Reynolds holding about even. Brokers noted two new private deals in the tobacco industry.

Among the blue chips American Tobacco, Chrysler and Du Pont were down a point or so while Alcoa rose nearly a point.

ADM added close to 1/2, on the bid February car sales since 1950. Hopes for a rate and winter division will be the engine contracts for a new army-higher production—gain of better than two in United Aircraft.

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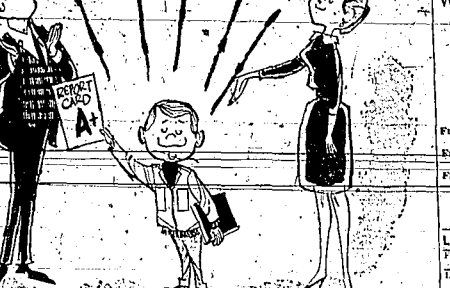
