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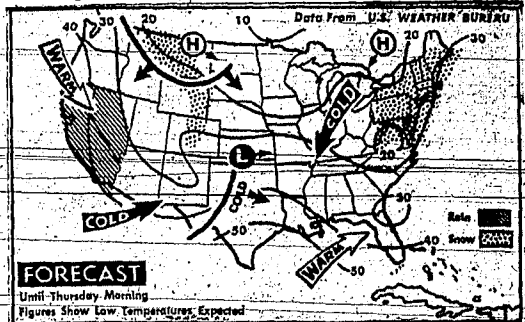

Pilot Is Mum After Fleeing From Mexico

MCALLEN, Tex., March 7 (AP)—Charles Arden Jennings, accused of flying contraband into Mexico, was home today and keeping silent about his fugitive status south of the border.

Jennings was wounded last October when Mexican Federal agents sprang a trap at a makeshift landing strip near Zacatepec.

The 38-year-old McAllen man, a World War II pilot, was shot in the abdomen and taken to a hospital in Pueblo, Mexico, for surgery. Mexican authorities said he piloted the plane they ambushed, and that he was charged with aerial smuggling.

Yesterday, Mexican authorities said, Jennings walked from the hospital to a waiting car and drove off.

He was flown to McAllen by a pilot identified as Ernest Nagy, Alamo, Tex., and was cleared for re-entry by U. S. customs.

Jennings said he did not know of any charges against him in Mexico. Mexican authorities said he was a fugitive.

Accused Red Loses Battle On Sentence

WASHINGTON, March 7 (AP)—The federal court of appeals ruled Tuesday to say any longer an order that Philip Bart be jailed for contempt unless he answers a grand jury's questions about U. S. Communist party activities.

Government lawyers said Bart, identified as "our" organizational secretary of the party, would be given a reasonable period to turn himself in and begin serving up to six months.

Bart, who told newsmen he is a 58-year-old printer from Brooklyn, N. Y., was cited for contempt last Wednesday in U. S. district court here. Judge Alexander Holtzoff, who issued the citation, delayed his effectiveness for 48 hours to give Bart time to appeal.

On Friday, the appellate court granted him a stay, giving his lawyers additional time to prepare the appeal.

But in Tuesday's action, the appellate court denied a further stay and tentatively set for March 31 a hearing on the appeal.

During his appearance before Holtzoff last Wednesday, Bart refused to answer 41 questions about top officials, finances and other details of the party.

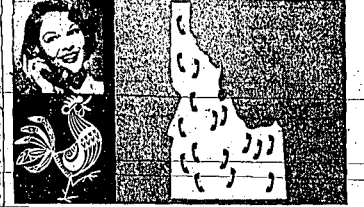

Hospital Keeps Train's Victims

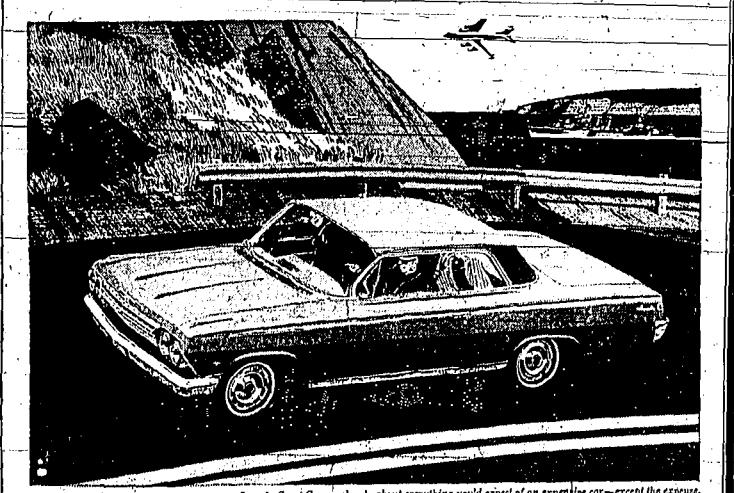

WASHINGTON, March 7—The more thoughtful leaders of both major parties here are beginning to fear from the left, and from the right, that the attacks upon the extremists, it serves only to advertise them.

WASHINGTON, March 7 (UPI)—A change in the United States conditions in the industrial sector are causing concern among labor leaders to make some adjustments in negotiations with major employers.

Aircraft and missile workers of the Aeronautics and Astronautics Division, and the United Auto Workers, in their second biennial joint conference just ended here, have decided to ask for new employment guarantees or their half-million members in renewing contracts which expire in 1962.

One of the key demands is a proposal that the government reimburse every contractor for supplementary unemployment payments to laid-off employees.

An alternative proposal is to establish a fund from contributions from employers, this fund being insured by the U.S. government to pay for loss of wages in rapidly changing industry.

That's something the good premier doesn't have to tell the Russian people.

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EVERYBODY OUT OF STEP

In fact, Robert Welch, founder of the John Birch Society, has alienated many of his original followers by his distribution of a personal newspaper, which has the effrontery to call "American Opinion." It may be helpful and hygienic to elaborate here on some of his outlandish views.

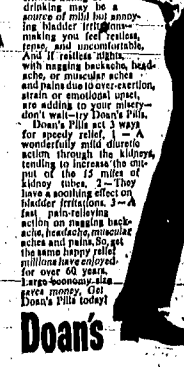

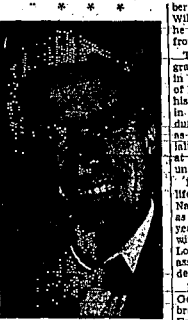

Seasonally, the milk production dropped 3 per cent this year from December to January. The output of creamery butter, American cheese and ice cream, exceeded production in each classification for January a year ago.

Bribery Plot Alleged Over Stock Fraud

NEW YORK, March 7 (AP)—The government charged that a Federal grand jury today indicted 12 persons who were paid to the late Ben. George Bender, R., O., to fix a stock fraud conspiracy.

The government charged that it obtained 12 persons and four firms accused of fraud conspiracy involving the United Dry and Chemical corporation, now known as Chemgill Industries, Inc. Bender at the time was said to have been assistant secretary of the Trustor.

The defense immediately demanded a mistrial, on grounds that Bender had not been indicted. Bender, who was indicted pothetically for "false and inflammatory reflections."

Federal Judge William B. Hoffman, overruled the mistrial motion. Walpin was winding up his opening statement when he referred to Bender as "Garfield." Bender, 51, promoter and one of the defendants.

The prosecutor said Garfield paid the defendant to Bender to get the investigation quashed... to get Bender's interference when they are in a high government official.

German Aide To Moscow Is Facing Fight

BERLIN, March 7 (AP)—Hans Kroll, the controversial West German ambassador to Moscow, today faced a showdown with his foreign ministry superiors today over his actions in the Soviet capital.

Kroll returned to Bonn after being summoned by Konrad Adenauer. He was expected to tell his story to Foreign Minister Gerhard Schröder today prior to a meeting with Adenauer today.

The ambassador refused to comment on reports that he proposed certain concessions which are contrary to the government's policies. He denied the reports previously.

An ordering Kroll back from Moscow was issued yesterday which he should make no more public statements until his return to Berlin. The ambassador was said to be angered by Kroll's calling of a press conference earlier in defiance of foreign ministry orders.

The storm over the 63-year-old ambassador centered on charges by the newspapers West and East that Kroll had proposed a settlement with Moscow involving West German recognition of the Central and Eastern German bloc as a forger charge and division of both West and East Germany into the United Nations and a 25 billion dollar West German loan to the East.

WESTON, March 7 (AP)—Former British Prime Minister Anthony Eden, who has had major operations here twice in the past eight years, was scheduled today to undergo a thorough checkup at New England Baptist hospital.

Mr. Eden and his wife, Elizabeth, arrived here from a vacation in the West Indies.

The visit is "purely routine," according to the 64-year-old Eden. He posed for pictures but would not discuss his condition in political matters. He said his health at present was "just fine."



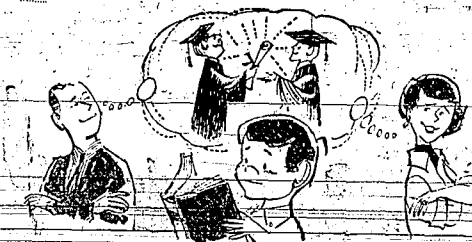

Help Your Child at School—No. 13

Expect More From Your Child and Better School Results Are Likely

By DR. LESLIE J. NASON (Professor of Education, University of Southern California)

In high school the best students usually know their parents expect them to go to college. The poorer students often feel their parents do not expect them to attend college.

Many students could do much better if they knew positively that their parents expect them to attend college.

Some parents find it hard to know just what they should expect from their children.

Surprisingly often, parents have no expectations at all. They feel they should not "pressure" their children.

Just as frequently, parents have unreasonably high expectations for their children. This can be true for both parents and the student when the expectations are not based on the child's ability or interests.

Johnny is going to be a physicist. He will be expected to listen, to share, to enjoy the group discipline necessary when he and 30 friends are crowded into a classroom.

Parents can do a great deal to give children the background that helps them get a running start in school and keeps them successful.

Insisting that he follow the rules and routines at home helps him accept them at school.

As a child progresses through the grades and into high school, your expectations for him—and his for himself—may change. Remember that different kinds of plants have different kinds of blooms, and some plants bloom early and some bloom late.

If you expect the student in your family to attend college, the expectation should be reinforced by the way he masters high school subjects. If the subjects definitely are too difficult for him, you may have to change your expectations.

Consolidation For Schools Is Discussed

WENDELL, March 7—More than 50 persons met Tuesday evening in the Wendell High school to discuss a booklet of ideas concerning consolidation of Wendell, Hagerman and Bliss high schools.

The organization in the area may have up to 10 copies of the booklet and a meeting at Hagerman March 28 is scheduled to discuss the matter with architects who will explain building and other costs.

The citizens committee is seeking viewpoints from all interested parties, both property and non-property owners.

Another meeting is scheduled in Wendell April 17 to hear reports on the viewpoints toward the proposed consolidation, and if sentiment appears favorable, a referendum will be held.

Singer Asks to Shed Film Star

LOS ANGELES, March 7 (U.P.)—Dinah Shore filed suit Tuesday for a divorce from actor George Montgomery.

The suit alleged mental cruelty but went into no details.

It asked that she be awarded custody of the couple's two children with reasonable visitation rights for Montgomery.

Shore singer and Montgomery were married in December 1949 and separated last Dec. 2.

The harbor pilot-qualified his office by radio that he will be back in New York in 11 days when the United States returns from Europe.

Blond Mother's Suit Claims Catholic Church Lured Mate

MINNEOLA, N. Y., March 7 (U.P.)—A blond mother of four young daughters sued the Roman Catholic church Tuesday for \$275,000 damages. She contends the church broke up her marriage to a former priest and kept her apart.

The suit was filed in state supreme court in Minneola by Mrs. Alice Ryan, 57, former assistant pastor of the Glen Cove Catholic church.

Defendants include, in addition to the church: Francis Cardinal Spellman, the archbishop of New York, and the dioceses of Brooklyn, Rockville Centre, Springfield, Mass., San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Mrs. Ryan said in her complaint that she and Father Ryan were married secretly in Maryland Nov. 12, 1950, after which he left the church.

She said her husband was abducted from their home on April 4, 1955, "with force and by means and aid of intoxicating beverages and liquor."

Mrs. Ryan said her husband returned on May 15, 1956, and within 12 hours thereafter the defendants—except San Francisco dioceses—began renewed efforts to separate her from her husband.

She said she had been unable to discover his whereabouts and that she has been deprived of receiving proper and adequate support and has been a public charge.

Mrs. Ryan's suit asks \$375,000 for exemplary and punitive damages for herself and \$300,000 for each of her four children—Teresa, 37; Alo, 10; Donna, 8; and Leslie M., 6.

The suit also asks attorneys' fees. Mrs. Ryan contends they are their members filed in the case in one way.

One-Eyed Killer To Be Executed

SAN QUENTIN Calif., March 7 (U.P.)—Henry Louis, Jr., who had only one eye and one arm, was scheduled to die today for the murder of a woman in a prison for the fatal shooting of a Menlo Park patrolman.

Louis, 24, was convicted of slaying patrolman John Lee, 22, last Sept. 22.

Flood Funds Being Sought By Pocatello

BOISE, March 7 (AP) — Pocatello asked Tuesday for nearly \$13,000 in emergency assistance to help it repair flood damage and Idaho state civil defense director said it is the first of an expected 40 or more applications.

The request for \$112,511 was presented to Lieut. Col. James E. Keel, Idaho civil defense director, by Jack Nevius, Bannock county civil defense director.

It was forwarded promptly by Keel to the area office for emergency planning at Everett, Wash., for processing and payment.

The application was filed under provisions of Public Law 518 which makes federal funds available to aid in financing repairs to public facilities damaged by natural disasters.

In Pocatello, figures prepared by the county engineer's office disclosed that Bannock county faces a bill of close to \$200,000 from last month's floods.

Included are damages of \$105,000 to the county's roads, costs of \$37,250 to clear and reopen flood-damaged roads, about \$32,000 for actual flood fighting and another \$20,000 for reconstruction of a bridge.

Estimates prepared by County Engineer Vern Powell and assistant Jay Nelson show the total cost was about \$124,850.

Powell's figures are still tentative and subject to revision. They do not include other flood clean-up projects such as dredging Marsh Creek ditch and the Swan Lake drainage problem.

Without this equipment the members of nurse training classes would surely be short-changed in their efforts to acquire the high degree of skill essential in caring for the ill and injured, Mrs. Chase explained.

Approximately 600 hours are spent in theory and clinical instruction and a required total of 2,500 hours in supervised experience, by the members of the current class of prospective licensed practical nurses who will graduate March 15 from their year-long course of training. A large percentage of this time is spent with "Mrs. Chase."

Mrs. Carolyn Harris, instructor of the current class, on behalf of the local school district and the Casala Memorial hospital, also expressed appreciation to the Burley Lions.

"Acquisition of the Chase doll is indeed a long step forward in the improvement of the nurses training program," she declared.

Plane? Bird? No, It's British Craft That Glides Over Sea, Land on Air

LONDON (NEA)—It is a ready-made aircraft, says the bird-like plane. No, it's a British Hovercraft, a vehicle that glides with equal ease over land or sea on a cushion of compressed air.

While the U. S. has been concentrating on its military aspects, the British are developing it commercially—and soon will take orders on the world market for the strange vehicle, variously known as Hovercraft, Chaloncraft, Avrocraft, Air-Secon, Aeromobile, Childenobile and Levacraft.

British manufacturers take the Hovercraft's operation as a means of transporting of bananas from African plantations to waiting boats and the ferrying of supplies to a market in the tropics across the frozen wastes in the Hovercraft.

The Hovercraft can operate over sandbanks, mud flats, swamps and bayous where roads are impossible and rivers un navigable.

Experts Planning Attack on U. S. Agricultural Surpluses

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Agriculture department experts see two possible ways out of the farm overproduction problem.

Despite the fact that the experts are not sure either will work, the Kennedy administration is going ahead with a substantial farm program that covers, in part, both alternatives. It will be put before congress this year.

The first plan would require a hefty shift in the types of U. S. products. There would be a big lean-forward in dried beans, peas and soybeans, and a cut-back in feed grains. U. S. farmers would produce considerably more rice and more non-fat dried milk than anyone could figure out how to sell.

These ideas result from a new agriculture department world food study to determine shortages of specific foods and where they exist.

This survey was made to prepare for a planned expansion of U. S. government gifts and subsidies shipments of farm foods abroad. Roughly half of U. S. farm exports now are so subsidized.

The agriculture department also plans increased aid in the form of technical know-how in agricultural production to the food-deficient nations, so countries will be less dependent on imports of American farm products.

The agriculture department's marketing experts are not quite certain how to mesh these two programs.

The second agriculture department plan is to produce more of the products the agriculture department sells. It would be on the market shortly or within a few years:

Sweet potato flakes — says the agriculture department, "The sweet potato flake is an excellent product—nutritious, easy-to-use, with good fresh-like flavor. We think it can't be overproduced. Several technical problems must be resolved before commercial production is practical."

Bulgur—This parboiled wheat product can be used in salads, meat, soups, stews and as stuffing for roast chicken or turkey. Canned bulgur already is available in some Midwest stores.

The agriculture department's Eastern laboratory is working on ways to make "instant" foods that take less time to prepare than non-instant foods.

Dried honey, vegetable chips, whole egg powder, beef powder, these are being developed. The egg powder is "nearing commercial reality." The bean powder already will make an instant product of what the agriculture department calls "one of the slowest cooking vegetables available in the household store."

Freeze-drying — Cooked or uncooked food is dehydrated under vacuum while frozen. Freeze-dried foods apparently do not become toughened or shriveled. They retain original flavor and texture when rehydrated, the agriculture department men say. Properly sealed, they can be stored at room temperature for long periods. Freeze-drying probably won't be economical for all food products; present costs are too high.

Dehydrated fruit — Fruit and vegetables are dried and retain their original weight, then frozen and held frozen. Agriculture department men say the quality of the thawed and cooked food is equal to that of normal frozen foods. There are savings in freezing, packaging, storage and shipping costs. Commercial production has begun.

Instant instant — Fruit or vegetable juice or puree are heated to a foam and dried in an air blast. Instant dry whole milk also can be produced by this method but it won't be commercially practical until the bland flavor of the milk can be stabilized. In the dry milk.

One question the agriculture department men say is whether it is worth the money to buy more of these new products, but they say something is being done and they say it's worth the money.

Mr. Dickinson was born May 11, 1908, at Onager, Wyo., and had lived here for several years. He operated land leveling equipment.

Survivors include his widow and son, three daughters, Mr. Wesley Lane and Mrs. John Walker, both Casper, and Mrs. James Freeman, Hamilton; two sons, Mrs. Henrietta Moore, Rowville, Wyo., and Mrs. Gilbert Davidson, Casper, Wyo.

RUPERT, March 7—A wrecker called to pull a vehicle from a borrow pit after a two-car Union Pacific train derailed Sunday evening two miles southwest of here was involved in a second mishap when it was struck by the engine of a Union Pacific train.

Investigating officers said Harry Berchard had driven his 1959 Chevrolet wrecker partially onto the tracks of a spur crossing in an effort to pull a 1953 Chevrolet, driven by Vernon Green, 22, Burley, from the borrow pit.

Witnesses reported the train engine did not whistle for the crossing, but Berchard, upon hearing the emergency brakes being applied to the engine, managed to crawl from beneath the wrecker before the impact.

The wreck occurred when a 1951 Ford driven by Patrick Moore, 17, collided with Green's Chevrolet. Officers said Green was passing the Ford and another vehicle when Moore also pulled out to pass.

The Chevrolet was forced off the road into the borrow pit and onto the railroad right of way area.

Moore was cited for failure to signal.

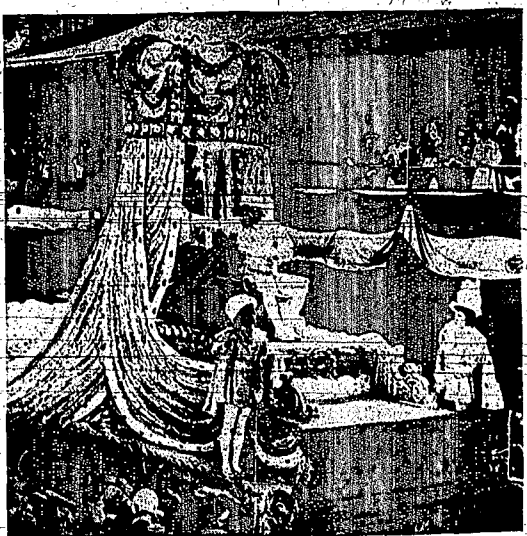

French Woman, 75, First to Lead N.Y. Orchestra

NEW YORK—Marie Perle, 75, Nadia Boulanger, going on 76, does nothing unusual about a woman conducting the New York Philharmonic orchestra.

"We are all musicians, making music together," she said when asked whether being a woman conducting an orchestra was a special concern.

"Nor does she see anything extraordinary about a woman of 75 years teaching music and directing some of the most distinguished orchestras in the world of settling down to a rocking chair."

"I have a bad memory for the past," she said. "One can carry the past with one. But you don't live with it."

The French musician, who has been the teacher of many American composers is staying with friends during her visit to the United States, to act as guest conductor for the famed Philharmonic whose regular leader is Leonard Bernstein.

She is the only woman ever to have conducted the Philharmonic in a full concert. She first appeared with the orchestra in 1939. Evidently, she had some idea of leading from the keyboard but that does not count.

Madame Boulanger, who is known as madame although she has never married, is the first woman also to have led the Boston Symphony and the Royal Philharmonic of London.

The New York Philharmonic invited her for the 75th birthday and in recognition of her influence on musical composition in the United States.

Pupils of the musician-in-law included her young sister, Lily, who died in 1953, and her son, who was also part of the program in the New York series.

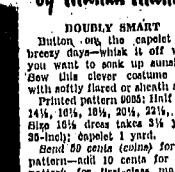

 - 1/2 teaspoon parsley-flakes
 - 1/2 teaspoon thyme
 - 2 small nutmegs
 - 1/2 small mace
 - 1 teaspoon salt

 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1/2 cup fine-dry bread crumbs

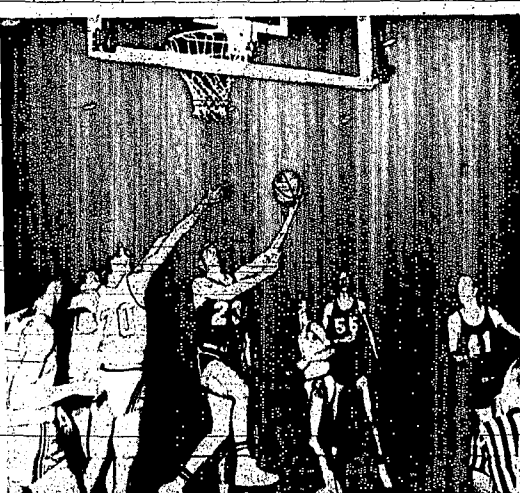
