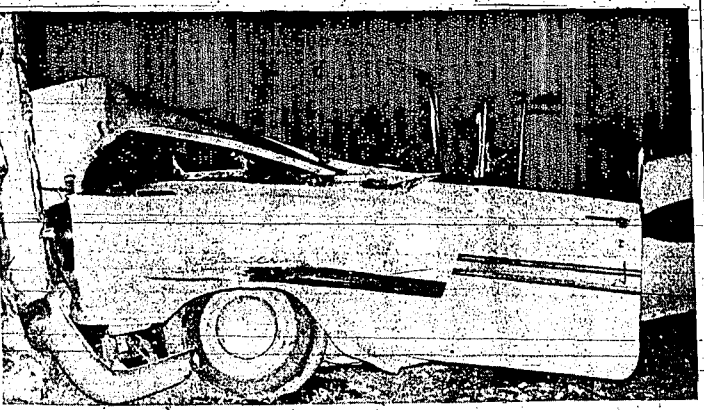

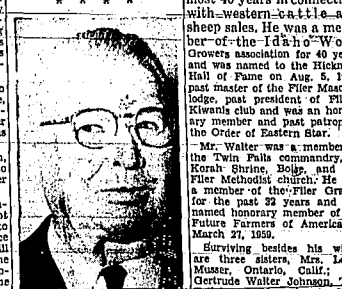

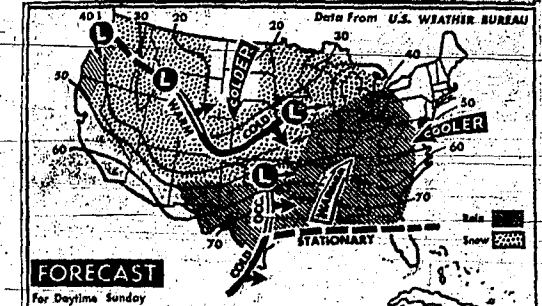

Farm Unit Hears Talk At Meeting

SHOSHONE, March 10—Work of the Farm Bureau information department was explained in detail at the Lincoln county Farm Bureau meeting held Wednesday afternoon at the Manhattan cafe.

Speaking on the subject was State Farm Bureau Information Director Harold Smith, Pocatello, who was introduced by county director, Myrum Meserve, Dietrich.

The importance of obtaining correct information was stressed by Smith, stating the purpose of the Farm Bureau information department is to provide information which will enable members to form their own opinions and to know what is right, giving the member the ability to act wisely and maintain his freedom. Evening services will be held at 7:30 p.m. each Sunday with the general theme for the six-week Lenten period to be "The meaning of suffering."

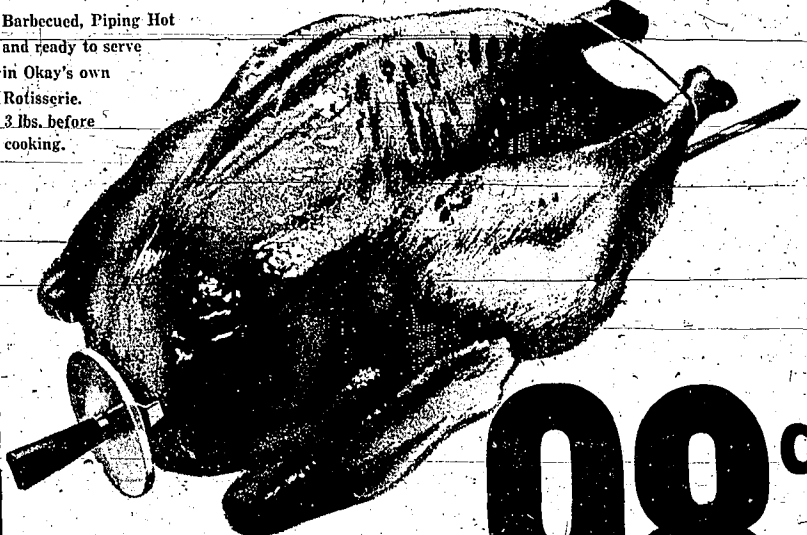
The church's multiple-choirs, under the direction of Mrs. Ernest Threner, will sing at morning and evening services. Special vocal and instrumental numbers will be featured.

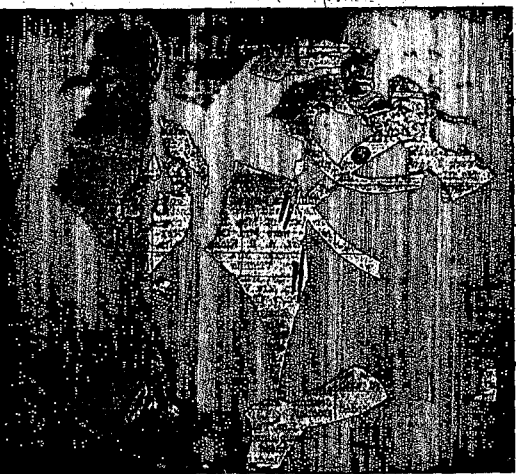

Bond-Buying Plan Backed By President

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—President Kennedy is going along with a modified version of his U.N. purchase plan in the hope of deflating a coalition of nations for stopping aid to the United Nations.

The President's decision was described by one administration official as a reluctant one, designed to salvage as much as possible of his original proposal.

He asked that the United States subscribe to half of a 200-million dollar issue of 25-year, 2-percent bonds to finance emergency U.N. operations in the Congo and Middle East.

The senate foreign relations committee has voted to permit the unrestricted purchase of 25 million dollars in such bonds. But it limited additional U.S. buying to amounts equal to what other U.N. members are buying, an over-all 100-million dollar total.

Democratic leader Mike Mansfield of Montana, said the senate may be able to take up the committee-approved proposal in the next week in the senate, where some members have had sharp criticism of U.N. policies, the foreign affairs committee has set to schedule hearings on the matter.

Deep Despair Grips German Red Hostages

LEIPZIG, East Germany, March 10 (AP)—The pall of despair has intensified in East Germany in the weeks since the communists built their wall across Berlin to shut East Germans from fleeing to the West.

This reporter, permitted to visit East Germany for Leipzig's spring trade fair, found gray monotony and in some cases hopelessness. A dreary conformity shrouded through the weeks of festivity temporarily created during the fair.

A visiting Briton compared the material conditions with those of wartime England. He said the people's spirit was a far cry from that of the war.

Leipzigers in conversations expressed fear that Walter Ulbricht, East Germany's top communist, has entrenched his hold on the last few months. They see little hope of a letup in the daily struggle to control his communist.

Ulbricht is regarded as a Stalinist whose repressive measures have not eased despite changes in some other communist countries.

Here are three comments this reporter heard:

"We're getting more Russian than the Russians ever were."

"The work norms are boosted almost every three months and we have to work longer hours for less."

"You either pretend support for the government—or else."

Police controls have tightened since Aug. 13 when the Berlin wall was started.

"The janitors in the apartment buildings aren't real janitors any more," a woman in her 40s said, but mostly by people of her own age or older. A working mother of four, she commented, "It doesn't help the youngsters in school or in their later careers if they have been conditioned to be held back and then made to look stupid in the eyes of their comrades."

A chemist said the best of the country's products are exported.

"We never get our hands on really nice consumer goods. Dissatisfaction also comes from shortages of potatoes, milk and butter."

"Oranges are seen so seldom," a taxi driver said, "they're a luxury to be eaten on only very special occasions."

"There's no lack of clothing," a bartender said, "but it all looks the same and has no style."

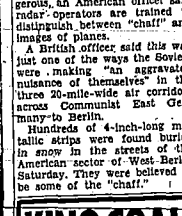
Informed sources said today that Russians planes filled the air approaches to Berlin for two hours Friday, with what they call "chaff" or "garbage," thousands of thin metallic strips.

The effect is to clutter up the screens of radar sets controlling the flights of western planes into the isolated city. Breaks of white across the screens make an unclear picture.

Declaring the effect not dangerous, an American officer said radar operators are trained to distinguish between "chaff" and images of planes.

A British officer said this was just one of the ways the Soviets were making "an aggravated nuisance of themselves" in the three 20-mile-wide air corridors across Communist East Germany to Berlin.

Hundreds of 4-inch-long metallic strips were found buried in snow in the streets of the American sector of West Berlin Saturday. They were believed to be some of the "chaff."

Joseph E. Robbins, administrative officer for the Wallops station, estimated damage at one million dollars or more. He added it would be several weeks before the facility is operational.

Mrs. Pfost Reports Her Mail Favors Wilderness Proposal

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—Chairman Grace Pfof, D., Idaho, of the house public lands subcommittee, estimated today that 10 to one support from the nation's mail is running at least 10 to one in favor of the pending wilderness bill.

The senate-passed measure would transfer about 17 million acres of public domain, primarily in western states, to a national wilderness system for preservation in primitive state for future public use and enjoyment.

Mrs. Pfof said she is receiving 20 to 40 letters a day from all parts of the country commenting on the legislation.

In contrast to the estimated 10 to one support from the nation as a whole, she said her own constituents in Idaho are about evenly divided in their letters for and against the bill.

Mrs. Pfof said she had hoped to conduct public hearings on the measure this month, but is now awaiting a detailed report of the subject by a task force of the President's outdoor recreation resources review commission.

That report, she said, is now expected about mid-April. When the report is received, she said, a hearing date will be set far enough in advance to give adequate notice to those who might wish to express their views.

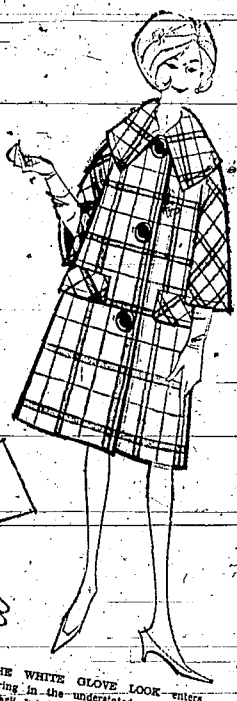

Experts Say T. F. Women Have Good Fashion Sense

Those women who have always wanted to look like approaching Elizabeth Taylor will have their chance this spring. Vincent Adams, television star, introduced women all over the world who have felt that styles "just weren't feminine enough" will be benefited, they and ultra-female this year.

How? We asked several Twin Falls fashion designers and they said the answer was often surprising. "The 'torsetto' look is in for a long run," said one designer. "It's sometimes belted, all ways figure-flattering," she stated. "Russell Wells, who has been in the dress business in the city for a more relaxed feel. Accessories will be geared to the basic dress."

"The 'Liz' look has begun to take hold in Twin Falls. Both teens and older women are buying the ruffled blouse, the ruffled skirt, ruffled everything. The new trend toward femininity is actually the result of greater freedom in fashion ideas. Next year may see even more ruffles."

Next year's most popular dress style was the loosely-fitted blouse; the coats with braided length sleeves and elbow length sleeves were favored with Magie Valley women.

She also commented that she believes Twin Falls women to be more fashion conscious as women in larger western cities. "Cleopatra" look, now popular in the East and on the west coast, is gradually coming to Twin Falls, noted the designer.

Despite Winter's Sniffles, U.S. Economy Keeps "Zip"

NEW YORK, March 10 (AP) — The economy retains its zip despite a slowing case of winter sniffles, the government maintained during the week.

President Kennedy and his economists expressed confidence that business in 1962 will live up to expectations.

Doubts had been raised by January declines in personal income, manufacturing sales, industrial production, and employment, but these factors had been reported down, too, but a revival of activity showed a one per cent gain.

The President seized on a February drop in unemployment to tell his news conference that this economy has more vitality in it than some of its premature mourners.

The number of unemployed declined by 120,000 to 4,453,000. This represented a 10-month low of 5.6 per cent of the work force.

At the same time, total employment increased by 231,000 to 75,589,000.

Both figures were better than usual for this time of year. Nevertheless, the protracted high level of unemployment was widespread worry.

George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO, called for a strike to force a reduction in pay as a solution to automation.

"I'd like to see the work week in America short enough so it would provide a job for every American who wants to work," he said.

Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges conceded that the economy suffered a slight chill early this year.

"But one month doesn't make a trend and one month does not freeze the pond," he said.

"If you look at all the January figures, rather than just the headline-makers, you see that many of the returns are quite good. I think it is safe to say that our government recovery still has a good way to go."

Walter W. Heller, chairman of the President's council of economic advisers, noted that the economy has gone through a 10-month period of good production.

"I think you can see the signs of it," he said.

Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges noted that the economy suffered a slight chill early this year.

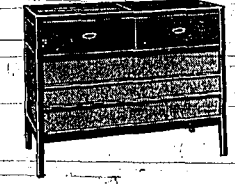

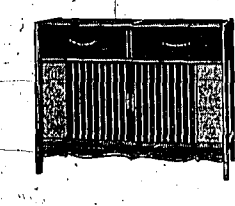

DUBLIN, Ireland, March 10 (AP)—The young man in the coffee house had red hair, a good suit and fire in his eye. He had done more than his share of fighting on the border. He was a leader of the new generation of Irish revolutionaries. He had certainly not taken notice of the Irish Republican Army's decision last week to dump its arms and call off the dogs against the British in the north.

When the campaign started five years ago the IRA intended to take the government of Northern Ireland, the six counties which still are part of the United Kingdom. It started with an onslaught that looked like full scale war, but the campaign degenerated into sporadic bombings and battles of 20 people who died, the young man complained, not one was a British soldier of the northern forces. It was the broadest Scotch accent he had heard since leaving Scotland four days previous. Bob Brown had started to get into his car, when he looked around to see Macpherson dressed in the tartan of his clan, and hailed him. Now Bob Brown was born in the Wood River valley and never has seen the Scottish Isle, but his father, Bob Brown, was a piper in his native land as a youth before coming to America, and his mother also came from the Land of the Heather.

"When I saw that Scottish outfit I just had to say 'howdy'," Brown smiled. "The two men had a good visit."

Mr. and Mrs. Macpherson visited in Kelchum and Sun Valley last week until Friday morning, when they left for California. During their stay here they were special guests at the Kelchum-Sun Valley Rotary club and Chamber of Commerce. Macpherson, as guest speaker at both meetings, told many interesting facts concerning his native land. The Scottish people are becoming very aware of their country, he said. "The population of Scotland is approximately six million," he stated, "and during the last year that many tourists visit there."

At Edinborough there is a large Rotary club, in the city proper, and four in the outlying districts. Macpherson attended Rotary there just previous to leaving for America Feb. 22.

Macpherson is a member of the "lord" PROVOX committee, which he states is also known as the cabinet-of-the-queen. He is also a member of the Edinborough corporation transport committee. Every two years he travels conferences held by this committee. Last year it was held in Copenhagen, in 1959 in Paris and in 1958 it will be held in Vienna.

During their stay here Glen Brewer, manager of the Kelchum-Sun Valley Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the Stanley basin country. Macpherson states the scenery here is much like that in the central highlands of his native country. Seabees Have Changed, but They're Still on Job After 20 Years' Service

(Continued from Page 21) —air station at Cebu Point in the Philippines.

The obstacle: An 800-foot-high mountain. The solution: Cut the mountain in half. They did.

Rebuilding and rehabilitation is going on at Guam, Rota, and Adak. Alaska, New Zealand, Puerto Rico, Spain and Midway Island. The Midway project includes an attempt to locate the island's albatross and the bothersome albatross—or gannet.

—Has it worked? "We don't know," says Adm. Clark. "Female gannet birds lay eggs every seven years and they always return to the place of their birth to hatch them. Most of them were born along the runways."

"We're trying to get them to lay their eggs on their own runways," says Clark. "When we'll be all right."

Seabees will be responsible for installing two nuclear reactors in the Antarctic.

Their experience on the ice qualified the Seabees for one of their few jobs in the continental United States: a snow-packed, 12,000-car parking lot at the 1960 Winter Olympics at Squaw Valley, Calif.

The Snowbees, as the ice workers are sometimes called, are split into three units of 125 men and assigned to Antarctica on a rotating basis.

The Pacific Seabee Commander, Adm. Clark, says that the Seabees, since 1930 graduate of Annapolis, is given to few frills. His chief worry is the Seabee's ability to do his job. "The Seabee is a hard worker, efficient and unlettered."

Selection of work for Seabees is a complex problem. Navy policy forbids them to compete with civilian labor in the United States except for security or strategic reasons.

Clark speaks with familiarity of both Pacific and Atlantic Seabees, having commanded the Atlantic battalions before taking the Pearl Harbor job in 1959.

He describes the differences: "Here in the Pacific we handle in the main long-range, large projects such as Cebu bay and the Okinawa job. In the Atlantic, most of the requirements are less involved and are completed more quickly."

But then Seabees were always known for their speed. In World War II they often lived up to their motto, "The difficult we do at once, the impossible takes a little longer."

(Continued from Page 21) enhanced with several visual aid machines that Herrett, who taught in public school for 18 years, has designed for teaching purposes.

After the visitors are introduced to the wonders of space in this building and given briefing on what they will see in the planetarium, they are taken into the planetarium behind the floor.

There they are seated and treated to an illustrated lecture, complete with an artificial sky projected on the planetarium dome, which explains the birth and death of a star, and occasionally visitors are treated to a simulated ride through space.

Programs at the planetarium vary because there are so many visual aids that it would be impossible to use them all in one program.

After the lecture, if weather permits, the visitors look through the telescope and view the planets and stars that have been discussed. When the lecture is over, they will return to the new building, where the subject matter covered during the evening can be reviewed.

Herrett says the new addition will serve both as a place to display science and art objects, but he adds that in the future he hopes to build another addition for art alone and devote the new addition to science.

"I hope that the new facilities can serve as a source for the broadened aspects for learning by

the people of his area," Herrett says. "When I first started studying astronomy, I figured I knew a lot, but the more you study the more you realize how little you know."

Herrett, who has devoted most of his time the past five years to the building and expansion of the planetarium, points out that the purpose of the planetarium is to add to the knowledge of school children who visit, not give them a basic understanding, which is the job of the schools.

He hopes that the planetarium will spark their interest in science and the arts, so they continue their study.

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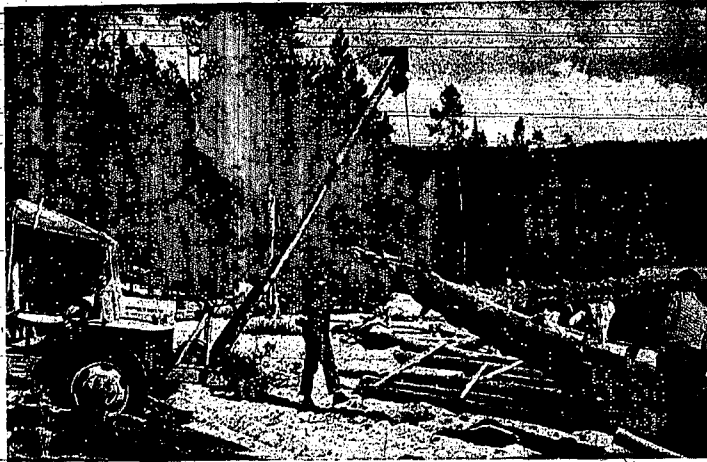

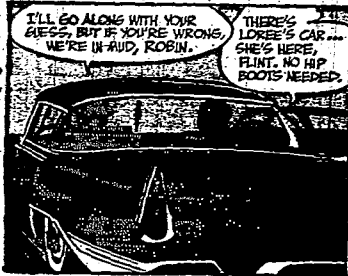

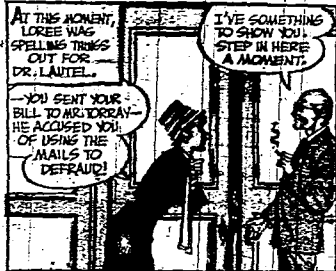
