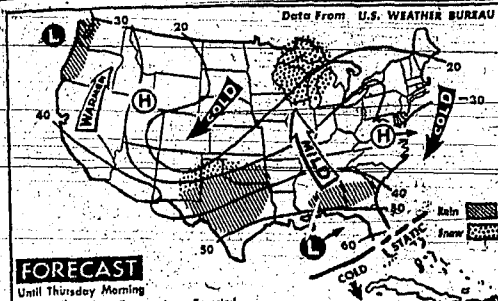

Cancer-Causing Agents May Enter Humans Via Stomach

PHOENIX, March 14 (AP)—The avenue for the agents that cause human cancer may well be through man's own stomach, a scientist suggested Tuesday.

These chemical agents that man inadvertently swallows in his daily diet may produce cancer far removed in his body from the digestive tract.

"This possibility is being considered following experiments with animals, and Dr. William E. Poel, of the University of Pittsburgh's laboratory for experimental carcinogenesis.

"No sane person would eat a cancer-causing agent from a labeled can," Dr. Poel told an American Cancer society's science writers seminar.

Dr. Poel fed agents to laboratory mice, and found they caused a wide range of tumors in the mice, skin cancer, breast cancer, lung cancer, for instance.

"These tumors were heretofore believed to have been caused by external contact with a cancer-causing agent, or by viruses, he said. Some strains of mice, he explained, have a susceptibility to breast cancer because of an imbalance in the presence of a virus believed to cause the breast cancer.

A similar strain has the same hormone balance, but not the virus, and hence does not get breast cancer. This strain fed cancer-causing agents and nevertheless, got breast cancer.

In other strains of mice, varieties of tumors were produced by feeding them agents such as found in cigarette smoke.

WASHINGTON, March 14 — President Kennedy's ability to lead this country moving ahead, which was the basic theme of his 1960 campaign, has been questioned even by his ardent and vocal supporters because of congressional neglect and dawdling.

Although three months of the current session will end in a few weeks, the White House and congressional leaders have been slow to take any action in the areas where the President has shown special interest. The most important of these areas has been the field of urban affairs, which has been killed by devastatingly large majorities in the conservative house and the more liberal and sympathetic senate.

There is even stronger evidence of congressional refusal to heed White House demands on the very issues which enabled Kennedy to be elected a victory over Richard M. Nixon. And there are issues which won him almost the solid support of liberal, labor, independent and racial elements of the electorate.

DELAY 'INCREDIBLE'—The Democratic chairman of numerous major committees have even more berating of the President's most important and long-range social, economic and foreign programs.

This incredible delay—really a sidown strike—is extremely dangerous because it happens to be a reelection year, when all house members and a third of the senate must face the political gauntlet. Under such circumstances, it is not surprising that many congressmen are reluctant to take any action which might be construed as a threat to incumbents—the honorable gentlemen like a fast getaway from Washington, June or July if possible.

There are the presidential proposals on hand, no date for committee hearings has yet been set. Civil rights legislation, a world trade expansion act, medical and social security, and authority for the President to increase or lower taxes, standby power to build public works at the onset of a depression.

MORE THAN TALK NEEDED—In view of poll reports of President Kennedy's continuing popularity, this indifference and sluggishness in capitalizing on his popularity is a disservice to the country. It is not surprising that many congressmen are reluctant to take any action which might be construed as a threat to incumbents—the honorable gentlemen like a fast getaway from Washington, June or July if possible.

It is true, they concede, that the White House has been very busy and certainly convincing messages to congress on these problems, and reinforced them with attractive arguments. The best of these proposals on hand, his appeals have been so numerous and comprehensive that he cannot afford the time to discuss and follow them up with individual and influential members. 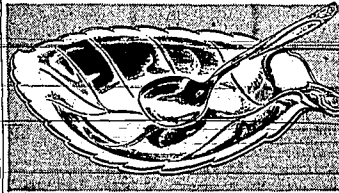

Growers Ask Changes for Farms Plans

BOISE March 14 (U)—Directors of the Idaho Wheat Growers association voted here today to support the Kennedy administration's proposed farm program unless 10 amendments are included in the wheat and feed grain sections.

The directors noted that Idaho growers voted opposition at the Lewiston convention last fall to any program which would bring further reduction in grower income.

The proposed amendments, the directors said, are needed to assure achievement of the bills announced goal of increasing farm income while bringing production into balance with demand.

The amendments also include a provision to protect the production allotments of Idaho feed grain producers.

The IDWGA directors also joined the Idaho wheat commission in support of a protest against a recent attempt by the Sydney Harris, director of the commodity stabilization service at Portland.

Harris said in a speech at Lewiston that bringing Midwest wheat to Pacific ports through lower freight rates would actually benefit the western growers.

Harold West, administrator of the wheat commission, said in a letter to Harris that Idaho growers were "greatly perturbed" by the department of agriculture policy of "reducing freight rates from the Great Plains area to Pacific Coast ports through our own state of Idaho without reducing the Idaho rate."

West said that Idaho's share of the same proportionate decrease in freight rates to West Coast ports.

Wheat commission chairman Adrian Nelson, Genese, said the Idaho growers are not opposed to reduced freight rates for wheat from the Midwest provided that Idaho is granted similar rate cuts. But he said Idaho cannot accept discrimination.

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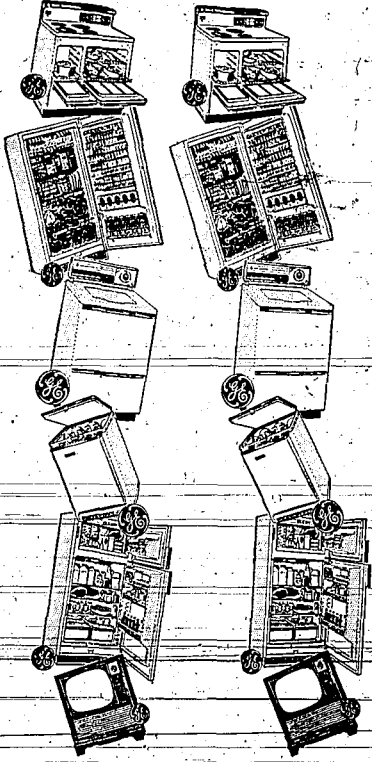

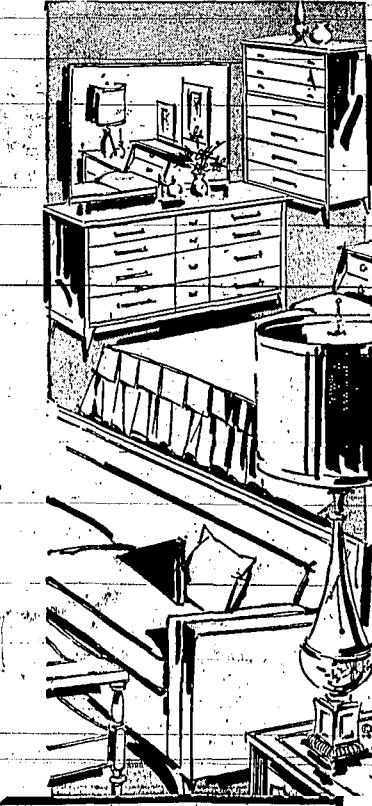

3/4 cup dairy sour cream
1 egg
1/2 cup milk

Mix together oven to hot (425 degrees F.). Sift together corn meal, flour, sugar, baking powder and salt to bowl. Add milk. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in sour cream blended with egg and milk. Mix lightly until mixture is just dampened. Turn out on lightly floured board or canvas and knead until 2 or 4 times. Divide dough in half; roll each half to 1/8-inch thickness. Cut into desired shapes. Place on ungreased cookie sheet; prick each cracker well with a fork. Plan to Build up Cassia Division Deer Herd to 3,500 Receives Support

Plans to gradually increase the base herd of the Cassia division deer population to about 3,500 head was endorsed Tuesday night by the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association. After two extensive reports by big game biologist Les Trout, the association passed a resolution calling for controlled permit hunting over the next seven years. The plan would allow next fall with 2,500 permits and the number of permits would be flexible to maintain less-than-increase harvesting.

Trout defined the situation in the South Hills by answering three questions: "How many large should the base herd be? How fast should the herd population be rebuilt? and how many permits should be allowed to assure steady increase?" He noted browse studies indicate that between 12 and 15 per cent of the available feed is being utilized now with a base herd of 5,000. To let the winterbrush maintain its growth vigor Trout said that the growth vigor of the plants. There are about 20,000 acres in the range but this figure is not representative in that deer utilization is not even during the critical winter months.

He said 31 per cent of the brush, 20 per cent of the alfalfa, and 63 per cent of the alfalfa and five per cent are young with only a few seedlings. Trout said that the brush currently has been planted with winterbrush, it will require some time for these plants to mature and support winter herds.

For that reason a "rapid build-up is not desirable," he said. "Trapping stations and aerial counting stations, and aerial counts over the years, Trout said the base population has been reduced 18 per cent over the past four years or about four per cent per season. The average harvest has been 2,000 head in even figure averages.

"By dropping the number of harvested deer to 1,800 per year, the fish and game department could maintain the present herd level. Red Thought Is Praised for Cuban Youth

HAVANA, March 14 (UP)—Prime Minister Fidel Castro urged young Cubans today to develop a "pure Marxist-Leninist spirit" and declared that they will soon live under communism.

The prime minister promised Cuba's younger generations a new society devoid of egoism and individualism. He called on Cuban youth to develop a more intense "Marxist spirit," and said the young live "in another more advanced stage, not socialism but communism."

Castro set no date for Cuba to become a communist state. In a speech last December, in which he publicly identified himself as a Marxist-Leninist, Castro said "there will be no communism in Cuba before 30 years."

"We're not inviting anyone to study Marxism," he said, asserting that Cubans have embraced Marxism-Leninism "because the young generation that listens and repeats but a youth that thinks and is not revolutionary by imitation."

GENEVA, March 14 (AP)—The Disarmament conference which opened here today continues the first such international negotiations since the Soviet bloc walked out of the 1958-59 disarmament conference June 27, 1959.

The control and verification issues therefore remain among the chief controversies.

The United States—backed by Britain, Canada, and Italy—insists on effective international control of disarmament as well as of any nuclear test ban. The Russians object, claiming that any such agreement would amount to establishment of an international spying system.

The phased Soviet "general and complete disarmament" plan "supported by Moscow's four satellite participants, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Romania, and Bulgaria" was first introduced by Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev to the United Nations general assembly in September, 1959. It since has been supplemented by a number of official policy statements.

In broad outline, Khrushchev's plan calls for a single treaty covering all three disarmament stages, with no specific arms reduction measures to be implemented until total agreement on all issues has been reached.

In the final Soviet stages, armed forces, armaments and production of arms would be pooled and stored in a high trust area required by limited national police forces. Countries would place police contingents at the disposal of the U. N. security council, where necessary.

The United States three-stage disarmament plan was presented by the general assembly by President Kennedy in September, 1961. The third stage would limit all nuclear forces, arms and armaments production to lowest levels required to maintain internal order and provide contributions to the U. N. peace force. No national force would have nuclear weapons.

Woven into the conference will be the question of a nuclear test ban treaty on which the United States, Britain and Russia labored three years, without success.

The big three have agreed to turn this over to a working subcommittee. It is expected to hold its first meeting Thursday. But prospects for its achieving any kind of success appear as slim as the success of the reduction measures to be implemented.

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Police Battle Teen Rioters In Guatemala

GUATEMALA CITY, March 14 (UPI)—Military police battled teenage mobs here yesterday and last night in a day of wild street lighting in which at least 80 persons were wounded and more than 100 were arrested.

(Travelers from Guatemala arriving in Nicaragua said "several" persons were killed in the day's rioting—during which the mobs destroyed stores and set fire to trucks and automobiles.)

An official Guatemalan broadcast heard last night in Managua appealed to the parents of unruly Guatemalan teenagers not to let the communists "use them for cannon fodder."

The thud of tear-gas bombs and the crackle of police gunfire resounded through the city all day long and into the night.

Although the police used a barrage of tear-gas, it was reported that most of the shots were fired by police indiscriminately.

Most of the wounded were young rioters felled by police clubs or overcome by the tear-gas fumes, which victims complained of as "vomiting" and "blacking out."

Rioters were protesting alleged government frauds in December congressional elections and "repressive measures" ordered by the government under the current state of siege emergency regulations.
