Conflicts Flare for Conclave

GENEVA, March 15 (AP)—U. S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko clashed today at the very outset of the 17-nation disarmament conference.

Gromyko denounced a painful blow to the conference plans of the United States to start new atmospheric tests in late April unless the Soviet Union start here to end all such tests under strict controls.

Rusk replied that the present conference was born amid the echoing roars of more than 40 Soviet nuclear explosions last fall and that the Soviet Union, in view of its record, was one of the least-qualified of nations to criticize the United States.

Rusk and Gromyko presented sweeping and detailed plans for disarming the world.

The stated aims were the same. But the methods differed sharply as to revive at once the shadow of deadlock which has hung over all discussions and negotiations of the postwar period.

Rusk called for a 30 per cent cut in nuclear armed rockets, big bombers and in such conventional military weapons as tanks and warships in three years. He also proposed a prohibition on production of nuclear weapons and that the United States and Soviet Union each transfer 50 tons of weapons-grade U235-explosive uranium to peaceful purposes.

Connected with the plan were proposed measures to prevent surprise attack and for an international monitoring system. The measures included aerial inspection areas, ground observation posts at strategic points and a system of communications to allow direct communication between the world from being plunged into war by accident, misinterpretation of communications or surprise attack.

An order signed by Chief Justice E. B. Smith set oral arguments in the case for March 27 and told lawyers for both sides to have their written briefs in the court's hands one day earlier than that.

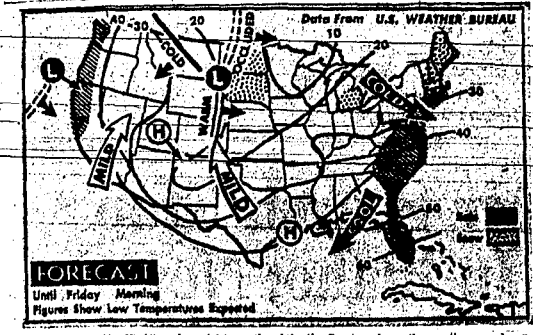

Rowdy Youth Takes Punch At Spacemen

ARLINGTON, Va., March 15 (AP)—Arlington police said today they are searching for a boy who they said tried to sock astronaut John H. Glenn last Saturday night.

The incident took place in a parking area at the Glenn family's church here. The astronaut came to the city of the Rev. Frank A. Erwin who was attempting to keep four rowdy boys from disrupting a television broadcast in the church's youth center. Erwin said the boys apparently did not know he was a minister, or that Glenn was the famous space flier.

Police said one of the four lunged at the minister as Glenn drove up. Glenn leaped from his car and told them to leave or he would call the police.

When one particularly brazen youth still refused to leave, police said, Glenn began jolting down the license number of the boy's car, whereupon the youth stepped between the astronaut and the vehicle.

Glenn shoved him aside and the boy took a right-hand swing at him. Glenn easily dodged the blow and pinned the boy against the car. When Glenn released his hold on the boy and his companions drove off in the car but Glenn got the license number and notified the police.

One of the four boys involved in the incident has been picked up, police said. They said the four ranged in age from 15 to 17 and had been drinking beer bought illegally in nearby Washington.

Refusal to consider President Kennedy's proposal for a new cabinet position dealing with urban affairs constitutes the strongest rejection to date, but signs here and there indicate the President may have some serious knuckles before long.

The President has told congress there is no need to speed up the program to develop the 2,000-mile-an-hour B70 bomber, but some congressmen have other ideas. Notable among them is Rep. Carl Vinson, chairman of the house armed services committee. He's more than miffed that the President is trying to tell congress what to do. He's pressing for a showdown on congress' right to play a major role in such decisions.

Elsewhere in the house of representatives, President Kennedy is opposing some congressmen in the annual rural over funds for foreign aid. The President asked for \$4,878,600,000, roughly five billion dollars, contending the total cannot be cut. But Rep. Otto Passman, chairman of the house subcommittee in charge of foreign aid, says the five billion total is preposterous and has promised to try to cut it.

Over in the senate, President Kennedy's plans to increase postal revenue have run into tough sailing in hearings. Principle point of contention is the proposal to increase charges on the so-called newspapers and magazines. Here again, the chairman of the committee, Sen. Olin D. Johnston, is opposing the administration recommendation. He told witnesses he was "not pleased" with a proposed one-cent per piece surcharge for mailed papers.

The important point here is that all three of these committee chairmen—Representatives Vinson and Passman and Senator Johnston—are Democrats.

It's not unusual to have senators and representatives from the opposition party fight administration suggestions. Sometimes it is referred to as "politics" with a variety of descriptive adjectives, depending on who's describing the politics. But when members of the President's own party—and particularly those who head committees—start opposing the administration, then the President can expect some tough sledding. That's particularly true whenever an item of controversy is involved.

If the incidents cited above are indicative of the general attitude of congress, and particularly some of the Democrats, can you expect significant accomplishments by congress in this election year.

In a way, it's rather surprising that President Kennedy would permit such a situation to develop. It hasn't been long since he was in congress and certainly he can remember how jealously and zealously lawmakers guard what they consider their legislative right.

OUNCE OF PREVENTION
Most law enforcement officers would rather avert a crime, accident or any other incident of similar nature, not only because of the additional work and trouble avoided but because a good officer considers prevention of violations one of the more important phases of his work.

In this connection, traffic control is one of the most important parts of an officer's duty today. It means more than just arresting speeders and trying to convince drivers that stop signs and other regulations are developed for their protection. Primary purpose of arrests for traffic violations is to avoid accidents, specifically, serious accidents which could result in the loss of life. Although the violator who has just been cited may not be able to understand, the officer writing the ticket has an ultimate aim of saving the violator's life—and possibly the lives of others.

Most law enforcement officers have had two examples of law violators just back that present a "ounce of prevention." Two junior high school girls, who had convinced themselves they had to fight for some reason or other, were all set to mix it up. But, police had been tipped and moved in time to prevent any bloodshed. Police and the anonymous tipster are to be commended for averting an incident that could only reflect to the credit of students, schools and the city.

Two more alert city patrolmen smelled smoke in the middle of the night, traced the fumes to their source in a garage and summoned firemen. Because of their alertness and prompt action, damage was held to a minimum.

Perhaps it means less excitement generally, but taxpayers and citizens certainly should favor the prevention type of work by their policemen.

Red Shadow's Grim Spectre Dims Village

LANGAU, Austria—Under the watchful eyes of gun-toting communist soldiers, a small band of Austrian miners dug for coal within reach of the Iron Curtain. The coal deposit runs straight across the frontier into Czechoslovakia, beneath electric bars and mine-infested no-man's-land.

In two years the stretch on Austrian territory will be exhausted. Then the miners will abandon the pit, adding another to a string of deserted canons, farms and ghost towns in what is regarded as Austria's "dead zone."

A depression area since World War II, this wind-swept part of Lower Austria Province never recovered from the damage done during the Russian occupation during which most of its factories were razed and the equipment shipped east.

And after the Russians had left in 1955, the chill of the cold war drove thousands away from their homelands, leaving behind some mostly old farmers who doggedly cling to the land of their forefathers. But their number dwindles steadily.

In one typical district, Haugsdorf, in the northernmost tip of the ragged border line, some 100 people live on 20 per cent of their population. Local authorities admit they can do nothing to help them. "Who would want to spend his life in a trap that might close on him if it comes to another war?" one official summed it up.

This general uneasiness is deepened by "we have no change" feeling of economic insecurity. Industrial production in the rural border district is virtually nonexistent because private capital is reluctant to invest money in an area drained of most of its manpower.

The Langau coal mine is kept running by the giant Austrian Steel Works in Upper Austria Province, west of Linz, just to help 20 miners retain their livelihood for two more years. The nearby town of Haugsdorf, famous for its picturesque 11th century church, has lost a quarter of its former population. Many of its 110 houses stand empty.

Computer Is Taking Slide Rule's Place

BLOOMFIELD, N.J.—“In my mind the young generation of the slide rule,” says 60-year-old organic chemist Dr. Bradley Whitman, “is being replaced by the computer.”

“They have to learn the computer,” he says.

On Saturday mornings, 9 to 12, and 20 juniors and seniors from Montclair State University are learning about computers from Dr. Whitman and George Thomas, a chemist and statistician. Schering corporation, the pharmaceutical firm which employs the chemist, provides the cost and provides facilities for the 14-week course, “Electronic computer programming.”

At a recent meeting, half the class was updating “debugging” a program which had been written in tape in computer language. It was led by one student using the computer for solution. The work was accompanied by a running commentary from Thomas. “Now we'll run the program through the computer system and it runs. Oh! Well show you how to debug the program. Incidentally, if you want to make money, buy stock in a computer paper company... Even experts make mistakes in stocks. If you want to make money... Now what you do in actual practice, you go to the key punch operator and the correction punched into your program.”

Download Dr. Whitman's pupils worked on a program of mathematical problem into a program for the computer, while Dr. Whitman discussed the class. Dr. Whitman says he and Thomas feel the course is worth while and could be still further improved. “We think the class should be smaller. Each one isn't getting as much actual time at the computer as we had hoped. And we've learned there are certain basic concepts that throw them. The ones that should be this. If there is one, we can get some of these points over. That we never anticipated as stumbling blocks.”

“We haven't too many kids you know, and they come on time. I hope they're giving in their Saturday mornings because they're interested.”

“They should have notified us first,” Woodford said.

Six infants have died since Friday when the babies' formula was mistakenly made with salt instead of sugar.

“Yesterday baby died during that period, but officials at the hospital said it had not been fed with the poisoned formula. All the other except the Woodford infant are in fair condition.”

Reds Strike Guard Unit Near Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, March 15 (AP)—Communist guerrillas, firing from an ambush in dangerous zone "D" about 40 miles north of Saigon today killed 23 civil guardsmen. Another 40 government soldiers were missing and several wounded.

There were between 70 and 80 men in the civil guard company which was ambushed in the Tan Vinh district of Phuoc Thanh province. The ambush was set up within five miles of Bien Hoa, from which Vietnamese air force planes and American pilot instructors are flying missions against the Viet Cong almost daily.

The civil guard company's vehicles were burned and many of their American-made weapons were carried off by the red guerrillas, known as Viet Cong.

An authoritative military source said the Viet Cong casualties were extremely light.

The ideological rift between the Soviet Union and Communist China appeared to widen even further today following First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan's denunciation of Albanian communists and their "leftists."

Mikoyan, in a pre-election speech yesterday at the 50th anniversary of the revolution in Brevin, capital of the Soviet Armenian republic, leveled charges against the Albanian "leftists" — presumably the Communist Chinese — who have criticized the Kremlin's disarmament proposals.

Although Mikoyan did not mention the communist Chinese by name, his remarks were interpreted as a clear rebuff to the charges that the Soviet disarmament and peaceful coexistence lines are hindering the national liberation movements in colonial nations.

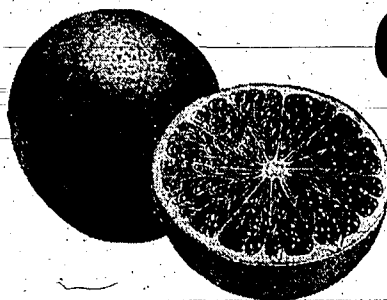

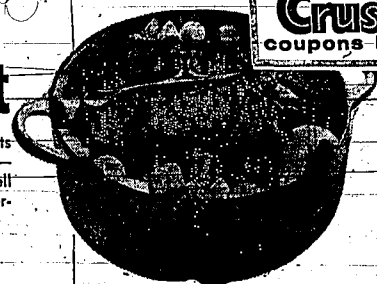

NEW YORK, March 15 (AP)—One of the "lonely" about-child prodigies and that keeps ordinary mortals from feeling short-changed — is that when they cease to be children they frequently are no longer prodigious either.

An exception is Ruth Slenzyńska (pronounced slen-zynska).

As a pupil 4 1/2-year-old she climbed up on a piano stool to make her professional debut in Oakland, Calif. That was 32 years ago.

Recalling her precocious childhood, she says: "I remember, like any child, that I was very happy, but it's like a great calamity. You're glad you lived through it, but you wouldn't advise it for anyone else."

Her Berlin debut came at age 6. Paris at 7. New York at 8.

"Greatest keyboard genius since Mozart" was one of the earlier accolades she received. "I never had anything I wanted," she goes on, "without bitterness. It never wanted to be a pianist. It was my father's idea before I was born. But since I am one—"

"I've learned when given a set of circumstances to make the most of them, to enjoy them. But I'd probably be the most happy, contented little housewife and mother."

Ruth lives alone in a New York apartment. She'd like to have a pet, but she travels too much to keep one. In the past five years she has given more than a thousand concerts on three continents.

Ruth who is just under 5 feet, once was fired as a waitress because she couldn't hold trays high enough. That was when she was working her way through the University of California, majoring in psychology, after her family returned from Europe at the outbreak of World War II.

She was teaching at the College of Our Lady of Los Angeles in Long Beach, Calif., and I thought I'd found my niche and wanted to stay forever. When she was overheard practicing in 1951 by the head of the Carmel Beach Festival.

Tebbetts Says Baseball Is Tough Sport

Tebbetts, who has great respect for pitching, requires better athletes than any other sport in the world.

Baseball and other sports simply don't mix.

Authority for these observations comes from Tebbett's veteran major league player and manager now back in uniform as field general of the Milwaukee Braves.

The latter sport demands the coordination from so many different angles as does baseball, says Tebbett. "It requires tremendous speed, agility and the deft handling of a fast-moving object."

"The only reason I except pitchers is that a man can be a great pitcher if he has great strength. It's a question of picking up the leg and throwing the ball."

"Baseball is a noncontact sport and the muscles you develop in it are against the concept of other sports. That's why football players are usually not good baseball players."

"Remember when I was catching for the Detroit Tigers, one of the great tennis players of the time came out to Lakeland and we got him in a proper game. He fell flat on his face in no time."

"In proper games a batter hits or smokes, sharp flies or grounders in succession to a row of a half-dozen players."

"You have to punish yourself in baseball, particularly as you grow older," Tebbett said. "You need to force yourself to work as hard as you know how to work."

Grandelius was an assistant coach at Michigan State, where he had been a football star, when he took the Colorado job. The University of Colorado sent a report from its own investigating committee to the NCAA officials two weeks ago.

The Post said the university's report verified NCAA charges, rather than attempting to build a defense against them. The NCAA appeal is scheduled to meet in April.

Close paper bag securely and shake until each piece of chicken is completely coated with mixture. Remove chicken from bag, reserve flour. Blend 1/2 tablespoons seasoned flour, cook over low heat 2 minutes. Gradually blend in 1 cup light cream or milk. Stir to keep smooth. Correct seasoning if necessary. Pour hot sauce over chicken and garnish with crisp salt pork and parsley.

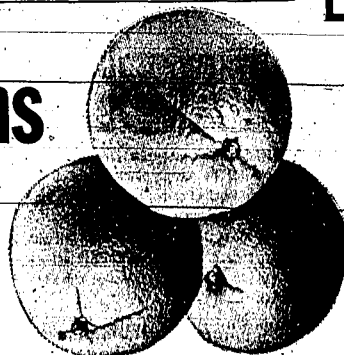

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Drevlow Intends to Stay in Race for Governor's Chair

BY RICHARD CHARNOCK
BOISE, March 15 (AP)—Tale of the candidate himself, William E. Drevlow has no plans of pulling out of the race for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

In fact, he told UPI by telephone from his home at Craycroft, home only the weather has held him back thus far from barnstorming the state.

"I don't regret a moment that my health is falling or that he plans to step out of the governor's race and run again for lieutenant governor," Drevlow said.

"I know nothing about it. I don't know anything about it. I don't know anything about it. I don't know anything about it."

He said he was in good shape. "Add the 72-year-old lieutenant governor added staidly that far, I haven't given any consideration to doing anything other than seek the gubernatorial nomination in the June 8 primary."

He said he contracted "24-hour flu" just before he was scheduled to leave for Idaho and the seminar last Saturday and had to cancel out. He said he's recovering quite well, however, but that Saturday "I couldn't have talked if I'd wanted to. I had a sore throat and I was hoarse."

Mrs. Drevlow said she has been down with flu, he said, but now is beginning to recover.

"I shouldn't be getting out 'right pronto," he said of his campaign plans. "Just as soon as the wife gets on feeling better."

He said he plans to campaign in all 44 counties and that he will go by automobile all the way. He said he has a car with a reputation of part of one of his legs last summer. Drevlow now has an artificial limb and his car is fixed so that he can drive it without trouble.

"I'll be just the same kind of campaigner I put on for lieutenant governor," Drevlow said, "except that I can't see as many buildings, signs and other places to hand out my literature and meet people. I can't cover quite that much ground now."

"I've said all the time I've slowed down a little bit but I'm not a sick man," he added. "With the artificial limb, I can't walk as many miles as I did when I was for lieutenant governor."

Drevlow said that he isn't ready to start hammering on some of the issues developing in the campaign—government reorganization; a possible deficit; and natural resources management. But he did say that his hand already is clear on off-proposed right-to-work legislation.

"I have a record down there (when he was in the legislature) to vote against it and I haven't changed my mind about it," he said.
