Russians Ready to Negotiate

GENEVA, March 19 (AP)—The Soviet Union announced today it was ready to negotiate with the United States and Britain on a nuclear test ban treaty. But it stood firm against allowing international inspection teams on its soil.

The action opened new prospects of East-West talks on the test ban, although it did not resolve any of the differences blocking a treaty. If agreement can be reached, it would be the first time since the Soviet pact President Kennedy has announced he will cancel next month's scheduled start on a new series of U.S. atmospheric tests.

The Russian announcement was made by Deputy Soviet Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin at a news conference. His statement coincided with information from Western delegates that the United States and Britain have finally agreed on concessions to Russia in a number of Soviet objections to international inspection.

The offer probably will be made Tuesday. It is understood that the Western powers would reduce the number of inspectors which teams of international inspectors could make around the Soviet Union. Much of the test ban would be eliminated from any inspection at all.

French Foreign Secretary Louis Home returned to Geneva from week-end consultations in London with Prime Minister Harold Wilson. Allied diplomats there believed Macmillan had been in touch with Kennedy on pulling down the number of inspectors to be even more anxious than Kennedy to show that if the U.S. tests are called every power effort is made to avoid them.

Zorin said the Soviet Union would accept a number of proposals from the United States, Britain and France on a nuclear test ban. The great powers would meet in Geneva to discuss the disarmament conference.

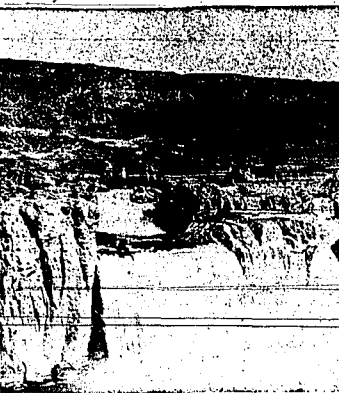
Since France is boycotting the Geneva talks, Zorin said he is ready to continue negotiations among the three powers, but the news conference, Zorin said.

Said the Soviet draft treaty for total disarmament in three years in four major areas would be the basis for negotiations here, especially since, he said, the United States has not made a complete treaty proposal.

Rejected the proposal advanced by the United States. State Dept. said last week that Russia and the United States each transfer 30,000 kilograms of nuclear explosive material to a stockpile for peaceful use. Zorin said that should be done only at a time when the weapons came under a total ban.

Declined to say whether Russia would walk out of the Geneva talks if the United States refused to accept nuclear explosive transfers in the atmosphere, assuming there is no test ban treaty.

Declared that national inspection systems for detecting nuclear explosive transfers are a police a test ban treaty. This is the heart of the treaty dispute. The United States insists international inspectors must be admitted to the Soviet Union.

1954-Poster Living Cost Boost Urged for Troops

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara proposed today an average 18 1/2 percent cost increase in the basic housing allowances of officers and top enlisted men in the military services. In some cases, the increase would total 66 percent. At the same time, McNamara proposed a new five-year, \$1.5 billion dollar construction program to provide about 70,000 units of military housing. Here are some examples of the proposed higher housing allowances.

A sergeant without dependents now receives \$51.30 a month with one or two dependents he gets \$71.10 and with three or more, \$90.90.

Under the new proposal he would receive \$70.20 without dependents, \$90.00 with one or two dependents and \$110.10 with three or more dependents.

The allowance for a captain without dependents would go from \$85.50 to \$105 a month. With dependents his allowance would increase from \$105.50 to \$126 a month. No distinction is made as to the number of dependents.

That of a full general without dependents would rise from \$130.80 to \$160.20 a month. With dependents, he would go up from \$201 to \$241.

The biggest percentage increase, 66 per cent, would go to sergeants major without dependents. He would rise from \$51.30 a month to \$85.20.

Lower grades of enlisted men earning the same pay would get only a slight housing allowance increase or none at all.

Crippling Strike Hits Algerians as Peace is Signed

ALGIERS, March 19 (AP)—A cease-fire ending the savage 7 1/2-year Algerian nationalist rebellion went into effect at noon today. But the third force in the order of Algerians, the European secret army, struck back with crippling general strikes and terrorist attacks. Vowing to keep Algeria French, the secret army's call for a 24-hour strike halted all but essential services in Algiers and in the second largest city.

The underground army wanted the French fighting was just beginning.

Terrorist attacks erupted in Algiers despite reinforcements of French soldiers and tanks to the city. Gunfire and explosions rang through Oran, where AP correspondent, Rodney Angove said no French troops are in the center of the city. Authorities gave no casualty figures.

Oran, a strategic stronghold, had all communications cut with France by secret army saboteurs, Angove reported. He said all stores were closed. Europeans rallied to the secret army's strike call.

President and Air Algerie canceled all flights from France to Algeria because airport personnel in Algiers and Oran joined the general strike.

Fugitive ex-Gen. Raoul Salan, head of the secret army, ordered the 24-hour strike to begin at noon Sunday even as President Charles de Gaulle was announcing the cease-fire. Salan urged Frenchmen and Moslem alike to forget their differences.

The secret army has opted the cease-fire agreement betrayal, and its announced campaign to bring down the French government brought uneasiness among Algerian nationalists who signed the agreement with France at Evian in July, 1962.

Political Turmoil Seizes Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, March 19 (UPI)—A smashing election victory by followers of former Dictator Juan D. Peron threw Argentina into political turmoil today, forcing resignation of the cabinet and the closing of banks and stock exchanges. The Peronists, supported by communists and guided in election strategy by Peron now in exile in Madrid, swept elections in 20 provinces including important Buenos Aires. Reaction to their surprise sweep was drastic and immediate. The armed forces, which threw Peron out of office seven years ago, immediately demanded the government resign control of the provinces in which the Peronists were victors to nullify the government's actions.

Senate provisional President Jose P. Guido—voted—the presidential proclamation at mid-day, and it is reported he had been summoned to consider an urgent session of congress to provide for a new cabinet. The provinces in which the Peronists triumphed.

An official announcement said the resignation of cabinet members was to enable a government reorganization. However, there were reports some of the ministers would be reappointed immediately.

Peron exploded a bomb at the home of an army official. The mass resignation of the cabinet was not immediately effected. Peronist Arturo Frondizi, however, it faced him with a major political crisis which soon broke down the government.

Peron's fall was preceded by resignation of Interior Minister Alfredo Videla, who quit in protest against the army's attack.

Under intervention, the victorious Peronist candidates would have been named to the cabinet. The government would name so-called intervenors, or military appointees, to assume the reins of provincial government.

Syria Blames Israel After Border War

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Syria charged Israel today with aggression and demanded that the UN take action to end the fighting at the Golan Heights. Israel said it acted in self-defense.

A U.N. mixed armistice commission team was investigating the border fighting. Syria said 1,000 Israelis were killed and Israel said 30 Syrians were slain.

Syrian Ambassador Farid Choukri charged Israel with aggression in a letter to the Security Council. He said the UN should take action to end the fighting at the Golan Heights. He said the UN should take action to end the fighting at the Golan Heights.

The Israeli action was taken in accordance with Israel's legitimate right of self-defense and the responsibility of a government to protect the life and property of its citizens and the stability of its state.

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Single Slate Is on Ballot of Russians

MOSCOW, March 19 (AP)—An estimated 175-million-voter electorate cast ballots for a single slate of communist-approved candidates for the Soviet parliament.

Based on past performance, more than 90 per cent of the voters are expected to approve the single slate.

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New Bill Will Help Pay for Boys' Ranch

Sen. Henry Dworkin has introduced a bill in the senate recommending that the 2,560-acre Idaho Youth Ranch be considered federal land.

The ranch first acquired the land north of Rupert by special act in 1925. The land has been paid for at a rate of \$4 per acre, which is \$150 more than the fee now in effect for the purchase of recreational and school sites from the Department of the Interior.

Dworkin's resolution would take advantage of the lower price asked for the land, according to a purchase public land sites for park and recreational purposes for \$2.50 an acre.

Taxes Relief Bill Has OK By Senators

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—The senate today approved a tax relief bill which would provide a 10 percent reduction in the top rate on income over \$100,000.

At about the same time President Kennedy asked congress to pass a bill to provide relief for storm-ravaged areas.

Primary beneficiaries would be taxpayers in the states of California, Texas, and Florida in 1962.

The senate measure, proposed by Sen. John F. Williams, R., Del., was passed by a 70-20 vote.

The bill would allow persons in disaster areas to deduct from their 1961 tax returns the amount of uninsured losses in the disaster areas. The losses covered include:

- Both individuals and businesses also would benefit under the White House proposal.
- The bulk of the money—\$5 billion—would be used to provide assistance to state and local governments in New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky and Idaho.

Second Trial Is Overruled

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—The supreme court today ruled that once a U.S. district court judge orders acquittal in a criminal case there can be no retrial even if the judge made a conspicuous bad error.

The pronouncement was in an unopposed opinion which upheld the action of U.S. Circuit court of appeals.

Wyzanski directed acquittal of the Standard Oil Products Company, Inc., which had been convicted in North Dighton, Mass., and two of its employees, Fred P. and Robert E. K. K.

The supreme court reversed a decision of the U.S. circuit court of appeals.

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Spokane Blast Cause Checked

SPOKANE, March 19 (AP)—Spokane gunpowder may have caused a week-end explosion here that destroyed three buildings and injured 22 persons.

Investigators said today a natural gas leak first thought to be the cause of the explosion that killed the entire city now appears a less likely possibility.

Officials said, however, there was conclusive evidence that gunpowder caused the blast and several other possibilities were under investigation.

At least one man was killed in the explosion, but of the 20 persons injured, 19 remained hospitalized. Their condition was reported less than critical.

Increased Aid Is Slated for Pacific Isles

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—President Kennedy today granted more self-help grants to the Pacific islands, and intended to eventually return sovereignty over the one-time European territories to Japan.

Kennedy also called for increased U.S. aid to Okinawa and other islands, which are still in the island's economic and social development.

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Many Backs Tariff Plans In Testimony

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—AFT-IO President George Meany today testified before the House subcommittee on the administration's trade revision bill.

He said the benefits from increased exports would be realized through the sale of goods and services.

At the same time, Meany suggested that the bill should be put into formal order many steps that already had been in practice.

University President Warns Students on Mountain Peril

President Ernest L. Wilkinson of Brigham Young University warned students not to climb rugged mountains Sunday after a 23-year-old freshman plunged 250 feet to his death.

It was one of two falling accidents in the state over the week-end.

Phyllis Egan, 20, was hospitalized during surgery Sunday, a hospital spokesman reported.

Wilkinson said the government should do more to warn students of the mountain peril.

Mrs. Kennedy Is Making Progress

HOBART, March 19 (AP)—President Kennedy's wife, Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, is making progress in her recovery from a pelvic fracture.

The statement was made by a spokesman at St. Elizabeth's hospital. The spokeswoman said Mrs. Kennedy is convalescing "very nicely" and is spending her time reading and sorting her mail.

6 Idahoans Are Killed In Mishaps

Two drownings and a plane crash claimed the lives of six Idaho residents this week.

Four members of a Napra family were killed Saturday night when their light plane crashed in a cornfield, two miles north of the city farming community.

The victims were identified as pilot Samuel L. Stringer, 30; his wife, Arlen Kent Stringer, 30; their 12-year-old son, Randy Stringer, and David, 14.

The plane was flying low over the Ira Wade farm, just across the road from the farm of Mrs. Stringer's parents.

Investigators are still responsible for the deaths of two youngsters.

Explorer Scouts Take Dog From Crevasse at Canyon

MURTAUGH, March 19—A dog, trapped since Thursday in a deep crevasse along Snake River canyon about four miles north of Murtaugh, was rescued about 11:15 P.m. Saturday after nearly three hours of work by 12 Explorer Scouts from post 101 of the Murtaugh LDS church.

Kenneth Sorenson, post Explorer leader, said Monday morning that the dog, which apparently wandered off the road adjacent to the canyon and fell into the 300-foot deep split in the ground, "was very resistant about coming out." He noted that the dog was "real vicious" when the boys hauled him out of the crevasse.

After wrapping several ropes around the dog, a German short-haired pointer, the Scouts were able to hoist the dog out of the crevasse. "Don Berthel," "Alan Oberkay" managed to corner the dog and get one rope around his midsection. But the animal bit the rope in half.

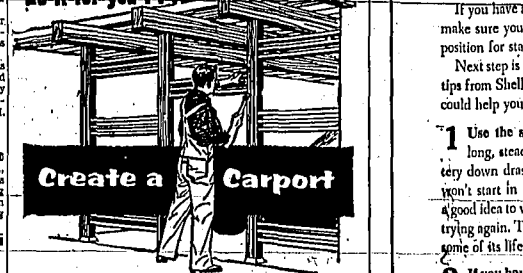
Murtaugh residents had been throwing food to the dog since he was discovered Thursday by Perkins. Sorenson noted that the dog had plenty of food, including five pounds of dog food thrown to him Saturday by one of the boys.

It took about two hours for the boys to get down into the crevasse and about one hour of "good solid digging" to get into a little cave that the dog backed into.

- 1 Use the starter in short bursts.** A long, steady grinding runs your battery down drastically. In fact, if the car won't start in the first few attempts, it's a good idea to wait several minutes before trying again. This lets the battery recover some of its life.

VATICAN CITY, March 19 (AP)—Pope John XXIII created 10 new cardinals today and at the same time spoke sorrowfully of the "new slavery" being established in some regions of the world ruled by communism.

The pope addressed a secret assembly of 29 members of the College of Cardinals who concurred in his new selections to their ranks. It was the first in a series of ceremonies which will culminate in a public consistory in St. Peter's Basilica Thursday at which the pontiff will name the broad-brimmed galero—the hat symbol of the cardinal's rank—on the head of each new prince of the church.

The appointments raised the sacred college to an all-time high of 57 members.

In his address to the consistory, the 80-year-old ruler of the Roman Catholic church expressed profound sorrow for the condition of the church in countries where, he said, it suffered troublous difficulties and where human freedoms were lacking.
