Algerian Fighting Flares Up

ALGIERS, March 21 (AP)—A savage street battle between French troops and right-wing European secret army guerrillas broke out in the heart of Oran today and repeated rounds of gunfire blasted the working quarter of Bab el Oued in Algiers. A number of persons were wounded, or killed.

The shooting shattered a quiet that had prevailed up to 11:00 p.m. in Oran after nearly two days of bloody clashes in the wake of a cease-fire proclaimed between France and the Algerian nationalists.

The battle in Oran was the first open clash reported there between French government forces and the secret army since the cease-fire. The secret army is determined to keep Algeria French.

In Algiers, round after round of gunfire was heard in Bab el Oued, scene of frequent trouble. A curfew was ordered in the quarter and thousands of people fled to their homes indoors.

The French said at noon there had been no reports of clashes between French units and Moroccan soldiers in the North African territory.

The army said "localized effectiveness" of Moroccan crowds continued in a number of cities but that "all demonstrations are being handled peacefully."

The announcement was in sharp contrast to the 10-hour shouting Monday's cease-fire proclamation in which nearly 150 were wounded by the gunfire of French troops and European extremists.

Defense Unit Clears Paper For Soldiers

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—The defense department has decided after an investigation to permit a private defense newspaper overseas weekly on army newsstands in Europe, it was announced today.

A spokesman said the decision was made by Gen. Lauris Norstad, commander in chief for Europe. The decision was approved by Defense Secretary Robert B. McNamara.

The newspaper program would be similar to the removal of Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker from command of the 25th Infantry Division. Army officials have said it would allow them to see and sensationalism.

The spokesman said that "it was a step toward a more open and free press in the weekly since last June. Norstad decided there was not sufficient clear justification for its removal."

Norstad plans to take no action unless the content of the weekly falls to "objectionable levels," the spokesman said.

The decision was conveyed to the senate subcommittee investigating the charges of military censorship before the House. The committee is hearing accusations against the overseas weekly were aired.

Pocatello, Alameda Okay Consolidation

POCATELLO, March 21 (AP)—Pocatello and Alameda voted Tuesday to consolidate and become the largest city in Idaho, while the village of Chubbuck decided to go it alone. Pocatello voters favored the proposal overwhelmingly but Alameda voters passed it by only a slim margin. It needed a majority in both cities. The decision by the voters in the two largest cities involved in the consolidation will give Pocatello a population of 39,194, a merger of Pocatello and Alameda would have approximately 36,000, and Idaho Falls with 33,163.

The new city will combine the 28,834 population of Pocatello and the 10,600 population of Alameda.

Chubbuck, with 1,500 citizens, rejected the proposal to combine with the two larger adjoining cities.

Consolidation of Pocatello and Alameda will not become official for at least 90 days. The ballot is to be held in Pocatello in charge of the consolidation procedure, must wait at least that long before it can call an election of seven new Pocatello commissioners. The union of cities would be official at that point.

The vote on consolidation is expected to take place on July 1. Pocatello voted 4,040 to 320 in favor of merging with Alameda and 3,943 to 249 in favor of uniting with Chubbuck.

But consolidation requires mutual consent of a majority of voters in each city participating in a proposed consolidation. Chubbuck turned down approval by a vote of 215 against and 147 in favor.

Alameda voters agreed to consolidate by a scant 59 votes. Official returns from Alameda showed 1,410 in favor and 1,351 against.

Under Idaho consolidation law, approval by Alameda and Pocatello means a new city will be created under the ordinance and name of the larger party to the union—in this case Pocatello.

Taylor Mulling Race Decision

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 21 (AP)—Former Sen. Glen Taylor of Idaho said today he still was undecided whether to seek the post held by Sen. Frank Church, D., Idaho.

"I still haven't made up my mind whether to be a candidate," said Taylor, adding "I still have some things to think about."

First Lady Greeted by Big Crowds

LAHORE, Pakistan, March 21 (AP)—Pakistan welcomed Jacqueline Kennedy today with a carnival-like reception that brought out the country's president and thousands of school children.

The U. S. First Lady landed at Lahore airport in the early afternoon to begin a six-day tour of the Asian ally of the United States. She was greeted by President Mohammed Ayub Khan and hundreds of young Pakistanis waving flags and carrying bouquets.

Thousands on thousands of tiny paper flags were strung across Mrs. Kennedy's 3-mile route from the airport to the government house where she was to stay. Welcome banners greeted the route, and school-children lined the way.

An almost crowd of about 6,000 persons broke into applause as Mrs. Kennedy, dressed in a sunshiny one-piece suit and hat, stepped from the silver plane to greet President Ayub Khan and receive bouquets of roses from three children.

Ayub Khan's personal plane brought Mrs. Kennedy from New Delhi after she ended a nine-day tour of India with the death of the Indian public and the prison of officials ringing in her ears.

Nehru said that her visit to India has been "of considerable success. It has been very much an almost creditable. It is expected that the visit would contribute to further improvement of Indo-American relations."

Famed Name Joining Bay State Roster

BOSTON, March 21 (AP)—Another famed name was added today to the star-studded cast seeking a U. S. senate seat from Massachusetts.

The latest candidate is Harvard history professor H. Stuart Hughes, 45, grandson of the late philosopher Charles Evans Hughes.

Hughes said he will announce his candidacy next week as an independent. His grandfather was the Republican nominee for president in 1916. Prof. Hughes said he could join a Republican but more Democrat than anything else.

Khrushchey Agrees to Cooperation With U.S. In Space Exploration

MOSCOW, March 21 (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchey sent a message today to President Kennedy agreeing to cooperate in exploring space. He said immediate cooperation was possible in the use of artificial satellites for long distance communication. Further he proposed close cooperation in the use of space ships in weather forecasting. The message was read over Moscow radio.

Kennedy had proposed to Khrushchey that the two powers cooperate in various space programs such as communications—the tracking of satellites—the use of space ships in weather forecasting and the launching of the Earth's magnetic field.

The Soviet premier said it was "desirable to have an international agreement to insure closer cooperation in use of space ships and particularly in giving greater security to astronauts."

Khrushchey suggested the two nations get together in launching observation rockets to the moon and planets.

This letter said all countries should have equal opportunities for space exploration. Therefore, the Soviet government suggested a series of joint research ventures including: Use of artificial Earth satellites for a long distance communication system.

Organization of a worldwide weather observation service using satellites.

Organization observations, both radio and optical, under a joint program of objects launched in the direction of the moon, Mars, Venus and other planets.

Poofing of efforts in the study of the physical and interplanetary space and celestial bodies.

Syrian Jets Battle With Israeli Craft

JERUSALEM, March 21 (AP)—Syrian and Israeli warplanes clashed today and a Syrian spokesman said one Israeli fighter fled from a dog fight in flames.

Each nation accused the other of violating its air space in this follow-up to hostilities launched for an eight-hour battle in the Golan Heights area Saturday.

An Israeli military spokesman said Syrian planes penetrated Israeli air space for the second day in a row, but were driven off by Israeli fighters.

A Syrian spokesman charged that four Israeli planes flew into Syrian territory, where they were intercepted by fighters of that Arab nation.

"Our planes quickly went up against them and scored a hit on one of the Israeli aircraft," he said. "This Israeli plane was seen in flames returning to Palestinian territory."

The Syrians use Russian-made MIG-17s. The Israeli fighters are French Mystere jets.

Smylie Charges New Frontier Tried to Buy West's Loyalty

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., March 21 (AP)—Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smylie asserted Tuesday night that expenditures by the federal government are being made in "a gross attempt to purchase an allegiance that the West has already rejected."

The Idaho chief executive said that John Bailey, Democratic national chairman, next week "is coming to my state to give us instructions in proper obedience along the new frontier." "He may even grow so bold as to tell us," Smylie added in an address prepared for a meeting of the Los Angeles county Republican central committee "that we better vote right if we want to get things from Washington."

"But all this new frontier campaigning will not disguise the fact that most of the West has been misunderstood, overlooked and forgotten by this administration. New frontier emphasis on nonwestern areas will not be remembered when the voters of the West go to the polls in November."

"It is big federal spending and the chief claim that it has its hands in the lunch bucket of the northwest timber workers and they know it and I think they will remember."

Smylie predicted Republican campaign "will see a general election next fall. We can continue control of the legislature," he said, "because we are losing ground. No leader now looks any better as a result of federal government action than it has in 1960."

"For the first time in 65 years there have been no new reclamation projects in this country. There hasn't even been a start on a flood control project.... This isn't discrimination. It's a matter of understanding the needs of the mountain West."

Secretary of State Dean Rusk informed American allies he has been unable to detect any relaxation in the Soviet Soviet demands on Berlin.

A meeting of the chief nuclear test ban negotiators of the U. S. Britain and France was attended by the 17-nation general disarmament conference to report by west and whether there is any hope of agreement now-ended with each side replying that the other is unwilling to give an inch.

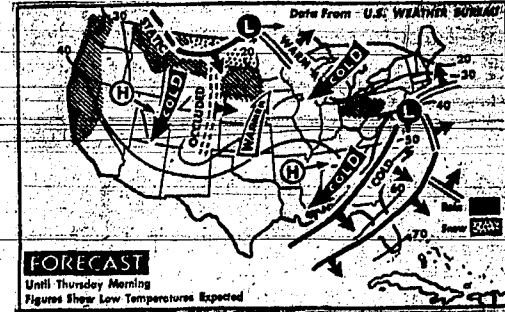

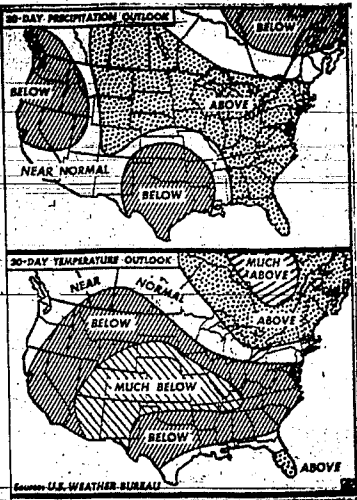

MOBILE, Ala., March 21 (AP)—The training of 23 telephone operators into a uniformed, proficient machine-gun unit was viewed today as "just a hobby" of the girl's debonair, bachelor boss.

"Just like you like golf and I like fishing, he likes fooling around with firearms," said Mayor Henry Carson about John McClellan Snook, 42-year-old vice president and general manager of the Gulf Telephone company.

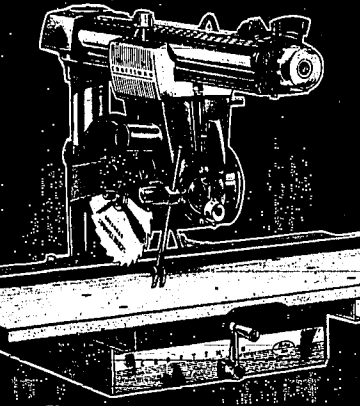

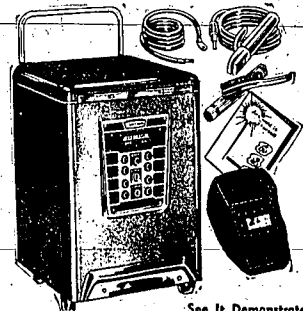

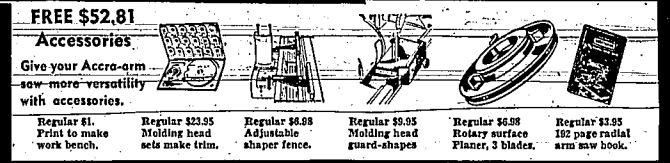

**Unusual Show**

Shoshone falls is spilling water again in a display that will become increasingly unusual with each new step in Idaho reclamation. When Palisades dam was finished, there was a good chance of present amount water. At the time, river experts declared water would spill over Shoshone falls from time to time in the future, depending to a large degree on the snowpack at the headwaters and the type of runoff.

The same question can be expected to arise each time in the future when another dam is completed and the same answer can be expected. But with each increase in water storage capacity above Milner dam, the frequency of the Shoshone falls display is bound to diminish. When the display is over, most of the snowpack runoff can be contained in reservoir or be used immediately for irrigation, then the magnificent Shoshone falls show will be virtually ended. Only on rare occasions will runoff water cover the falls when river development means that there is no water available.

Because of drought conditions that have prevailed for several years, even the present show at Shoshone falls is rather unusual. As a result, traffic has been picking up at the falls as residents drive out for a look. Prospects are good that the display will improve at least until the start of irrigation, then a good deal of the water presently flowing over the falls will be diverted at Milner dam.

Later in the year, the show at Shoshone falls could return to its former beauty for a few days as the watered runoff comes from the Palisades and Jackson Lake and Palisades reservoir. Even without water, Shoshone falls, and the rugged canyon setting constitute a mighty attraction, one that Valley residents should never believe to strangers with the "disappearing" explanation. But they're not. Improvement at least the scene is impressive, as many visitors have declared in the past.

The rugged canyon scenery, attractive park and the unusual setting speak quite well for themselves. Let's not belittle the falls when they're dry and make the most of them when they're flowing. Let's never forget that early-day tourists rode the stagecoach from Shoshone specifically to see the "Niagara of the West."

**YOUTH RANCH BOOST**

While the Idaho Youth Ranch was still only a name, it had four sections of sagebrush cleared and a debt of \$64,000. Now part of that land has been developed, wells have been drilled for irrigation, part of the land has been cleared and a handful of boys are living at the ranch. A dream of having a place to go to for society is starting to take shape.

For the past several months, directors of the Idaho Youth Ranch have been working on the first of several permanent housing units. The building is designed to house 10 to 12 boys and foster parents to give them a home life until they are old enough to live on their own. All the spare funds available have gone into the housing unit in addition to a good deal of donated labor. Yet the building isn't ready to be occupied yet.

By April 1, the ranch has to make a payment of \$2,500 to the state, the federal government. The original debt of \$64,000 resulted from the price of \$25 specified in the act of congress that transferred four sections of sagebrush as a site for the ranch.

But last July the government announced a new program of public lands. Now the going price for non-profit organizations, such as the Idaho Youth Ranch is only \$2.50 per acre, one-tenth of the original price. Youth Ranch directors have made four payments of \$1 per acre, or a total of \$10,240. Unless congress takes some speedy action, another \$2,500 will be paid by April 1.

Labor department spokesmen said that they had simply "counseled" visiting Tokyo union leaders who explained the effect of collective bargaining under government supervision in this country. They also explained that they never volunteered this aid to foreign union officials. It was given, they said, only on request.

LABOR ATTACHE'S JOBS—When it was pointed out that American workers would protest against such interference in our economic operations, they minimized this danger. They said the foreign governments and industrialists were aware of the labor department's co-operation with the union movements in their various countries.

### Proposed Sale of Drawing Creates Furor in Britain

LONDON, March 21 (AP)—The Royal Academy needed money so it decided to sell one of its treasures—a drawing by Leonardo da Vinci worth 2.8 million dollars to some rich American museum.

The academy's decision without the aroused British public—has been a "stunning" revelation since the British public had shown "little" interest in the drawing for the 100 years it has been in the academy's possession.

"Tomorrow, mounting up in press, in parliament, on television and radio will culminate in an emergency meeting of royal academicians to decide whether to withdraw the drawing from an auction scheduled for June 15.

The nation's greatest living artists, astonished by the outcry over their ancient efforts to buy their own way as the Royal Academy has done since it was founded, are expected to set a price on the drawing so that Britons can pool their pounds and pennies and keep it safe within these shores.

And away from the grasping Americans.

The academicians—Sir Winston Churchill is one of them—will probably place a price of 21 million dollars on the drawing.

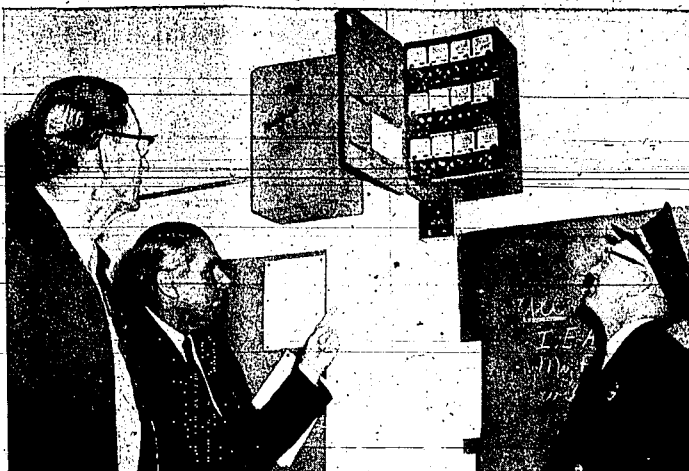

# Fire Alarm System Installed At T.F. Junior High School

A new type of fire alarm system has been installed in the Twin Falls junior high school building, announces Ernie Ragland, superintendent of school district 411.

The system, which was installed Saturday, is all automatic and is hooked directly to the Twin Falls fire department, states E. R. Budge, Burley, district manager of the Notifier corporation, manufacturer of the system.

The control box has eight lights representing eight areas in the building. When a fire breaks out in a room, light or closet, one of the lights will light up, Budge said.

In each room there is a detector which, when activated by an increase of 15 degrees per minute will set off the alarm. Budge said there are 400 detectors in the building. In the case of the detector, fire 20 feet apart and in hallways they are 40 feet apart.

The alarm system has a battery stand by in case of power failure. When the electricity is cut off, the system automatically switches to the battery for power. Budge states: "When the electricity is turned back on, the system automatically switches back to AC current."

Budge said this is the third such system installed in Idaho public schools. He said he has installed one in Idaho Falls, Lincoln and Bickel schools, will have the system installed within the next few weeks, he added.

MILNER, March 21—Evan Burley, Baker, Taylor and Mrs. Burley, will be "adopted" by some of the residents of the area for the purpose of donating blood to him.

Evan was born Feb. 22, 1955, and is a first grade student in the Dvorzhak school at Burley.

Before Evan started receiving gamma globulin shots he spent considerable time in and out of many doctors' offices before it finally was determined he had a lack of antibodies in his blood. This lack of antibodies leaves him with a very definite inability to resist germ attacks in any form.

From May until August, 1951, Evan did not have to take any shots, but after that time it was decided that he would have them once a week. He received three cc's of gamma globulin a week, which is the equivalent of one and one-half pints of blood.

Evan is but one of many people in Magic Valley each year who benefit from the Red Cross blood program. No charge is made to the patient by the Red Cross for the blood donated but the hospital, clinics, or doctors may charge a fee to administer the local points out.

The Red Cross blood program is but one of the many features of the Red Cross in Cassia county. Its existence depends upon the people who so willingly donate their time and blood to the cause. Reports Farnum Warr, director.

# Wildlife Week Spotting Spring Thoughts of Trout

Gov. Robert Smylie has joined other governors and mayors across the land in setting aside this week as National Wildlife Week. Their proclamations are timed to spotlight the week that includes the first official day of spring, the vernal equinox that makes sportsmen's fancies turn to thoughts of opening day on good trout waters.

These are the words of first prize winner Joanne Perce, student at Parma high school, who adds, "Most people are aware that not all citizens consider this. A few are willing to put good outdoor manners into practice."

She answers her own rhetorical question as follows:

"The general public can be made aware of our outdoor manners by greater publicity on hunting facilities and proper disposal of first aid kits and punishments should be levied against the axonal. It's the same, and the literature. Perhaps the best way to encourage proper conduct could be prepared by the Fish and Game department and handed out on outdoor hunting license. Maybe an examination similar to that for obtaining a driver's license."

# Water Depth In Reservoir Near Normal

**BULLH**, March 21—Mishel Gray, said Monday that Bureau of Reclamation reservoirs in the region are showing normal filling for this date.

Gray stated that Jackson Lake, with a capacity of 247,000 acre feet, is 157,000 acre feet to date. Palisades, with capacity of 1,200,000 acre feet, has 65,500 acre feet in storage.

Island Park reservoir, on the north fork of the Snake river, with a capacity of 127,000 acre feet, has 68,000.

Lake Walcott, at Minidoka dam, is 100,000 acre feet to date. Gray said this precaution was taken in order to protect the dam from surging ice flows which might damage the control works.

Gray suggests that a trip down to the Shoshone or Twin falls reservoirs would be worthwhile. The flow over the falls is now 3,500 second feet. This amount of water going over the falls is one of the marvels of the Snake river, he added.

Gray stated that Jackson Lake, Island Park, American Falls and Walcott reservoirs will fill this season and that Palisades, which has accumulated at least 900,000 acre feet, before the end of the 1962 storage season.

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# Duty Hiked On Carpets

**WASHINGTON**, March 21 (AP)—President Kennedy has ordered to increase import duties on carpets and certain kinds of carpet tiles on ceramic mosaic tile and household glass tiles.

Kennedy, in announcing the decision Monday, accepted tariff commission recommendations to increase the duty on white, yellow and velvet or other woven imports from 21 to 40 per cent of their value.

Increase the duty on cylinder, crown and sheet glass to amounts ranging from 13 to 25 cents.

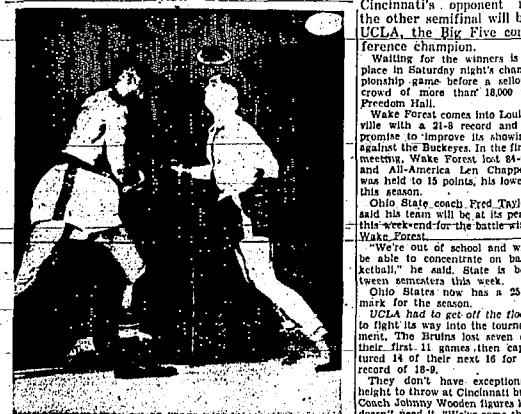

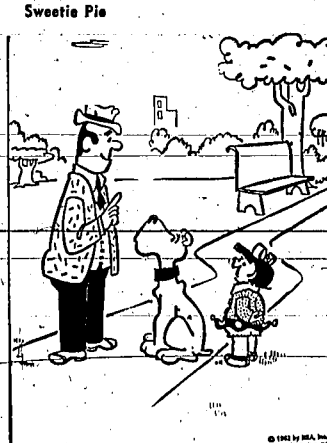
