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Berlin Tour Is Topic for Hansen Talk

A recent tour of NATO bases in Europe and a comparison of the Berlin of today with the Berlin of a few years ago, were outlined by state Rep. Ova Hansen, R., Bonnaville, during the Wednesday noon luncheon in the Regency Hotel Roundup room.

He noted that the Berlin of a few days some months ago was a very busy city. He mentioned the six common market countries in Europe and how the countries' economic growth has more than doubled that of the United States because there are no economic barriers between the European countries.

He noted that this common market situation has helped make NATO a really effective defense weapon, by making the countries closer.

Hansen, who is a candidate for the Republican nomination in the second district congressmen, noted that there is a "high degree of cooperation at the military level" in the European countries.

He pointed out that during the trip he spent a few hours behind the iron curtain in East Berlin, and he said that the tall, thin, lucky United States is just by "watching them watching you."

He explained the geography of Berlin and told of a helicopter trip along the 25-mile long wall, which separates the two sections of the city. He noted that there are memorials along the sidewalk on the west or free side of the wall, explaining that the wreaths and memorials were placed along the wall by relatives of East Berliners who have died trying to escape.

"One of the great tragedies of the wall," he noted, "was the West Berliners having to watch while their brothers seized themselves in."

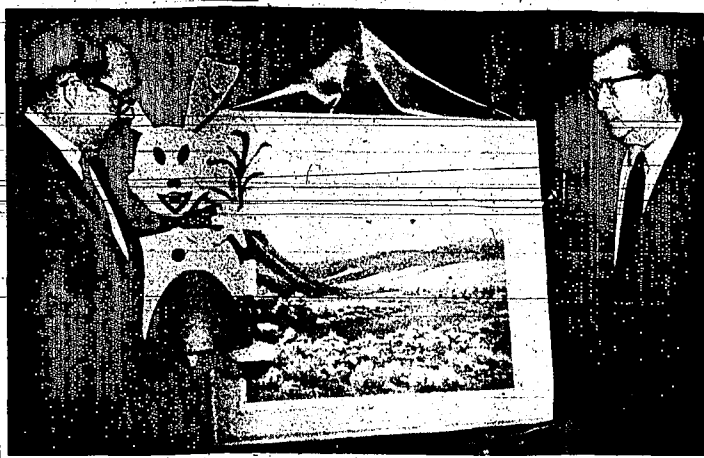

WASHINGTON, March 22—Selective calls of voters scattered in their districts today by the house of representatives—far more conservative than the senate—today toward President Kennedy's legislative program and related issues.

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MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, March 22—Whether President De Gaulle can restore a law and order in Algeria and in France itself with the signing of the Algerian ceasefire is the question that has politicians here.

As recent history has shown, terror as a political weapon all too invariably goes the way to greater terror and eventually to the destruction of what the terrorists were theoretically destroying.

With order restored, France same and whole can take its rightful place again in the new Europe. An extraordinary fact is that, despite the civil disorder, the economy has not collapsed.

Such a small margin of order would seem to be essential to restore the balance of order, but without the strength of the margin France cannot recover.

The same neurotic suspicion has seemed to condition the French attitude toward the European economic community and any intimation of its evolution toward a supra-national authority.

What follows the first step of a cease-fire taken after long and painful delays, is of paramount importance. The great danger is that the cease-fire will be merely a temporary truce.

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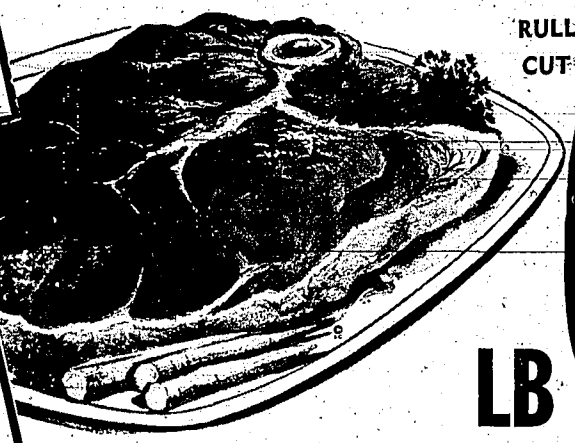

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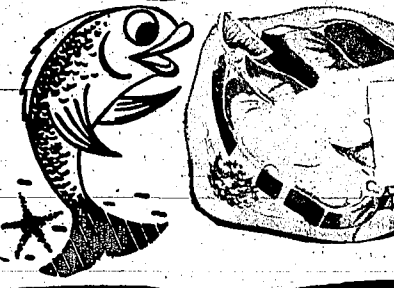

With fryers, poultry counters also feature broilers, stewing chickens, turkeys, freezer chickens will be wide in stock. Turkeys in light of growing evidence that recent low prices were temporary.
Pork buys include the traditional spring hams, plus roasts, chops and bacon.
At beef trays, chuck cuts seem to be the most generally attractive.
Lentil meat planners will again find good main course possibilities at fish and seafood departments.

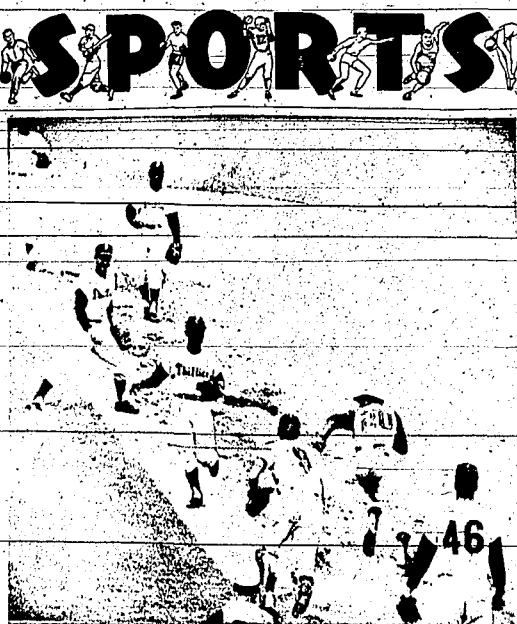

The player had reported to school officials—who relayed the information to the district attorney's office—that the gambler told him other players were throwing games and it would be an easy way to make \$100.

Silver's investigators tried to make contact with the bowling alley stranger but were unable to do so, the spokesman said.

Two young detectives were then sent to Erasmus Hall and other high schools to pose as student spectators at games to pick up information.

"They attended the recent public school athletic league tournament at Madison Square garden, mingled with the high school crowd in the lobby. The D.A.'s spokesman said the investigation was continuing.

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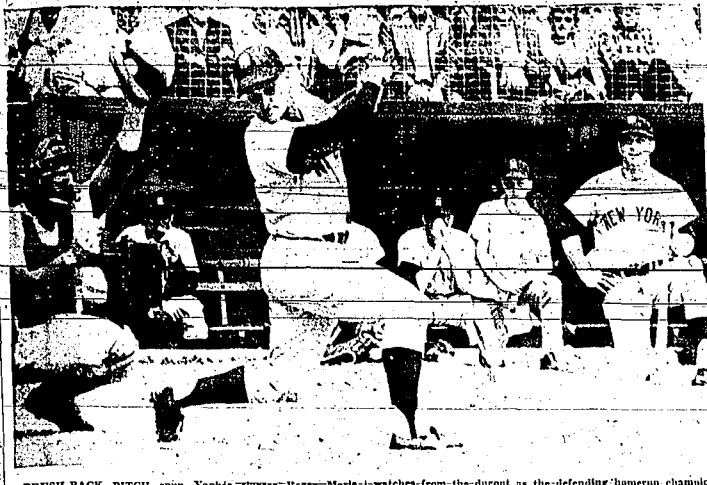

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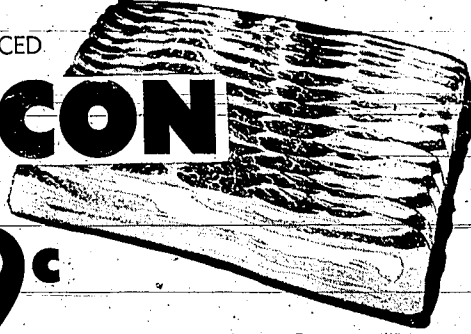
