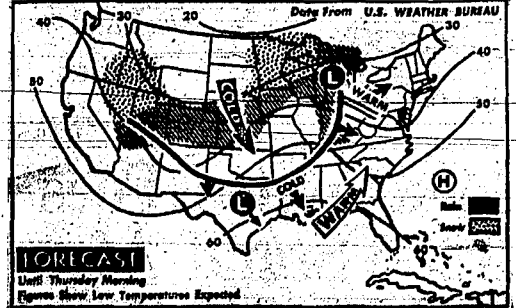

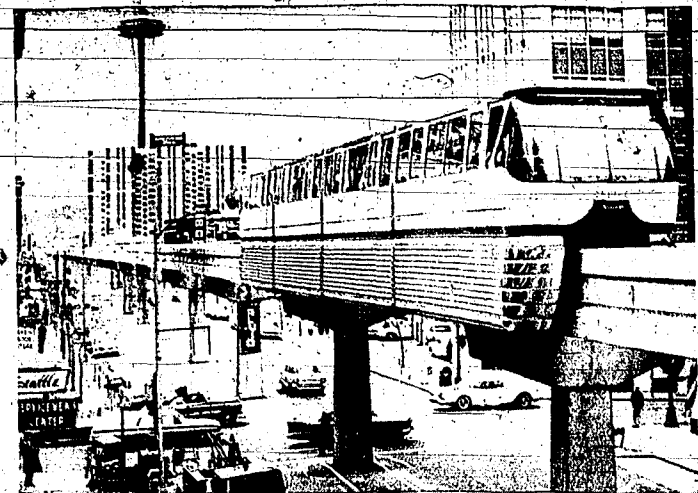

Burley Sells Water, Sewer Bonds to Utah Company

BURLEY, March 28—At a city council meeting in Burley this week the sale of \$500,000 in water and sewer revenue bonds to Edward L. Burion company, Salt Lake City, was authorized.

The sale will provide funds with which the city plans to improve and extend the municipal water system, water treatment plant and sewage collection system along with construction of a new sewage treatment plant.

Richard Fox, a representative of the winning company, told council members the company was offering a lower average cost than Idaho Falls, Twin Falls and Almada for the bid it recently accepted on the sewer bonds.

Apparent low bidder accepted announced by the council for laying the entire new sewer trunk line, including a pumping station and treatment plant, was Davis Construction, Provo, Utah at \$564,564.

There was a difference of \$14,712 between the Edward L. Burion company bid and the next best bid interest offer. There was about \$26,000 difference between the low and high bids.

In other action, the council decided that plumbers or property owners should be allowed to dig to property lines before city crews make the sewer connections. It also was decided that connections to the sewer line would cost the property owner just labor and materials and not the \$60 charge for a new hookup to the line.

Ben Danale, city clerk, was directed by Burley councilmen to draft a letter to the state highway board accepting an offer to construct an interchange between Alfresco road and the interstate interchange just north on the Paul highway.

The state highway board decided to provide a street opening on the east side of the highway to coincide with the existing dedicated street. City officials and property owners contended the dedicated street crossing arrangement would provide better service for the area as well as facilitate the movement of live ambulances, police and other emergency vehicles.

The strip affected runs from the Jerome Cooperative creamery to just beyond the Snake River bowl.

Need for Energetic Fight Against Communism Noted by Speaker Here

"People must face the realization that communism is winning, and Americans must do something about it," asserted Evelyn E. White, Boise, noted authority on the subject of communism, to a crowd of more than 300 persons gathered Tuesday evening in the Twin Falls junior high school auditorium.
According to William Ginn, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, "White has had extensive study and training in communist philosophy and conspiracy as it relates itself to the people of the United States."
He also noted that White is a former clergyman and is presently associated with a life insurance firm in Boise, adding that he has addressed schools, church and civic organizations in 48 of the 50 states.
In his speech White said, "Communists are what they say they are and it is a shame that people don't understand or have a misconception about what they are doing."
He asserted, "Communism is not a political system, it is a way of life, a religion that is fundamentally atheistic," he added. "Their god is materialism and conquest of the world; for the communist way of life."
He stated that communists in America were active on 13 different fronts, among which are agriculture, science, education, religion and government. He also noted that the U.S. Attorney general's office lists 475 subversive or communist-affiliated organizations active in America today.
In closing White said, "Americans must learn that communist leaders throughout the world are brilliant and educated men who are bent on creating chaos in the world to eventually bring about world conquest by communism."

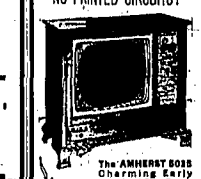

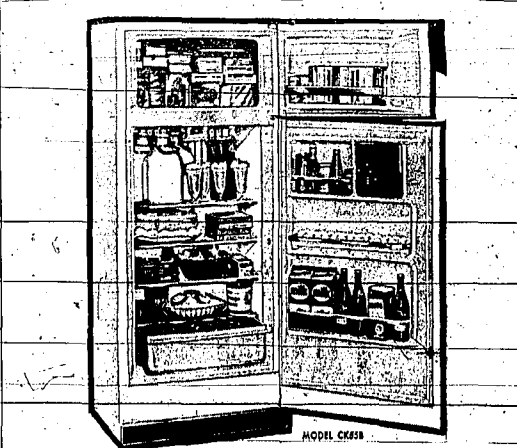

News Around Idaho

 Black ice was reported on Idaho highways today and there was a reported snow slide on roadways in some areas. Generally, state police reported, major highways were free of snow and dry. Black ice was listed on roadways in the Coeur d'Alene, Kellogg and Lewiston areas. There was snow and slush at Grangeville and U. S. 10 at Lookout pass and U. S. 85 at Whitebird hill. There were snow-covered and slick spots on highways in the Twin Falls area, and U. S. 20 to the east and U. S. 101 to the north were snow covered and slick. Floodplaters covered U. S. highway 30N in the Bancroft area but traffic was going through.

SOUFFLE ROTHSCHILD
(Makes 4 to 6 servings)
1/2 Cup red maraschino cherries, finely chopped (about 2 cherries)
1/2 cup kirsch or maraschino cherry juice
Butter
Sugar
3 tablespoons sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
4 egg yolks
2 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons vanilla
5 egg whites
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup red maraschino cherries, sliced for garnish (about 10 cherries)

Blend 1/2 cup chopped cherries and kirsch or maraschino cherry juice together. Let stand 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Prepare a collar-of-wax paper to go around a 7-inch souffle dish or adapted the original Paris recipe into an American version for the gala Easter dinner.

Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add egg yolks, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in 2-2 tablespoons butter. Drain cherries, reserving liquid. Add liquid, with vanilla, to souffle mixture and beat well. Beat egg whites and salt until soft-peak form. Add 1-1/2 tablespoons sugar and beat until stiff. Gently fold into souffle mixture.

Four 1/2 mixture into prepared dish and sprinkle with chopped cherries. Cover with remaining mixture. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F) 30 to 35 minutes. Garnish with 1/4 cup sliced maraschino cherries, as desired.

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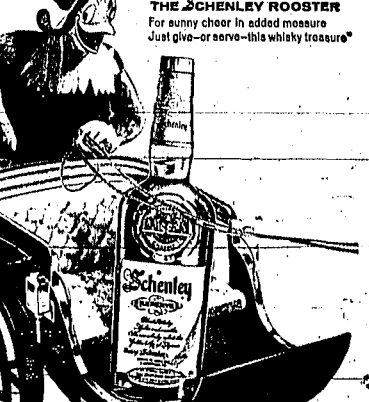

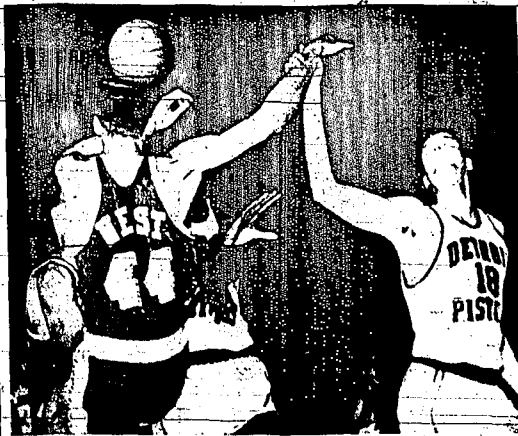

"A cure is possible with patience. I hope we can now get along with the job to the end that the only true international sport is preserved from emotional annihilation. "Larson noted that only a month ago the boxing education and research foundation was incorporated to thoroughly study and arrive at solutions of boxing's ills. "He said a uniform safety code involving all aspects of health and safety for fighters has been given a top priority."

Brown Assails Pro Boxing as 'Rotten, Dirty'

SAN FRANCISCO, March 28 (AP)—Gov. Edmund G. Brown Tuesday learned boxing is "dirty, rotten and brutalizing sport" and said he would ask the California legislature to abolish it. Brown said he was certain the matter of abolishing boxing would be a subject at the next general session of the lawmakers. "I've been against boxing for 20 years. Brown said, "It's a dirty, rotten and brutalizing sport not only to the fighters but to the spectators. One of these days it will be abolished and I hope soon."

The governor was commenting on Saturday night's welterweight championship fight in which ex-champion Benny Parett suffered critical brain injuries. "However," he added later, "I have no plans at this time to ask for abolition of boxing in California, where I think the sport is handled as well as it can be. 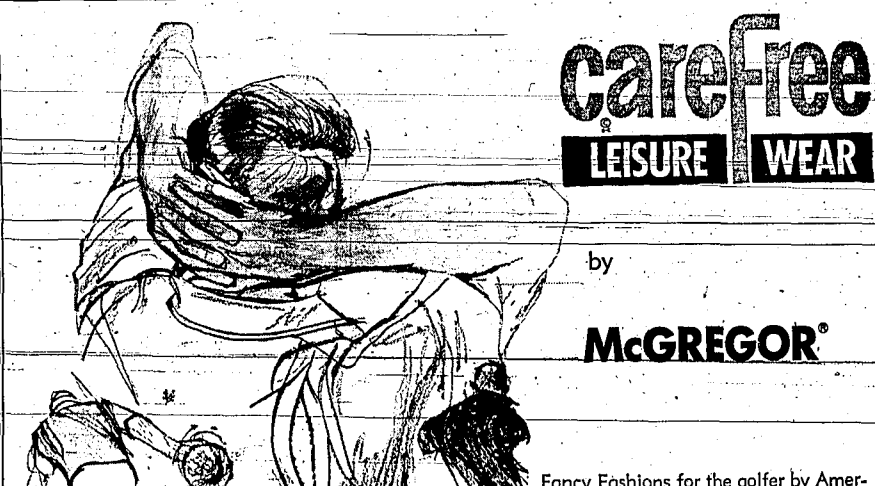

Supreme Court Ruling Will Set Off Legislative Meets

By The Associated Press
A supreme court ruling that a new federal court is to be set up in the state's legislature is expected to set off a series of legislative sessions in many states. One suit was filed within two hours after the decision was handed down Monday.

After 25 days the supreme court clerk notifies the special judge in Nashville that it has authority to act on complaints. The special court will hold a trial to give complaining voters an opportunity to try to prove their claims.

His argument is an old one. Many states have such suits pending. But the city voters had never taken them today in their long fight to prod rural representatives out of some of their seats in order to get more representation for themselves.

Because of Monday's decision, their hopes were higher. In the supreme court said that "counts ought not to enter the political bucket. The count for unfairness in districting is to secure state legislatures that will support a man's case in cities is worth much less than that of a country voter."

The case had to do with Tennessee, where there has been no reapportionment in 40 years. The decision had meaning in many other states.

In Pennsylvania a watchdog group called the committee of seventy, declared it would bring suit unless the legislature redistricts during its session which begins in January.

Gov. John Patterson of Alabama said he may call a special session of the legislature next summer a group of Alabama voters sued in Montgomery, asking the district court to compel the legislature to reapportion itself. Their pending suit requested the court to force candidates for house and senate to run at large this year unless the legislature was reapportioned.

In Nevada, District Judge Marion Beatty said any action on a pending suit compelling force reapportionment of the legislature would be delayed to permit all concerned to study the supreme court's decision. Briefs had been due Friday.

In its decision in the Tennessee case, the supreme court said it would be improper for it to consider now what remedy would be most appropriate if the city voters prove their case at the trial.

Supreme court sources, however, said this would be the follow-up on the ruling.

WASHINGTON, March 28 — Commerce Secretary Luther Hodges said yesterday the recent failure of the economy to live up to Kennedy administration forecasts probably would extend through June.

His statement at a news conference was the first public acknowledgment by a high official that the administration's forecast that the economy would rise to between \$65 billion dollars and \$70 billion dollars by mid-year was too ray.

Hodges declined to use any figures, but in response to general questions he firmly stuck to an opinion that total business activity was "slightly off" in the first three months of 1962 in relation to official forecasts.

He said this also would be true in the spring quarter. Commerce department experts have made a preliminary estimate that gross national product rose modestly in January, February and March to a new high annual rate of \$48 billion dollars.

The administration forecast fashioned by the president's economic advisers was for a 5.5 billion dollar annual rate of spending for all goods and services.

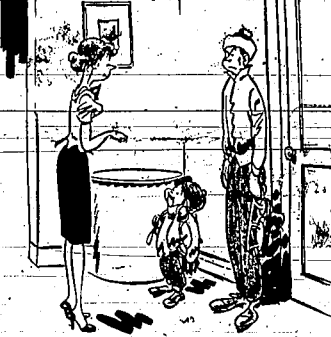
