

Hearings Start On Idaho Power Rate Hike Plea

BOISE, April 2 (AP)—Idaho Power company asked today for a general rate increase, noting that the added revenue it seeks about half will go directly to the federal government for higher income taxes. "The company," said Chief Counsel A. C. Inman, "does not object to paying its full share of taxes, but it must not be forgotten that this money can only come from our customers in their rates for electric service." Inman spoke at the outset of a hearing ordered by the Idaho public utilities commission to consider the company's request for a rate hike averaging about 13 1/2 per cent. Ralph Wickberg, chairman of the commission, presided and announced that the company's direct testimony would first be received. Protestants then will be heard and the hearing recessed. Later, he said, other public hearings will be held in Pocatello and in the Magic Valley area and opportunity also will be afforded for cross-examination of company witnesses. Also before the commission is a public hearing on a proposed rate increase for the Idaho corporation involving electric company and Ford Machinery ratings for power used at the 2500 phosphate plant at Pocatello. Evidence in that case will be heard following the first phase of the power company hearings. Wickberg declined to say when a decision may be likely in the power rate case but he noted that a decision is expected to be made in the filing of a rate case involving natural gas service and the existing rate. The amount of the proposed rate increase will be heard by the commission Tuesday afternoon, regardless of whether the company has completed its presentation by that time. "The decision of the commission will be rendered on the record made in the hearing rooms. Enough time will be allowed so that all parties can be heard," he added. Deadly Wind Ranked High For Violence

MILTON, Fla., April 2 (AP)—The tornado which ripped through Milton and killed 16 persons may have been one of the most powerful ever to strike in this state. Gov. Farris Bryant and a group of city and county officials toured the stricken area Sunday and saw first-hand how completely the Saturday storm devastated a residential area in this northwest Florida town. Bryant said he was appalled at the violence of the winds, which in one area blasted a group of houses so thoroughly that the foundations could be found. "For the width of about three blocks, the twister swept down every house and ripped every tree to shreds, leaving only bare tree stumps. Bryant said federal authorities were expected to begin assessing the damages today for possible assistance. The civilian defense organization and highway patrol are helping with the cleanup. Syrian Officers Revolt to Seek Return to UAR

CAIRO, April 2 (AP)—Army officers in northern Syria proclaimed a rebellion today against the Syrian military junta and demanded reunion with President Gamal Abdel Nasser's United Arab Republic. A broadcast from the pro-Nasser hotbed of Aleppo, Syria's second largest city, indicated the rebels claimed control in the northern and eastern reaches of Syria. There were no reports of renewed fighting after clashes Sunday in various parts of the nation. The Aleppo claims were ignored in Damascus broadcasts by the junta, which broke with the UAR in an uprising last September and then last week toppled the civilian government headed by Nasser's son. The junta asserted the army is united in all parts of Syria and warned plotters and exploiters and troublemakers that the general command will take severe punitive measures against them. In booting out the civilian government, the junta had accused officers of "inefficiency, lack of reforms and Arab socialism." It called for a brand of Arab socialism but no reunion with Nasser. "But now, apparently under pressure from the uprising in the West Bank, in repeated broadcasts listed vaguely of unity with all Arab countries, including the UAR. It seemed to be a first step toward a return, rather than a return to the one-man rule setup under Nasser. Syria is joined Egypt in the UAR in 1958. Secret Army Robs Banks; Slays Two

ALGIERS, Algeria, April 2 (UPI)—Secret army officers commandeered and robbed three Algiers banks today and escaped with nearly \$50,000 while other OAS raiders continued terrorist attacks here and in the western port city of Oran. An European was shot and killed on one street here while Moslems on another were sprayed with machinegun fire from a passing car. In Oran a plastic bomb shattered a movie theater, apparently injuring no one. But terrorist gunmen killed two Moslems and wounded five others in another section. Security forces setting up a cordon around the Saint-Eugene quarter of Oran this morning to search for the robbers. A car was passing automobile. One gangster was killed and another arrested in Oran. The OAS in Oran also angered the army with two apparently deliberate killings of French officers. An army lieutenant was fatally shot while strolling in a fashionable district through the central square. The second officer, rank unknown, was shot down while in uniform late this afternoon near the city center. The bank holdups here, while less spectacular than the \$4 million dollar robbery carried out a few weeks ago, were considered a major step. July 1 Deficit Of 3.8 Billion Faces Nation

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Congressional tax experts estimated today that the federal government will wind up with a fiscal year ending July 1. The joint senate-house committee on internal revenue (taxation) derived sharply from President Kennedy's estimate late in January that his fiscal 1962 budget would show a narrow 600 million dollar surplus. The estimates were prepared for the senate finance committee which opened hearings today on the house-passed tax bill aimed at closing revenue loopholes and stimulating the economy through a tax credit on investment in new plants and machinery. The joint bill, which was passed by the senate to make major changes in the house measure to produce an estimated 600 million dollar, a year in additional revenues. Hinting at possible income tax revisions in the next year or so, the committee also urged steps to eliminate inequities, produce more revenue and put the nation's budget in order to meet growing foreign competition. Church Ban Is Threat in Racial Stand. NEW ORLEANS, La., April 2 (AP)—A militant segregationist who threatened to disrupt the communion of the Roman Catholic church sought an injunction today against Archbishop Francis M. Sumner. Mrs. B. J. Gaillet, president of the Catholic Women's League, said she was planning to discuss the segregation issue with the archbishop. "I'm wrong," he got down on his knees and said "I'm sorry," Mrs. Gaillet said. She declined to disclose contents of a letter from the archbishop. Gaillet said she was a militant segregationist. The archdiocesan chancery issued a statement Sunday night that a "personal and confidential" letter was sent to Mrs. Gaillet. Mrs. Gaillet's organization contends that Biblical teachings prohibit "God demands segregation." Archbishop Sumner, 82, who declared segregation "morally wrong and sinful" six years ago, urged the South West Pastoral Council to end its segregationist campaign next fall. Mrs. Gaillet has led a small group of militant segregationists in the area of the archdiocese and the nearby home of Archbishop Gaillet's son, Cardinal O'Day since his announcement. Warm Weather Unleashes State Politicians' Tongues

Spring broke in Idaho last month with a gray-like silence. But a week later, when spring temperatures crept to above 60 degrees, it seemed to have articulated Idaho's political corps.

"Here is a roundup of what they are saying."

Vernon K. Smith, Boise attorney who heads the pro-gambling Tourists for Idaho Unlimited, went outside the state to pick up political ammunition.

The Democratic gubernatorial candidate said a Nevada newspaper recently headlined a letter of confidence from Attorney Gen. Robert Kennedy that Nevada gambling is not controlled by thugs.

"The statement . . . should end the argument that controlled gaming for resort areas (in Idaho) will fill our state with undesirable elements," said Smith.

Salmon attorney Charles F. Herndon, a Democratic gubernatorial candidate, says vigorous leadership and executive courage are needed if Idaho is to "provide a climate where new business will feel it can flourish."

Speaking to a "Herndon-for-governor" banquet at Salmon, he said the next governor of Idaho should: Appoint a tax reform committee; streamline and economize state operations; and ask the legislature to authorize an effort to study the state's "patchwork" tax structure.

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Conley Ward said from his Blanding home that state land Commissioner John G. Walters should either quit his state "patronage position," or quit the gubernatorial race.

"My principals may be antiquated," Ward said, "but I don't believe that a patronage position should be used as a lever to obtain elective office."

Still another Democratic gubernatorial candidate, John G. Walters, says he will ask to appear at public utilities commission hearings—starting Monday—on a rate increase request by Idaho Power company.

Walters said that since the governor was apparently interested in stopping Idaho Power from forcing customers to pay off a mortgage on its Hells canyon dam, he will make an attempt at the hearings to do himself.

Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Ida., said from Washington that capital development—making victims of Idaho taxpayers.


Courier Brings Wife's Message

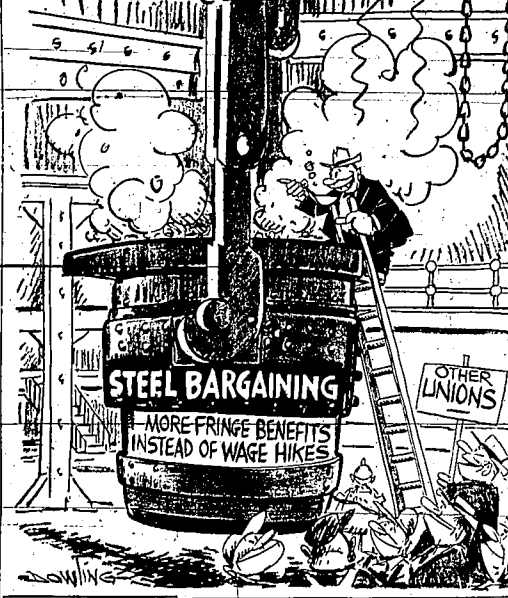

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Hoffa Flays Kennedy on Steel's Pact

DETROIT, April 2 (AP)—President John F. Hoffa of the Teamsters union was out on the political road today with a blast at George Romney and a good word for Nelson A. Rockefeller.

He accused the administration of interfering in the steel negotiations in what he called a "political maneuver."

The union chief, opening his union's DRIVE movement campaign night, let go with a salvo on Michigan state and national politics before an audience of more than 2,000 union members.

DRIVE is the Teamsters' newly announced Democratic-Republican-Independent Voter Education program, through which Hoffa says he hopes his huge organization can wield political influence. Hoffa says the Teamsters represent more than five million votes.

Hoffa, rapping Romney, the probable Republican candidate for governor of Michigan, said, "So far, all that Romney has accepted across the bargaining table is American Motors president. He seems to be trying to escape through legislation."

Hoffa said that right now incumbent Democratic Gov. John B. Swainson is the man for labor.

The Teamsters head, referring to the labor contract agreement in steel, said, "The government uses pressure to settle the contract so that there would be no increase in price. This was a political maneuver and I'll wager certain grades of steel will go up in price in a few months, anyway."

Solons Blame British Over Export Fault

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Sen. Prescott Bush, R. Conn., said today the administration has failed to attack the nation's unemployment problem "realistically or with sufficient vigor or urgency."

He said unemployment could become a staggering problem by 1970.

Bush made the statements in a speech prepared for delivery in the senate. The senator, ranking Republican on the senate-house economic committee, said he was expressing the views of all of the panel's GOP members.

His speech followed disclosure by Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg that major economic conference involving labor, management and the public would be held in Washington next month. Goldberg said the conference would be devoted to economic developments in general.

Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges also disclosed that he and a team of administration troubleshooters would meet with businessmen in three cities soon to study ways of promoting U. S. economic growth.

Hodges said that the meetings would be held April 19 in Los Angeles, April 23 in Kansas City, Mo., and May 7 in Atlanta.

The commerce secretary said that while the economy was not improving as much as the administration had hoped, "my own prediction is that we will be in good shape comparatively, right on through the year."

Bush, in his senate speech, said the nation's unemployment problem might be getting worse. He said the administration had failed to recognize the basic causes of joblessness and apply proper remedies.

The GOP senator said very long-term unemployment is at the highest level in more than 20 years. He noted that the very long term jobless are mainly young people, workers over 46 and Negroes.

He unveiled a resolution which would authorize a study by the senate-house economic committee of unemployment, with particular attention to very long term joblessness.

Solon Blames Work Plight On Kennedy

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—A survey by two senators shows that Britain's refusal to help enforce U. S. export controls has resulted in shipment of millions of dollars worth of goods to the communist bloc.

The unpublished survey was prepared by Sen. Kenneth D. Keating, R. N. Y., and Thomas J. Dodd, D. Conn., for the senate internal security subcommittee. Sources said the subcommittee planned a full-dress inquiry.

The survey indicates that British and other western European governments have done their best to block shipments embargoed by the coordinating committee for international controls.

But cooperation to enforce the more rigid U. S. restrictions often is lukewarm, according to the survey. It said British authorities in particular were "naturally reluctant" to act against British traders who violate U. S. controls but stay within the COCOM prohibition.

As a result, strategic goods destined originally for allied nations wind up illegally behind the iron or bamboo curtains, the survey reported.

"To the extent that U. S. export controls go beyond those kept by COCOM, the survey said, "it is difficult to obtain the cooperation of British authorities for enforcement purposes."

The convicts apparently left the prison grounds on foot, O'Brien said.

An associate said he was confident, however, that Estes' \$500,000 bond could be raised if a plea for lower bail was unavailing.

Estes and three other businessmen are charged with conspiring to take fraudulent chattel mortgages from one state to another.

Assistant U. S. attorney Wayne Speck told newsmen the government would oppose any reduction of bond when Estes goes before U. S. District Judge J. R. Thome today.

Officers drove Estes to El Paso Sunday from Pecos, where he had been held since Friday night. The 37-year-old prisoner ignored questions from newsmen.

An addition to the mushrooming troubles of Estes was suspension of the state grain warehouse license held by one of his firms, United Elevators, Inc., at Lamona, Tex.

The three men charged with Estes, all officials of Superior Manufacturing Co. of Amarillo, Tex., won release earlier on bonds of \$25,000 each.

Super Rocket Given Checks At Canaveral

CAPE CANAVERAL, April 2 (AP)—Scientists today ran final checks on a new rocket combination designed to help increase the speed of launching American and Russian space machines.

Bearing complications—the new high-energy rocket combination is called "up-and-down"—test flight across the Atlantic ocean Friday. The shot has been delayed several times already.

Scientists said the sleek, two-stage Atlas-Centaur combination will eventually be able to lift satellites weighing up to 4½ tons into orbit 300 miles or more above Earth's surface. John Glenn's capsule weighed 1½ tons and circled Earth about 100 miles up.

The new rocket is expected to open the entire inner solar system to U. S. research.

The booster for the rocket is a modified Atlas Intercontinental ballistic missile, the same type that boosted Glenn into orbit Feb. 20. It is the upper stage that is designed to give the Atlas-Centaur its added muscle.

Power can be second stage is powered by volatile liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen, one of the high-energy rocket combinations ever developed. This also will mark the first time that liquid hydrogen, a tricky substance, has been used in a U. S. rocket.

The hydrogen-oxygen fuel can deliver more power for less propellant weight, thus offsetting the United States its earliest hope for a major push toward narrowing the "space gap" in the space race with Russia.

**Hiss Studies
Review Paths
From Perjury**

NEW YORK, April 2 (AP)—Former state department spokesman Alger Hiss said last night that a statement in former Vice President Richard M. Nixon's new book might be the basis of a review of his conviction for perjury in connection with a Russian spy ring uncovered by the late Whittaker Chambers.

Hiss and his attorney, Mrs. Helen Buttenwieser, said they were studying the book in connection with the review of Hiss's conviction. Nixon's statement that the old Woodstock typewriter which Hiss used in the case was discovered by federal agents among typed copies of incriminating documents on it, Mrs. Buttenwieser said a plea might be made to the attorney general to authorize disclosure of the minutes of the grand jury on this point.

At Hiss' trial in 1950 government witnesses swore that the government had never had the typewriter in its possession. The typewriter was actually produced at the trial by Hiss' defense lawyer, and the court later decided that it was a fake that had been planted with them.

Hiss' defense theory was that Chambers had forged documents on the typewriter, which once had belonged to Hiss.

A spokesman for Nixon said last night in Los Angeles that the statement in Nixon's book, "Six Crises," was the result of an investigation by the FBI. He said that actually the FBI had obtained specimens of Hiss' made in the grand jury proceedings which checked with typewritten copies of state department documents allegedly typed by Hiss' wife and not the typewriter itself.

The statute of limitations bars the prosecution of Hiss' trial in court. Hiss served a prison sentence for perjury himself before a grand jury concerning his relationship to Chambers.

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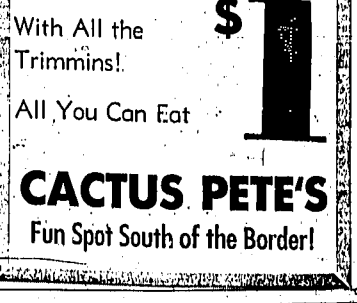

The pact, which would increase benefit payments to 100 per cent of wages already in effect, is being negotiated by the International Union of Steelworkers and the American Iron and Steel Institute.

At 18.6 billion dollars, it doubtless is streaking higher this year. But the average worker is inclined to see it only as insurance against the day when he might be laid off. It is the joy of an extra week of vacation with pay. Armo Steel reports that it pays more than \$1,000 per hourly employee per year for such things as insurance, paid vacations, pensions and holidays. But only 16 per cent of employees it queried said they had realized that. Armo's survey of a one-third sampling of its 34,800 employees also brought out one thing that may have led steel workers to put less emphasis this year of a big pay hike—fear that a big boom might mean more steel imports.

It says replies showed the big majority felt overseas competition a bigger threat to their jobs than was competition from other American steel companies or from competing materials such as aluminum, plastic, glass and concrete. The lower price of imported steel is due to lower wages scales abroad, in the opinion of 83 per cent of the workers, and 80 per cent added that these lower prices were also aided by lower corporate income taxes paid by foreign steel makers.

2 medium onions, sliced thinly
1/2 cup tomato sauce
1/2 cup olive oil
1/2 cup green olives, chopped
1 tablespoon capers
1/2 cup seeded raisins
2 cloves garlic, peeled and chopped
1 bay leaf

Boil codfish in water for 4 hours. Drain well and boil rapidly in 2 quarts water for 15 minutes. Drain, discard water and bones and dried fish. In a large kettle arrange layers of codfish and sliced potatoes alternately with layers of sliced onions. Add all other ingredients; pour over fish. Cook over low heat, covered, for 30 minutes.

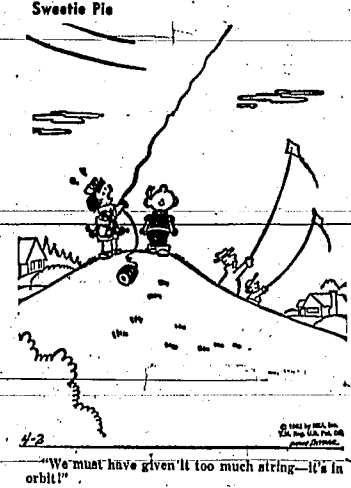

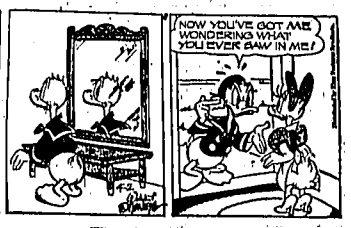

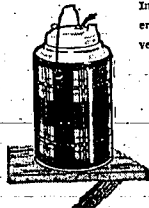
