

Conditions Favorable in T.F. for Junior College, Editor Told in Interview

The challenged testimony was submitted by J. H. Wiley, analysis and statistical engineer for the company.

Dean Seeks Output Ban At Conclave

GENEVA, April 4 (UPI)—The United States proposed today that the world end production of material for nuclear warheads and other forms of nuclear weapons. The proposal is part of a study on how to do it. At the same time, the United States is trying to "remove the motor" from systems laboriously agreed upon for ensuring compliance with the nuclear non-proliferation treaty.

Chief U. S. Delegate Arthur H. Dean called upon a 75-nation general disarmament conference to turn its immediate attention to the problems of eliminating stocks of nuclear, biological and chemical weapons and of ending production of plutonium and uranium for use in nuclear warheads.

Riot Breaks Out At Cuban Prison

HAVANA, April 4 (UPI)—A mob of 800 persons shouting "Fidel, Fidel!" and pro-Castro slogans today used brute force to break up a "death watch" at Principe prison by 100 friends of war prisoners awaiting the verdict in their treason trial. The street clash was the first to occur since the start of the mass trial in 1,179 invasion captives last Thursday. It had been brewing since before dawn when pro-Castro supporters were seen massing across the street from the group awaiting the trial verdict.

Blood Quota For Gooding Area Missed

GOODING, April 4—Gooding county fell 515 pints shy of its blood-pint quota for the Red Cross bloodmobile Tuesday. There were 22 units donated by residents of the county. The quota was set at 1,000 pints. The shortage was made up by donations from other areas.

Shupe Hired As Judge for Jerome City

JEROME, April 4—J. O. Shupe, a Jerome resident for 20 years, was named today to the position of judge for Jerome City. Shupe is a member of the Idaho State Bar and has been practicing law in Jerome for several years. He will be sworn in as judge on Tuesday.

Goulart Affirms Brazil's Loyalty

WASHINGTON, April 4 (UPI)—President John F. Kennedy today affirmed Brazil's loyalty to the United States and the Western Hemisphere. He said that Brazil is not part of any political-military bloc and that the United States is in an address prepared for a joint meeting of congress. The Brazilian chief executive advocated peaceful contacts with the United States and called the socialist world.

Normally a rehearing is allowed but the court noted it had suspended regular rules in considering the reapportionment case.

McNamara slandered and defamed him by misusing an army report on its investigation of his troop education programs. He also told senators, investigating alleged military muzzling that he had been made "a scapegoat for an unwritten policy of collaboration and collusion with the international communist conspiracy." As Walker testified, George Lincoln Rockwell, head of the American Nazi party, and two of his followers were ejected from the premises for wearing swastika buttons in their lapels. They were ushered from the hearing room and the senate office building as well when they refused to remove the buttons.

ROME, April 4 (AP)—The Italian press, which has had, Elizabeth Taylor on the front page for weeks, now shows signs yesterday that it is becoming disillusioned with her.

Many of the articles printed by the Italian newspapers and magazines were less than enthusiastic about the activities of the modern-day Cleopatra, who has broken up with her husband, singer Eddie Fisher.

The magazine "Lo Specchio" (The Mirror), which only last week published an exclusive picture of Welsh-born actor Miss Taylor off the set at the Cincinnati studios, said it had had enough of Miss Taylor.

In an article, entitled "Enough of Liz," the magazine said: "At Rome, Liz is passing out of fashion. Her personality has tired everybody a little. . . . No one wants to hear anything more about what she's wearing, her adjustments, her illnesses, her fear, her food poisoning, her children, her husbands, the bits and pieces of her friends. Let her finish once and for all this film and go back to Hollywood."

Miss Taylor apparently ignored the critics and put in a full day's work on the "Cleopatra" set.

If the announcement that she and Fisher were getting a divorce bothered her, she deserved another one for her performance in not showing it.

During a wild banquet scene, she showed no signs of being upset over her divorce. She was at lunch with Burton, who is playing the role of Marc Anthony, said she was "obliged to be obliging to the stories that linked the two stars romantically."

Kennedy Flays His Charge of Faulty Evidence

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—Attorney Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said today that new evidence of innocence by convicted perjurer Alger Hiss is not supported by the facts.

Kennedy issued a statement through his office on the controversy stirred up by former Vice President Richard M. Nixon's comments on the Hiss case in his new book, "Six Crises."

Hiss has expressed hope that a statement in the book that the FBI in 1948 had possession of a typewriter which figured prominently in the case would help vindicate his position.

The government contended that Hiss' wife used the typewriter to copy state department documents which were slipped to the late Whittaker Chambers, a self-confessed Soviet spy courier.

Texas Figure Seeks to Save Farm Assets

PECOS, Tex., April 4 (AP)—Billie Sol Estes, under federal conspiracy charges and "temporarily" free to serve his multi-million-dollar agricultural empire, ordered his associates today to dispose of assets in a way that is solely essential to the many businesses he operates.

One of the first items to go up for sale was a \$100,000 investment, one of two owned by a funeral home in which Estes has an interest.

Estes estimates he is \$2 million dollars in debt, but has vowed his creditors will not lose a dime. Brokers of the federal charges against him, creditors have filed a number of civil suits in the past few days totaling almost 10 million dollars.

Estes, 37, termed the "boy wonder of West Texas," has been in almost constant conference with business associates since he was released from jail in El Paso Monday night in a reduced \$100,000 bond.

Yesterday he announced he has turned over to Anderson Clayton company, the world's largest cotton broker, about 15,000 acres of his estimated 20,000-acre farm holdings.

Anderson Clayton's headquarters in Houston, a spokesman said the company did not demand control of the operations, but took it over on a voluntary trust agreement. The takeover amounted to about \$500,000.

Estes was also known to be negotiating with other creditors in an attempt to write off more of his huge debt in a similar manner.

Troops Raid Congo Depot

ELIABETHVILLE, K. A. L. A. G. The Congo, April 4 (AP)—United Nations troops raided a secret Katangese air force supply depot today and confiscated 40 Harvard trainer plane engines and a number of other aircraft parts.

Acting on "certain information," a U.N. spokesman said, the Indian troops entered the depot without opposition and took the parts away in trucks for examination.

The raid followed recent reports that South Africa had offered 40 Harvard trainers—U.S. World War II planes—to the Katangese air force and that the air force was building up its staff.

Murder Pair Plead Friday

ELKO, Nev., April 4 (AP)—A Gallup, N. M., couple arrested at Weiser, Ida., on Nevada murder and robbery charges are scheduled to enter pleas Friday before District Judge Taylor Wines.

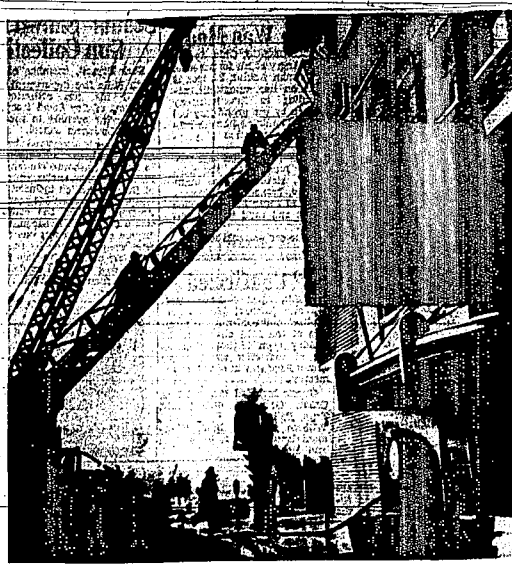

Race Figure May Reveal Bans Letter

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 4 (AP)—A Roman Catholic woman, identified by the reports of Archbishop Joseph Francis Ruffini, promised Tuesday to reveal the letter threatening her with excommunication "if the communication 'round doesn't stop'."

Mrs. B. J. Galliot, Jr., head of the segregationist Citizens' Save Our Nation, Inc., said the archbishop's chancery acknowledged receipt of her letter in writing for an audience. She said she wanted to answer his letter—termed a "paternal admonition"—by the chancery. "It contains false statements and false accusations."

"The archbishop received my letter yesterday," Mrs. Galliot said, "but he wouldn't say if the audience would be granted this week or next week. I told the press I set Friday as the deadline for the audience or I would reveal the contents of the letter threatening me with excommunication," she added.

A similar letter went to State Rep. Rodney Bunn, who was on the speaker's platform at a meeting of the pro-segregation White Citizens Council last Friday.

"I received the letter Sunday, asked for an audience with the archbishop and met with the 85-year-old prelate Tuesday."

Bunn emerged from the session saying he emphatically opposed integration. "As a member of the Roman Catholic Church," he added, "I must abide by its laws and decisions pertaining to the doctrine in which I live."

Key in Lock Just Eluded 5 Prisoners

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., April 4 (AP)—Five convicts who escaped from San Quentin prison were captured yesterday just 50 feet from what they had sought, a key to their 30 hours of freedom—a car with a key in the ignition.

The warden said the five convicts, who had been on the run for two days, were captured by two guards 10 miles north of the state institution in the Santa Fe area, where they had been home developments border wooded hillsides.

One of her aides described the congresswoman this way: She's brainy and she's got guts."

Mrs. Green, a former school teacher, is the mother of two sons, and also is a grandmother. The congresswoman speaks in behalf of the working women who is sole support of her children, for the woman abandoned by her husband, and for the unwed mother.

At a hearing once when a congresswoman was condemning a woman who had several illegitimate children, and recommending a penalty for her, Mrs. Green turned to him and asked sweetly, "Would you also punish the man?"

Experts Insist 'Twist' Is Not Really Dance

NEW YORK, April 4 (AP)—That hippy gymnastic, the twist, may not be a dance after all.

The dance expert who says so crawls further along the limb, predicting the death knell of the twist soon will be sounded.

Lou Brecker, manager of one of the nation's largest ballrooms, put it this way.

"Two people do not hold one another while performing the twist. How can it be a dance?"

The ballroom Brecker manages, Rosebush, caters to 100 men a week. For more than 20 years people have come to the place in Manhattan for the slow, the slow shuffle, the fast jitterbug and the peaceful waltz.

Among the great orchestras that have played there: Tommy Dorsey and Glen Miller's.

Because the twist doesn't fit Brecker's definition of a dance, he's banned the "hippy gymnastic" as he calls it.

"So far as I can figure, you haven't had anyone jump out of our place angry because they couldn't twist," Brecker said.

Brecker feels that twist is on the way out for many reasons.

"Brecker feels that twist is on the way out for many reasons. For a while, he said, putting a 'twist' sign in the window in midtown was a magic magnet. Of late, indications are that there is less and less power to that word."

Additional reasons cited include the following:

"Good dance music played by a top orchestra, not the kind one can perform the weird gyrations to."

"Playright-producer George Abbott, with whom Brecker watched a twist session, insisted that it is not a dance and that the word never use it in one of his shows."

"Ginger Rogers insists the twist is not a dance."

After banning the twist, Brecker received a mail complaining that on his stand, some people have been injured during the twist. At least one doctor has said the injuries are like football injuries.

When he banned the twist, Brecker soon thereafter received a cable from the director of the London Dance Institute. The cable read:

"Understand you have banned the twist. We are in absolute agreement."

But that's not all, Brecker has high opinion on this. "Members of the social register, represented by Mrs. Eric Outwater, commented as follows recently: 'You won't twist party.' The socialites performed the dances of the past 40 years."

1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar.

1 tablespoon prepared mustard.

2 tablespoons cornstarch.

Orange-slices and wedges.

Watercress.

Arrange ham on rack in shallow roasting pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 45 minutes. Meanwhile, drain cherries; reserve syrup. Slowly stir reserved cherry syrup, sugar and mustard into consistency. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and clear.

Put ham with some of cherry syrup mixture. Bake 30 minutes longer.

Brush ham with some of cherry syrup mixture frequently during baking period. Arrange ham on serving platter. Garnish with orange slices, orange wedges, 1/2 cup cherries and watercress. Combine remaining cherries and remaining cherry syrup mixture; heat to serving temperature. Serve cherry sauce with ham.

Circus Life Is Described by Bareback Rider

CHICAGO, April 4 (AP)—Mother was a bareback rider... that's what three Zoppe children will be telling their own children one day.

And from the looks of it, there'll always be a Zoppe (and Zipp) in the circus. Roger, 12, and the twins, Dennis and Denise, 8, already ride in the family bareback act. Tiny Denise also performs precariously atop a human tower of Zoppes in another act in which her father balances high on a ladder as it were with his wife standing on his shoulders and Denise on her shoulders. It doesn't worry Mrs. Zoppe.

"Denise knows her daddy won't let her fall. He's very trustworthy," Mrs. Zoppe said in an interview between performances at the Shrine circus.

Unlike her children, brown-haired, easy-going Peggy Zoppe, 7, was not born to the circus. A small town girl from Ft. Morgan, Colo., she never set foot in the swadlow ring until she was 15 and her stepfather turned clown.

A year or so later, Peggy donned spangled spurs for a fancy riding act in the old all Gray circus in the west. Next thing she knew, she was getting the eye from another horseman, Joe Zoppe.

They were married within a year and any doubts the new Mrs. Zoppe had about staying with the circus were banished. Handsome, dark-haired Joe hailed from eight generations of Italian circus performers.

"Sometimes I think I'd like to leave the circus in five or 10 years and settle down," Mrs. Zoppe confessed. "But Joe couldn't do it, and so long as he travels, we want to be with him."

She's long since gotten used to the seemingly insurmountable problems of trying to keep house and bring up three children on the swadlow trail.

"First—there's the problem—of cooking and keeping house in a small trailer, the big ones are too hard to tow long distances, and the Zoppes also have to carry all their horses in a semitrailer."

It's a job, too, to see that the children keep up with their schoolwork at the Calvert correspondence school in Baltimore.

Mrs. Zoppe, who finished high school herself, through correspondence courses, supervises the home study courses. She tried putting the children in a Dallas, Tex., public school for a few months last year. "They liked school and made 'B' averages," she said, but balked at the idea of being separated from their parents to stay in school.

Now that the children are in the act, they're up till the evening performance ends at 10, which poses a new problem. "They don't stay up after the show and watch television," but from what I hear," Mrs. Zoppe said, "that's not a problem unique to the circus."

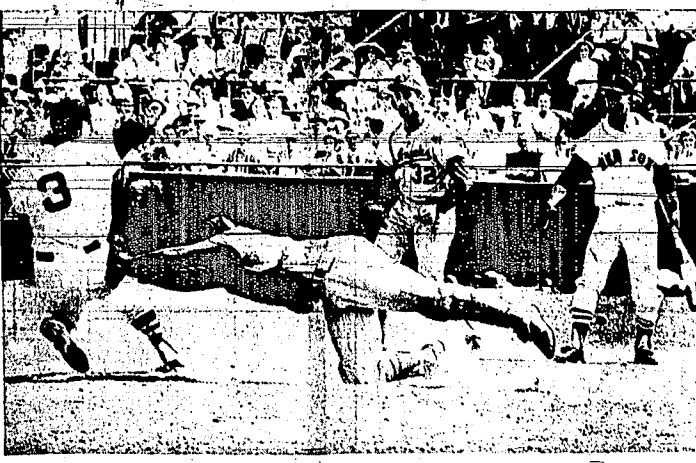
