

## Aircraft Falters, Succeeds

**EDWARDS AIR FORCE**  
BASE, Calif., April 5 (UPI)—The X15 rocket plane, through a successful test of an automatic adaptive flight control system over the Mojave desert, today after an initial false start when the engine failed to ignite, was headed to a landing on an emergency strip.

It was the fifth attempt to test the automatic system, an auto pilot designed to steer a human pilot safely through the dangerous region of the fringes of the Earth's atmosphere. The autopilot is a system that thinks for itself. The heart of the system is a 42-pound electronic brain the size of a suitcase which will determine for the pilot what the correct controls are needed to make a safe maneuver.

Armstrong went through a series of banks and turns using the electronic brain. The national aeronautics and space administration pilot, a 31-year-old Navy veteran, took controls while being carried aloft from this desert, test base north of the state capital, to the fringes of the Nevada-California border.

After final checkout at the desert altitude, Armstrong gave the signal for drop. When the engine failed to ignite on the first try, flight controllers kept him aloft through the brief procedure again and successful ignition was obtained.

## Guard Plan Draws Fire in Congress

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—Congressmen opened fire today on the army's controversial plan to break up eight battle-starred national guard and reserve infantry divisions. Meanwhile, the army braced for a salvo of objections from another flank—governors of some of the 21 states affected. Rep. Durward G. Hall, R., Mo., predicted the plan would touch off a major battle in congress. He said it was another example of the administration's "flaunting the will of congress."

## Area Reserve Troops Vital, General Says

CONRAD, Mont., April 5 (UPI)—Gen. LeRoy Anderson, commander of the 8th Infantry division of the army reserve, said Wednesday's announcement by the army to reorganize four reserve and four national guard divisions will certainly not decrease the need for the men in his division.

## 'No Change'

LIEUT. COL. Warren Togan, commander of Maple Valley's fourth howitzer battalion, one of the army reserve units in the 8th infantry division, said Thursday morning that "it's merely a matter of reorganization. The strength figure I don't think should change at all." He indicated the battalion will possibly remain as an artillery unit.

## Help for Homes

The eight divisions—some with histories dating back to the Revolution and some with many battle honors—will be reorganized into four divisions of between 3,000 and 4,000 men each. Many units now part of the division would be assigned to support the regular army, if needed.

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk called on congress today to pass President Kennedy's foreign aid bill in the name of the security of the free world today and the shape of the world of tomorrow.

PARIS, April 5 (AP)—Premier Michel Debre today was reported to be urging President Charles de Gaulle to hold new parliamentary elections soon after Sunday's referendum vote on the Algerian pact.

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—The first test of strength for a bipartisan committee to advance 100 million dollars to the United Nations resulted in an overwhelming administration victory today. A Republican amendment to deny U.S. economic aid to any country which is more than a year delinquent in payment of its U.N. assessments was rejected by a 78 to 15 vote on the initial roll call.

## Retirement Funds Case Enters Court

BOISE, April 5 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court was asked today in a test case to compel state auditor Joe R. Williams to transfer \$100,000 of the state teachers' retirement system in compliance with a 1961 law. Williams declined to make the transfer on the basis of a ruling by Attorney Gen. Frank L. Benson that the law is unconstitutional. The statute attempted to make the public school endowment fund the funded reserve of the teachers' retirement system. It appropriated \$200,000, for the biennium, from the school endowment fund.

## Witness Says Profits Vary In Rate Case

BOISE, April 5 (AP)—Anticipated dividends may vary by more than one-half million dollars annually depending on what financing method is used by Idaho Power company over the next five years, a public utilities commission was told today. The commission has under consideration a request for rate hearings on the 1962-63 rate, averaging about 13% per cent.

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## Kennedy Outlines Broad Program on American Transit

WASHINGTON, April 5 (UPI)—President Kennedy sent congress today an ambitious transportation program which looked to reductions in air, rail and bus fares and federal aid to improve urban-suburban transit. The 6,000-word message was described by Myer Feldman, deputy special counsel to the President, as the first comprehensive national transportation plan ever drafted by a chief executive in U.S. history.

## Legislature Case Extension Sought

BOISE, April 5 (AP)—An attorney for George O. Casner asked the supreme court today to extend the deadline for seeking a rehearing of the legislative reapportionment case until April 23. Attorney T. H. Eberle said the court order which limited the time for petitioning to next Monday at the latest was "arbitrary and capricious" and that it denied Casner due process of law.

## Walker Rusk, Punches Reporter

WASHINGTON, April 5 (UPI)—Former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker finished up two days of testimony on alleged military muzzling today by questioning Secretary of State Dean Rusk's patriotism and throwing a punch at a newsmen after leaving the stand. He told the special senate subcommittee investigating troop information and education programs that he was not satisfied with Rusk's dedication to the nation's independence and security.

### Red China Leaders Attack 'Insolent' Party Members

TOKYO, April 5 (AP)—Red China's leadership today castigated members of the Chinese communist party who it said have become "bureaucratic, insolent and self-satisfied."

The unusually sharp denunciation may be the prelude to a new purge of the party, which has more than 12 million members.

The purge may become whipping boys for the present condition of Chinese agriculture, which has created hunger and unrest on the mainland.

The attack was published in the "Official" People's Daily through an ultra-secret meeting of the national congress, the Chinese communists' rubber-stamp parliament.

"There are persons," the paper said, "who have become steeped in bureaucracy, exhibit feelings of insolence and self-satisfaction, forget realities, estrange themselves from the masses and do not care to discuss things with the masses."

The editorial said many new members of the party lack experience in revolutionary struggle and have not been educated in Marxism and Leninism. Both old and new members, it continued, "it has become an important task for us to understand the importance of solidifying the party's political, ideological and organizational phases, strengthening the party's ideological construction," it declared.

The last big overhaul of the Chinese communist party took place in 1955 following the failure of Mao Tse-tung's freedom of expression policy, called "let all flowers bloom, let 100 schools of thought contend." For one startling month critics of communism, and of Mao, had their public say. Then they were subjected to ruthless persecution as "rightists."

In recent months the Chinese Reds have made plain that the "great leap forward"—the crash program to make China a world industrial power—has been shelved because of agriculture failures. Mao's agricultural program of rural communism grouping millions of peasants into collectivized colonies, has been drastically modified because the peasants' discontent in the communes. As it did in the "let all flowers bloom" period, the People's Daily now says that party members should be encouraged to criticize higher ranking members.

"Say anything you know," the editorial said, "express whatever you are thinking, and if there is nothing wrong in a person's opinion, it should be taken as a lesson to the listener."

### Race Figure May Bow to Papal Blow

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 5 (AP)—A Bible-toting New Orleans Catholic segregationist says she will accept excommunication unless priests show her error in scripture passages which she contends call for racial segregation.

Mrs. B. J. Galliot, leader of the militantly segregationist Save Our Nation, Inc. group, may get her requested interview today with Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel. She said the archbishop threatened her with excommunication.

Controversy continues over the archbishop's decision to desegregate all Catholic schools in the New Orleans archdiocese and the more recent decision by a federal judge calling for complete end of segregation in the first six grades of the city's public schools.

Mrs. Galliot, 41, mother of three children, said that unless the Bible is brought into her discussion with Archbishop Rummel "then I will have to bow down gratefully and accept excommunication rather than desert my belief in God."

"My statements about segregation and my defense has always been the Bible," Mrs. Galliot said Wednesday.

## Pacific Area Is Set Aside For A-Blasts

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—The U.S. atomic energy commission has marked off a wide area in the Pacific for the expected nuclear tests in the atmosphere. Establishment of the area will become effective April 15 "in preparation for such actual tests as may be ordered later in the month," the commission said Wednesday.

Christmas Island is close to the center of the area, 600 miles wide and 800 miles long. It also embraces Fanning Island, Washington Island, Palmyra Atoll and Kingman Reef.

President Kennedy has said that later this month he will order a resumption of U.S. air tests unless agreement with the Soviet Union is reached before then banning nuclear weapons testing.

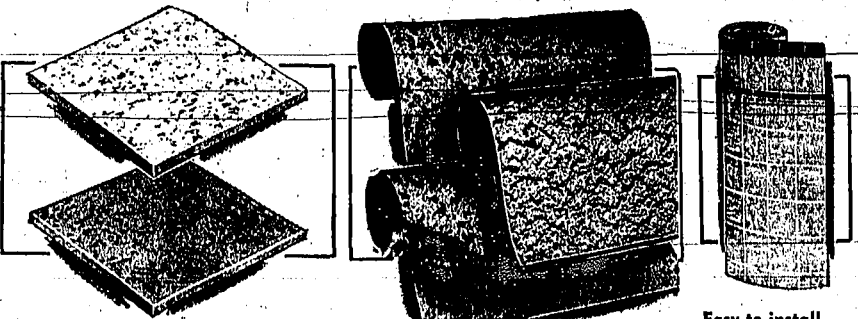

## Juveniles Proposed Library Budget In T. F. Studied by Board

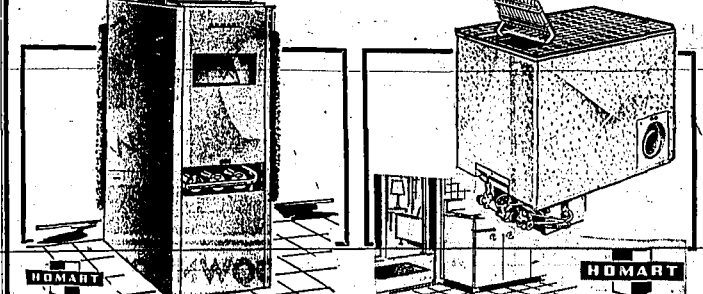

# Dakota Lays Part of Old West to Rest

MEDORA, N.D., April 5 (AP)—They buried a bit of the old West here today.

North Dakota's oldest cowboy, Ben Bird, 97, was sent to his final round-up. He died Sunday in a hospital at Beach.

Bird, who once sold horses for Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders, began as a cowboy in 1881 after leaving his Denton, Tex. birthplace. He joined his first team drive in 1884 from south of Amarillo, Tex., to Miles City, Mont. On his third drive, he helped move dogs to the mouth of the Little Missouri, near Williston, N. D.

He decided to return to western North Dakota to settle down. Bird once sold the 1,600-2,000 cattle he had to help drive for several months on each trip "nearly near cured me of cattle." He found horses less monotonous.

After spending the winter of 1902 in the Klondike mountains hunting deer for the railroad camp, he homesteaded in Almont, the place where he was first laid to rest. It was at Almont that Bird was married and raised six children.

An expert horseman, Bird competed in early rodeos and won a calf roping contest at the age of 75. He rode for pleasure until just a couple of years ago. Bird also served as peace officer in Almont for 25 years, including a term as a deputy U.S. marshal.

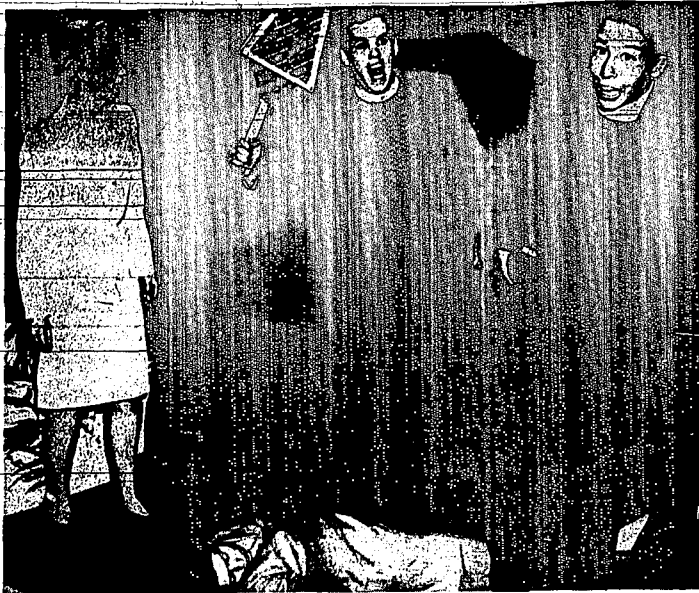

Thousands Pay Respects To Paret

NEW YORK, April 5—Several thousand persons filed past the body of former welterweight champion Benny (Kid) Paret, 28-year-old Cuban who died after a savage ring beating, at a Bronx funeral parlor Wednesday.

At the same time, seven New York state legislators, one a former fighter, were appointed to a special committee that will investigate boxing to decide if it should be banned in the state. Hearings will open in New York Friday.

There were new moves to end sport in Canada and Sweden, and Rep. Abraham J. Muller, D. N. Y., called for congress to ban radio and television broadcasting of fights. Muller said this would make them unprofitable. He called the sport "public slaughter."

The Havana press reacted furiously to the death, accusing American "commercial interests" of causing it.

Paret died early Tuesday. He never regained consciousness after he was carried from the Madison Square garden ring March 24, after he collapsed in the 12th round from a head injury at the hands of Emile Griffith.

More than 20 policemen were on duty outside the funeral home to prevent any disorder. One man was arrested Tuesday night when the crowd got out of hand.

Umpires Take Firm Stand on Interference

NEW YORK, April 5 (AP)—The umpires have held several informal discussion periods during the exhibition baseball season, working on the new rules that were passed last December. The most important changes involve catcher's interference and obstruction plays.

Under the old rules, interference by a batter by a catcher or any fielder—entitled the batter to first base without liability to be put out. The new rule gives the manager of the batting team an option to decline the interference penalty and accept the play.

Larry Napp, veteran American league umpire, explained it this way: "Suppose there is a runner on third base who scored while the batter was being thrown out at first base. Under the old rule, the runner would have to go back to third and the batter would be awarded first base.

Under the new rule, the manager may advise the plate umpire that he wants to accept the play, instead of the penalty. In other words, he would accept the run scoring and let the batter be called out."

The other important rule change involves an obstruction play when a fielder blocks off a runner or impedes his progress. Aug. Donatelli, a leading National league umpire, gave this explanation of the new rule: "If there is obstruction on a rundown play, say between second and third, the runner is awarded the next base ahead of his last position. In the past the placing of the runner depended on whether he was trying to get back to the base he just left or trying to advance an additional base."

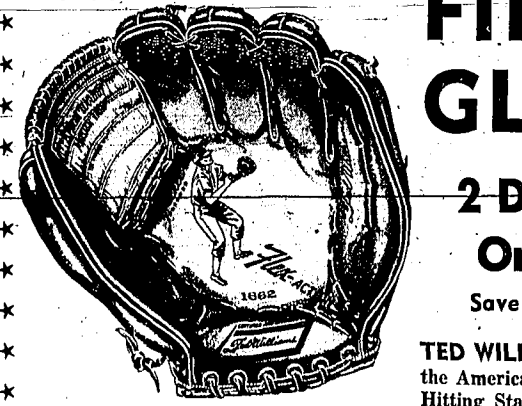

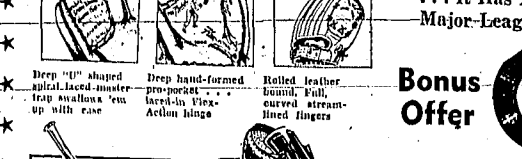

# Pender Winds up Drills for Title Match Saturday

BOSTON, April 5 (AP)—Former middleweight champion Paul Pender wound up his sparring sessions Wednesday for Saturday-night's title bout with Terry Downes, and nobody's happier about it than Indian Willie Greene. Greene, once a promising middleweight himself, has sparred 110 rounds with Pender over the past month. As of Wednesday he was an ex-fighter.

Green, only 24, will go to work for his father, who owns a construction firm in Providence, R.I.

Since he once fought Downes before the tough, little Britisher won the disputed title from Pender in London last July, Greene was asked to compare the two.

"I can't see how Pender can lose," he said. "He hits a little harder than Downes and he's a better all-around boxer. I just can't see Downes beating him."

Greene battled Downes in a tune-up fight in London last Friday. Downes was credited with a three-round TKO, but Greene said Terry never knocked him down or cut him.

Green's appraisal of Pender being the harder hitter was surprising, since the tall sharpshooter is best known for his ability to hook, jab and move away.

Paul, an 8-6 choice to win back the title, says that Downes' boxing style is "made to order for

Downes, who predicts a knock-out victory defense, also wound up his heavy training in Boston Wednesday. He was presented a champion belt by ring historian Nat Fleischer.

The accusation of quitter might settle the bout between Downes and Pender.

But whether Downes uses the cry as an impetus to defend his crown successfully or former Brooklyn fireman Pender comes back for revenge is anybody's guess.

The allegation refers to the way Pender lost his championship in London last July 11. The match-nosed Pender retired— to use the British term—after the ninth round. Pender had defended his title unsuccessfully with a seventh-round TKO win over Downes here 15 months ago.

Pender said he had to stop because of being weakened by a virus infection.

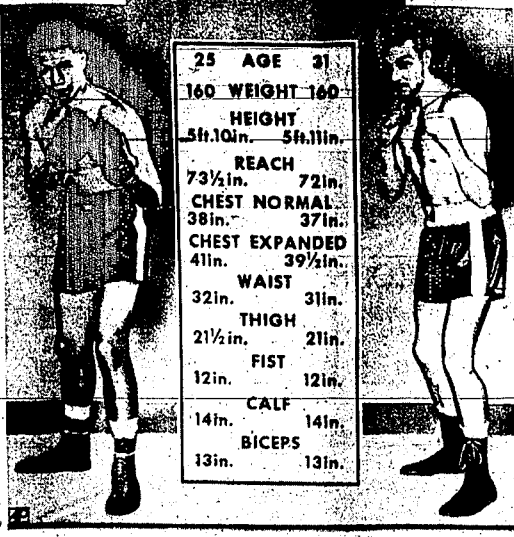

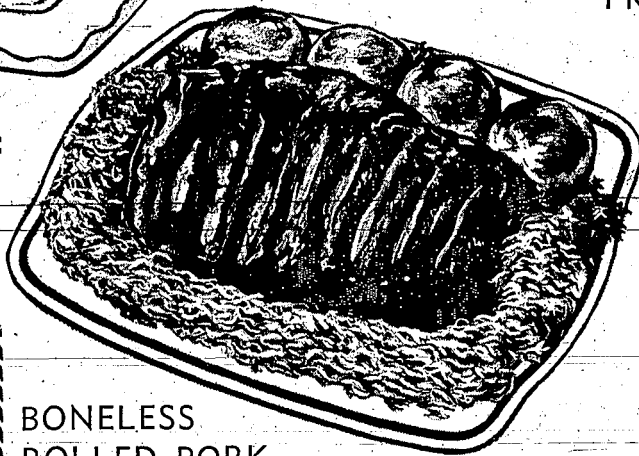

Dairy prices continue downward, with butter off a cent or two a pound in many markets.

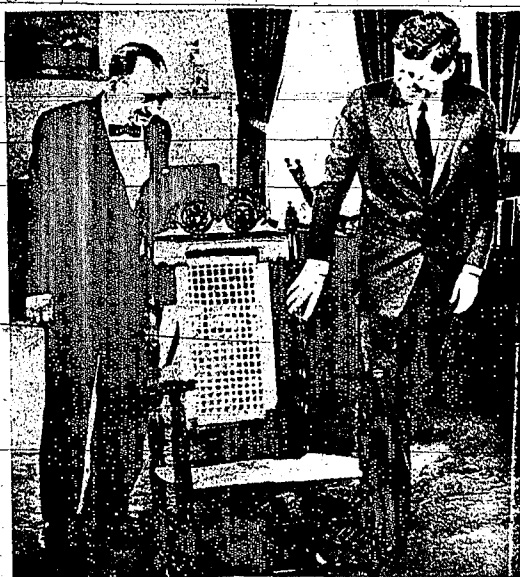
Fruits and vegetables remain on the high side in most markets, after adverse growing weather. This is particularly true in the Southwest and Midwest.

## Power Rates, Gambling Hold Stage as Issues Are Sought

BOISE, April 5 (AP)—Although the primary election now is but 60 days away, the candidates for governor still seem to be searching for "bread and butter" issues to exploit.

Many issues already have been raised during the campaign but only two, so far, seem to have any general appeal. One is the rate increase asked by Idaho Power company and the other, whether Idaho should legalize gambling.

There's been a lot of talk about tax reform, natural resource management and governmental reorganization—but you hear it mainly from the candidates and the press. Unless you've got a gimick to sell such issues, say many observers, you'll seldom quicken the pulse of the average voter.

During the past couple of weeks some of the gubernatorial candidates— notably Democrats Clarence Higer, Emmett, and John Walters, Boise—struck up quite a storm over the power issue.

In essence, they claimed that Idaho Power— in asking for a 13.7 per cent rate increase—reneged on a promise not to raise its rates if it were allowed to build the Browner and Coburn dams in Hells canyon. And both urged the public to appear at a public utilities commission hearing, which will take place this week to oppose the rate hike.

Well, the PUC set aside Tuesday afternoon to hear such protests and five persons showed up. Higer was present in the hearing room, as an attorney representing a client, but made no official statement in his own behalf.

Walters was seen outside with a statement in his hand—which he later gave newsmen—but he did not go in.

Additional hearings are planned in the Magic Valley region in Pocatello and there's a possibility that one or both of these candidates may voice some political views at that time. Walters said he intended to make his appeal to the commission later.

The fact neither appeared before the commission is a public-spirited candidate on Tuesday, however, had tongue wagging against Higer.

One critic said he felt Walters Higer, and other politicians who oppose the rate hike were waiting for a bigger audience. The Boise hearing is smaller than the not-to-large house caucus room of the statehouse.

The same critic also pointed out that witnesses at such hearings are subject to cross-examination on their testimony.

Regardless of either man's reasons for not speaking up politically at Tuesday afternoon's hearing, there's no getting

around the fact the proposed increase is a natural political issue in an election year.

In fact, Idaho Power's choice of timing in the matter has been the subject of considerable discussion both on the street and in print.

The company's president, T. E. Roach, has this to say about the timing: "The steady, inflationary spiral in costs to provide dependable electric service left no alternative to our rate application at this time. The company has counteracted these costs by every means at its disposal, through operating economies, automation and use of advanced technology.

Even these measures finally could not forestall the sharp drop in earnings this year. Therefore, the choice of timing has been dictated entirely by necessity."

The other talkable issue so far in the campaign—gambling—also has stirred up quite a storm. Very few days go by that somebody—and often the chief promoter, Vernon K. Smith, Boise—doesn't mention it.

And that, of course, is right down Smith's alley. He's out to get publicity for his campaign and, good or bad publicity, he's getting it. The public is getting to know his name and to associate it with the drive to legalize local-option, casino-type gambling as a tourist lure in Idaho.

If Smith sticks to his plans to announce and file for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination there's a chance, many are saying, that the eventual nominee will be chosen in a runoff election between the anti-gambling and pro-gambling forces.

Echoes... from the statehouse, the voter-approved merger of Pocatello and Alameda may not be the sugar plum the backers thought it would be. Alameda State Auditor Joe H. Williams has some doubts. He said it might cost Pocatello, which emerges as Idaho's largest city, some \$20,000 in highway users' funds. During 1961, Alameda got \$10,000 in such money while Pocatello received \$52,620.53 as its proportionate share from the state. However, Williams said distribution of the money each quarter is made on the basis of population shown in the last federal census—and that was in 1960. When the cities merge, Alameda won't exist as Alameda any more but as a part of Pocatello, and the 1960 official census won't show the effects of the merger.

Echoes... from the hustings: Tracy Coker, Twin Falls, member of the many seeking the Republican nomination for second district congress, now has nominating petitions circulating in five out of six counties. He says he won't be able to say until April 21—the filing deadline—whether he actually will file for the nomination, however.
