# Slight Drops For Tensions Encouraging

WASHINGTON, April 9—Some slight easing of tension over Berlin has encouraged U.S. officials in plans for further probing of Soviet policy on the future of the Berlin dispute.

Top policymakers are extremely guarded against "leaking" findings ways to improve U.S.-Soviet relations because to step taken by the Soviets so far has involved any real concessions or any pledge as to the future.

Indeed, not only are Washington authorities baffled about what course the communists will follow but there is some belief here that the communists themselves may not be sure.

This uncertainty has produced a feeling among some well-informed officials that U.S.-Soviet relations may well be destined for dramatic developments in the next few weeks, based on important new decisions now being made in Peking and Moscow.

President Kennedy surveyed the Berlin situation in a meeting with policy advisers at the White House over the week-end. The group reportedly included Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson, Soviet affairs Expert Charles E. Bohlen, and Alexander Bundy, Kennedy's staff assistant on foreign policy matters.

"If the voters are taken in by the soft talk on finances, their politicians will enact the biggest income tax increase in the history of the state," Crookham said at a meeting sponsored here by the Shoshone county Republican central committee.

Crookham, an advocate of a state sales tax, claimed his program "reduces both income and property taxes, causes more people to become direct taxpayers and makes tax money available to meet the modest growth needs of Idaho."

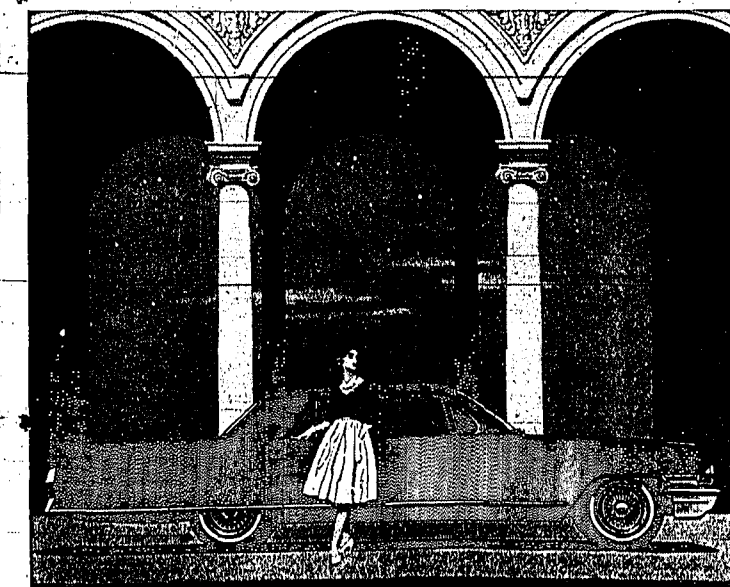

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, April 8—High administration officials feel hopeful that the pattern of an amicable and nonflattering settlement in the Big Three in forthcoming negotiations in other key industries, producing a durable peace on the labor front for the first time in many years.

The important point in official opinion is that the two powerful and stubborn protagonists that once precipitated a 116-day period of industrial action—the United Automobile Workers' union and the massed operators—the administration tried and tested the tools for winning a victory in the public interest. It is, perhaps, the first time that the ultimate consumers have not been the only victims.

The White House, of course, will use these same weapons—early and active intervention, an antiinflationary formula based on productivity, the power of presidential publicity and friendly pro-labor legislation.

With the steel settlement as a shining example, it is believed that few union and industrial leaders will be slow to respond to "national interest" and security appeals such as President Kennedy and Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg directed to the American people over the heads of the parties in the Philippines.

In fact, following the example, in the steel conference, members of the President's council of economic advisers even now are holding talks with the United Mine Workers in advance of the expiration of their contract.

**AUTO PEACE EXPECTED**—Herewith are some reasons why auto makers and labor officials, which lead Washington officials to believe that other basic industries will resolve their differences without a strike and with a non-aggression pact in the near future.

Groups fall into line, it is considered certain that smaller but important interests will follow.

Automobiles: Walter P. Reuther, Henry Ford and the United Automobile Workers' union are expected in this reasoning, will not care to act less responsibly and patriotically than their colleagues in steel.

Moreover, Reuther's members would probably prefer additional fringe benefits and job security, the latter being the main point of contention, and shorter hours will only after a costly strike.

The lack of an increase in steel prices should boost the already high demand for cars, meaning improved economic opportunities.

Politics may also influence Reuther to show unusual restraint. As the unofficial "Democratic boss" of Michigan, he realizes that any economic disturbances in the state by industry would enhance the chances of George Romney, the company car pioneer, to be elected governor of Michigan in the November election.

Prospects bright—Coal: There has not been a strike in the soft coal industry since 1950, and John L. Lewis, still the most important figure in the industry, has announced his formal retirement, and the operators sensed the threat of such competing fuels as oil, gas and natural gas. It is felt that coal is not as serious in the event of higher coal prices resulting from wage boosts.

President Kennedy recently made a friendly overture to Lewis by asking Congress to grant the right of federal eminent domain to pipelines that will haul water and powdered lignite to the Gulf of Mexico, thus eliminating the need for competing energy sources.

It will broaden the market for bituminous, reopen mines and increase employment.

The union is hostile to the recent report of national experts because it questions the practice known as "feather bedding," or the employment of more men than the operators' unions demand in the mines.

The unions also challenge the numerous merger petitions now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

**TRANSPORT**—However, the railroads' plight is expected to force a reasonable settlement by the Brotherhood. Otherwise, the unions may have other alternatives, such as the construction of service and facilities, and the remedy they demand—government ownership, and operation of the system under which American-owned vessels are always a threat to continued operation on the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific coasts.

**TRYING REAL HARD**  
The new report on possibility of constructing Burns Creek dam is a desperation measure to obtain some sort of favorable action on the proposed project in time to help Rep. Ralph Harding in Idaho's elections. The report comes from the army corps of engineers, opening a new avenue aimed at obtaining approval for the project.

Even at the current session of congress, lawmakers turned thumbs down on the proposal and Representative Harding glumly conceded at the time that it appeared to be dead for this session of congress. The new strategy is aimed at reviving the Burns Creek move before Idaho's primary election which is now less than 60 days away.

Because of his campaign which won his election two years ago, Representative Harding almost has to promote some sort of favorable action on Burns Creek. He promised two years ago that he would obtain passage of the Burns Creek project.

If Representative Harding could even point to pending action on Burns Creek, he would have a card to play when he returns to Idaho to campaign. But without something to which he can tie his campaign, Mr. Harding will have a difficult time. Hardly anyone is likely to let him forget his promise of two years ago, including any possible opposition in the Democratic primary election.

Of interest in connection with the announcement on the new tactics concerning Burns Creek was the joint statement from Sen. Frank Church and Reps. Ralph Harding and Gracie Prost. The inference is that Idaho's three Democrats in congress present a united front, and the lone Republican is not effective. Actually, such reports as the army engineers study on Burns Creek are not made available equally to Republicans and Democrats. Whatever party controls the government enjoys the advantage of having such reports first.

It will be interesting to see if congress takes any different view of the new Burns Creek approach than it did of the previous attempt.

**WHAT A GRIND!**  
California's Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown, Democrat, and Richard M. Nixon, Republican, are both vying for the governorship of "head-on" campaigning for the governorship in this fall's election.

This means, assuming that both will be in the state to campaign, that the heaviest of hitting the political trail are both of them. And it means that all concerned, including party officials, are likely to get mighty busy in the next few weeks.

**CALDWELL, April 9** — Don't be alarmed if you see an acre of swan-diving figurines or blossoming parachutes peeling down from the banana belt sky. They're not raiders — just jumpers, out for kicks, playing a game they say is safer than gin rummy.

The Trackers Parachute Sports club, Boise Valley, is the only group of its kind in Idaho. So it would be logical that this fairly unknown pack of airborne citizens could score the wins out of a Sunday duster.

Any sunny week-end afternoon, Frank's flying field west of here buzzes with these jumping bugs. They claim drooping from an airplane and traveling downward at about 120 miles an hour is a sensational way to get away from it all.

The Trackers' club gets its name from the ability of a man to make his forward jumping speed equal to his falling speed, while guiding himself to a target on the ground.

Everybody's welcome to do it. Judicial mothers and grandmothers since the club has one young mother who has made four jumps.

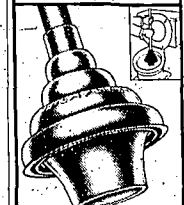

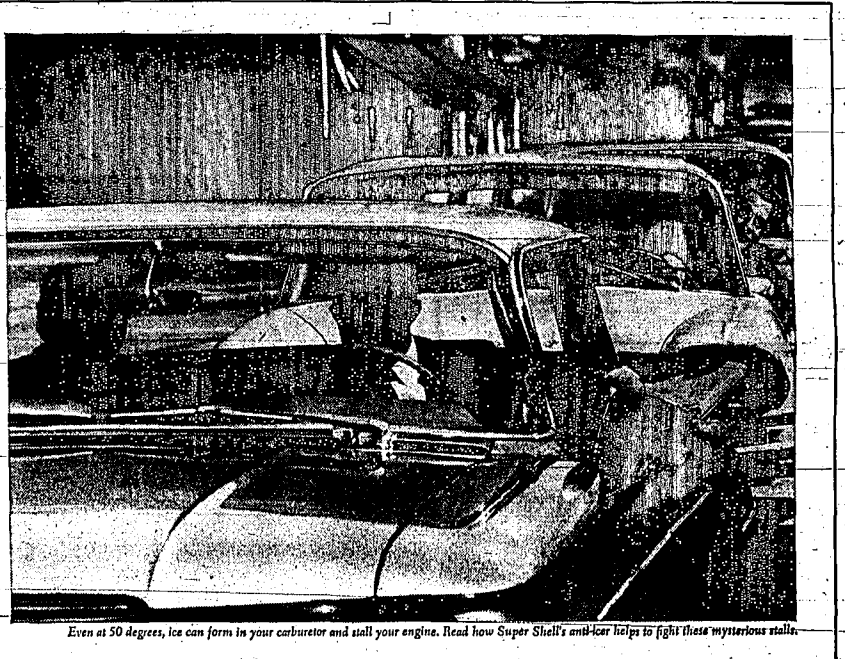

### Right Wing's Role in U. S. Fading Now

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—The specter of a right-wing conservative will influence the course of the major political parties in this fall's congressional elections appears to be fading.

Leaders of both parties, in fact, are busy plotting keep-away stunts against zealous citizens who profess to feel that some of the nation's highest officials are entrapped in a communist conspiracy.

The stunts appear also to those who anxious other things, want to abolish the income tax and to impeach Chief Justice Earl Warren.

This was demonstrated in the dusty reception Republicans and Democrats gave last week to former Maj. Gen. Edwin Walker when he questioned the loyalty of Secretary of State Dean Rusk and others in testimony before a senate armed services subcommittee.

Sen. Strom Thurmond, D., S.C., who sparked the inquiry into alleged muzzleing of military units at which Walker appeared, made it clear several times he was not endorsing the general's statements.

Walker's performance on the witness stand convinced most of the "patriotic" who heard him that the former general is not likely to become an effective spokesman for the far right.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, R., Mass., and he couldn't go along with Walker's charges. Sen. Howard W. Cannon, D., Nev., said they weren't supported by the record.

Sen. John M. Stennis, D., Miss., head of the senate group that heard Walker's testimony, said he has no intention of calling for an inquiry into the records of persons accused by the former general of being soft on communism.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R., N.Y., urged Walker's appearance to test off against what he called the "radical right in the Democratic party." Walker is seeking the Democratic nomination for governor in Texas. His chances are regarded as poor.

Javits said in a New York television broadcast Sunday that "the radical right is not only a threat to the Republican party it is also a threat to the Democratic party."

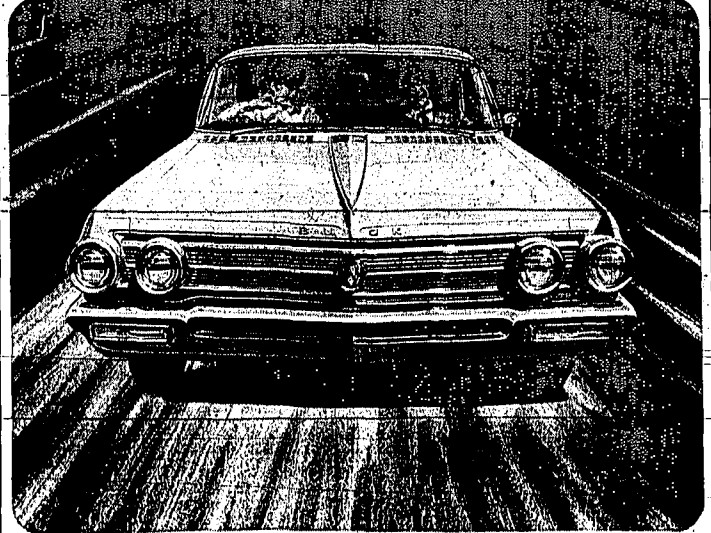

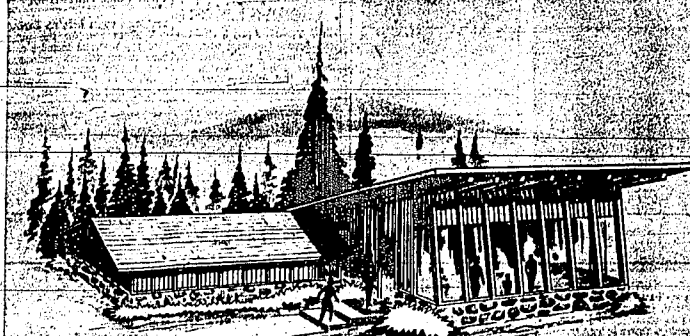

COODEN, April 9 — New tenders as bid invitations for the new Redfish lake visitor center in the region were received by some 100 the public received a boost in-

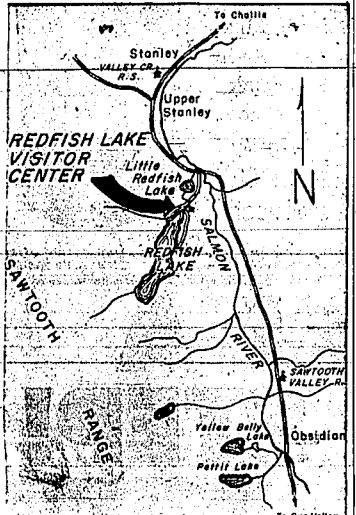
development program which also calls for extensive campground construction and rehabilitation in the Sawtooth mountain region. The area, covering 130,000 acres, lakes in parts of Idaho's Boise, Challis and Sawtooth national forests. This rugged terrain has 70 peaks jutting over 10,000 feet and contains 355 lakes. Recreation activities here include hunting and fishing, riding, hiking, mountain climbing and magnificent scenic vistas for the artist and photographer.

In addition to recreation undertakings, the U. S. forest service program for this area project will be an observation room for movies and slides and an exhibit room. Displays in the exhibit room will feature glaciation and geology of the area, life history of the salmon, the Sawtooth wilderness Primitive area, wildlife, story of the early settlers, history of the early forest service, and a major Indian battle.

Part of an extensive program to help the public better appreciate and enjoy its national forest uses and resources, the center will be built this year within one of Idaho's most famed and scenic recreation spots in the heart of the Sawtooth mountains. Recreation visits last year to Redfish lake alone totaled more than 90,000, according to Ranger Jack Levin.

Related features will include a 400-seat amphitheater on the lakeshore for lectures and films, a nature trail, and road and trailside exhibits at this gateway to the Sawtooth Primitive area. A program commenced last summer and groups of 30 or more took hikes. Over 200 attended each evening lecture.

The Redfish lake visitor center will represent a major effort in the forest service recreational

## Bureaucratic Intrusion at Local Level Hit by Coker

GOODING, April 9 — Tracy Coker, Twin Falls, a candidate for U. S. representative from Idaho's second district, lashed out at the intrusion of "bureaucratic control" into local levels, and the "alarming gains of international communism" during a tour of Gooding county Saturday.

"How can we trust an administration made up of a millionaire president, and aides for the harmonious development of multiple-use resources — water, timber, grazing, wildlife and minerals — with the object of bringing them all to full potential as soon as possible."
