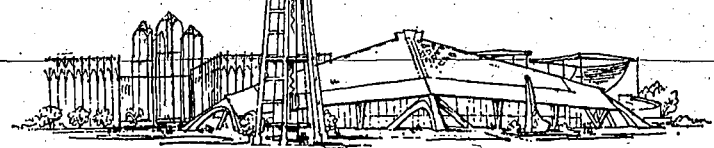

Gem State Is Location for New Reactor

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission announced Monday that a nuclear reactor designed to provide electric power for the state will be located in Idaho if congress approves the program.

Henry Dworak, R-Ia., said the AEC informed him it had approved the "Snap" reactor program for location at the National Reactor Testing station in eastern Idaho.

The program is intended to provide in the late-1960s an electric power source for space engines, advanced communications satellites and other space experiments requiring large amounts of electricity.

Establishment of the program, Dworak added, will require congressional authorization and appropriations.

Dworak is a member of the joint committee on atomic energy.

Promotion of Local Police Is Reported

Fred Becker, Twin Falls patrolman, was appointed to the detective bureau and three other patrolmen were named acting sergeants by Police Chief Roger Tucker Tuesday.

Thomas Thompson, Francis Aherst and Angus Spence were promoted from patrolmen to acting sergeants. The sergeant appointments were made pending city commission approval, Tucker said.

This commission must provide funds for the increased wages in the 1962-1963 city budget, he explained, adding that if the funds are forthcoming the men will be made permanent sergeants July 1.

T. F. Broker Hits Pending Interest Withholding Idea

E. W. McRoberts, Twin Falls writer, said today that he is opposing a pending tax legislation before the United States senate which would require withholding of dividends and interest at the source would be an "unjust, uncalculated for imposition on millions of Americans" including thousands in Magio Valley.

McRoberts pointed out that the withholding bill would allow dividends and interest on stocks and bonds, government securities, mutual funds, bank deposits, savings and loan companies and credit unions.

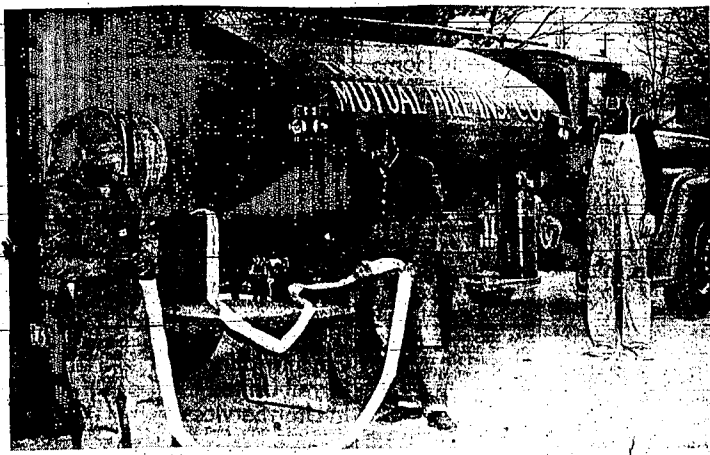
Fire destroyed 200 square feet of flooring and supporting joists at the William Chess, Jr. residence, 325 Oak street, repair crews reported.

Painter States Modern Art Must "Capture the Moment"

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 10 — "We try to capture the moment," is the way Noel Smith, acting assistant professor of art at the University of Idaho and noted modern-artist, explains modern painting. "We have all had the feeling—while experiencing a beautiful sunset, or while doing other things—of being 10 feet tall. This is the moment the modern painter attempts to portray," said the 32-year-old artist. He admits these moments are rare for some, but it happens. This alone isn't modern art. To get me wrong—there's nothing wrong with landscapes. They have their place. However, as

writers today do not write like Shakespeare, artists do not paint like Rembrandt. Times change and so do the arts, and the arts reflect the soul of society—whether society likes what they see or not. The Idaho professor has made a name for himself while attempting to depict the soul of our times. His work has appeared in more than 37 one-man and invitational group shows. The latest is the San Francisco Art association show where a painting of his has been selected for the third year from among more than 1,500 entries. A painting by Mrs. William Sloan, whose husband is an associate professor of architecture has also been chosen for the show. Smith has won numerous art awards, including the coveted Adole. Morrison Hyde medal at the Oakland annual show in 1958. His paintings hang in the collections of the Oakland Art Museum, Brigham Young University and Mr. and Mrs. Sean Barshad. A native of Utah, he attended Oils Art Institute, received a bachelor's degree from BYU and a master's degree from the University of California. Before coming to Idaho, he taught at the Texas and California universities.

Large Capacity Fire Engine Added To Twin Falls County Mutual Force

A 1,500-gallon capacity fire engine, the sixth and largest to be added to the Twin Falls county Mutual Fire Insurance company force, has been assembled by Self's Manufacturing company, 251 Third avenue south, William Atkins, Buhl, secretary-treasurer of the rural volunteer fire department, reports. Atkins notes the new truck has a larger tank capacity than any of the new "pumper" type trucks, capable of holding 200 to 500 gallons of water, rely mainly on drafting water from nearby canals or ditches. He explains that the new truck, which will be stationed at the Twin Falls labor camp, will be used throughout the county for fires during the winter, when most canals are dry.

Other fire trucks in the company are stationed at Buhl, Filer, Kimberly, Castelford and Murtaugh. The Buhl, Filer and Kimberly trucks were purchased through L. M. Curtis and sons, Oakdale, Calif. All three featured Hale pump equipment on commercial trucks. The Castelford and Murtaugh trucks were purchased through Starline Equipment company, Boise, from American Fire Truck company, one of the nation's foremost fire equipment firms, according to Atkins. The pumping equipment on the new truck is capable of pumping 200 gallons of water per minute. The last truck added to the force was the Murtaugh unit, which was purchased about nine years ago. The Twin Falls county Mutual Life Insurance company was formed in June 1911. The company's engines will go to all rural fires, regardless of whether the property-owners are members of the company.

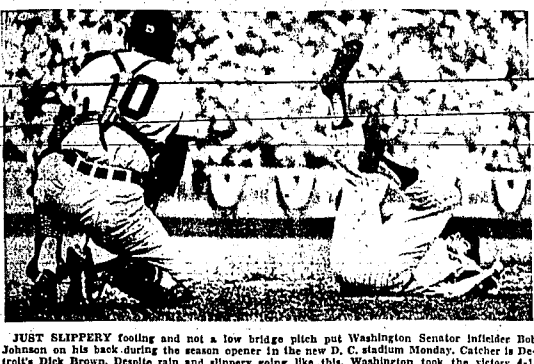

Team rosters must be in by May 1. The players on teams that have disbanded will not be allowed to play on another team of their choice. Their names will be put together and players will draw the names.

Craner said if there are enough players to make a team, a team will be formed before names are drawn.

If a player doesn't want to play on a certain team, he may put his name up for selection and be chosen by another team, Craner noted.

Umpires will umpire behind home plate for the first and second leagues, and in all other leagues umpires will umpire behind the pitcher.

There will be two adult base coaches on the playing field. In all other leagues there will be only one adult and one player base coach on the playing field.

Team winning the first four places during league play will receive ribbons. Playoffs will be played between the first four places with finals in days later park. No ribbons will be awarded.

Craner said pitchers from the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grade leagues will pitch only three innings or nine outs, and in the seventh, eighth and ninth grade leagues, pitchers may pitch five innings or 15 outs. There will be no exceptions, Craner said.

All players must play in every game, Craner stated. A player will not be allowed to play in a game if he has violated the coach's practice rules. If he violates the rules, the coach should notify the umpire so it will not be a forfeit game.

No team can call a regular team practice before a game, Craner warned. He said the time of the games will be written on the score sheets and all games will be played five innings or one and one-half hours, whichever

Special Interests Seeking Role in State Legislature

BOISE, April 10 (AP)—There's more than just city versus farm representation at stake in the running dispute over Idaho's legislative apportionment.

A large number of special interest groups are making a great time to make their voice heard for control of those who will serve in the state's 57th legislature.

Besides agriculture and labor, many others have men and women on the road bidding for candidate support. They include the municipal league, industry, trading stamps, education, gambling and several other interests with axes to grind.

Spurring them on is the fact that both houses of the next Idaho legislature will have not only new faces but in many cases—new leaders. And these will come regardless of what happens to reapportionment in the elections.

Should reapportionment come to pass—and it probably would take federal court action to accomplish it this year—better than half of the house members and nearly all of the senate would be new ones.

And even without it, natural attrition will claim at least a third of the present members and maybe even more.

Coupled with this is the fact that many of those in the delivery seats in 1961 will not seek reelection. Three key senate leaders, for instance, are out already. President pro-tem A. W. Nesice, R., Bonneville, is running for the GOP nomination for lieutenant governor.

Senate minority leader J. Ray Cox, D., Kootenai, is seeking the Democratic nomination for attorney general. And the assistant minority leader, James Donahue, D., Wash., is quitting to devote his time to the practice of law.

In the house, it appears that speaker W. D. Eborle, R., Ada, probably won't run again. Majority leader Orval Hansen, R., Bonneville, is bidding for congress and minority leader C. H. Huet, D., Gem, is running for governor.

The health, political and otherwise, of many other leaders of some of them committee chairmen—is in question.

Thus, confronted with these factors, many of the special interest groups believe that this may be the year to elect the men and women who can help them get what they want.

Some of these groups, of course, have made their pitch to the candidates in the past. But, say many who have been out beating the bushes, not with the clubs-are-down effort they're giving it this year.

The pro-gambling interests already are on record. You have but to read Vernon K. Smith's so-called "blue book" to know he's quite serious about having his sympathies—among the legislative candidates for his program of legal, loan-option gambling, Church and other interests of the so-called "do good" variety are equally as anxious to get elected representatives, who oppose gambling.

Labor is out to stop a reported movement for "right to work" legislation while some segments of industry, agriculture and business are out to promote it. And tax reform, municipal and educational financing—and perhaps the trading stamp business the last legislature tried to regulate—also will be at stake when the votes are counted.

New legislators and new leaders are bound to affect the hopes and plans of these special interests. You can expect some moderate changes in legislative philosophy even without reapportionment. But with it, say some, anything is likely to happen when the 57th regular session of the Idaho legislature convenes in 1963.

And the course this philosophy takes may well be determined by the success of those now in the field seeking candidate support.

There's only a rumor so far of any kind of competition in the June 5 non-partisan judicial election for the two supreme court justices seeking re-election.

To date, as far as anyone in the statehouse can determine, only Chief Justice E. B. Smith and Justice C. J. Taylor have taken out nominating petitions

for the high court. If anyone else has obtained petitions for this purpose, they've been mighty discreet about it.

An unconfirmed rumor is circulating that a member of the bar in Pocatello might bid for one of the posts. But so far, that's all it is—a rumor.

Unless something happens between now and April 21—the deadline for filing petitions—it looks like Smith and Taylor will be reelected without contest.
