Newsman Hit Him, Walker Tells Texans

DALLAS, April 11 (AP)—Former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker said Monday he punched a Washington newsman because the newsman last week jabbed him three times with his elbow.

"The incident happened when Walker, a candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in Texas, went to Washington to testify before a senate subcommittee studying "muzzling" of military officers.

The newsman was Tom Kelly, a correspondent for the Washington Daily News.

Walker said he decided to tell his side of the story because "the liberal, left-wing press—especially in the East—would like to keep it quiet."

Kelly said the former general punched him when he tried to ask Walker a question about George Lincoln Rockwell, leader of the American Nazi party who was forbidden to attend the committee hearings while wearing a swastika.

Walker said newspaper reports that he slugged Kelly because of a question were untrue. He said he punched the newsman because he "gave me three bloody elbow jabs and grabbed my arm from the rear."

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State Revises 27-Year-Old Almanac; Requests Flood in

BOISE, April 10—The word is out that Idaho is finally revising its 27-year-old almanac. And letters are flooding into the department of commerce and development, mailed anywhere from Lapwai to Jackson, Miss.

Libraries, clubs, schools and magazines are the biggest takers. The Seattle, Wash., public library has ordered 14 copies. Take this as an idea of how hungry people have become for information on Idaho—Some of the orders are from Brockton, Mass.; Burbank, Pasadena and Sacramento, Calif.; Jacksonville, Fla.; East Orange, N. J.; Peoria and Chicago; Ill.; Jackson, Miss.; and from Look and Life magazines.

This is in addition to Idaho's own cities and counties. It was announced about one month ago Idaho was going to print a new almanac. The last one was printed in 1935 and much has changed—even Idaho's name.

The 500-page, standard-sized almanac is a giant undertaking for the small department of commerce and development. But Secretary Louise Shadduck's bible eyes light up when she talks about it.

"It shouldn't be every 27 years this book is revised," she said. "The writing in the book is dated through several departments of the University of Idaho, and supervisors and lead-

ers of all of Idaho's industries, churches, schools, agriculture and city and county leaders and newspapers.

The editing and compilation is done by the department's small staff. State historian Merle Wells has written the history of Idaho for the book.

A limited number of copies will be printed. Miss Shadduck said 5,000 will be on the first press run. And the chance of any of them being out on view-stands is slim.

The book, estimated to be off the presses by the middle of August, will contain pictures and maps. An effort is being made to reproduce actual boundaries of the Idaho counties as they were when the state joined the union. But this too is doubtful because of costs.

The book will sell for \$3.50. Most of them will be with soft covers. Complimentary copies will be with the hardbound covers.

The importance of such a book is made by the large number of out-of-state purchases so far. A good fact said Miss Shadduck, can often serve more importantly than a stack of promotional material.

Anyone wanting the Idaho book of facts will have to order it from the department of commerce.

Conley Ward Notes Stands In Campaign

A Democratic candidate for governor Tuesday declared his opposition to the sales tax and called for an anti-monopoly law to take the retailer and processor out of primary production in Agley Ward, Maring, was in Twin Falls Tuesday campaigning for a place on the Democratic ticket in November.

"I oppose the sales tax as not necessary," Ward said. "It is a device to make the rich richer and the poor poorer."

Also, the candidate said the state highway department and other special funds agencies should be reorganized to create greater administrative economy and to make them more responsible to the will of the people.

Ward endorsed the commodity by commodity approach to farm problems and said he favors the family-size farm as the basic unit of production.

Bagland said the new junior high school will have access to the three streets near the school.

In other business, two teachers were hired by the board. They are Elizabeth H. Molyneux, fourth grade teacher at Lincoln school, and Francis M. Priestad, third grade teacher at Washington school.

Funds Asked For Fight on Forest Pests

About one and one-half million dollars has been requested by the forest service for the coming fiscal year to fight the pest problem reported Eno Henry Dvorshak, R. Ida, Wednesday after he heard testimony from Forest Service officials last week.

"We are faced today with probably the largest number and epidemic of pests that we have ever had before in our history," he noted.

He noted that the officials did express optimism for the coming year because of the very cold weather and heavy snow encountered in Idaho the past winter which may have reduced the insect numbers by a large amount. They added a special check on the blisters and blisters that we have had before in our history.

Blister rust, disease infestation in trees, also was discussed at the hearing and was pointed out that antibiotics have done a large job in controlling blister rust in the area, but in Idaho forest. Officials also noted that because of the antibiotics about one million acres of white pines are being treated and sent back into green forests.

Holme-bid \$31,124 on the construction of a surface on 12,529 miles and resurfacing on 8,806 miles of state route 28 from Baker High Bridge and from Salmon to Baker in Lemhi county. 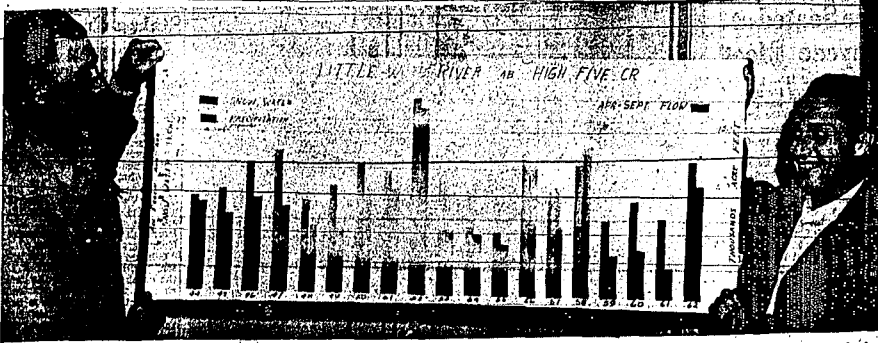

Library Shelving Has Been Donated by Club to Library

Three new sections of wooden shelving were donated Tuesday to the Twin Falls public library children's room by the Twin Falls Twentieth Century club. The donation highlighted National Library week activities April 8-14, at the local library.

Mrs. L. E. Salladay, president of the club, notes that the donation is only one of many projects undertaken by the club in the past few years. In 1960, the club financed construction of peg-board panels along the basement hallway displays.

Other projects include shelving for the youth room in 1957 and 1958, and donation of chairs and drapes for the youth room in 1958.

The new children's room shelving will hold an additional 400-500 books. Two sets of books are now placed on top of older shelving, which is filled. New sections of shelving will be 42 inches high and 98 inches long, with a total of 18 shelves.

Mrs. Salladay points out that the club was one of the clubs which worked to encourage construction of the current library and, as far back as 1928-29, purchased tables and chairs for the children's room. The group has also contributed paintings to the library.

"It is quite evident," Arthur T. DeWolter, library director said Tuesday, "that without the support of organizations which have contributed to the library in the past years, that adequate service could not be obtained in our city. It is imperative that continued interest is shown in the library."

He added that only \$27,500 was originally spent to construct the library, which is now valued at over \$190,000 in replacement costs.

Youth Pleads Innocent for Death Count

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., April 11 (AP)—John J. Chermuckin, 16, accused of killing the man who fatally shot his father and wounded his mother, today pleaded innocent to a manslaughter charge.

When asked by the superior court clerk how he pleaded to the charge, the youth replied in a barely audible voice, "not guilty."

Judge John R. Thain set May 15 as the sentencing date for the start of the manslaughter trial. Chermuckin is free on \$10,000 bond.

Last Feb. 16, the Chermuckins were having a birthday party for the youngest of their six children, Carl, 4.

Albert Shipley, 65, arrived at the home and demanded to see Mrs. Alice Hill, one of the guests. He was ordered to leave by John's father, Edward, 41, a factory worker.

At this point, according to police, Shipley fired one shot at Edward, killing him. He then fired at John's mother, Veronica, 46, who was standing in a doorway.

John and his brother, Edward, Jr., 16, hearing the shots, ran downstairs to the living room and disarmed Shipley. Police said John was hearing Shipley with the assassin's own gun when Edward shouted, "Dad is dead." John then pumped the four remaining shots into Shipley who died within an hour at a hospital, according to police.

State Shuns USA Labels For Pavings

BOISE, April 11 (AP)—The state highway board, replying to a query by Rep. Ralph Harding, D., Idaho, says it is steering clear of "made in USA" label on highway construction materials.

Patient-Doctor Relations Noted By T. F. Surgeon

RUBERT, April 11—The importance of good patient-doctor relationships in any treatment was stressed by Dr. Frederick Koulouch, Twin Falls, when he spoke at a meeting of the Mindoka Memorial hospital staff.

Dr. Koulouch listed three things a patient wants when he goes to a doctor: comfort, the ability to carry on his normal life, and security. A doctor must be able to satisfy these basic needs at the same time he is treating the patient.

He told of the growth of the use of hypnosis in medicine through the medical profession's efforts to understand and alleviate the lack of any of the three basic needs.

Life presents a continual struggle against both physical dangers as represented by actual injuries, and from illness caused by germs, he said.

The power of suggestion in the treatment of illness was recognized in ancient times, Dr. Koulouch said, and is used by the professional man as well as by the unscrupulous person who uses it for his own ends.

He advised each person to find a family physician in whom he has confidence, and to follow his advice. He also suggested regular checkups, since, he said, early diagnosis means a better chance of cure.

The importance of maintaining freedom in the choice of a doctor is something every person should consider, especially deciding whether or not to support the current trend toward socialized medicine. Under such control, the individual would lose that right of choice, he noted.

Dr. Koulouch also asked those present to find out just what the proposed medical care legislation did offer, stating that some claims being made for the bill were not contained in the bill itself.

Dr. Koulouch, a surgeon, pointed out that his particular field of medicine is probably the last to accept the use of hypnosis. Increasing emphasis has been placed on psychosomatic treatment of various types of illnesses over the last 10 years, the speaker stated, adding that dentistry was perhaps one of the first fields to put it to use.

Dr. Koulouch gave a demonstration of group hypnosis, and also a demonstration with an individual, showing the power of suggestion under ordinary circumstances.

During the business meeting, conducted by Dr. Carl Keel, president, reports of various committees were made, including an announcement by Mrs. Jerry Pulwarty that women are needed to help out Wednesday mornings with the beauty bar program.

TRY A PEGAN RING
How about a cinnamon-pecan ring for Easter morning breakfast? Teen-ager Sandra Swartz, Drummond, Okla., has a fine recipe. It won her a \$100 scholarship at the recent 4-H club conference in Chicago, awarded by General Foods corporation in a food and nutrition project.

CINNAMON-PECAN RING
(Makes 1 ring)
1 cup lukewarm milk
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup soft shortening
1 package dry yeast
1 egg
3/4 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup corn syrup (optional)
Malted butter
Chopped pecans
Combine milk, 1/2 cup sugar, the salt, shortening and dry

yeast and stir until sugar and yeast are dissolved. Stir in egg. Then gradually add flour until dough can be handled easily. Turn out on to a lightly-floured board and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled in bulk—about 2 hours. Then punch dough down and knead lightly. Let rise another 45 minutes.

Meanwhile, combine 1/2 cup sugar and the cinnamon. If desired, pour corn syrup into a well-greased 9-inch tube pan. Then form dough into walnut-sized balls; dip in melted butter and then into sugar-cinnamon mixture. Place in tube pan, sprinkling each layer of dough balls with pecans. Let rise about 45 minutes. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 35 to 40 minutes.

New Jersey Will Try New Boxing Rules
