

Bishop Raps LDS Action In England

DURHAM, England—April 16 — An Anglican Bishop denounced today what he called the "dangerous perversion of doctrine and practice" of the LDS church and warned British Christians to be on guard against it.

The Bishop of Durham, Dr. Maurice Harland, told a diocesan meeting:

"The history of the Mormons, and what they believe, seem to us so utterly absurd that we have not taken them seriously and consequently they have made great strides forward.

"Our people should be on their guard and aware of the attractions, especially to children and young people, of well-equipped Mormon buildings and social activities which can allure them from the Christian faith and lead them into dangerous perversions of doctrine and practice."

"Mormon missionaries are quite active in England.

Harland said some members of the clergy had written to him asking of the activities of Mormons. One told him, he said, that young American Mormons had as their associates "mostly dim-witted girls."

"The people who visit the bishop," he said, "are always repeating in the best heretical tradition."

China Notes Sending Aid To Russians

TOKYO, April 16 (AP) — Communist Chinese foreign minister, Yeh Chi-chuang, said today his country has supplied many types of machinery to the Soviet Union to help Soviet economic construction, Peiping radio reported.

The broadcast said Yeh made the statement at a banquet given in Peiping for the Soviet trade-economic delegation led by S. P. Frolkoff, Soviet minister of foreign trade, and M. N. Sulov, vice chairman of the state committee for foreign economic relations.

The Soviet delegation is negotiating trade and economic relations for 1962.

There have been frequent reports of trade difficulties between red China and the Soviet Union. The outbreak of their ideological dispute over peaceful coexistence and Soviet aid to non-communist underdeveloped nations.

Red China is said to feel Soviet aid should go to communist nations. The Chinese report a hard time meeting trade commitments because of crop failures, since they must pay for imports of machinery largely with agricultural products. There have been some reports the Soviet Union has cut off trade with red China provided under previous agreements.

Frost, who read some of his poetry — at President Kennedy's inauguration, was full of praise for the President as a man who has "some poetry in him."

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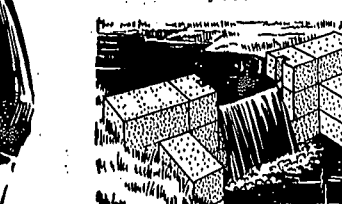


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High School Cast to Present Joint Birthday Party Attended

WASHINGTON, April 16—"I could have been President. I needed only 5 per cent more votes in the Negro vote in the 1960 election. I've gotten them if I had campaigned harder."

These words of regret, which compose the first paragraph in a revealing and exclusive interview in "Ebony," a leading Negro magazine, by Edward M. Nixon warn that he will not duplicate his 1960 neglect of the Negro element in his current campaign for Governor of California. It is estimated that 90 per cent of the state's Negro voters are registered as Democrats.

The former vice president says that he will fight to get Negroes on the same ticket, and that he will appoint them to top positions if he is elected. Whichever party wins the election in 1962 because he was "afraid" that he would meet a cold welcome from small and hesitant Negroes will concentrate on them in his effort to defeat Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

"WHAT NIXON MUST DO"—The article is entitled "What Republicans Must Do to Win the Negro Vote." A more apt heading would be "What Nixon Must Do, etc."

The former president throws an entirely new twist on former-President Eisenhower's refusal to intervene on behalf of the Rev. "Nixon said he nodded his head, then answered, 'I will not let myself be used in such a cause.' Perhaps this incident best illustrates the feeling of the first man to lose out as President because Negroes didn't support him."

Big Government

During the past year there has been considerable speculation over relations between U. S. business and the Kennedy administration. Developments involving the steel industry should eliminate any doubt, at least concerning that segment of our business.

During negotiations between steel companies and the United States workers of America, it became perfectly obvious that the government was exerting considerable pressure on both sides, but particularly against management. The theme was that any settlement had to be non-inflationary, the general objective being to avoid any increase in the price of steel, the basic commodity that always leads any new round of inflation.

The deep involvement of government in the contract talks was illustrated clearly in the means by which the settlement was announced. The news came out of Washington, D. C., although the negotiations had been conducted in Pittsburgh. It has been reported that newsmen were still waiting outside the Pittsburgh conference room when the settlement word was flashed from Washington.

Although not official, the action signified government intervention and "leaking" settlement news from Washington was not good judgment. General pleasure at the terms was expressed by government sources and it was emphasized that no steel price increase would be necessary. There was no word to that effect from the steel companies.

Then less than a week later, U. S. Steel announced price boosts which normally would have been carried right down through the steel industry, the traditional method of our past.

Everyone is aware of President Kennedy's reaction to what was a severe blow to his anti-inflation policy. The Associated Press reported he spoke "in cold anger and disdain." If the steel industry felt government pressure before, it was nothing to the pressure that developed.

Even though the price increase of steel ran contrary to President Kennedy's expressed wishes, there's reason to question his judgment in loosening congressional and various bureaus on the steel industry. Other segments of industry aren't likely to miss the point. If government can dictate, in effect, labor contracts and prices, then industrial nationalization is only a step away. And that is socialism.

When President Kennedy took the matter to the public, he charged the steel industry had failed to show "a higher sense of business responsibility for the welfare of the country." If that is so, then there is a similar failure on the part of government in failure to consider the welfare of the taxpayer. The pot called the kettle black, all sorts of investigations were started or re-started. The behind-the-scenes pressure must have been vicious.

By now, everyone knows how U. S. Steel folded under all the government pressure that was brought to bear. It's almost inconceivable what must have gone on behind the scenes, but it should be of deep concern to every citizen. There was a day when big business held a whip hand over the nation.

But when government can force one of the 10 largest corporations in the nation to comply with administration wishes, it becomes crystal clear that big government has terrific power, perhaps far more than should be condoned. Ostensibly the steel reversal was forced on behalf of the general welfare of the public, but better guess would be that the Kennedy administration was giving far more consideration to its own welfare and plans.

It's something that could cause some nightmares for Mr. Taxpayer.

Special Diets May Be Used For Fallouts

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., April 16 (AP)—Scientists reported today a possible lead toward developing special fallout shelter diets — to give people some protection against radiation in the event of nuclear attack.

The Massachusetts Institute of Technology researchers said experiments with mice showed that a dry, powdered "synthetic" diet doubled the resistance of the animals against near-lethal doses of X-rays — as compared with the animals fed so-called "natural" diets.

The synthetic diets consisted essentially of milk protein in the form of casein; sugars in the form of dextrose, dextrin and sucrose; lard and corn oil; furnish fats; and also vitamins and minerals. One of these diets contained a yeast supplement.

The natural diets consisted of combinations of more conventional foodstuffs, such as wheat and dried milk.

Dr. H. A. Dymally and S. A. Miller of MIT's department of nutrition, together with a graduate assistant, John Malone, told about it in a report to the annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology.


