WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Western Electric company officials have acknowledged they paid the government 3 million dollars to rent factory space for the Nike missile contract.

JACKSON, Miss., April 18 (AP)—At least 300 persons fled their homes for the third time within a year today as the rampaging Pearl river rose toward an expected 34-foot crest—16 feet above flood stage.

The U. S. weather bureau here reported the river had risen to 32.4 feet and was still rising. The bureau said little or no rain was expected today.

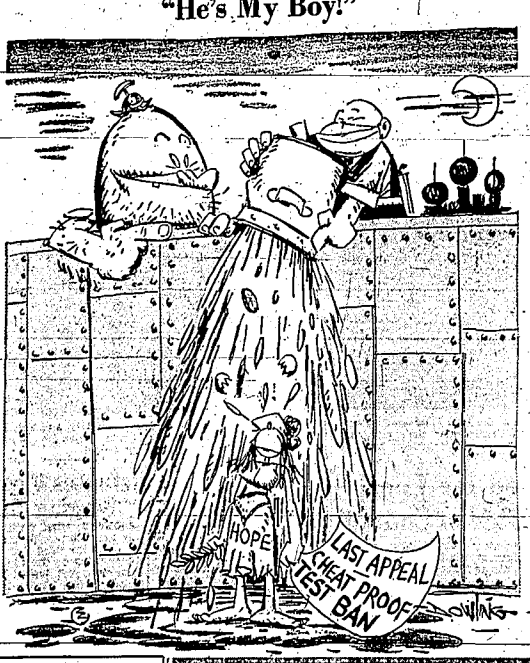

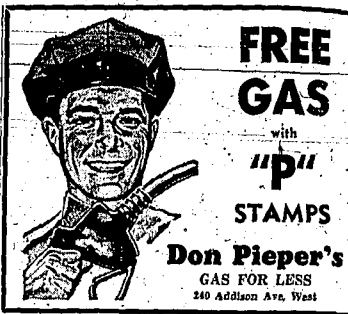

Southern Potato Growers Blast Controlled Market

ATLANTA, April 18 (AP)—Proposed national authority to regulate volume and quality of truck potatoes was blasted Tuesday by a group of Alabama and Florida growers in an uninvited restriction. The group met under American Farm Bureau sponsorship in advance of a final U.S. department of agriculture hearing on a proposed marketing agreement and order, which would be financed by nominal assessments on production.

Names of three committees from Alabama and one from Florida charged that the proposed order would stifle the industry, invite black marketing and lead to government-sponsored

ed peasantry. It claimed that no substantial number of growers has sought the order.

But, the first witness to appear at the Atlanta hearing was a large bloc of North Carolina growers on record in favor of the proposal.

The former heavyweight titlist, showing a few rounds over weight but still in pretty good condition for a 48-year-old man, sat smoking quietly in a small, smoky room above the Radio Rodeo, holding a tiny-looking cigarette in his massive hand.

"When I leave here I go to Japan, South Africa," he said reeling off a list of countries on his touring agenda for the next few months. Despite the traveling from tank town to foreign countries, the Preem can't ready for retirement. "No, not yet. I can still go where I want."

Switching to the boxing scene, Carnera talked about the recent death of Kid Farel, who was killed defending his welterweight title three weeks ago.

"I blame the doctor," says Carnera. "He's supposed to know. You can't blame the referee (Rudy Goldstein). He's been refereeing for many years. He knows his job upside-down. You have to blame the doctor. If the 'boy' isn't ready, he shouldn't fight."

Asked if detection might be nearly impossible in a case such as this, Carnera smiled. "He's gone to school many years. He's supposed to know. He spent a lot of money and a lot of time to learn these things. If you have to blame, blame the doctor. He was paid to know."

"Maybe he was brought along too fast," Carnera said. "He did not have many fights. Many boys are brought along too fast now."

Carnera, who was born in Italy and still speaks broken English, lives in Los Angeles. He is home in Italy.

"Every night another fight or another town," he smiles. "I don't know how many matches a man can have. Of interest to those brought up hearing the tales of Carnera's prowess, the ex-champ didn't seem as big as legends of the past. He is, of course, still a big man in this world but with the continued increase of size in the sports world, Carnera didn't seem as big as he had mentally pictured he would be. Except for his hands, in his right hand, his huge fist seemed practically to wrap to the elbow.

His trademark in the ring is the huge right fist, naturally. Matched against pudgy Jerry Graham, Carnera tolerated a little "villain" cutting up and then let the mean audience know he was fooling around had ended as far as he was concerned by bringing "Big Bertha" up in a boxing stance.

The match itself lasted quick with Primo winning in two straight falls. He hardly worked up a sweat.

Walking out of the ring to the dressing room, he appeared to have his first moment of peace. He sure all night when he scooped up a small child in his huge hands and lifted her overhead.

A small knot of fans had appeared for a round of autographs, small scraps of paper. An elderly, gray-haired gentleman, who quite obviously had intended the match for this single purpose, scrambled out of the stands to shake hands with the man he'd probably cheered many years ago as a champion.

The old man probably had fulfilled something that was quite important to himself. To see a former champion, a great athletic figure and a near-living legend. To do it was nearly the same.

But to think of a man who had earned thousands of dollars with his fists and climbed to the top of the profession in Twin Falls, Idaho appearing before 118 fans was not in line with the mind of Carnera. He didn't mind. He said he liked traveling around wrestling.

But watching him disappear into a doorway leading to a men's dressing room only made one think "how the mighty do fall."
