Minuteman, Polaris Due For A-Warhead Test in Pacific; Armada at Sea

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—The Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missile and the submarine-launched Polaris rocket are expected to get their first tests with nuclear warheads in the new U. S. test series about to begin in the Pacific. Informed sources suggested this probability today—as T-day—the date for triggering the first U. S. atmospheric tests in nearly four years—appeared imminent.

U. S. to Launch Super Missile For Pictures of Outer Space

CAPT. CANAVERAL, Fla., April 23 (AP)—The United States readied its most powerful space rocket today for an attempt to propel the Ranger 4 spacecraft to the moon to snap television pictures and record scientific data. The launch crew has an 87-minute period to fire the 10-story-tall Atlas-Agena B vehicle to put the spyship on course for the 239,541-mile journey to the moon.

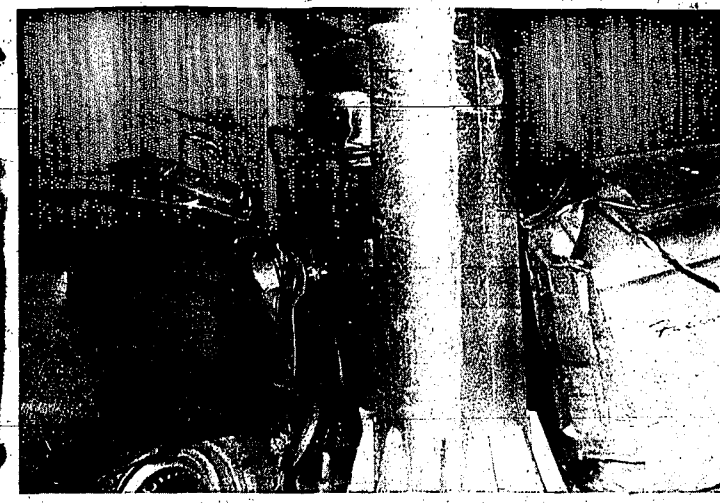

Price of Freedom

Magic Valley farmers opposing federal controls of agriculture have pointed out they have little or no voice in determining what they will plant in the way of crops brought under controls. They do have the privilege of not planting any of those particular crops, but that little freedom of selection narrows their farming operation considerably. They also point out the myth in any contention that farmers had a free hand in control arrangements. Farmers have never had a free choice between controls and no controls. The qualifying terms involved in the so-called elections have given farmers little or no choice where controls were involved. As one farmer expresses the wheat situation, "I can vote only one way so long as the government holds that surplus wheat pistol to my head."

But once involved, what can farmers do? Some Twin Falls voters think they can do little. They're looking at possibilities of electing a congressional delegation that will reflect their thoughts.

That course of action is a rough road, but farmers point out the control road is even rougher with no end in sight. If the movement catches fire and spreads, then eventually there's a chance of ending the controls farce through congressional action. It's the only way to reverse the trend of the last 30 years. Any attempt at individual revolt can lead only to such tragedies as the one in Arkansas. James Wier, Lake Village, Ark., had a running battle with federal bureaucrats, but under the laws, he had no chance of winning. It all developed from Wier's action in ignoring rice acreage allotments. He paid a penalty of \$8,900 for overplanting his 1958 crop, then the government went to court over an assessment of \$16,972 for overplanting the 1959 crop. Last Feb. 12, U. S. District Judge J. Smith Henley upheld constitutionality of acreage allotments and signed a judgment of more than \$22,000 against Wier.

The inevitable end came last week when a government auction was held at Lake Village and Wier's farm was sold at auction. Farmers may have their own thoughts on the auction sale. The 944-acre farm was sold for \$60,000. Previously, Wier valued the farm at some \$300,000. In reporting the farm auction, the Associated Press said many farmers in the rich Mississippi river valley are sympathetic with Wier. One farmer testified at a hearing before an agricultural stabilization and conservation committee that "He's doing what a lot of us would like to do and can't afford to do."

It's something for everyone to keep in mind as Twin Falls county farmers voice their thoughts on federal controls and tackle the problem of electing a congressional delegation that will reflect their wishes in the matter. City residents here don't think they have no stake in any farm or farm controls. In many respects, they will voice different thoughts. What governmental action is there today that doesn't reflect in some degree every citizen? You might ask James Wier, Lake Village, Ark.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, April 23 — The Kennedy-Bush clash over Big Steel's price-wage relations and other cooperation practices under WPA and War Relocation Authority barrages have furnished the Democrats with what they believe will be a formidable issue for the coming congressional elections and possibly the 1964 presidential contest. Based on several recent discussions, it appears that the Republicans will be able to take the Kennedy-Bush and Coolidge-Hoover cases, as well as the political implications of "Big Business" with the economic and social stigmas which such an alliance may convey to the voters. The GOP will be so accused on the basis of the "Whirligig."

It is the general belief that 90 per cent of the nation's most influential leaders of business and industry are Republicans because of their general opposition to the providing of public funds in elections. Home runs by Jack Depalo and Bruce Camilli plus timely clutch hitting by most of the Idaho Falls Yankee team spoiled the season opener of the Magic Valley Cowboys 9-5 Sunday. The two clubs will meet again at 7:30 p.m. today. A crowd of 2,178 adults and an estimated 1,200 children, watched the Cowboys make their debut and saw some classy fielding performances turned in by shortstop Frank Rubino and third baseman Jim Couch. Right-handed George Bechtold and reliever Stevenson scattered eight Magic Valley hits as the Yankees stayed on top most of the game.

Indians, Pirates Sport Easter Wins

Cleveland and Pittsburgh turned out in baseball's finest sports on Easter Sunday but the poor bedraggled New York Mets showed up in their same old basement rag. Nor did the New York pinstripes, display the fancy finery they usually do as they suffered a pair of embarrassing defeats at the hands of the Indians, 7-5 and 9-3.

The general pattern was toward extremes. The Indians visited from a fifth-place tie to the top of the American league by breaking a 19-game losing streak at Yankee stadium dating back to May 1959.

Danny Mortuaga's Pirates led a modern major league record by beating the Mets 4-3 for their 10th victory without a loss since the season opened.

And the lightly-regarded Kansas City A's moved into a virtual three-place tie with the Yankees by defeating the Chicago White Sox twice 7-1 and 7-5.

On the dead side was the Mets' ninth straight loss without a victory, equalling a National League record set by Brooklyn at the start of the 1918 season. The St. Louis Cardinals also considered it a black Sunday when they lost their first two games of the season following seven straight victories. The Chicago Cubs beat them 1-3 and 8-0.

In other N.L. games, the Cincinnati Reds beat the San Francisco Giants 6-4, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the Atlanta Braves 6-3 and the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Houston Colts 4-3.

The Baltimore Orioles took over second place in the A.L. with an 8-3 victory over the Washington Senators, the Detroit Tigers beat the Boston Red Sox 8-5 and the Minnesota Twins blanked the Los Angeles Angels 5-0.

Gradually, the National League race is much closer than the one in the American. That's not the case this time though. Already there is a 12-game gap between the first place Pirates and the last-place Mets.

In the American league, on the other hand, only a game and a half separates the first nine clubs.

U. S. Chances In Olympics Are Brighter


