

Shot to Moon Is Success

GOLDSTONE, Calif., April 26 (AP)—The United States scored a major advance in space today when the crippled spacecraft Ranger 4 crash-landed on the far side of the moon.

It was this country's first success in seven attempts to land a piece of hardware on the moon and virtually duplicated the feat of Russia's Lunik II which hit the moon Sept. 12, 1959.

A space official called the feat another of long flights in space in the past year.

James E. Webb, head of the national aeronautics and space administration, said Ranger 4 was much more complex than anything the Soviets have attempted.

Dr. William Pickering, director of NASA's jet propulsion laboratory which built Ranger 4, said that despite the failure of the guidance system and the spacecraft's fact that it hit the moon "gives us confidence we can send instruments to the moon with the accuracy needed."

He said another Ranger to take close-up television pictures of the moon's surface will be launched by the end of the year.

Scientists at the jet propulsion laboratory, where Ranger 4 was built, tracked its faint radio beacon at the Goldstone tracking station on the Mojave Desert 50 miles north of Barstow, Calif.

The first light-of dawn was spreading across the desert as Ranger 4 was launched, a flashing red light at the base of the huge antenna warned ground personnel that operation moon track was in progress.

Batter Fried Shrimp
Barbecued sarrabis
Roast Fresh Loins of Pork
Roast or Candied Sweet Potatoes
Lemon Flavored Spinach
Gingerbread Applesauce

Luanu Cake
Tea or Coffee
Luau Cake
1 package de luxe yellow supreme cake mix
1 can (1 pound, 4 ounces) pineapple slices
½ cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1 teaspoon lemon juice
¼ teaspoon rum extract

1 lime, thinly sliced for garnish (optional)
Prepare and bake cake according to directions for two 8-inch layers. Cool in pans 10 to 15 minutes. Turn out on rack for thorough cooling. Drain syrup from pineapple into a saucpan. Cut pineapple slices into thirds and set aside. Stir sugar and cornstarch into syrup in sauce pan and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until filling is thickened and clear. Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice and rum extract. Cool.

Arrange one cake layer on serving dish and spread with three-quarters of the filling. Cover with half the pineapple. Top with other cake layer. Spread lightly with remaining filling and decorate with remaining pineapple. Refrigerate cake in firm filling if necessary. Top pineapple slices with lime sections and garnish with the fronds of a fresh pineapple.

NCAA Sets up Probe Into Grade Scale

NEW ORLEANS, April 26 (AP)—The executive council of the National Athletic Association (NCAA) approved a \$5,000 appropriation Wednesday to study the possibility of establishing a national scholastic minimum for college athletes.

Fish, Game Department Begins Restocking of Area Reservoirs

Restocking of Magic Valley's reservoirs with fingerling and catchable-size trout has begun and will be completed within the next two weeks, announces Stacy V. Gebhardt, district fish biologist for the state fish and game department. Heading the list in size and numbers will be the opening phase to re-establish Magic reservoir as one of Magic Valley's best fisheries. "In spite of the favorable outlook for water this year, low water conditions the past two years has seriously reduced plankton and insect production in these reservoirs. Therefore, careful attention must be given to restocking of the reservoirs. This will require at least one summer to re-establish normal abundance. However, with a good carryover of water at the end of the irrigation season this fall, we can expect to have all of the reservoirs in southern Idaho back to full production with prospects for excellent fishing in 1962."

The Magle reservoir project will require two and one-half million rainbow trout, ranging from two to four inches in length. In addition, 30,000 catchable size rainbow will also be planted to supplement fishing during June and July. By August fishing and has been restocked with rainbow ranging from three inches in length and will eight inches to one-half pound.

BOISE, April 26 — Hungry for pocketbook, another campaign money is in short supply this year.

With 43 candidates seeking nomination to the state and national offices in Idaho, there just isn't enough of the old money to go around and many of the boys are having to spend their own.

Money for the primary election is so tight, in fact, that several candidates are running "do-yourself" campaigns. Free publicity and advice on how to get it are being sought almost as earnestly as that other cherished goal—votes.

Although some of the hopefuls are incumbents, and those who are grinding axes have been able to charm funds, many are forced to skip some of the preliminaries.

Instead of extensive advertising, for instance, they are shaking hands, singing door-to-door, and seeking out the voters in their natural habitats. They're making out their own schedules, writing their own speeches, and even cranking out and personally delivering their own news releases.

Shortages of money in a primary campaign are not unusual. Nobody wants to shell out his hard-earned cash to back a political question mark. But this year, complain many of the candidates, even promises of money are hard to come by.

Most of the big money that is around is going, of course, to those seeking the big jobs—senator, congressman and governor. The incumbents usually have the best chance of getting it, but this season, even some of those running for governor and for congress are having money problems. There are just too many in the race.

Among the better financed of the candidates, aside from the incumbents, seem to be Vernon K. Smith and Jack Hawley. At least these two have in addition to volunteers—some paid help to research issues and write copy. Yet supporters of both are soliciting campaign funds every chance they get.

Smith, who advocates local option gambling, seeks the U. S. senate nomination for governor. Hawley is after the GOP nomination for U. S. senate. Both are reported to have well-organized campaigns.

Sen. Frank Church, unopposed for the Democratic re-nomination, is reported to have a lot of financial support. So is Rep. Ralph Harding, although he has opposition in the primary election from Asael Lyman for the Democratic nomination to second district congress.

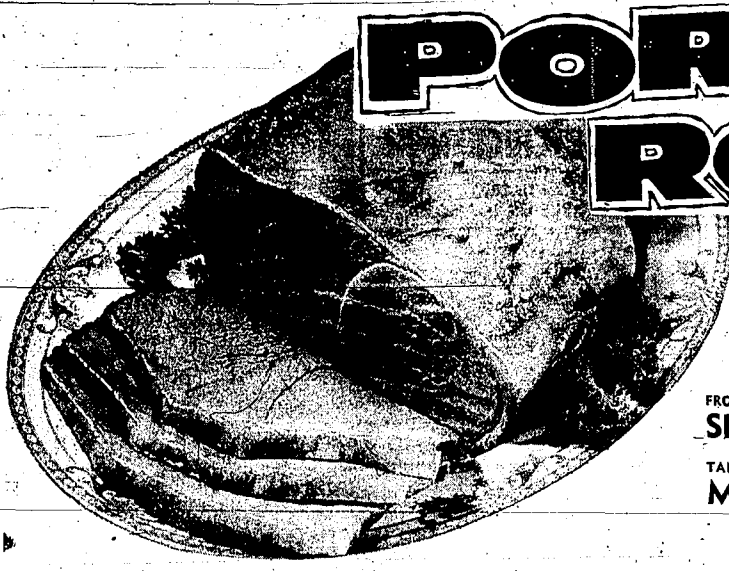

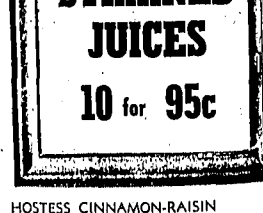

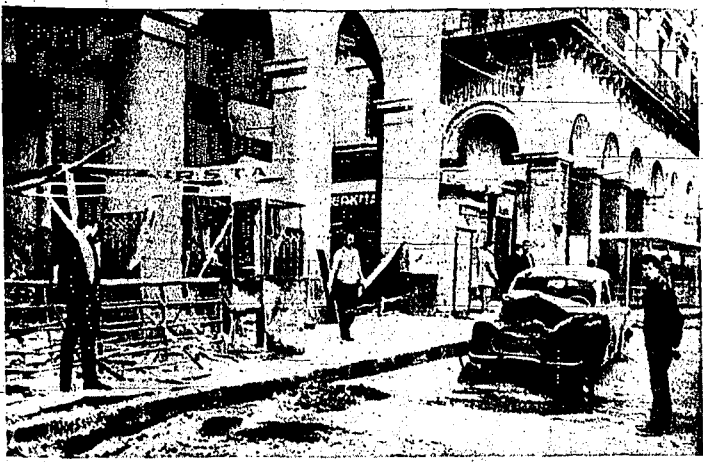

Germany Is Subject for Area Speech

SIOGHONE, April 26 — A comparison of the East and West German territories was made by Orval Hansen, Idaho Falls, who spoke to a non-partisan group at a meeting held at Wood River Center Grange hall Tuesday evening.

Hansen, Republican candidate for U.S. representative, made a campaign tour of Lincoln county Monday after lunch in company with W. B. Murphy, Twin Falls, and Mrs. Orwin Silva, Shoshone.

Hansen showed slides of two tips he made behind the Iron curtain. In 1955 he was a student at the University of London and was one of a selected group to take a tour of Berlin. Then, in December of last year, he made another tour as a reserve air force officer, visiting Germany, England and France.

Pictures of the two visits showed improvements made in war recovery and he especially noted the aid the Marshall plan had given many countries.

In West Germany, all the war time ruins have been cleaned up, Hansen pointed out, and many new buildings erected, while in East Germany the Russians have built mostly for government offices and propaganda buildings.

The Stalin-alley street, now called Karl Marx alley, is an example of the show line. Hansen put on for tourists, he said. From this modern street, however, just a half-block away, debris and ruins are yet in evidence from the war.

Hansen's pictures included scenes of the Brandenburg Gate, Russian War memorial, Garden of Remembrance cemetery and

the wall that divides East and West Germany. This wall is heavily guarded, Hansen said, making escape for East Berlin residents almost impossible. During the question period, Hansen said the major objective of Russia is to destroy the United Nations.
