

WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, May 1 — Although President Kennedy has no real agenda of the supreme court of the United States, the high tribunal's recent decisions have indicated that the federal judiciary has relieved him of political pressure and embroiled the executive branch in a web of legal entanglements. Their recent doings have removed a "serious" difficulty from the train of political issues.

The supreme court and the lower courts have taken full jurisdiction of the executive branch, enforcing and executing "discretion" in schools, interstate transportation, and every other act affected with public interest. It has made it possible for aggrieved individuals to bring suit instead of forcing Attorney General Kennedy to conduct the fight alone from Washington. The attorney general has been glad to step aside where possible.

It has condemned "various states," either not placed in proper perspective, or it held to be only "token desegregation," and not in accord with the speed implicit in its historic 1954 decision. It has ordered desegregation which provided for progressive integration, but which did not comply with its vague, unmeasurable requirements.

In short, the federal judiciary has assumed quasi-political responsibilities which the administration would otherwise have had to bear, and despite the fact that the administration and the department of justice to a body which can be assailed vocally, and has been—but which cannot be harassed politically or voted out of office.

AID AT PRECINCT LEVEL — The supreme court has also assumed jurisdiction over the reapportionment of state legislatures, which will eventually influence the election of members of congress and the electoral gain for the Democrats at both levels.

In finding that the rural population enjoyed undue weight in the electoral process, the court has influenced the state legislatures, Chief Justice Earl Warren's men reinforced the administration's pressure to bestow greater political and economic power on the cities. They are almost unanimous in their leanings toward the Democratic party.

The court has consented to a certain degree for congressional deficit of the administration's proposal for creation of a department of urban affairs. If city members remain glib and confident, they will be able to solve many of the metropolitan problems which the proposed new cabinet would have tackled under the proposed program.

ALLIANCE WITHOUT PRECEDENT — Had the supreme court not intervened in this field of controversy, an amendment to the constitution for the speedy ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment. And in view of the composition of the state legislatures today, it would never have been enacted.

Disasters on this decision, notably Justice Felix Frankfurter, charged that it was plunging the supreme court into politics, an action which has never been taken before. In the original desegregation decision, the majority acted as if no importance at all was attached to the political consequences.

Thus, when a few more supreme court justices resign, and when President Kennedy's 100-day new appointees to the federal judiciary begin to take office, the administration's political position will receive more reinforcement from this independent and unassailable branch of the government than from an overwhelmingly Democratic congress.

In support of this observation, there is the fact that the court has not only ordered the reapportionment to be enacted under the current composition of congress, nor does it support the equal rights amendment, nor does it support the anti-communism and anti-social changes. Only the supreme court possessed those powers.

There has never been such a politico-judicial alliance in all our history!

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One way to raise the limit on expenditure by any candidate for office is to encourage more small political contributions. A \$10 tax credit or a \$100 tax deduction is recommended.

President Kennedy will propose legislation on these and other reforms.

The Senate and House have passed and sent to the President for approval a bill authorizing \$2 million federal government grants to promote educational television.

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It Could Backfire

The New Orleans segregationist organization offering free bus fare to all Negroes who will go north and never return may find a bigger problem on its hands when news of the offer spreads among the Negro population. The first problem would be one of finances if any sizeable group of Negroes in New Orleans decided to accept the offer. A large group would be the matter of trying to keep the "deported" citizens out of New Orleans if they changed their minds. The segregationists might discover they have no way of enforcing the agreement.

Actually, the segregationists have no intent to buy from the North. They are every Negro who would rather live in the North. Their project is a grandstand move designed to give the rest of the nation the impression New Orleans can get along very well without any Negroes. It is not the offer, even if segregationists would admit it.

Any city in which Negroes comprise a good portion of the population has an economy that is built around the Negroes in varying degrees. New Orleans is no exception. If even half of the Negroes left New Orleans within a short period, the city could be crippled. Just like a similar city, New Orleans is a marginal and submarginal job that pay poorly or by their very nature are not attractive. It's a hard, cold fact that Negroes bulk large in the economy of any city in which they comprise a good portion of the population.

A startling fact is that no city of the South holds the population record for Negroes, either by numbers or percentage. New York City has 1,087,991 Negroes, or 18.4 per cent of the population. And Washington, D. C., holds the record for percentage of total population, a whopping 63.9 per cent.

The New Orleans program of shipping Negroes to the North probably will have a similar effect. It would be the New Advancement of Colored People is likely to see that there are far more applicants than can be obliged. And even if free bus tickets do await all takers, there's nothing to prevent them from enjoying a summer in the North and returning to New Orleans with colder weather.

If any city in the South ever does lose a considerable percentage of its Negro population, white citizens might finally realize what the Negroes have been doing all these years.

FRENCH PASTIME
At times it almost seems that killing Frenchmen is the national pastime of France. With monotonous regularity, news reports keep telling how Frenchmen are killing Frenchmen in Algeria. Through 1961, more than 20,000 have been killed. But the casualties this year seem to indicate something of a record for this particular war if the trend continues. Since Jan. 1, there have been 4,050 dead and 9,355 wounded, not counting about equally divided between French settlers and troops and Moslems.

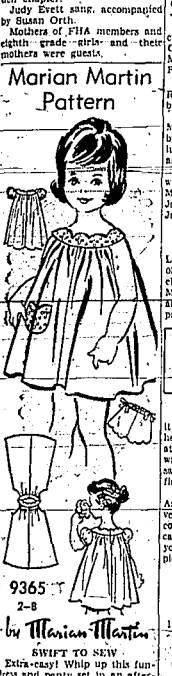

Food for Americans

SERVE ANAPAAGUS
Spring! Another way to say it is "Fresh Anapaagus." It is fresh, high, non-fat market at its tender best. So enjoy it with melted butter, Hollandaise sauce or with a savory sauce flavored with chicken bouillon.

Weight watchers take notice: Anapaagus is 70 to 75 per cent carbohydrate and consequently you can eat a whole pound and pick up only 72 calories.

Serve Anapaagus With Savory Sauce
(Yield: 6 servings)
2 pounds fresh anapaagus, 1/2 inch boiling water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons minced fresh onion, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper, 1/2 cup chicken stock or 2 chicken bouillon cubes dissolved in 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 2 egg yolks, 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice, 4 slices onion.

Wash anapaagus, break off tough ends, remove scales from the stalks and wash again. Place in a steamer with boiling water and 1 teaspoon salt. Bring to boiling point and cook uncovered, 15 minutes. Cover and continue cooking 10 minutes or until anapaagus is crisp-tender.

Sauce onion in butter or margarine until tender but not browned. Stir in flour containing salt and black pepper. Gradually add chicken stock. Stir and cook until thickened slightly. Blend egg yolks with lemon juice and blend with a little of the hot sauce. Then stir into remaining hot sauce. Stir and cook over low heat or hot water until thickened. To serve, place anapaagus on toast and pour sauce over top.

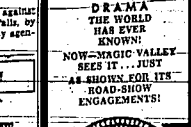

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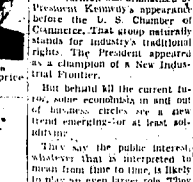
