Unit Suggests Federal Powers On Strike Issue

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—A presidential advisory panel has recommended giving the government more power to deal with national emergency labor strikes. The panel, headed by the President, would have the authority to halt such strikes for an 80-day cooling-off period without obtaining court injunctions. Fact-finding groups appointed by the President would be empowered to suggest settlement terms. These were the major recommendations in a report Tuesday night by his labor-management advisers. It enacted by Congress they would provide provisions of the 1957 labor law. The advisory group—made up of seven representatives each from labor unions and the public—called for broad revision of Taft-Hartley law procedures for handling strikes that threaten the nation's health or safety.

New Orleans' Six Negroes Reach North

NEW YORK, May 2 (AP)—Six Negro men, poorly dressed and shaggy, arrived in New York from New Orleans, La., on tickets bought by the citizens council of New Orleans. "These other persons have come here in previous days by the same means—one couple and a family of 10. The new arrivals landed off a new verbal blast from Dr. Edward Lewis, executive director of the Urban League, who said the citizens council is a dangerous group which exploits human misery. The citizens council originally planned to send 20 busloads of Negroes north—over 100—but the plan was abandoned. A larger group had boarded the plane as it left New Orleans Tuesday afternoon but a reporter accompanying them said only 10 had left from the airport to go to New York.

Booby-Trapped Auto Explodes; Arab Children Among Injured

ALGIERS, Algeria, May 2 (UPI)—Terrorists blew up a stopped automobile in the midst of a crowd of Moslem dock workers today, killing one and wounding dozens and setting off violent rioting. The blast was believed to be the work of the outlawed secret army organization. Police said at least eight were killed and 100 injured in the blast but they said the figures probably would rise. One Moslem bystander died and 70 wounded. Many of the dock workers had taken their children with them to the landing site near where the explosion occurred, since they felt the youngsters were safer there than elsewhere in the city. Police reports indicated six children between the ages of 9 and 14 were among the injured. Enraged Moslems rioted after the explosion. They caused one French soldier to be shot. French troops were ordered off the area and sent in Algerian police in an attempt to quiet the rioting Moslems. The tension spread to Moslem quarters of the city as the rioters looted shops and hospitals. The Cuban-born youths to Europeans who valued their lives. Idaho Campaign

It's not particularly unusual for senators or representatives to conduct a good part of their campaigns for reelection in the nation's capital. So in that respect, the Burns campaign is not unusual. But other aspects of the hearing are somewhat rare.

Already this session, congressional committees have voted down the Burns Creek proposal. This particular hearing will be held before the board of engineers for rivers and harbors at the behest of the reclamation bureau and army engineers. It might be pointed out that even if the board of engineers for rivers and harbors approves, the matter will still have to be approved by Congress.

Burns Creek has a dismal battling average before Congress.

The new hearing, naturally, is a prime step in plans of Rep. Paul Harding to ask reelection. He won election—two years ago on his re-election promise, but it hasn't delivered anything.

Now Mr. Harding desperately needs some sort of accomplishment in the Burns Creek issue. His last chance is the hearing to open Friday. 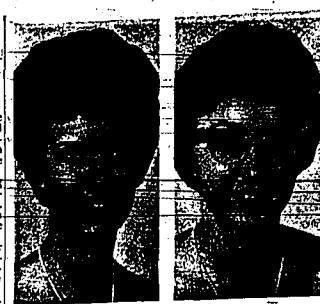

Swope Blasts High-Priced Transients

"People are paying about twice as much for home improvement items from transient outside companies as they would for the same or higher quality jobs from their local dealers," William Swope, assistant to the Idaho attorney general, has told William Grange, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce secretary-manager, in a telephone call.

Swope advised that people contemplating any equipment or repairs for their homes "should never succumb to high pressure selling, but should always wait for time to compare prices and quality."

"If the firm is doing an ethical type of business operation, they will not object to this, but if not, they will be easy to detect by their reaction to this suggestion by the prospect," Swope noted.

Swope also issued a warning on possible incinerator salesmen, pointing out that a household unit which costs from \$50 to \$80 is currently being peddled for \$250.

He added that the attorney general's office has recently put a stop to an unethical insurance operation where the "policy" was nothing but a piece of paper, with the "underwriter" not even licensed by the state insurance department.

"If people would just check these items before paying any money, these swindles would die a natural death," Grange pointed out.

Swope also commended the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce on their "alert action in assisting the attorney general's office," and observed that there are several areas where Idaho law could be strengthened to control some highly unethical practices which are being reported.

The Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce has records on many of the firms whose operations might be questionable, and if not, we will make every effort to obtain such information," Grange said.

"Fight Fair" Pastor Tells Newlyweds

ATLANTA, May 2 (AP)—It is said that Dr. Robert W. Burns does everything for the couples he marries, except teach the bride how to cook.

As pastor of the non-denominational Peachtree Christian Church he has advised the more than 3,000 couples he has married to return to him before going to a divorce lawyer.

Apparently his system works, for he knows of a mere handful of marriage failures among his alumni. And of those who returned to be guided over troubled waters only one couple was divorced.

Dr. Burns urges the prospective bride and groom to: See a physician to learn about the physical side of marriage. Tell the truth about debts each may have, draw up a workable budget, and cancel all charge accounts.

Read aloud to each other—the Bible, the great love literature of the world, poems.

Fight fair when quarrelling. It's not fair to compare the bride's cooking to the bridegroom's mother's, or for her to compare her husband's earning power with her father's.

"Immature selfishness is the biggest cause of divorce," Dr. Burns says. Ever since 1954 this tall, graying minister has been renewing wedding vows of the couples he married on the second Sunday in January of each year.

Dilemma of Selecting Ring Confronts Today's Couples

Earlier love matches were not complicated by the dilemma of which side is shape, or price, of a diamond to pick.

The smiling youth simply braided a string of grass and placed it on the finger of his fiancée. Later generations carved stone, or shaped, crude silver or gold into the proper ring sizes.

Historians say that the Egyptians began the tradition of the betrothal and wedding rings, considering a circle the hieroglyphic of eternity.

During the Middle Ages the Italians began to embellish these circles, with diamonds, the most treasurably impalpable of all stones, and therefore a symbol of enduring love.

And in the not very olden days, men used to announce their honorable intentions by pulling a finger shaker out of a tiny velvet box. But picking the right ring to flatter his beloved's hand today has become so complicated that the marriage-minded gentleman does better to bring his intended into the jewelry shop with him.

Beforehand, he can tip off the jeweler as to his price limitation so that the young lady does not embarrass him by choosing a stone he cannot afford.

Prices are determined by the karat, color, clarity, and cut. A karat is a weight unit of 100 points for measuring diamonds. For example, a 45 point stone is just 5 points under a half karat. A fine diamond is clear as a drop of water with no trace of yellow or brown, and picks up and reflects every color in the spectrum.

An absolutely flawless (and therefore very expensive) diamond will not reveal any carbon specks or bubbles when magnified ten times.

Cut refers to the workmanship

in putting 58 facets on the diamond. The better the proportions the greater the brilliancy.

Cut also refers to the shape. Basic ones are round, pear, marquise and emerald. Not all hands can wear all styles.

For square capable hands — If the fingers are broad and squared, the top side should be covered as much as possible. Engravings of blossoms or faceted metal to resemble baguette diamonds, and metal rim extensions around a center diamond make rings look larger.

For long, slender hands — A large hand with slender fingers can wear a less ornate ring since there is less top side finger area to be bridged between the center diamond and the sides of the finger. Oval cut and heart shaped diamonds set in solitaires are good choices.

Small hands — Lucky is the engaged boy, for his bride should not wear much ring. A small hand with slender fingers can wear wider bands than one with short fingers. Slender fingers can be broadened by grouping diamonds on either side of a center diamond.

If a small hand with short fingers wears a wide-banded ring, the fingers appear still more stunted. Delicate, simple ring designs are best, especially those with elongated outlines. Marquise and pear shape diamonds are perfect choices for solitaires.

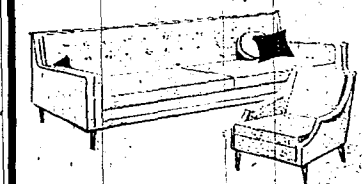

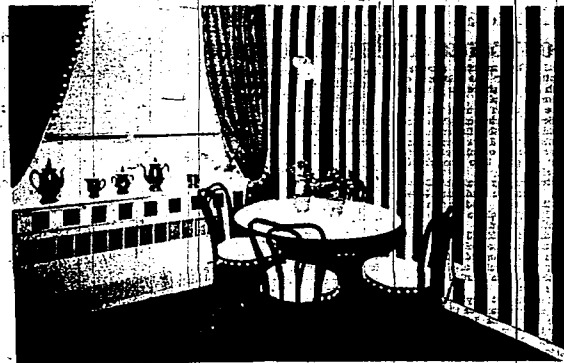
Marriages by Docks Pushed By Ship Lines

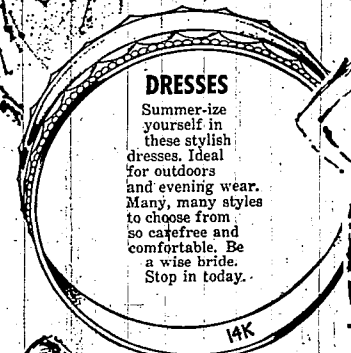

There they eat not one type of hors d'oeuvres but several. They dance to not one orchestra but four or five.

The parties are a new method of at-the-table shopping for engaged couples. They were instituted by the owners of two large catering houses here.

The owners of the catering service emphasize to their shopping party guests that they are under no obligation to contract the business of the salesmen at their tables. They may seek out their own florists, musicians, etc. Or they may continue to attend the monthly wedding parties to hear out other tradesmen who will be invited there.

Even after the couples' wedding business has been won, they remain on the party invitation lists until they graduate from the clan as young marrieds.

Meanwhile, the brides and bridegrooms-to-be make many firm friendships among the regulars at the monthly wedding parties which carry into their married social life.

What Will You Do to Keep Life Alive After Marriage?

NEW YORK, May 2 (AP)—After you are married, what will you do to keep your excitement going alive? Will you do with your trite laments or professional gifts?

Each year at graduation exercises, Millicent MacIntosh poses these questions to Bernard College students. Her plan is to become a bride within a few months.

As the only college president in the United States who is also a mother (of five), Mrs. MacIntosh is particularly interested in these answers. In her role she tries to warn them of becoming 24-hour housekeepers, a trap into which wives, in their enthusiasm to fit the job well, fall.

"There is no such thing as being stable," says the 32-year-old woman with flinty eyes of blue. "If you do not grow, you will slip backward."

The Mrs. MacIntosh worries about those who do not let the educated women until she is either a wife or a mother. Then she either succumbs at the risk of becoming a dull wife and mother, or battles with the problems of inadequate household help, in-laws and husbands who do not understand, and her own roll compass.

"The situation faced by educated women is unique in our time," she says during one of many discussions.

"Their mothers have not been educated. Not much was expected of them. They wrapped them selves up in their children, and, as a result made them too dependent."

"The result today is a conflict of ideas between generations. Older women do not understand younger women who seek to find intellectual stimulation beyond the confines of their home."

Some husbands brought up under their influence may not approve, either. And neither do men whose jobs a woman can do as well.

"The solution to the problem? Prevail upon the husband to understand needs for self-fulfillment. Encourage his ambitions and avoid guilt complexes."

Hors d'Oeuvr Can Be Social Problem Here

NEW YORK, May 2 (AP)—Becoming a bride shouldn't automatically admit you to membership in the sozzly hors d'oeuvr set.

"But if you're a typical American housewife, the chances are it does," observes visiting Princess Simona Troubetzkoy with some asperity.

"I have eaten more limp canapés, sozzly hors d'oeuvres and wilted appetizers in the last few weeks than I hope ever to see again," she says. "Dinner is an anti-climax in America, instead of the main event of the evening as in France and other countries. American dinner parties are an endless round of cocktails and snacks."

"The princess has found our diners the worse for wear, spoiling in the kitchen while she stands up for hours, making life conversation until the hostess gets ready to serve the guests."

"American diners could be gastronomical achievments. You have wonderful food and good service, but instead people are sology from drinks, they don't appreciate good culinary effort."

"The princess served at houses as wine tasting parties, trying to interest American partygoers in her national drink, champagne. "But they must learn how to chill and serve it and how it complements a party before they can appreciate it," she says.

KEEP A LIST

Have a note pad handy in the kitchen to jot down a day-by-day shopping list. Then you'll be ready when it's time for the supermarket and won't run the risk of forgetting essentials.

Showroom Shopping Tests Are Listed To Help Buyer Develop Eye for Buys

Because choosing new furniture isn't an everyday experience, a shopper cannot develop a practiced eye for good buys. Still, there are some simple showroom shopping tests of workmanship that you can apply when selecting furniture. These tests help assure certain standards of quality in a preferred price range.

When choosing chairs, tables or chests of any type, ask to have the piece moved to another section of the floor; then rock it with your hand to be certain it's steady. Tip it up on one leg to further test the proper tracing, jointing and gluing.

If it does not rick or twist—you'll feel it in your arm — it means care has been taken in machining it properly. Interior furniture is often made from limed or properly seasoned wood and load-properly glued in the joints, but its wobbly reaction should alert you.

Check drawers of dressers and cabinets to determine free and easy—not too loose—action. Front and sides of drawers should be fitted together by dovetail joints (you can see where the two wood pieces interlock) and not by nails. Remove the drawer to be sure there are drawer guides either at the center or sides. Check to see that the drawer bottom is reinforced with glue blocks at the corners and on the bottom.

The interior of the case itself should be reinforced with screwed and glued corner blocks for strength. Turn the case for a look at the plywood back panel, which should be recessed into grooves in the upright posts, not merely nailed to the back of the case.

Have the salesman turn over chairs and tables for you to assure yourself of proper reinforcement in the places of strain.

Good furniture will have blocks of wood screwed and glued into these corners. While you're looking at the underside of a chair, check on spring action. Top quality upholstered chairs have vibrating strips supporting the coil spring units. Flat spring construction lacks the deep feeling luxury of hand-tied coil springs.

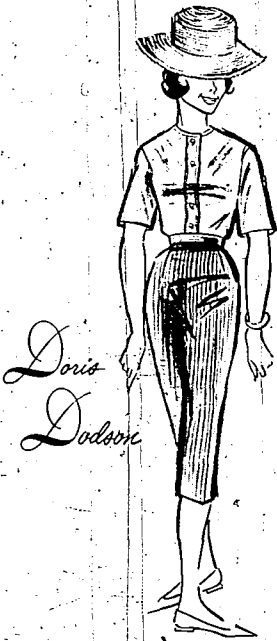
In all furniture pieces, make certain the joints are smooth, light and flush in themselves, and not built up with wood filler. Carved detailing in arms and legs means hand labor was used and makes an article costly, so if you encounter excessive carving in an inexpensive piece, be wary. The "carving" may simply be molded wood filler and easily chipped off.

Check the feel of the finish. Lacquer should be smooth to the touch and over a stain or bleach that has been applied, evenly without light and dark spots.

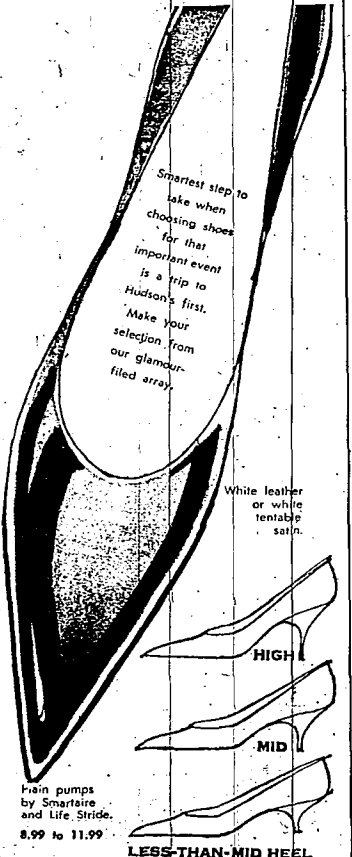

Realistic Time Schedule Might Keep Bride From Being Tired for Wedding

Being escorted by the father down the aisle is the altar is a tradition for which most brides are grateful.

Too often too many by their wedding days are too unscrupled and exhausted from duties beforehand to be able to make it up there on their own steam.

The only solution to a beautiful ceremony with a minimum of backstage chaos is to set up a realistic time schedule. Broadway producers do it — and who is to say that weddings are less of a colorful production?

A time wise bride likes the most minute details that must be attended to before the important day. She will arrive at these after consulting with etiquette books, bridal consultants, her parents and future in-law.

Although big weddings can be

turned out in less than three months, that's the hard way. With a date set early, here's a typical schedule:

THREE MONTHS BEFORE BIG DAY—Consult with clergyman, arranging for pre-marital instruction if desired.

Decide upon type of wedding. Select attendants and usher, choose sites for the wedding and the reception. Make up a guest list (after consulting with bridegroom's family) and order invitations.

Select china and silver patterns and register choices with retail sources. Order brides gown and bridesmaid's costumes.

Make plans for a honeymoon and buy trousseau accordingly. Begin search for apartment or house.

WITH TWO MONTHS TO GO

Set a date for wedding rehearsal and arrange for rehearsal supper.

Hire your caterer, musicians, florist and photographer.

Check up on ordered clothes. Make plans for furnishing new home.

THIRTY DAYS AWAY

Address and mail invitations.

Buy gifts for attendants, groom.

Get this ring (they'll get yours). Go with him to secure marriage license. Remind bridegroom to order boutonnières and flower girls for wedding party and the two mothers.

Consult with caterer about reception menu and cake. Take up the matter of decoration with the florist.

Schedule showers so that you have rest periods between parties

ONE WEEK BEFORE BIG DAY—Two weeks away. Have brides' shoes taken. Send to interested out of town papers with announcements.

Check on arrival of gowns and trousseau notes.

Begin writing your thank you notes for gifts already received. Make a list of them in your book.

Wrap gifts for attendants and ushers.

Make arrangements for out-of-town guests.

Ask phone and utilities companies to install service in proper time.

Check deliveries of furnishings to new address.

ONLY A WEEK LEFT—Send wedding announcement to local papers.

Check on arrival of gowns, trousseau items. Make a beauty shop appointment for hairdo.

Have bridesmaids luncheon. (He'll be having a bachelor dinner this week too.)

Whether to Buy or Rent Is Important for Brides

None of the thousand-and-one problems of a bride is more important than where she is going to live—and whether to buy or to rent.

While this will not be the bride's decision alone, the new husband had better reconcile himself to the fact that her views will carry the most weight. It will appear to be making the final decision, but inevitably it will coincide with what she wants.

The exact location of the young household usually is determined by the result of the verdict on whether to rent or to buy. There was a time when the question of buying a house was answered automatically by the simple matter of proximity. If the couple had enough money to make a down payment on a house, they bought.

Today, with down payments virtually at the vanishing point, this consideration is non-existent, although if they do buy a house, they are advised to make as large a down payment as they can afford. The decision on whether to buy or rent actually

is based on a number of other factors. Buying a house brings with it a feeling of ownership, no small asset in the area of personal commitment, as any psychologist will tell you. From a more tangible standpoint, it also means extra space, that which is ready for immediate use and that which can be utilized when additional members of the family make an appearance.

Owning a house usually goes hand in hand with more congenial surroundings for the married couple and a more practical, wholesome place in which to bring up children.

Then there's the all-important matter of investment. The home owners are building up an equity in their property with each mortgage payment. Also, not to be dismissed lightly, they can deduct mortgage interest payments and real estate taxes from their income tax returns.

There are advantages on the other side of the coin. When you rent an apartment, you don't have to worry about mowing the lawn, trimming the shrubbery, painting and rep-

airing, changing light washers and the thousand and one other maintenance tasks which seem to follow one another in an endless stream. And no matter how much do-it-yourself labor you put in on these chores, you'll find they cost money.

If the husband has a job which may require him to move to another city at a later date, it's easier for the family to move from a rented home. Modern apartment leases have clauses which permit the tenants to move, under this condition, before the expiration of the lease.

There's a financial angle connected with buying or renting that has many ramifications. If the couple buys a home with little or no down payment, its interest payments over the years will be larger. Presumably, therefore, it's smarter to put down as large a down payment as possible. But a large down payment ties up money that might be otherwise invested. Tenants have no such decision to make.

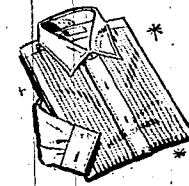

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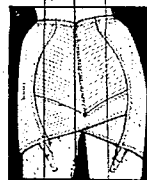

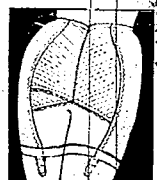

For the formal wedding correct attire becomes definite and mandatory. Moreover, with only the slightest variations of cravat and boutonniere, all the male members of the wedding must be garbed identically.

For instance, formal evening weddings — the most formal of all times for after 8 p.m. — finds the bride in a long fancy

Bride Shower Traced Back To Quilt Bee

The story goes that the first bridal shower took place in England when a maiden fell in love with a poor miller. When her father forbade the marriage, the girl's friends marched to her home bringing gifts, making the marriage to a miller possible.

In this country bridal showers are traced back to the quilting bees and house-raising given by our forefathers.

At any rate the point has always been to rain happiness on the marriage couple by providing them with useful things with which to begin a home.

Some novel ideas for showers are these:

POSTAL SHOWER — For the girl away from home arrange for friends to mail packages so that all will arrive within a short span of time.

PAPER SHOWER — Its possibilities are unlimited. It should include an address book which her best friends have already inscribed; a scrap book with wedding announcements; recipe books, stationery; and perhaps even a couple of tickets to a good play.

PARTY SHOWER — Save this one until the honeymooners have returned. Arrive with the refreshments and drinks. But also have guests bring enough decanters, cocktail napkins, coasters, casseroles, bar accessories, glasses, and liquors to enable them to entertain inexpensively for months to come.

DRUDGE SHOWER — For fun everyone can attend this one wearing their dirtiest scrub rags. Have them bring mops, brushes, cleaning powders and soaps, wax, brooms, dustpans, etc.

DANCING SHOWER — Make this a mixed party. Have guests bring albums of Broadway musicals, folk songs, ethnic music or hill tunes. Everyone, including the marrying couple, will have a good time for the rest of the evening.

IDEA FILE — Clip and file all time-saving ideas here and try each. When you find one that fits your circumstances — and your husband — save it; discard the rest.

For the semi-formal evening wedding, the tuxedo takes the place of the tall coat or, in summer, the white dinner jacket. Black bow tie, of course, pleated white shirt with either a white evening vest or a tuxedo jacket. The white bow tie is never worn with tuxedo.

Weddings before 8 demand from the groom so-called morning kit, formal or informal. The formal daytime wedding, with the bride in wedding gown

and long train, prescribes for the groom the cutaway coat in black or gray, striped black and gray trousers, single or double breasted vest to match the cutaway, pleated or starched bow tie, away, pleated or starched bow tie with separate starched wing collar. The cravat may be either preferred ascot or the family four-in-hand, in small black and white checked silk or gray, white, or gray gloves and top hat to complete the outfit. Spats, if worn, should match the waistcoat.

The semi-formal morning outfit for the bridegroom and male attendants are like the formal, but with these important differences. The jacket worn with striped trousers, for instance, is the jacket club coat or so-called waiting coat, similar in cut to a regular suit jacket. It may be in black or oxford gray. And it may be worn with a regular shirt collar instead of the detachable or separate wing collar. Hosiery or derby hats are appropriate.

Background for her is audacious, vivid and ever changing. She enjoys bold stripes, shocking colors because she will probably change them to something else before they begin to wear on her. She also appreciates striking transparent colors that often reach glass tones in brilliance. She likes florals but only if they belie their genteel origin with a

complete departure from the old-fashioned conception of wallpaper. She'll hood her budget book for these.

TYPE B is demure and homey, dedicated to the building upon the solid foundations of her forefathers. She is happily addicted to antique collecting, recipe testing and apron wearing.

Her wall backgrounds are gentle, deeply tinted in the past. She feels happiest surrounded by provincial patterns, tear drops, and florals so delicate the petals seem to be crumbling.

TYPE C is elegant and formally correct. She knows all the right people, or at least who these are, and she would die of humiliation at pulling a social faux pas. Even from the beginning of the couple's climb up the success ladder, she serves in the living-dining room with candleabra and sterling silver.

Fortunately, she is a part of an age that stresses lush fabrics in wall coverings. The type of person feels comfortable with silk embossed ones, rich in color and line.

Designs touched with contemporary magic to resemble cut velvet, brocade, silk satin quilting and other rich fabrics are a com-

plete departure from the old-fashioned conception of wallpaper. She'll hood her budget book for these.

A good way for a bride's friends to forecast fair weather for the new cook in the kitchen is to shower her with pots, pans and even pickle forks.

And to be friends indeed, they should connive with each other to prevent gift duplication. They should select choices from a good, basic list of required cookware, tools, cutlery, bakeware and gadgets.

Such a list was compiled by Mary Ann March, director of home economics for one of the world's largest manufacturers of housewares. It is practical because it takes into consideration not only the probable size limitations in the bride's first kitchen, but her time limitations as well.

COOKWARE
It should be stainless steel—for radiant heat cooking—between two sheets of stainless steel—for even heat distribution. Basic pieces needed include: 1-quart saucepan; 2-quart double boiler; 4½-quart Dutch oven; 7-inch small skillet plus cast-iron potholder; 10½-inch chicken fryer with high-domed lid; coffee maker—either percolator or drip-

olator; tea kettle; fat-free pan. Extra space can be saved if cookware has lids which turn upside down and rest securely in the pans for storage.

KITCHEN TOOLS
Supply her with these: Can opener; deep lidde, potato masher; pan fork; basting spoon or small pan spoon; small skillet; turner; potatoe turner; 3-inch strainer with stainless steel mesh for easy cleaning; narrow spatula; egg beater; wall rack for hanging these kitchen tools.

A counter top rack or an under-the-cabinet Susan will also keep these tools handy and save drawer space.

CUTLERY
Stock her pantry with: Baring knife; grapefruit knife with wavy edge blade that needs no sharpening; 4 to 6 steak knives; roast slicer—8-inch; utility knife—5-inch; French cook's knife—8-inch; bread and cake knife—8-inch; sharpening steel; carving board; holder for cutlery. Keeping knives in drawers is dangerous.

Also, their edges can be dulled when in contact with other hard steel blades.

Secrecy Not Approved of In Marriage

Nobody approves of the secret marriage except the socially prominent family without any money.

"Announce your engagement and then run away to be married," is the advice to brides of families in this dilemma.

But ministers and marriage counselors, and also many couples who have been married secretly, agree that such unions make poor starts.

1. Coosy people jump to the wrong conclusion about the marriage. Did they have to get married? Did the parents disapprove?

Secret marriages lead to embarrassing, complicated situations whenever the couple attempts to be together.

2. Such marriage agreed to upon impulse, robs a young lady of the wedding of her life, for which she may long harbor resentment.

However, as with the poor bride of socially prominent parents, there are extenuating circumstances that make such a ceremony a reasonable solution.

A bride or bridegroom might wish to spare parents who are not well, or who might object to the marriage on religious grounds, or who are divorced.

Or they simply may not like the fuss of a formal marriage. Or they simply haven't time or patience for a wedding.

When the marriage secret is out, it is still possible to make newspaper announcements. The bride's mother may also send informal, handwritten notes to close friends instead of formal announcements.

At-home cards are enclosed with formal announcements, usually if the couple lives out of town.

Friends are not expected to send gifts to couples who elope. However, some will do so anyway.

At an elaborately formal wedding, there is sometimes a dark fruit cake on display in the large room of the reception, and a smaller, elaborately decorated tiered bride's cake at the bridal table in front of the bride and groom.

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Two Famous Beauties Tell How to Defy Curlers, Cream

You don't have to go to bed looking like a mechanical woman to be your own pretty girl the next day. Curlers, cold cream and chin straps aren't necessary every night if you know yourself well enough to work within the commercial look or—as you prefer to them—women's weapons.

I have learned this from experienced make-up people and professional hairdressers who have given me the hints for the pasting along.

Let's take skin and complexion first. If your skin tends to be on the dry side, there's no need to lather it up with thick layers of cream every night and retire looking like the King from the cake. First wash your face with hot water to open the pores, pat dry, and immediately apply a thin layer of cream. While you're brushing, let the skin absorb the cream and wipe excess off with a tissue.

That application will suffice for the night but to compensate for the light amount of cream at night, be sure that your daily cosmetic has a lanolin- or oily-base which will continue to lubricate your skin beneath the make-up.

On the other hand, if you happen to have an excessively oily skin, a once-over with soap is generally sufficient. For those worrisome spots, such as laugh lines, frown wrinkles or under-eye bags, apply any of the commercially marketed astringents on the weak spots. At best, the only evidence left is a light, powder-like smudge which can be erased with a tissue.

Hair, as we all know, presents a more complicated problem. The new hair styles require the use of rollers and, while the diffuser

looks lovely the next day, you're bound to look like the first lady on the moon the night before. Even clips and bobby pins, though more comfortable than rollers, give the appearance of being "wired for sound."

What to do? I have learned of what hairdressers call "a layer cut." The hair is trimmed in layers (various degrees of length) so that body it actually put into the hair through the method of cutting. One set holds for a full week, without setting, or until the next shampoo. That once-a-week setting can be done during an afternoon while he is at work, or on a lunch hour if you are a breadwinner, too.

Older widows and gay divorcees are often married quietly in their own homes, leaving their guests there to begin their honeymoon. Civil and chapel ceremonies are popular.


