Pro-Communist Force Chasing Laos Troops From Stronghold

VIENTIANE, Laos, May 18 (AP)—The defense ministry announced tonight pro-Communist forces are chasing remnants of the royal garrison of Nam Thun southwest on the road toward Houei Sai, the government's last stronghold in northern Laos. Government forces were crushed in a three-hour battle Monday at their rendezvous point at Vieng Phou Khia, which is 40 miles southwest of Nam Thun, a commune said.

As a result, it added, troops withdrew farther toward Houei Sai, a garrison town in the northern part of pro-Western Thailand. "Though the United States has denied previous reports that China was involved, the defense ministry declared the pursuing forces included both Red Chinese and communist North Vietnamese."

Acting Foreign Minister Silek Natchanasax said rebel Pathet Lao troops were within 20 miles of Houei Sai, the commune said. Pro-Communist troops were "pushing their way" from Nam Thun along the road to Houei Sai, he declared. The troops had covered 90 miles in the two days since they captured Nam Thun, he said. He declared the troops at least 100 miles from Viennasane and Red Chinese battalions took part in the attack on Nam Thun.

U. S. sources said there has been a major military effort in the fighting at Nam Thun, 20 miles from Houei Sai, on the border. They said the Pathet Lao troops included Chinese-speaking Laotians and North Vietnamese.

Silek refused to disclose the strength of the government garrison at Houei Sai, but said information "would only benefit our enemies." The Nam Thun-Houei Sai road was the only overland escape route for the 5,000 or more government troops retreating from Nam Thun.



ROCKET SHIP, PILOT SURVIVE THROUGH TEST

Rocket Ship, Pilot Survive Through Test

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., May 18—Air Force Major Bob Isherwood was held in a rocket ship during a 15-day test through temperatures of 200 degrees Fahrenheit that could burn a man to a crisp.

The 37-year-old test pilot was held from very death by the ship's ingeniously designed cockpit, armored with insulation and coated with liquid oxygen. He presarried flight suit of silver which also protected his own "370" atmosphere.

Wilderness Bill Revisions Urged

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Wilderness urged a sympathetic house interior subcommittee today to amend further a senate wilderness area preservation bill already eroded by scores of amendments. And subcommittee members indicated, as one put it, they would "take a step" on the toes of dam builders, loggers, miners and others who fear they may lose their right to use the federal wilderness land. The bill would authorize a wilderness area system of primitive areas in national forests and parks.

The bill would set aside about 7 million acres of the system immediately and call for the inclusion of other land for possible inclusion. It also would be a 60-million-acre system with rigid restrictions against commercial use. John C. Mason, deputy general counsel of the federal power control commission, said he would like to give the FPC authority to issue water projects in the wilderness areas.

Howard Zahner, executive secretary of the Wilderness Society, said his group opposes the bill because it would restrict construction in the areas.

Rep. Jack Westland, R., Wash., subcommittee member, said "water power is important to the West's economy and we want to make sure that we have a bill to give the FPC authority to issue water projects in the wilderness areas."

He added that the FPC would be required by law to license only those projects that are consistent with the wilderness area concept.

Water Shortage Is Broken, Official Says

BOISE, May 18 (AP)—A water shortage that has prevailed for several years in areas of the Pacific Northwest has been definitely broken, Morlan Nelson, survey supervisor for the soil conservation service, said today. He said that carryover storage of water this year "may be below normal at the end of the irrigation season" but added: "It cannot, however, be as low as the carryover water was in the fall of 1961."

The favorable outlook prevailed as of May 1, Nelson said, despite less than normal precipitation in most areas during April, the result of spotty storms.

"Temperatures in the southern portion of the basin in Idaho and Oregon were unusually high," Nelson said. "This resulted in the use of irrigation water early in the season of some projects."

"At the same time these warm temperatures resulted in the snow melting fast and good runoff into all reservoirs in the area," he said.

CAPE CANAVERAL, May 8 (AP) — The timetable for astronaut Scott Carpenter's orbital flight has been pushed back at least two days by difficulties in his Atlas booster rocket, according to informed sources.

The exact nature of the booster problem was not disclosed, but it was reported last night that the rocket already has been corrected in somewhat less time than anticipated.

The Atlas rocket was discovered when technicians made a close study of a final flight mission plan last Friday. The navy lieutenant commander and the project Mercury launch crew.

Originally, the national aeronautics and space administration was reported to be shooting for America's second man-in-orbit on May 15. But engineers told NASA it might take anywhere from a few extra hours to two days to track down and fix the trouble, sources said.

They pointed out that such delays caused by technical problems are expected in a program as complex as Project Mercury and in tests where absolute reliability is demanded because a man's life is at stake.

More checks were being made today on the Atlas 102D and the bullet-shaped Mercury capsule which Carpenter will ride into orbit on a flight much like that of Lt. Col. John Glenn, Jr., last week.

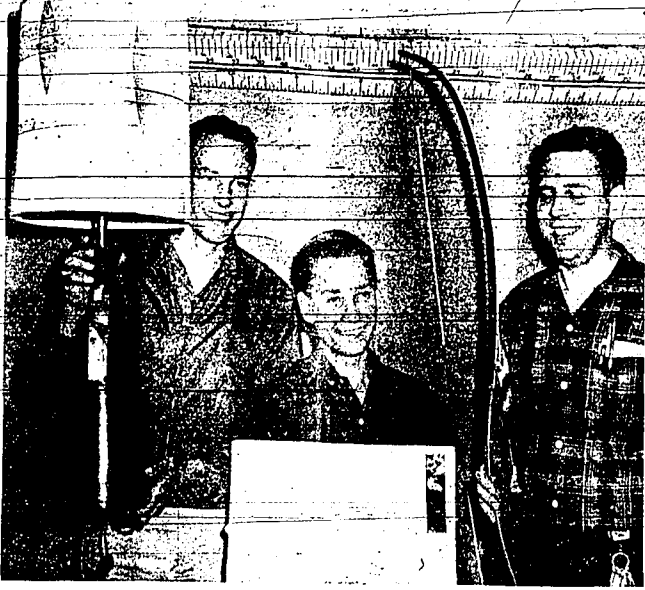
Utah Prisoners End Hunger Tie
