

Rusk Asks Anzus Help for Battle On Red Outrages

CANBERRA, Australia, May 9 (UPI)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk urged the free world today to help stop the communist "gangster war of terror and assassination" in South Viet Nam. A short time later, a communique issued at the end of a two-day meeting of the Anzus pact council expressed full support of current measures being taken to help South Viet Nam defend itself against the communist attacks "fomented, directed and supported by North Viet Nam."

Snake River Dam Project In Operation

PASCO, Wash., May 9 (UP)—The touch of a button by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson today would send the Snake River dam project into operation. The dam, first in a chain of Snake River development projects, is being built by the Army Corps of Engineers. Civilian and military officials headed a crowd of visitors from three Northwest states who assembled at the dam site in the morning east of here in advance of the noon dedication ceremony. The dam, which will produce 270,000 kilowatts of power annually, will provide substantial benefits in a three-state area of recreation, irrigation and power.

WASHINGTON, May 9 (UPI)—The seventh shot of the U.S. nuclear test series in the atmosphere was set off today in the Pacific. It followed the sixth shot off the Nevada test site on Tuesday. Dutch Seize Indonesians

THE HAGUE, Holland, May 9 (UPI)—Dutch troops on West New Guinea have clashed with a band of Indonesian guerrillas and have arrested 40 of them who fled into the jungle, it was announced today. The Dutch government said the guerrillas had been taken in the jungle after Dutch troops engaged them. Reuter said the guerrillas had not received fresh supplies from Indonesia.

Securities Probe Funds Are Asked

WASHINGTON, May 9 (UPI)—The Securities and Exchange Commission today asked Congress to pass a bill for more time and money to complete its investigation of the mutual fund industry. Rep. Peter P. Mack, Jr., D. Ill., said he was introducing a bill today which would extend the commission an extra \$200,000 for its inquiry and extend for a longer study of the fund industry for a final report.

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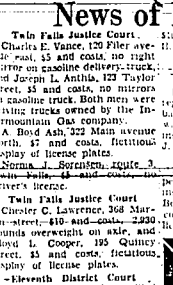

The complaint said Herick had a government contract covering construction of a liquid oxygen plant and used \$7844 for materials delivered to it by industrial contractors.

Idaho is red hot now. It appears that the BFA wants to join the federal fleet and gobble up private industry."

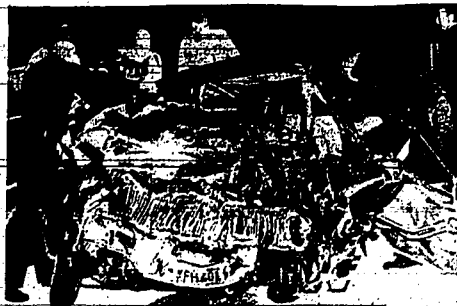
"However," he added, "the fact probably is that Sen. Frank Church and Rep. Ralph Hardesty are trying to hide their misadventure failure here."

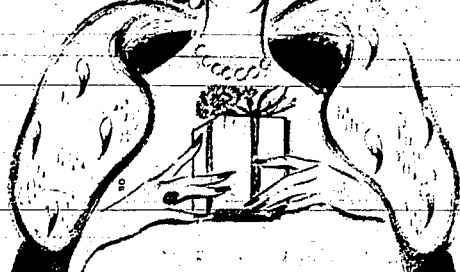
Romantic Couple Wed in Hospital

Smith Denies Moral Issue For Gambling

By The Associated Press
 Vernon K. Smith denied today the gambling issue is a moral issue, but he added that "it is immoral for us to continue to be abused with these immorally high taxes."

Smith, a Democratic candidate for Idaho governor, and an advocate of legalized gambling, disagreed with state Rep. Carl R. Burt over the gambling issue.

Burt, a Boise businessman, is a Republican candidate for secretary of state.

Smith took particular exception to Burt's earlier claim that Attorney General Robert Kennedy had denounced gambling.

"Attorney General Kennedy has vigorously denounced illegal gambling in the United States, but he is not saying that gambling is wrong," said Smith.

Smith said the proposal to add southern Idaho to the Bonneville power administration marketing area continued today as the leading political issue.

Smith said he is a "Democratic gubernatorial hopeful, endorsed the proposal and a fellow supporter of the governorship Democrat C. H. Hiler. Emmitt said the farmers may have to turn to DPA if Idaho Power is granted a rate boost.

James Annett, Burley, one of five Republicans seeking nomination to congress, condemned the plan and urged one of his opponents, Steve R. Crand Hansen, to state his position on the proposal.

Charles Herndon-Salmon, another Democratic candidate for governor, accuses Smith of a "deliberate attempt to 'foot the bill' by trying to make them believe that gambling can be treated in Idaho without a constitutional amendment."

This, said Herndon, "is political trickery of the worst order."

Smith told Herndon to "get back to reality instead of bragging how he can beat Gov. Romney," a Republican who seeks reelection.

The Idaho AFL-CIO, meanwhile, endorsed Don Adams of Couer d'Alene, for state mine inspector.

Adams is opposing incumbent Democrat George Fletcher for the job.

Republican renatorial hopeful George Hansen cauded confidence about his chances of winning the nomination from John F. Hawley.

Hawley told a Pocatello group that additional forest access roads are needed to better and protect Idaho's lumber industry.
