# Bonneville Power Extension Will Cause Political Fight

By RICHARD CHARNOCK BOISE, May 10 (AP)—Take a good look at the proposal to extend the Bonneville Power administration's marketing area to all of Idaho because it's going to be around as a political issue for some time.

Any idea that this proposal was advanced simply as a counter-buffet to Idaho Power company's request for a 13.5 per cent rate increase was erased last week-end by Interior Secretary Stewart Udall.

He asked the BPA to investigate the possibility of extending its lines to southern as well as northern Idaho, saying he felt it would "help stimulate the state's industrial growth."

"From BPA contracts with industry," Udall said, "it is clear that a number of industries would consider locating in Idaho if low-cost power were available there."

BPA Administrator Charles Luce has had the idea of extending BPA lines into Southern Idaho in mind for some time. So, apparently, has Rep. Ralph Hartline, the public power zealous congressman from Idaho's second district.

It reported that Harding and Luce met in February or early in March—not together with Sen. Frank Church to set him on the idea. Then they enlisted the support of Rep. Grace Ploft.

Whether it's a d'ing, Luce, Church and Mrs. Ploft were aware of Idaho Power's plans to seek a rate increase when they first discussed the BPA proposal is questionable. But the power company's timing certainly was not coincidental.

It has given them a chance, in an election year, to contrast private with public power proposals at a time when a private company is seeking higher rates.

There has been a lot of talk that the public utilities commission will wait until after the general election to announce its decision on Idaho Power's rate

request. A spokesman for the commission, however, said the decision will be made well in advance of the November elections.

Current betting around Boise is that the PUC will okay a rate hike of four to six per cent.

The BPA issue will not be so soon settled. The study asked by Udall will take several months, according to an interior department spokesman. Most likely the rate will not be completed until after the general election. This means that politicians on both sides of the question will have it as an issue to talk about all through the campaign.

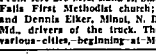

**Wage Policy Causes Split For Kennedy**

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., May 10 (AP)—Walter Reuther acknowledged today that his Auto Workers union diverges in part with President Kennedy's wage-price restraint policy although it agrees wholeheartedly with the general aim and purpose.

Reuther described it to reporters as more of a question of emphasis between UAW economists and Kennedy's council of economic advisers. He said he and the administration "are agreed on basic policy."

The UAW version was due to be formalized by resolution today at a concluding session of the union's week-long convention.

However, pictures of the difference between the Reuther and the Kennedy wage-price policies is that Reuther maintains wages should rise faster than Kennedy says they should.

The President calls for wages to be held generally to rates in productivity—neither—confirms business profits are out of line with labor income, and, until next year, he says that wages should increase faster than productivity gains. He says a faster rate of wage gains may even be a permanent necessity to buy purchasing power.
