A 12-member coroner's jury announced Thursday afternoon, after lengthy deliberation, that the death of Raymond G. O'Donnell resulted from his wife, Mrs. Faith O'Donnell, acting in self-defense. James May prosecuting attorney, refused comment whether his office would take further action in the case, but indicated Friday morning that the jury's decision was not necessarily final. The jury returned a verdict Thursday afternoon, after an inquest held in the Twin Falls county probate court, that the cause of death was due to hemorrhage and lack of oxygen and the death was occasioned by another person.

Probe Continues In Chemical Explosion

TOLEDO, O., May 11 (AP)—Foremen continued today to probe the charred debris of a chemical plant when an explosion Thursday killed at least nine persons and injured 46. Authorities said the debris of one person still unaccounted for may be in the body of the Maumee chemical company. All the dead were company employees. Nine of the injured remained in Toledo hospitals. The devastating explosion in the three-story plant near downtown Toledo spawned wreckage over a five-block area.

Carpenter's Flight Delay Is Announced

CAPE CANAVERAL, May 11 (AP)—Control problems in the space capsule have forced a delay of at least five days in America's next manned orbital flight, announced sources said today. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration had been preparing to send astronaut Scott Carpenter on a three-orbit trip around the Earth May 17.

No new firm date has been set officially, but informed sources indicated the man shot could go on before he is released. Officials met behind closed doors this morning to discuss the space problems and preliminary plans to fit a new target date for the flight.

Booster problems a week ago forced the postponement of the mission but today those problems to the project said the new postponement was caused by difficulties with the attitude control system of Carpenter's bell-shaped spacecraft. The attitude control system is the mechanism that keeps the space capsule turned the right way as it hurtles through space.

Because of attitude control problems last Feb. 20, Astronaut John Glenn, Jr. had been forced into taking over manual control of his space capsule—twice.

Since that time, technicians have worked long and hard to perfect the automatic control system.

U.S. Department Queries Embassy

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

BY RAY TUCKER
 WASHINGTON—Democrats with a keen sense of political trends and sentiment believe that the Kennedy-Wagner ticket will be the dominant phase of capturing New York State with a ticket of James A. Farley for governor and a Democratic ticket for the United States senate.

It could be "emphatic" would be the word for a spectacular and significant victory in an exciting year. It could knock down Nelson Rockefeller's political empire and national scene. It could bring an old warrior—"Big Jim"—back to the battlefield on which he excelled for many years.

It could send the first Negro to the United States senate reconstruction days. It could assure President Kennedy's reelection in 1964. These are possibilities which make the political race much more than a mere contest.

The two famous names were among others which Mayor Robert F. Wagner recently submitted to President Kennedy for consideration. The mayor is a former Rockefellerite from the political stage. Since the mayor has bowed out the gubernatorial race, the two administration candidates must battle out in their own name because time is running short.

TIOSOR OR UNKNOWN?—It is so short that none of the other unknowns on the mayor's chart would have a shot of a chance to defeat Governor Rockefeller. The only other knowns are Sen. Jacob K. Davis, a GOP liberal. The others are either personally, politically or by their accomplishments in the city or in upstate territory. They could not be built up into victors in a short campaign.

The nomination of any of them would be accepted as an admission of defeat. In fact, the mayor's unwillingness to run against Governor Rockefeller has been interpreted by L. Judson Mohrhouse, Republican state chairman, as an admission that the mayor is hated as the Democrats' strongest voter.

A Farley-Bunch ticket, linking a popular and widely beloved Democrat with a Republican winning Negro and a United Nations official on duty in Africa, backed by the President and the mayor, would provide a political combination almost mandatory in the cosmopolitan Empire state.

RADICALLY STRONG TICKET—Arthur Levitt, state attorney general, would help to fulfill the other requirement in New York City and many other northern states—namely, the presence of a man of Jewish blood on the ticket. Although he lost to the mayor in last year's primary, he is the only Democrat running widely to survive the Rockefeller landslide (a 573,000 majority) in 1964.

Senators **ROCKEFELLER** and **JARVIS**—Parley and Bunch, are residents of New York City, the five boroughs would be the strategic and possibly decisive vote. Normally, the governor's heavy upstate majority would overwhelm that of the metropolis, especially in the case of a Republican ticket. But a recent Democratic poll showed that, though its strength had held up fairly well in the city, it had fallen off of both in Albany.

With the racial appeal of a Farley-Bunch ticket, and the probable addition of a man of Jewish descent, it is believed that it would roll up a comfortable majority of at least 700,000 in the five boroughs.

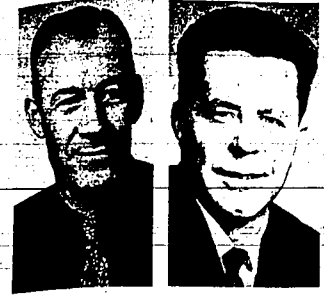

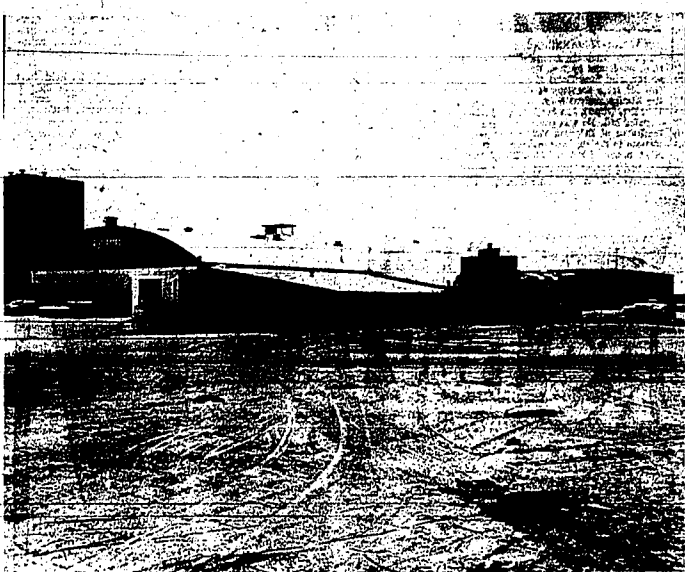

Cattle Feed in Pellet Form Tested During Experiment on 200 Herefords

A unique method of feeding and fattening cattle — through use of food in pellet form — is being tried and proving successful, W. J. (Bill) Peters, area farm-ranch owner and feed company co-owner, said Friday.

The cattle being used in the experiment are owned by Peters and are located on ranch property owned by him north and east of Hansen bridge on the north side. The 200 cattle in the experiment are Herefords.

Peters, who resides east of Twin Falls and is co-owner of Twin Falls Pellets, an extensive operation near Paul, is enthusiastic about the feeding method.

"It is cheaper than any grain ever tried," Peters said. "Besides it has proved to be a big labor saver. The pellets are fed twice a day, and it takes about 10 minutes in the morning and 10 minutes in the late afternoon to do the job."

In addition, he points out that it practically eliminates large food storage on farms because loads of pellets, custom mixed, could be brought to the farms in small quantity.

At the same time it was announced that additional construction is planned at the company site near Paul.

Anticipated is a bulk fertilizer plant and a feed and roller mill.

Albers Milling company, Lot Angeles, will be associated in the latter venture. It is hoped that facilities will enable the making of pellets of all feeds in the future.

The Kerr-Peters warehouse at Paul is 200 feet long and 75 feet wide. The roof is 40 feet above the ground. Facilities there permit unloading trucks in a five-minute period. Grain can be from the truck to storage, the truck to a larger truck or to a railroad car in a matter of 10 minutes.

Heavy Alfalfa Loss Reported From Winter Kill in Blaine

HAILEY, May 11—About 400 tons of alfalfa south of Carey have been lost between 75 and 85 per cent of their alfalfa from winter kill, according to G. H. Smith, county agent of the Blaine county agricultural station and conservation office.

While a complete survey has not been made, some 7,000 acres are involved within the county, including 3,000 in the Carey area, the manager said. Most of the alfalfa killed—less than half the acreage—was older than two years, he noted. The first and second year plantings were not as badly damaged as the older plantings.

Only 20 per cent of the alfalfa on some 1,000 acres on about 15 farms below the Base line in the Big Wood river valley has been killed. On another 25 farms within the county, 25 per cent of the crop has been lost, including another 3,000 acres.

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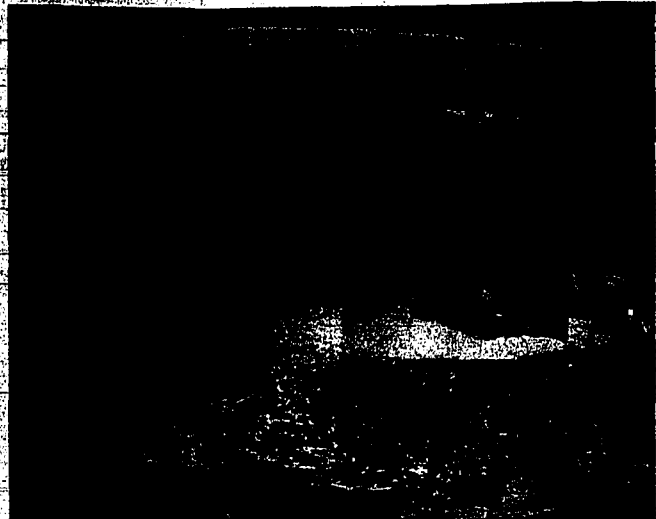

Magic Dam Spills for First Time in Four Years; Water Allotment Assured

SHOARON, May 11 — Magic reservoir is full and water is spilling over the flood gates for the first time in years. Many Pests Eradicated By Chemicals

PORTLAND, May 11 — Discovered by U.S. department of agriculture scientists that several chemicals prevent reproduction in locusts could lead to the control of essentially all locusts in the world, according to a report from the U.S. department of agriculture.

The information was released in a recent bulletin issued by the U.S. department of agriculture.

Scientists of USDA's entomology research service report that certain chemicals induce sterility in locusts, which are a pest of many crops, and that these chemicals have potential advantages over radiation sterilization, which was used in the 1950s to control locusts.

The researchers believe chemical sterilization has potential advantages over radiation sterilization, which was used in the 1950s to control locusts.

Scientists succeeded in halting reproduction in laboratory tests using certain chemicals. Sterile females laid no eggs and the eggs laid by fertile females that had mated with sterile males did not hatch.

In a preliminary field test on Bahia Florida Keys, off the Florida coast, entomologists nearly wiped out a population of locusts with a bait containing a chemosterilant. The bait was applied once a week for three weeks to a heavily infested rump.

At the end of the fifth week only a few flies could be found and 80 per cent of those captured were sterile.

Federal Court Rejects Review

WASHINGTON, May 11 — The U.S. department of agriculture lost the second round in its effort to label as "imitation" ham which has been cured in part by an injection of water.

The federal court of appeals on May 7 turned down a request for a rehearing on its February decision.

"It may be more moist than the unspiced pork meat, but it is still ham if it is cured hog thigh," stated Judge R. Barnett Freeman, when a homemaker soaks ham in water or boils it, this ending water, she knows and everyone knows that she has not thereby transmitted the real ham into an imitation ham.

Hay Man Readies "Merry Christmas" With Tree Crop

HAYLEY, May 11 — Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Anderson are preparing to make a merry Christmas for many folks about 10 years from now.

And, if everything goes as scheduled, their enterprises will continue along a real Christmas tree background—that of home-to-gooodness Christmas trees for many people for many years thereafter.

East-west "Northern" Warren, Blaine county agriculture agent, delivered the Andersons 18,000 trees shipped from the University of Idaho. Anderson took them to their ranch near Paul and Mrs. Dennis Anderson and they were planted in the area.

Within the next few days the Andersons will receive an additional 11,000 trees from the University of Montana. Missoula, also to be planted on their farm.

The first shipment contained blue spruce and Douglas fir. The Andersons are an experienced hayman. Warren states these species of trees are native to the coastal area and are a bushier tree than the spruce and Douglas fir.

The Andersons plan to plant the trees quite close together at this time to save on crop area. They will be transplanted to five-foot centers as soon as they are large enough. They plan on having 20 acres in the tree lot when completed.

The ground on the Anderson ranch is heavy and for this year will be irrigated four times. As the trees mature they plan to irrigate only twice a year.

Tree plantings of Russian olive, locust, Norway spruce and green ash on the Anderson ranch, which is managed by P. A. Thompson, were for many years a show place for the College of Idaho.

It is anticipated that two Boy Scout troops from Blaine and Emmons, will earn money by assisting in the work.

The Andersons anticipate six-foot trees within the 10-year period.

This is the first Christmas tree project of its size in southern Idaho. Warren states.

Congressional Leaders Map Farm Sugar Program

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP) — Administration farm leaders hope to reach an agreement this week with the American sugar industry on a new contract to be recommended to congress.

Agriculture department officials said a conference with representatives of domestic producers of sugar cane and sugar beets at 2 P.M. at the agriculture department will be arranged.

American sugar producers want a larger share of the country's market than allowed under the program expiring June 30.

The administration wants to hold a sizeable share for foreign trade purposes.

The house agriculture committee is anxious to get to work on a sugar bill. It had planned to start public hearings last week but postponed action because the administration had not made any recommendations.

Administration leaders hope this week will bring development on general farm legislation including lighter controls for feed grains, wheat and dairy products.

Measuring Grain Fields Started

Carl Boyd, chairman, Twin Falls county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, today summarized the government's policy on re-planting grain reserves, owned or under loan obligation to CCC, in or near points of production, and at the same time keeping such reserves reasonably fresh through rotating out the older lots as newer supplies come in.

Re-plant loans available to producers in 1962 cover these crops for the period indicated: The 1961-crop corn and wheat for 2 more years; the 1961-crop barley, oats, and grain sorghum, for another year; all 1960-crop wheat, corn and grain sorghum put under re-plant in the past year will automatically be continued in that status for another year; the 1960-crop barley and oats for another year; and the 1959-crop barley and oats for another year.

The new toluene diisocyanate plant will provide California with its first local source of this key chemical required to make flexible and rigid urethane foams and coatings. When completed it will make 11 western states independent of material from the east.

Africa Takes Step to Plot Market Plans

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—General African countries recently took a major step toward the formation of a customs union; coordination of the tariffs, customs systems, and legislation applied to each of them; adoption of a common policy in relation to basic products; and the unification of customs classification methods.

Each member state within five years from date of agreement agrees to abolish all tariffs on its imports from other member countries through progressive reductions.

A permanent body called the African Commission shall be set up to supervise implementation of the agreement.

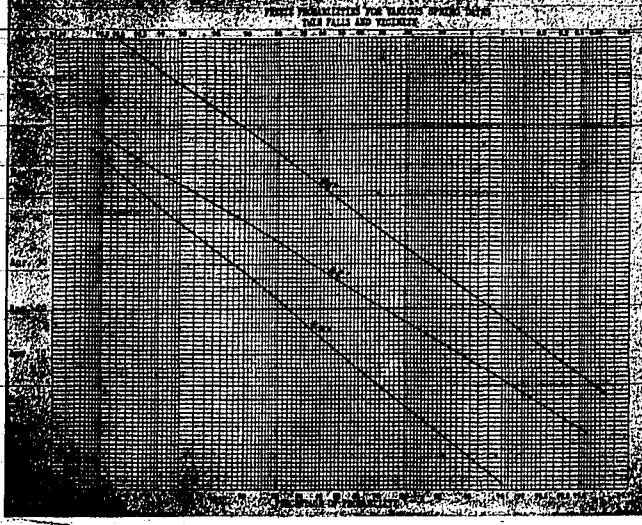

Jobs Available in Farm Sales

WASHINGTON, May 11—Jobs are more numerous among farm machinery and equipment firms than any other farm-related category, a recent survey revealed.

Of 17 agriculture vocations studied in New York, more than three-quarters of existing job opportunities were found in this field.

Additional Moisture Could Alter Range Grass Picture

Think Before Planting Tree At Your Home

If you are planning to plant landscape trees this spring, be selective and think ahead.

It won't be very long before you have a thinning job to do in your little home forest. If you plant only of mostly, fast-growing trees. These include alders, larches, poplars, Chinese silver maple, Willow and poplar.

Overcrowding bars sunlight and prevents proper development of trees. Too much shade also keeps your other flowers from doing their best.

M. W. Staples, a Davey tree expert, recommends corrective pruning or removal for a tree which is too tall to be pruned, while trees have no foliage, having shallow roots are not being used extensively.

The bigger the tree, the more costly is the task of removal.

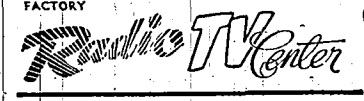

This is the time of the year when the birds are on the wing — and this is noticeable on postage stamps too.

This week Ethiopia's birds are flying high—philatelic speaking.

The new set of six stamps just issued by Ethiopia is the first in that country's history and postal authorities hope to repeat the popularity of their first set of four multicolored stamps featuring first Sport and Olympic Winner stamps. The bird stamps are also Ethiopia's first printed by multicolor photostyrene (by Courvoisier of Switzerland).

The five cent depicts a Hornbill, 15 cent Barbet, 30 cent Baler Eagle, 50 cent Barbets, and 51 cent Red Cuckoo. Each stamp also bears an aerial portrait of King Haile Selassie.

Still on the "wing motif" comes a report via the World Wide philatelic agency that Western Germany has issued a new set of four multicolored stamps featuring butterflies. The new set includes an annual serial called "Youth Stamps." Each stamp will have a surtax for raising youth charity funds.

The 10 pfennig plus "p" shows an "Appalo Butterly." The 10 plus "p" illustrates a "Blue-banded Check." The 20 plus "p" depicts a "Small Fox." The 30 plus "p" highlights a "Black ITT" Swallowtail.

Also issued by West Germany is a new 20 pfennig red Commemorative stamp honoring the 2,000th anniversary of the Mark. An early view of the town is the capital of the state of

Now Is Time to Work on Outdoor Furniture

The time for using outdoor furniture is upon us, and we may have been caught napping if there is anything else we can do to patch it, she wants to know.

Plastic materials are available by the yard, and the job is quickly and economically done by covering the entire side, securing it with an upholstery needle to side seams. Smaller cushions that need covers completely replaced lend themselves to the sewing machine, where plastic may be stitched easily. The new cover can be slipped on over the old one if you like.
