**PHONEY ISSUE**  
It's rather difficult to find a proper place in Idaho's primary election for a missile contract awarded to a California concern. The contract, which would have done a good deal of the work in Pocatello. Up until the contract went elsewhere, everyone concerned — and some who weren't — constituted one big family, all glowing over the possibility of employing up to 2,000 jobs in Pocatello at the old navy gun refining plant. Typically, everyone was claiming a much credit as possible.

Just in the way of review, a Pocatello industrial committee raised money to buy the old navy plant. It was to do what the Pocatello committee followed the traditional course of pulling as many political strings as possible, so many officeholders got in the act. One of them, Governor Smylie, tried to steal a march on everyone last month by predicting that Utah firm, Thihok Chemical corporation, would be awarded the missile contract. It wasn't and that brings the situation practically up to date.

Naturally, Democrats who played a major role in negotiations and purchase of the plant were not pleased when Governor Smylie made a statement that he would have stolen Democratic thunder. So Idaho Democrats and even a Utah Democrat have jumped on Governor Smylie for his statement, using such terms as "fortunate" and "wonderful justification."

As a political issue, the whole business is without justification. It might belong properly in a Pocatello municipal election but what's all the shouting about on the state level? Had Governor Smylie been content in his own reelection, his bid has been in a position to point and claim credit, thus perhaps winning a few more votes in predominantly Democratic Bannock county.

And now it's quite obvious why all the Democrats, including Utah's Sen. Frank Church, jumped on the Governor Smylie. It's the old theory that if enough people holler loud enough and long enough they'll convince someone. In this case, the Democrats are only too eager to use any and every means to get the attention of the voters. The goal is to take advantage of whatever energy they might have to defeat Governor Smylie in the primary election.

The Democrats want a weak Republican nominee for governor to improve what is expected to be a Democratic year of winning the statehouse in November. Voters will not be misled by such tactics. No Democrat is running against Governor Smylie in the primary election. It's a simple truth that Governor Smylie is opposed by a Democrat in the Republican primary, Elvin A. Lindquist and George L. Crookham, Jr. He is not running against Utah's Senator Moss, Idaho's Sen. Frank Church, Rep. Ralph Hartline, Democratic Candidate Charles H. Johnson or any other Democrat.

These worthless wouldn't be so eager to jump into the picture on such a phony political issue as the missile contract unless they had an ulterior purpose, namely, an all-out effort to beat Smylie.

Candidates can't be expected to keep in mind the purpose of primary elections, so it's up to the voters to draw the battle lines in such a way that Democrats oppose Democrat and Republicans oppose Republicans. Democrats choose their best qualified man among the Republicans as opposing a similar path.

And enough of such phony issues. There's enough wrong with the world as it is. Let's let legitimate debates without reaching out in left field for something questionable at best.

**WHIRLIGIG**  
WASHINGTON, May 14—Walter P. Reuther, the most venturesome and imaginative mind in the labor movement, is once again showing his daring by virtually demanding that the federal government take over the collective bargaining process in order to avert a possible strike in the multi-billion dollar defense industry. He insists upon even more administration intervention and authority than is currently accorded to the federal government in the dispute with Big Steel.

Reuther's position, as advanced at his Automobile Workers Union convention at Atlantic City, is that Uncle Sam should take over the industry and engage in the manufacture of defense weapons, especially aircraft, missiles and outer space ships. The federal government is actually the employer of these millions of workers.

President Kennedy, he points out, has demanded that there be no strikes in these critical industries. As a consequence, according to the "New York Times," the government is now intervening in the bargaining on wages because of the heavy federal investment in defense production.

**SOLE CUSTOMER, SOLE EMPLOYER** — Although its significance has not yet been fully appreciated, the resolution adopted Wednesday by the AWAU is a very important one. Reuther plan to force the government to take charge of forthcoming disputes.

Reuther's plan is that "the government is not only the sole customer (of defense industries) but its sole employer as well." In other words, Reuther is that the government is the employer rather than with the owners and operators by whom we are so last month.

In explaining the meaning of the resolution to reporters, Leonard Woodcock, AWAU vice president, put it even more bluntly. "The government is the sole customer and sole employer," he said. "It prefers to remain as a ghost at the bargaining table."

**NATIONALIZATION** — Woodcock advanced another argument for direct dealing with the government rather than with management. Presently, the government is the sole customer and result from the Pentagon's changes in design, cancellation of orders and new methods of production for which union members are not compensated.

"The government," he said, "should reimburse each company for payment of such benefits on a dollar-for-dollar basis. If the government finds out or fubich such payments would be made."

In view of the federal government's heavy investment in production for defense, as well as its interest in such equally essential activities as space exploration, nuclear energy and other defense Reuther's plan is revolutionary. **WASHINGTON** May 14 (AP) — The steel industry's realization that "if any progress at all is to be made in holding a line" on the steel industry — fringe benefits payments to be included in wages or as a part of wages.
