The inquest heard a statement of the arrest, stated that he felt there was sufficient evidence to warrant such a charge and the facts seem to fit the definition of voluntary manslaughter. Troubles Are Feigned for Space Launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., May 15.—The Cape Canaveral launch of the "Saturn 1" spacecraft on its first mission, the "Mercury 8," will be a triumph for the nation's space program.

Control room men made several checks to insure that the actual launch would be on schedule. The launch is set for Saturday.

Everything appeared to proceed smoothly on the first orbit. The problems popped up in each ascension.

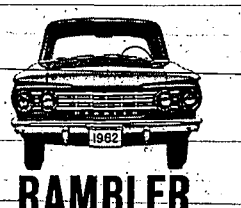

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Time to Plan

Now that a contract has been awarded for construction of a new junior high school building, here, a school board should take a close look at postwar school construction and plan accordingly for the future. School expansion since that time has been rapid and the number of pre-school children does not promise relief in the near future.

Twin Falls school district has voted three large bond issues since the war, totaling nearly four million dollars. None of the bond issues has been paid off, and only yet another will be a considerable interest cost.

If the pattern of the past is continued, Twin Falls will need at least one more elementary school in the not distant future. With a little planning, it might be possible to obtain a suitable site now instead of waiting until the time is imperative and the only available sites are located at the edge of the city or beyond.

Careful consideration should be given now to the possibilities opened by the plant facilities fund which permits a levy of as much as 10 mills to accumulate funds for future construction. There are many ways in which the funds can be invested to increase through interest until needed. The plant facilities fund still requires approval by two-thirds of the voters, the same as a school bond issue.

If local school patrons approved a 10-mill levy, there would be the possibility of financing all necessary expansion of schools here for the next decade without the added expense of paying interest on a bond issue. In addition, a school district would be able to reduce its population and enrollment drastically, thus reducing that source of school taxes.

A real savings is possible.

Time to Plan

Any American who could ever imagine that life would be better in Russia, must be chasing mirages or else has succumbed to Russian propaganda. There could be no other explanation to the experience of Mr. and Mrs. David Johnson, Manchester, N. H., who pulled up stakes and went to Russia with the intent of staying. Other than a dyed in the red communist, it's difficult to imagine the type of person who could have such thoughts.

It's obvious the Johnsons aren't communists, and if they ever had any leanings in that direction, the tendencies have disappeared now. After their arrival in Russia, it didn't take the Johnsons long to see that their situation and their life wasn't for them—Johnson had all sorts of fancy ideas about what he could expect to find in Russia and he confessed all his reasons for the trip were incorrect. So it becomes obvious he was a victim of the propaganda and propaganda. How many others have swallowed the lies but have never been moved to go chasing after red mirages?

After their glimpse of Russia and the discovery that their dreams were really nightmares, the Johnsons are likely to become of the type who are possible for the American way of life. Their discontent with their circumstances might not disappear but they can be expected to be a little more cautious if they ever again imagine some other pasture is greener.

They're not likely to mistake red for green again, either.

MURDERERS

It's easy for extremists to drop off the deep end when they get enthusiastic about their cause, yet that doesn't help understand the so-called secret army organization sometimes known as the "Black Legion" or "Black Legion." This organization is a promotion of open warfare in Algeria between Europeans and Moslems, the secret army has taken to shooting down women. Other women have died in the senseless slaughter of 4,442 since Jan. 1, but only now there was a suggestion that the women were killed by accident or because they were in the path of bullets.

But when the secret army's gunmen turned their weapons on women, they branded themselves for what they are, nothing more or less than murderers. If when they are apprehended, they must get swift justice accordingly.

Even on Algeria's blood-marked streets, there may be those who will object to such coldblooded murder. The extreme action is likely to hasten the end of an extremist organization.

Only so long as it contains its tendencies and is a group of self-discipline in an extremist group likely to arouse any degree of public approval. Once the extremist zeal gets the upper hand, the group itself is working to hasten its end. And in the case of secret army, it is a question of how much longer the murderers will be condoned.

They're long overdue for extermination.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, May 15 — How the course of world history might have been changed completely save for the blizzards of events that descended on the White House and its staff last week has been emphasized by a Canadian physician's theory that the revolution might have been prevented if British Prime Minister William Pitt was not slain at the time.

The generally minor influence of disease on the major changes of world history depends upon this episode alone. It was upon this episode alone that the death of Alexander the Great, the death of Alexander the Fourth, the death of C. C. to the ruling Franklin D. Roosevelt's ill-fated conference with Josef Stalin at Yalta in 1945.

Pitt was strongly opposed to the various monarchial apparatus which were the basic causes of the revolution which the massive taxation on tea and all kinds of duties were those which inspired the protests and retaliations against "taxation without representation."

Pitt might have persuaded George III to repeal these oppressive measures according to Dr. Wallace Gordon of Toronto, except that he was slain by the crew of the British ship *HMS Boscawen*, which led Pitt to refuse his "geopolitical" pleas to intercede with the king. It was only after the death of Pitt that Henry Georges were subject to attacks of temporary insanity. They were so upset that they never tried to learn to speak English!

CIVILIZATION INFLUENCED

Alexander the Great's influence was making preparations for his conquests in Africa and India. In the eve of the campaign, he carried out a deeply and die to take.

Had he lived to carry out his grandiose plans, the basis of culture and civilization in India and many other regions might have been different. The history of modern Europe and England, which includes its law, culture, customs and political structure, might have been utterly different. The strikes for higher wages began 40 days ago and have continued to spread in spite of stern government countermeasures.

Latest to join the strikes were 1200 workers at a Barcelona truck factory. At Puerto Llano, southwest of Madrid, more miners struck away from the government-run pits to bring the strike total in that area alone to 6000.

A threatened sympathy demonstration in Madrid's midtown square, "Puerto del Sol," surrounded the area. Plainclothes men ordered news photographers from vantage points.

In the north, where the three provinces of Asturias, Vizcaya and Guipuzcoa have been under a curfew for 11 days—about 35,000 miners and 25,000 industrial workers continued to defy government pressures to return to work.

The only break in the strike came in southern Andalusia. Several hundred agricultural workers returned to their jobs at Villanueva after daily pay was increased from \$5 to \$11.60.

Six Anglers Died Before Fish Attack

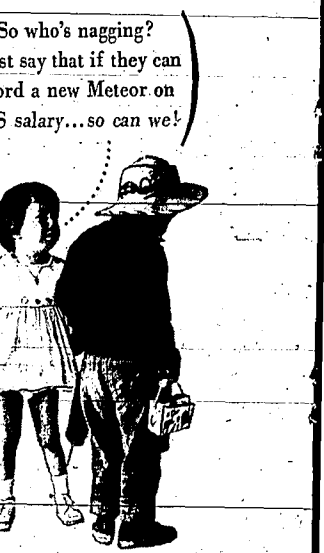
NEWPORT BEACH, Calif., May 15—A group of six men hauled from barracuda-infested waters show they drowned before the fish attacked them. Oceanographers and the coast guard later concluded the bites and tears on the bodies were more probably inflicted by barracuda. The coast guard has ordered an investigation of what it terms a major marine disaster. It said

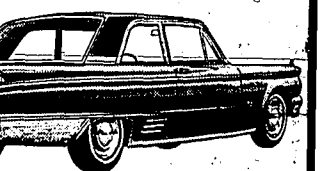

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Muslim Death Justifiable, Jurors Rule

LOS ANGELES, May 15 (AP)—A coroner's jury says the shooting of a black Muslim in a riot April 27 was justifiable homicide.

The jury ruled Monday on the death of Ronald T. Stokes, 29. A policeman testified that he shot Stokes during a melee in which an officer was shot and other Muslims and policemen injured.

Donald L. Weese said Stokes was about five feet away when "he put his hands up as if he was going to choke me."

"I ordered him to stop and then I fired," said Weese.

A grand jury begins an inquiry into the riot today. Officials said more than 50 witnesses would appear, including 20 policemen.

Weese said he wounded "three or four" of the six anti-white Muslims in the riot at the Alhambra, a Muslim temple at midnight.

He said he answered a radio call. He saw a man like a Muslim. Weese said another officer pointed to a dozen fleeing men in business suits and said "get those men."

He said he overlooked some of the men and ordered them to line up against a wall. They cried out, "why, why?" and he shot at them. "I shot a religious chant," Weese said.

The policeman said several Muslims were attacking his partner. "They were choking him and beating him with his baton," Weese said. "I fired three times, then fired at three or four of them around my partner. I saw three of them fall and then I was awfully."

Doctors said Stokes died when a bullet pierced his heart and left lung.

Nine Muslims subpoenaed declined to testify on advice of their attorney.

Raul Castro Lashes Chief

MIAMI, May 15 (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro's brother Raul charged last night that President Kennedy was to blame for the death of three Cuban sailors in a "pirate" attack on a Castroline patrol boat east of Havana.

The younger brother quoted a Spanish-language magazine published in New York for distribution in Latin America, as saying Kennedy favors pollution and economic blockade against Cuba, coupled with attacks by Caribbean-based speculators on the official radio broadcast of Raul's hour-long speech at a Havana ceremony.

"He is in a state of complete pleasure, and as his conclusion the crowd on the scene began to sing 'the communist' international anthem."

Raul also charged that U. S. marines at the Guantanamo naval base have been guilty of "daily provocations" of Cuban soldiers, including them, throwing rocks at them and peering through their legs with binoculars.

Titan Missile to Be Shown at Base

Train Derails; 12 Are Injured

PHILADELPHIA, May 15 (AP)—The third of a four-car elevated train derailed at the platform of a terminal in northeast Philadelphia early today, injuring 12 persons.

A spokesman for the Philadelphia Transportation company said the train wipped against the platform.

Ten of the injured were treated and released at Franklin hospital but told to report back for X-rays, the hospital said.

Two others were detained. They were in satisfactory condition.

Von Braun Backs Space Shot Cost

AMHERST, Mass., May 15 (AP)—A \$9 million dollars U. S. effort to put a man on the moon ahead of the Soviet Union will be worth it because of the knowledge to be gained and because of any strategic value, rocket expert Werner Von Braun says.

Von Braun said Monday night that he agreed with predictions by others in the field that the United States can put a man on the moon within 10 years.
