

Fullest Estes Probe Vowed By President

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—President Kennedy promised today there will be a thorough inquiry into the Billie Sol Estes case—a case his 75 FBI agents already are investigating. The FBI and state departments, and senate and house committees, the President said, are attempting to determine whether any members of the executive branch or of congress are involved. Any inappropriate, he said, will be met with immediate disciplinary action.

Kennedy noted that four government officials have resigned in the aftermath of the collapse of the financial empire of the late Estes. He is charged with fraud, and the federal and state governments have indicted him. The President twice noted that it was his administration that had complete investigation of the case on April 5.

Space Shot Air Force Plane Crashes at Nairobi, 14 Dead

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—A U.S. astronaut plane on a mission related to Saturday's planned space flight by transport pilot Malcolm Scott Carpenter crashed today near Nairobi, Kenya. The air force said all 14 aboard apparently were killed. The air force said all 17 were air force personnel not immediately connected with the national aeronautics and space administration, NASA itself had said earlier that none of the seven Mercury astronauts was aboard the C130 Hercules.

The wreckage of the C130 was found on a muddy field, but it was not clear if the aircraft was in trouble. The plane was apparently burned on impact, the air force said.

Two helicopters from Nairobi were sent to the crash site. The air force said that normally a C130 carries a crew of four. This would indicate the others were passengers.

No names were available immediately and the air force knew only that the plane was in the section with the forthcoming manned satellite flight.

At Cape Canaveral, Fla., Project Mercury spokesman said the C130 was a logistics plane—a supply plane—for the Nairobi-Kenya contingency site.

The air force tells us that it crashed while making an approach to the Nairobi air field, he said.

The spokesman said the plane was from the Brooks, a base in France and was assigned to the 322nd air division.

Marines Entering Thailand, Flying Near Laos Border

BANGKOK, Thailand, May 17 (AP)—U. S. marines, carrying a bristling array of bazookas and other arms, moved up to Thailand's border with communist-ruled Laos today. One of their officers declared they will stay "as long as we are needed." A large force of 1,800 marines in heavily equipped units are being sent to the border from U.S. Seventh Fleet warships at Bangkok with rifles, grenade launchers, machine guns and bazookas and were greeted by the cheering Thai crowd.

Thailand's government had invited American forces to help defend the border which was threatened by communist forces in Laos last week.

The first marines were then transferred to huge C-130 transporters to a point about 40 miles southwest of the Laos border in Thailand. The area is not hot and dusty in summer and wet and muddy in winter.

American forces are expected to be strung out in a 300-mile arc along the Laos border from the Vietnam area to the southern extreme of Laos.

The nearest jet air base is at Udon Thani, 100 miles from Hanoi, where the communist forces are active. Thailand's frontier.

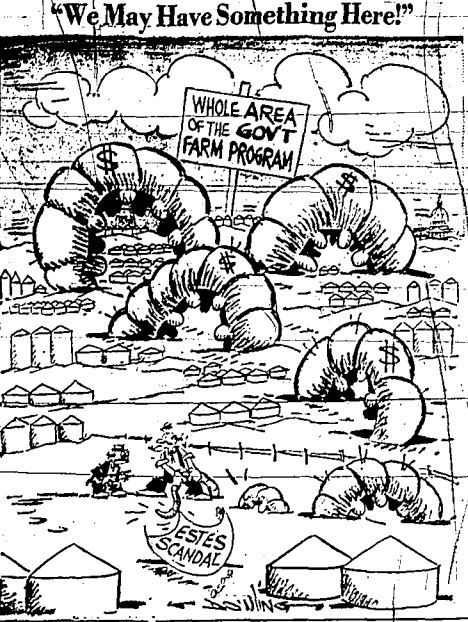

Disgraceful Record

Public agency has been blamed for this week's disgraceful turnout for the regular visit of the Red Cross bloodmobile. Blame it on public apathy, lack of interest, change-of-days-and-hours, lack of publicity by the Times-News, or any other reason that may come to mind, but the citizens of Twin Falls should feel ashamed collectively for donating only 65 pints of blood toward a 150-pint quota.

With a population in excess of 20,000 Twin Falls should have no difficulty finding several times more blood donors than are needed. Actually, the bloodmobile should schedule a two-day stop in Twin Falls with a minimum goal of 3,000 pints of blood. Assuming that only 400 residents are qualified to donate blood, a quota of only 800 pints still represents just a small fraction of those eligible. And here the best that can be done is only 65 pints—with a free lunch thrown in for donors!

Says Wesley Dobbs, Twin Falls county blood chairman, "Public apathy to the Red Cross blood program in Twin Falls is the main reason for the drawing not being successful. This is, and has been, the number one problem in trying to have Twin Falls citizens meet the blood quota set for them which is only one-half of the total amount of blood actually used by Twin Falls citizens."

That statement should serve as an enough of a warning. If Twin Falls is to meet its quota and something like six times more blood than is actually donated, local citizens had better sit up and take notice. No blood program can go on indefinitely at the expense of the community. The bare minimum. But to be successful, a blood bank must receive more other than bank deposits must exceed withdrawals. The more the bank cannot be postponed for long.

In view of this week's disgrace to the community, citizens of Twin Falls should start planning now to rub the black mark off the local blood record. Bloodmobile will return to Twin Falls in about two months, about the middle of July. That's a time of the year when it's easy to find excuses for staying away from the bloodmobile—the weather's hot, people are vacationing, fishing, golfing. There are all sorts of reasons to stay away and anyone so inclined can find several in a hurry.

But there is one excellent reason for donating blood, the impact on the old pocketbook. In event the program is withdrawn, blood counts don't merely drop, they decrease. They don't merely drop; they increase by a minimum of three times.

Instead of looking for a reason to stay away, look for a reason to attend the next stop of the bloodmobile in mid-July. Watch for the date and hours.
