HAILEY, May 19.—The Hailey city council has approved the plans for a new city pump house located on North Second Street, the site is presently in use as the northeast city limits.

The structure will also house a new chlorinator, Albert Johnson, city commissioner, will supervise the work of building.

The pump house in use will be moved to the new location. It is estimated that although the pump will draw from a well, it will be able to pump more than 900 gallons per minute, this is the maximum that will be needed from this source of supply.

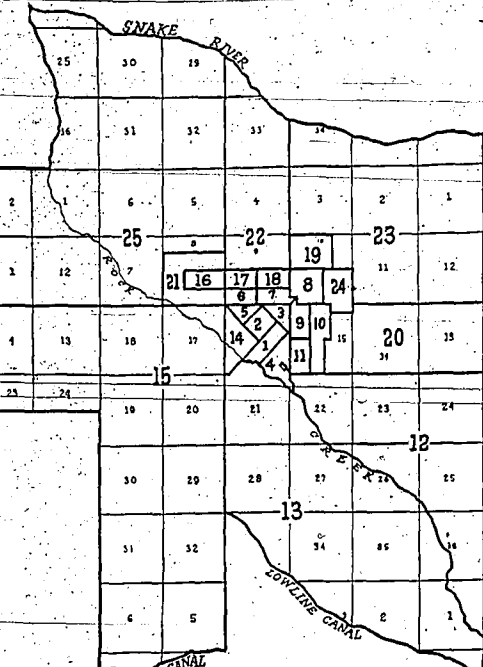

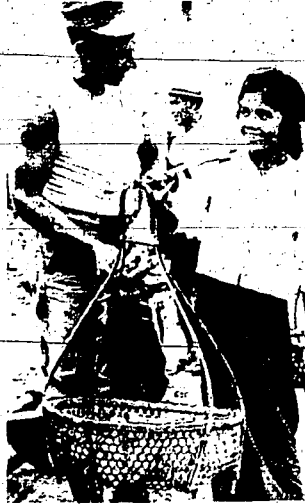

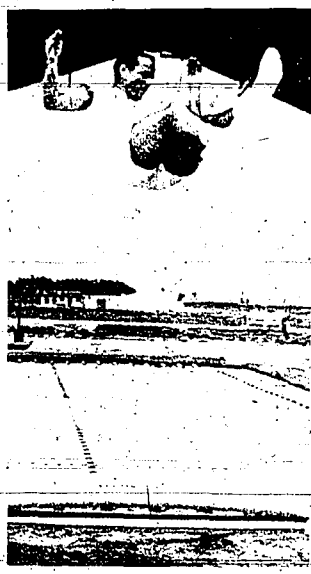

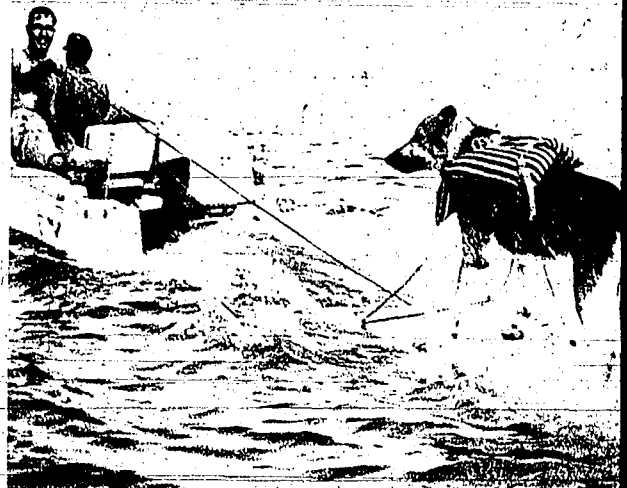

Only Way Eligible Citizens Can Miss In June 5 Election Is by Not Voting

If you fail to mark your ballot in the primary election June 5 the reason cannot be lack of ballots to mark.

In Twin Falls county there will be 25,000 official ballots available at the polling places, all printed by the Times-News job printing department. Actually, because of the requirement that name positions be changed every so often in situations where two or more candidates seek the same post, it is like a run of more than 10,000 so far.

The entire run for the 25,000 ballots took four days. And just to no enthusiastic voter gets the idea of voting more than once, all spoiled ballots are accounted for and are destroyed. The official ones are delivered only to the county clerk for distribution by him.

A breakdown of the polling place shows 25 to be within the city of Twin Falls, seven in Burdette, three in Filer, two in Kimberly and the rest singles throughout the county.

Just to keep the records straight there are only two parties on the ballot this year, Republican and Democratic — no socialist or communist.

And to make all things equal, the printing order called for the 25,000 ballots to be equally available, half for the Republicans and half for the Democrats. You must declare which one you want when you vote and only the ballot of that party will be handed to you.

SHOSHONE, May 19 — "It is true the Nazis, the fascists and the communists are not strangers to me," Tracy Coker, Twin Falls, Republican candidate for the nomination of second district congressman, declared Thursday in Shoshone.

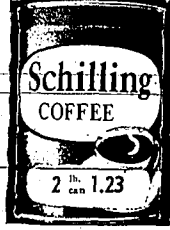

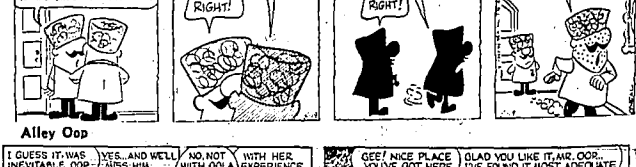

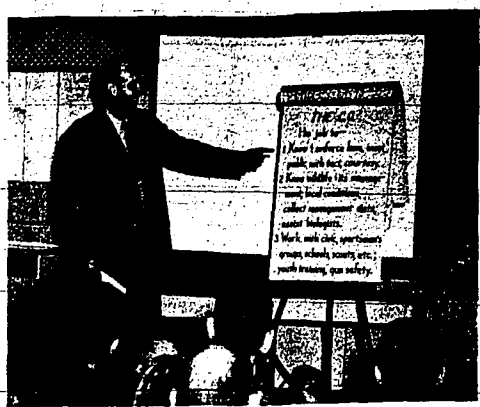

"We already know that the brain needs only about an hour's sleep most sleeping time is spent becoming comfortable enough to give the brain this brief rest," he explains.

Cameron insists there is no danger of drowning in his bed. Normally unequal pressures against the body produce tired muscles lead to a person rolling over. But Aquarac eliminates the unequal pressures, Cameron says, thereby removing the urge to land and turn.

Several bugs must be ironed out before the device has a chance for mass appeal. For example, it is barely ready to risk an 18 trial in the southern waters.

State Conservation Plans Aided by Sportsmen Banded Together in Clubs

With the general attitude of sportsmen toward the fish and game department, it is a good time to start to eliminate the causes of their recreational habits. The land-posting, which more often than not is done by the fish and game commission, it's a good time to join or become active in a sportsmen's club.

There are several reasons for joining—and any season is a good time for becoming active in a sportsmen's club. The local group does more than show a film about fishing or hunting. It also holds a meeting with a few liberal of the department. It's still a good idea.

Such a meeting may appear to be a waste of time, especially when better entertainment is available at home almost any night in the week. But so, any sportsman who is interested in his organization are like ships in a sea of water. With-out capable captains and mates on the bridge, they quickly run aground.

To function properly, a good club must have local projects such as improving a public access site for fishing or hunting, developing waterfowl areas, bettering landholder-sportsmen relations, teaching hunter safety training. These are some of the problems that sportsmen's organizations are in the best position to help solve.

For example, the broad field of landholder-sportsmen relations offers opportunities for programs to help extend the life of "no-no's." No true sportsman can afford to permit the small minority of disreputable hunters and fishermen to place his sport in jeopardy through carelessness, irresponsibility for good outdoor manners, and so on.

It is not that Walt Miller remains changeless, because his farm is modern and up-to-date. It is just that if things are going all right then why change it. In fact everything on the Miller place is work that Miller has done. A few weeks ago he cut down two trees. These were about 130 years old when Miller came to this country. So he had "decided" active and has made some changes.

According to Miller he was 19 years old when he stepped off the train at Curry and he thought he had entered the garden of Eden. The sun was shining, everything was green and the farmers were in the fields working. This was Feb. 22, 1912. He left Illinois in a blizzard.

Miller is looking forward to observing his 70th birthday anniversary this year. He is active around the farm and always has something to do. Add this to an appreciation for good humor and you, for telling stories and you have a fine picture of Walter Miller.

Some of Miller's favorite stories concern the days when he would pack up and go horse trading in Nevada, among the Indians. One example of the trades he would make was when he left Curry with a three-year-old stallion and brought back six horses and six pigs. Miller claims he got in the best of the good horse trading days. They don't trade like that anymore.

Horses were a long time hobby with Miller. For years he raised registered Belgian horses. Miller claims that he never finished lower than third in any horse show. The Belgians are gone but Miller keeps a few boxes on the place.

Miller recalls the first time he ever journeyed into Twin Falls: he walked down the railroad tracks. The second trip was by horseback. The third trip was in a buggy and the fourth trip was in a model T Ford.

When asked about progress, Miller grins and says that progress is fine, but he points out that there are just as many chuckholes in the road today as there were many years ago. A testimonial to Miller's ability to get along with his neighbors is his claim that he has never had an argument with anyone, never had an accident, and he can recall a row with anybody.

Miller might lay claim to the title of the exact man in the world to get along with. D. E. Alger has run the Miller farm for the past 20 years and Miller claims they've never had a cross word between them.

Miller says that life has treated him well and it had to do so all over again he spent those 50 years on the same corner.

50 Years of Continuous Residence at Same Farm Is Noted by Curry Farmer

Ask anyone in Curry where Walt Miller lives and he can tell you. Miller hasn't moved in 50 years. He has resided on a farm one mile south of Curry since Feb. 22, 1912.

Miller is a man of strong habits. For example, when he arrived in the area he deposited \$100 in the Fidelity National bank. Some 50 years later he is still doing business with the same bank. In 1914 he became a subscriber to the Times-News and has taken it ever since.

It is not that Walt Miller remains changeless, because his farm is modern and up-to-date. It is just that if things are going all right then why change it. In fact everything on the Miller place is work that Miller has done. A few weeks ago he cut down two trees. These were about 130 years old when Miller came to this country. So he had "decided" active and has made some changes.

According to Miller he was 19 years old when he stepped off the train at Curry and he thought he had entered the garden of Eden. The sun was shining, everything was green and the farmers were in the fields working. This was Feb. 22, 1912. He left Illinois in a blizzard.

Miller is looking forward to observing his 70th birthday anniversary this year. He is active around the farm and always has something to do. Add this to an appreciation for good humor and you, for telling stories and you have a fine picture of Walter Miller.

Some of Miller's favorite stories concern the days when he would pack up and go horse trading in Nevada, among the Indians. One example of the trades he would make was when he left Curry with a three-year-old stallion and brought back six horses and six pigs. Miller claims he got in the best of the good horse trading days. They don't trade like that anymore.

Horses were a long time hobby with Miller. For years he raised registered Belgian horses. Miller claims that he never finished lower than third in any horse show. The Belgians are gone but Miller keeps a few boxes on the place.

Miller recalls the first time he ever journeyed into Twin Falls: he walked down the railroad tracks. The second trip was by horseback. The third trip was in a buggy and the fourth trip was in a model T Ford.

When asked about progress, Miller grins and says that progress is fine, but he points out that there are just as many chuckholes in the road today as there were many years ago. A testimonial to Miller's ability to get along with his neighbors is his claim that he has never had an argument with anyone, never had an accident, and he can recall a row with anybody.

Miller might lay claim to the title of the exact man in the world to get along with. D. E. Alger has run the Miller farm for the past 20 years and Miller claims they've never had a cross word between them.

Miller says that life has treated him well and it had to do so all over again he spent those 50 years on the same corner.

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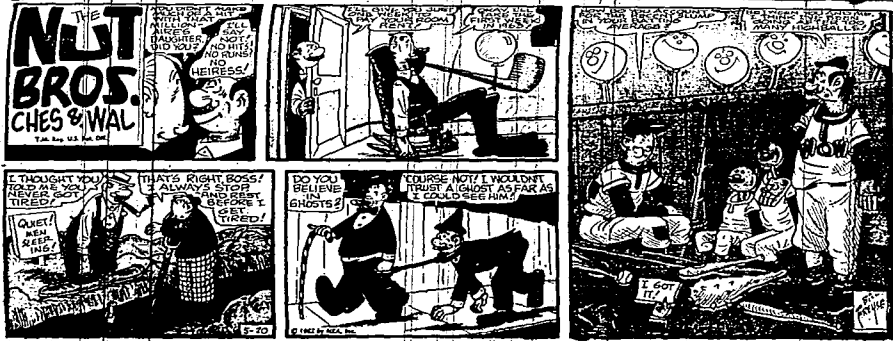
