Kennedy Rejects Compromise View On Medical Care

Firing another broadside at the American Medical Association Wednesday, Kennedy repeated his prediction that congress will adopt his plan this year if it reaches the house and senate floors. And he contended that despite AMA opposition, "more and more doctors are supporting it."

Titan Blast Injures 24 During Test

Kennedy's Farm Surplus Plan, Wheat Reductions Are Passed

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—The administration scored a victory in the senate today on its request for tighter controls over production of wheat. In the first major test on a catch-all farm bill, tailored to reduce government surplus and costs on grains, the senate eliminated a provision which could have continued a current wheat allotment and price support plan another two years. The vote was 63 to 36, closely following party lines.

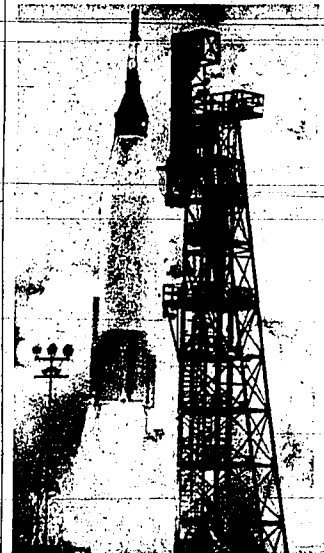

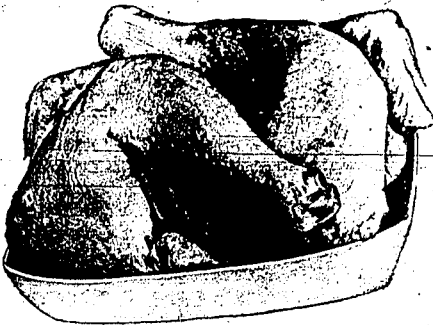

The clothing has been sent to the FBI laboratory in Washing-

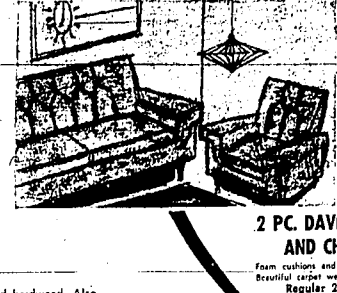
ton, D.C., for analysis. It is the third box of materials sent to the FBI lab since the murder investigation began.

Police booked Rosenberg on a homicide charge shortly before dawn, after he had been questioned through the night, and early morning and viewed by witnesses.

Defendants said he said he is innocent.

Rosenberg's surrender—described in a copyright story in the News—came five days and a few hours after the murders and on Rosenberg's 25th birthday anniversary.

Police revealed last Monday that they knew the identities of the three bandits and that a nationwide search was under way.

Later that day, the alleged triggerman accused of staging the \$4,000 holdup of a tobacco company with Rosenberg, was caught in a motel in a Chicago suburb.

The next day, the man accused of driving a car which was to have been used in a getaway attempt—Vincent Conroy—was arrested.

# Auditor's Employee Claims He Was Fired for Contribution

By The Associated Press  
A former employee in the office of State Auditor Joe L. Williams said yesterday that he was compelled to contribute to an office campaign fund and fired because he stopped contributing.

But the chief accountant in Williams' office said the employee was discharged because he was one of six employees released when July 1, 1961, the bureau of public accounts was transferred from the auditor's to the governor's office.

Chester Guy, Boise, said that Williams earlier acknowledged the existence of the fund but said no employee has been discharged for not doing it, and no employee has been coerced into doing it.

Bernie Hultquist, chief accountant in the office, said Guy was discharged because he was one of six employees released when July 1, 1961, the bureau of public accounts was transferred from the auditor's to the governor's office.

The supreme court ordered the

transfer effective on that date. State Sen. Howard Jochims, Idaho, said that business growth will make a major change in the state's tax structure in the next biennium unnecessary.

Republican senatorial candidate John T. Hawley, Boise, said the administration is not following a multiple use concept in development of natural resources.

William R. Padgett, Boise, a Republican, said that it effected a report by himself he would use his membership on the board of the Idaho ACT-CO, said examiners "to correct the damage done to the state's credit and standing by the constructionists."

# Vietnamese Sentenced in Murder Plot

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, May 24 (AP) — Four Vietnamese students convicted of attempting to assassinate U.S. ambassador to South Viet Nam Frederick Nolting Jr. were sentenced to death yesterday by a special military tribunal.

The government press agency reported that the students also were convicted of planning and carrying out five other hand-

grenade attacks in the Saigon area last summer, including two attempts against the lives of U. S. military assistance and military group personnel.

The attempted assassination of Nolting took place last August when a hand grenade was tossed at the ambassador's car. The grenade bounced off the car's door but did not explode.

The prosecutor charged the students with being responsible for the death of two Vietnamese in one hand grenade last night and having been cut deliberately out of the attack, which also injured nine civilians.

# AFL Gives Commissioner Five-Year Pact, Sets up Football Hall of Fame

**NEW YORK, May 24 (AP)—**The National Football league voted commissioner Rozelle a \$100,000 bonus for 1961 and boosted his salary the same amount for 1962 at Wednesday's meeting. The owners, riding high after their victory over the rival American Football league in a monopoly suit, also rewarded Rozelle for his work in the court action and the new single network television deal.

Rozelle received a new five-year contract in January at the Miami Beach meetings when the court case was suspended. It was not increased at the time but it was understood that the matter would be adjusted later in the suit.

The commissioner also played an important part in making it possible for the league to sign a new \$25 million dollar TV (CBS) contract in January. A previous contract had been nullified by a federal judge who found it violated an anti-trust law. A special jury was passed by Congress and signed by the President, exempting pro football, basketball and hockey from the anti-trust law in the area of professional sports.

Austin Gansel, league treasurer, received a \$5,000 annual increase in his salary. The NFL set its attendance record last year with 3,268,159 and Rozelle already has predicted that the figure will be broken this year on the basis of booming advance sales.

Rozelle, 53, moved up to the top of the league in an advisory position in 1960, following the death of Bert Bell. After some time he was named as general manager of the Los Angeles Rams. He was named as general manager of the members of the new national professional football hall of fame, to be dedicated in August 1963. At Canton, O., was outlined at the meeting.
